

## Along The Waterfront



The rough water has slacked off the fishing in this area slightly for the past few days, but with the sunny weather returning, fishing looks very promising again. A number of party boats have gone out with fishermen today.

The duck season ended Monday and has been the best year for shooting ducks in a long time.

The Harrells at Port Bay Hunting and Fishing Club, report a very good year, plenty of ducks and lots of hunters to kill them, with the majority bringing in their limits each day.

Hunting was fine at St. Charles Bay Club, also, and the sportsmen brought in their limit oftener than not. A number of the hunters got nice catches of fish after getting their limit of ducks in the morning.

At Mills Wharf last Saturday there were 28 hunters out and every one of them came in with their limit of ducks—a perfect day. There were 35 hunters out from the Wharf Sunday, with about half of them bringing in their limit and the others had three or four ducks each. On the last day of the hunting season, Monday, there were 14 out hunting and seven got their full limit, but all brought in some ducks. There were 3,072 ducks and 32 geese killed by hunters going out from Mills Wharf this season.

The fishermen are catching a few rat reds and drum and trout out there at present.

Hub Jones, Bob Stewart and J. B. Crisler of Lubbock, fished Saturday, Sunday and Monday on the flats in front of Floyd's Boat and Sales Co., catching 206 trout on plugs. M. M. Edon of Houston, landed 25 trout out there Sunday, and Mr. Sikes of Dallas and Harry Mills of San Antonio, brought in 64 trout Sunday which they caught out on the flats.

Mr. Johnson of Johnson's Bait Stand says that every one going fishing down there is bringing in some trout, although they are not biting in as large numbers as they were before the high wind of the past few days.

At Perry Jones' Wharf fishing was fine last weekend with one party catching 30 fish out there Sunday.

## SUN TEST CORING AT 10,492 FEET

Sun Oil Co. No. 3-1 St. Charles Bay State Tract 368, wildcat 14 1/2 miles northeast of Rockport, was bottomed at 10,492 feet taking A-1 sidewall cores.

Sun Oil Co. No. A-1 St. Charles Bay State Tract 368, wildcat approximately 16 miles northeast of Rockport, was drilling at 7,978 feet on an 11,500-foot project.

Sun Oil Co. No. A-1 Copano Bay State Tract 98, wildcat approximately seven miles west of Rockport, was drilling at 1,850 feet on a 10,000-foot permit. The test was earlier spudded by a Southeastern Drilling Co. rig.

Sam E. Wilson, Jr. and Warlit Oil Corp. No. 1 W. L. Pridgen, wildcat one mile west of Rockport, had set 10 1/2-inch casing at 1,011 feet. The scheduled 10,000-foot test is in John Smith and John G. Smith Survey.

Selby-Walter Corp. No. 1 Earl M. Baker, scheduled 8,000-foot East Fulton Beach Field test a quarter mile west of Fulton, has set 10 1/2-inch casing at 1,028 feet. Location is in Fulton Outlot 3 in William M. Carper Survey.

Ralph B. Lee Trustee No. 1 R. H. Winsor and others, test in the Lamar Field, will be 50 feet from the north and 170 feet from the east and west lines of Block 102 of Lamar Townsite. Permit depth is 7,500 feet.
