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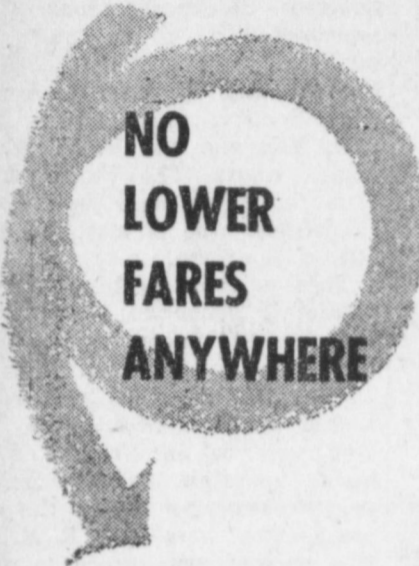
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Got a good idea for a new invention around in the back of your mind? Better take care or someone else may beat you to the patent office.

Many people have good ideas about new or improved machines or gadgets, but never do anything about them because they don't know how to protect their rights while perfecting such items and going through the necessary patenting procedure. Here's what you can do to protect your invention before you have it patented.

Under the patent laws of the United States the person who first conceives of a new and novel patentable idea is entitled to it. Therefore, if conflicting claims arrive as to who is entitled to a patent, it is necessary to establish who first had the idea, not who filed the first application for patent.

Of course, it is always advisable to make application for patents as soon as possible in such cases. But don't forget to protect yourself while you are completing your final drawings and ultimate plans and making such tests as may be needed to perfect your patent. To do this you should, as soon as you conceive the idea, make a written record of the facts, dating the same, including a general statement of the nature of your invention, and a rough drawing if possible. This should be witnessed by two persons who could be called on later to certify that they witnessed the same on the dates set out in the instrument you have drawn.

Some inventors place such witnessed statements and drawings in an envelope. This they seal and mail to themselves by Registered Mail. Their post office stamps each seam of the envelope in such a way that any opening of same can be detected. Upon receiving the registered envelope and its contents, the inventor merely files it away in a safe place unopened. Then, if a contest should later develop, postal records will lend additional support to the testimony of his witnesses.

By taking the above precautions you will establish a preliminary date showing the time when your original idea was conceived. After that you can continue with your work, perfect idea, and after the same is perfected, make application for a patent, if you feel that you have a patentable idea.

One should not just make a preliminary sketch and put it away and think that is sufficient to protect his rights. That is just one additional bit of evidence to help him establish his right to the patent. The patent should be sought as soon as one possible can after conceiving his patentable idea and working out details of the same.

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HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From Your State Capitol

AUSTIN—Texas needed another good, soaking rain. Thousands of the devout, and perhaps some of the not-so-devout, prayed for it Sunday in response to a plea from Governor Allan Shivers.

The governor urged ministers of all faiths and their congregations to "turn to the One who is the source of all help." At the same time, Shivers telegraphed President Eisenhower to thank him and other officials of the administration for their speedy aid to drouth-stricken Texas.

From the White House had come word that the President would allocate \$8 million for emergency drouth relief in 152 Texas and Oklahoma counties.

The plan was to furnish feed at low prices, permit the railroads to grant lower rates on feed and cattle, and extend credit to ranchmen and farmers.

Simultaneously the Department of Agriculture announced that it would buy 200 million pounds of beef from cattlemen in the dry Southwest.

Secretary of Agriculture hoped that this purchasing would remedy the "ruinously low prices" for cattle.

Good rains had fallen over a good deal of the state, but the precipitation was not enough, generally, to put the drouth out of the picture.

From Washington came long-range weather forecast that held out hope for the eastern part of the state, with "substantial" moisture from Central Texas eastward.

The outlook for West Texas was dry.

There was more and more activity in the political field.

Not any time recently has there been so much political maneuvering so early.

The elections are a year away, but three factions are already preparing for the struggle, and individual candidates are going speech-making and handshaking.

Paying a visit to the state was Stephen A. Mitchell, Democratic National Chairman, who said he would invite Adlai Stevenson to come here later.

Mitchell asked party members who supported Eisenhower to return to the Democratic fold, and predicted Democratic victories this year.

He forecast that "Sam Rayburn will return to the speakership of the House, and Lyndon Johnson will be majority leader, not minority leader."

But there was evidence that the rift between Eisenhower and Stevenson Democrats was still there.

