One should not just make a preliminiary sketch and put it away and think that is sufficient to protect his rights. That is just one additional bit of evidence to help him establish his right to the patent. The patent should be sought as scon as one possible can after conceiving his patentable idea and working out details of the same. (This column, based on Texas law, is written to inform-not to advise.