When the Texas Federation of Labor convened at El Paso, delegates booed when a speaker charged that Governors Shivers of Texas, Thornton of Colorado, and Mechem of New Mexico were "state's righters last year when it was a matter of dough in the pocket, but this year, when it's a matter of drouth relief, they're quite willing to be Americans and accept relief from the central government."

Shivers led the Democratic revolt that gave the state to Eisenhower last year. Labor leadership generally was for Stevenson.

Could Mitchell and the other party leaders pull Texas back into line?

It was obvious that they were going to work hard to reach that

goal. And it was equally clear that the Republicans were going to fight them every inch of the way. They hoped to make outright party members of the Democrats who voted for Eisenhower, and they planned to put up candidates for every elective office.

It was easy to make one prediction: the Texas political battles of next year are going to be big and bitter.

If Governor Shivers had party politics on his mind he didn't say so in his speech to the state bar convention in Fort Worth.

His remarks concerned liberty on the national and international level.

Americans, he said, "are the best in the world at selling soap and television sets, and we've got to sell liberty like we sell soap."

Shivers added: "We haven't sold liberty at home or abroad. We tried to buy it abroad, but this hasn't worked and it never will."

The political experts were bound to make interpretations of the speech.

Did it mean that Shivers would run for a national office next year?

The governor has said that he might make the race for a third term as the state's chief executive.

But then, again, he might not. Your guess is as good as any: if Shivers has decided what he is going to do, he has confided in no one.

And if we can judge by the past performance, he won't say a word about his intentions until the deadline gets here.

There was a bit of shuffling around as a result of one of the

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governor's appointments. Weldon Hart, one of Shivers' executive assistants, is now chairman and executive director of the Texas Employment Commission, one of the state's biggest departments.

Hart, a former newspaperman of wide experience, served as secretary of the State Democratic Executive Committee. He had a prominent part in sending an un-instructed delegation to the national Democratic campaign.

In his new office, Hart succeeds Harry Bengt Crozier, a former newspaperman who announced that he would go into the public relations business with Joe Hitchcock and Hugh Williams in Austin.

Hart's old job as executive assistant to the governor will be filled by Earl Braley, Austin public relations man who worked for the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

Both the state and federal governments get a lot of money from taxes on alcoholic beverages.

Coke R. Stevenson, Jr., administrator of the Texas Liquor Control Board, reported that a new high in receipts was registered for May of this year: \$1,391,589.

The state's revenues from taxes on alcoholic beverages will run above \$19 million for this calendar year.

And the federal government's excise taxes on alcoholic beverages are higher than the state's.

Old age assistance checks started going out on schedule, although it looked for a while as though there might be a delay.

The federal part of the fund was in doubt, but Congress quickly passed a resolution extending the old appropriation until a new one could be passed.

Following the Cyclecade, two types of bicycle races will be held. One will be a "snail race"—an event which will be won by the contestant who takes the longest time to negotiate the 50-yard course without stopping or touching ground. Both races will have divisions for boys and girls.

The first day activities will be rounded out with a street dance starting at dark.

The Shrimp-O-ree Parade, led by Attorney General John Ben Shepperd, will be held at 11 a.m., Saturday.

More than 100 entries—including bands, floats, and decorated automobiles—are expected.

Immediately afterward, a fish dinner will be served by Aransas Pass business men to all Shrimp-O-ree participants and spectators. The menu will include red snapper beans, pickles, bread and onions.

The rulers of the celebration—King and Queen Shrimp-O-ree—will be announced and crowned during a dance Saturday evening.

The king will be the winner of a two-month-long election staged by the Aransas Pass Chamber of Commerce. The winning candidate's wife will be crowned Queen Shrimp-O-ree.

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A. J. Bankhead, George Clark, Sam Kaufman, J. T. Steelman, Paul Wilhelm, Arlin Yeager, Houston Speer, Justin Snyder, Dr. W. N. Tinnerman, and Lloyd Richardson.

The losers in the King Shrimp-O-ree contest and their wives will serve as members of the ruling court.

The Sunday program will get under way at noon with a shrimp boil under the auspices of the Aransas Pass seafood industry.

It will be followed by the blessing of the fleet.

The blessing will be delivered by Msgr. Adolph Marx, chancellor of the Diocese of Corpus Christi. He will be aboard a boat that will move slowly through the harbor while the blessing is pronounced.

A welcome will be extended to visitors by the Rev. Damien Hayes of St. Mary's Star of the Sea Church in Aransas Pass.

Also on hand will be a Catholic choir from the nearby community of Taft. Members of the Corpus Christi Knights of Columbus will provide an honor guard.

The ceremony is expected to attract more than 500 fishing boats

from Morgan City, Port Arthur, Galveston, Freeport, Port O'Connor, Port Isabel, Brownsville, Rockport, and Port Lavaca as well as Aransas Pass.

The boats will be decorated with flags and streamers for the occasion.

After the blessing is completed spectators will be invited to board the shrimp trawlers for a marine parade around the Aransas harbor in nearby waters.

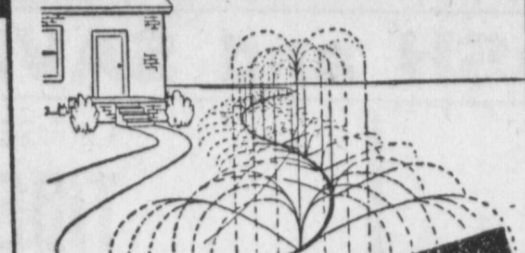
The Rockport Rhymsters held their regular monthly meeting Friday night at the home of Mrs. Paul Reese.

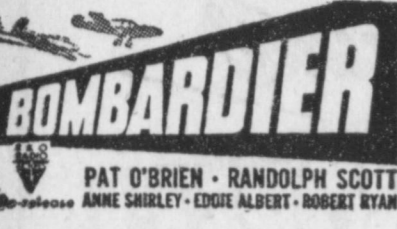

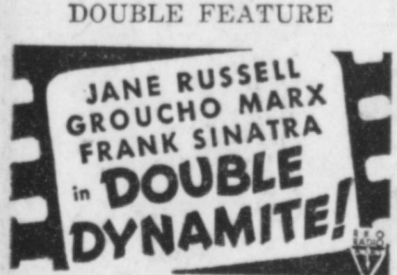

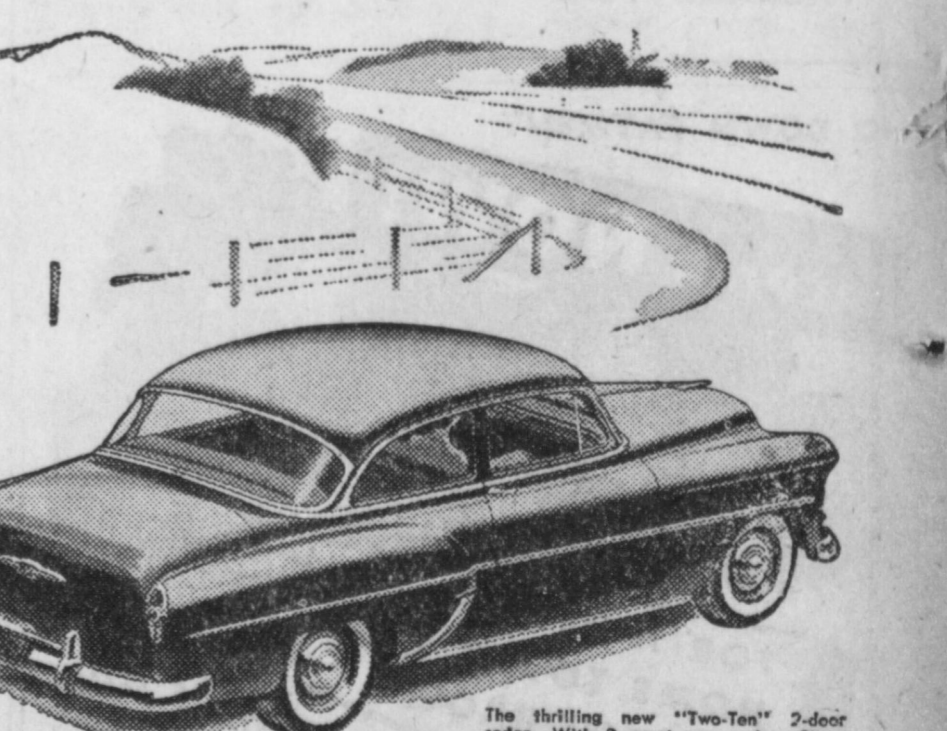
