## Funeral Services For Mrs. Morrison Held Tuesday Afternoon

Funeral services for Mrs. Katherine Morrison, 77, were held Tuesday afternoon, Aug. 18, at 4 o'clock at the Presbyterian Church with the pastor, Rev. T. H. Pollard, officiating. Burial was in the Rockport Cemetery.

Mrs. Morrison, a resident of Rockport for 12 years, died Sunday night in a Corpus Christi hospital.

Katherine Julia Lacey was born at Laceyville, Penn., Oct. 1, 1875, and was reared at Nealsville, Wis. She was a graduate of Moody Bible Institute and after her graduation was secretary to Dr. R. A. Torrey, head of the Institute. It was here that she met Mr. Morrison while a student and they were married at Denver, Colo., Jan. 14, 1902. The greater part of her married life was devoted to helping her husband in industrial Y.M.C.A. work in mining and railroad construction camps and in oil towns throughout western United States and Canada.

Mrs. Morrison was a member of the Presbyterian Church and the Daughters of the American Revolution. In 1932-33 she served as assistant district clerk in Corpus Christi.

Surviving are her husband, W. H. Morrison; three sons, Hugh of Rockport, Paul of Fort Worth, and Donald of Cimarron, N. M.; one sister, Florence Lacey of Topeka, Kan.; two brothers, John Lacey of Lenart, Kan., and Frank Lacey of Coolidge, Ariz.; 10 grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

The pallbearers were Norvell Jackson, C. C. Hayden, Ted Little, Floyd Smith, Pete Sprinkle, and Fred Brundrett.

## Student Registration Schedule Set

The Aransas County public schools and Sacred Heart Catholic School will both open the 1953 school term the first part of September.

Registration for the Sacred Heart School, which teaches the first through the sixth grades, will be held Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday, Aug. 24, 25 and 26, from 9 a. m. to 12 noon.

School will open Wednesday, Sept. 2, with Holy Mass at 8 a. m. and classes start at 8:30 that morning.

Dave Coleman, high school principal, has announced that the following schedule will be followed for registration of high school students: Tuesday, Aug. 25, Freshmen will register; Wednesday, Aug. 26, Sophomores; Thursday, Aug. 27, Juniors; and on Friday, Aug. 28, Seniors will enroll.

Mr. Coleman said that if it proves impossible for any student to register on the specified dates, to contact him and he would set a date for them to register before school opens.

Fulton and Rockport Elementary and Rockport junior high students will register at the respective school on the day they start to school, Tuesday, Sept. 8. A four-day workshop for teachers in the Aransas County schools will be held Sept. 1-4, Supt. Pat Greene has announced.

Afternoon periods of the first two days of the work shop will be devoted to study groups by grades and orientation meetings of members of the faculty with the principals and superintendent.

The last two days of the workshop will be devoted to group discussion meetings of the principals with their respective faculties.

Union Producing Co. No. 10 Taton, wildcat nine miles north of Lamar, has run 5-inch liner to about 9,200 feet after drilling to 11,378 feet. The test had earlier set 7-inch casing at 8,621 feet. Location is in J. M. Shreve Survey, A-186.

Renwar Oil Corp. No. 1 United Producing Co. wildcat 5½ miles west of Rockport, was drilling below 7,275 feet with mud logger attached. The slated 9,000-foot test is in Gilliland Survey, A-71.

V. G. Glasscock No. 1 State Tract 1, slated 7,500-foot wildcat seven miles northwest of Rockport, was making hole below 4,510 feet.

## WILDCATS TO PERFORATE, TEST

Arkansas Fuel Oil Corp. No. 1 State Tract 4, wildcat about four miles west southwest of Rockport, was preparing to squeeze perforations at 7,213-15 feet and perforate higher in the hole after recovering mud and saltwater on a drillstem test of that section.

After squeezing perforations at 7,217-18 feet and 7,208-09 feet, tubing was run and the test was perforated at 7,213-15 feet. On a 2½ hour drillstem test, with ¼ inch chokes and under 1,000 foot water cushion, maximum working pressure was 75 pounds and fluid came to the surface in 36 minutes.

Recovery was 500 feet of rathole mud and water cushion and 6,000 feet of clear saltwater. Initial bottomhole pressure flowing to 2,600 pounds, and shutin pressure was 2,700 pounds.

The test is being directionally drilled from a surface location in James Orick Survey, A-167, with bottomhole target 630 feet to the north in Puerto Bay.

Renwar Oil Corp. No. 1 United Producing Co., slated 9,000-foot wildcat 5½ miles west of Rockport in Gilliland Survey, was drilling below 7,878 feet in shale. It was earlier logged at 7,510 feet.

C. G. Glasscock No. 1 State Tract 1, wildcat seven miles northwest of Rockport, was drilling below 6,310 feet on a 7,500-foot permit.

Sullivan and Garnett No. 2 Eichlitz, well in the Lamar Field, 10 miles north of Rockport, has been dually completed for a daily flow of 25 million cubic feet of gas daily on open flow from the tubing side.

Production is from perforations at 7,110-20 feet, gas-distillate ratio was 41,200-1 and distillate gravity was 60.4. Tubing pressure was 2,444 pounds and shutin tubing pressure was 2,507 pounds.

Casing production has been gauged at 3.75 million cubic feet of gas daily on open flow from perforations at 6,978-85 feet. Gas-distillate ratio was 46,300-1 and distillate gravity was 59.1. Casing pressure was 2,229 pounds flowing and shutin was 2,411 pounds. Location is in Reserve D of Lands Adjoining Lamar Townsite.

It is alleged he ran into the rear of her car, causing it to run off the road into the bar pit before she could stop it. There was about \$400 damage on the Jones car and \$300 on Moore's car. Moore was given a ticket for driving too close behind another vehicle.

Precinct No. 1 (Box No. 1a), Voting place, Alamo Courts, Aransas Pass; presiding officer, Glenn Ellis.

Precinct No. 2 (Box No. 1; Voting place, courthouse, Rockport; presiding officer, Mrs. Alma Ratliff.

Precinct No. 3 (Box No. 1); Voting place, schoolhouse, Fulton; presiding officer, W. J. Moss.

Precinct No. 4 (Box No. 1); Voting place, Concession Hall, Lamar; presiding officer, Mrs. Alma Johnson.

The manner of holding the election will be governed by the laws of the state regulating general elections.

### Do You Have Your Birth Certificate?

College Station, Texas. — Do you have your birth certificate? Have you a certified copy in a safe place? Does it give accurate information as to sex, date of birth, and name of parents? If yours is in acceptable form how about those of your children?

Many schools require a copy of the birth certificate for enrollment. Mrs. Eloise Johnson, family life education specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, suggests you check to see if your child's birth certificate is recorded correctly.

Although everyone recognizes the importance of birth certificates, the specialist says a third of the nation's citizens have none. A person who can not produce a certificate or its legally acceptable equivalent, is stateless, ageless, and often jobless as far as government and many business firms are concerned. In this day of widespread military service, world wide travel and international youth exchange programs, a birth certificate is not only a convenience but a vital necessity. Adults and older people need proof of age and citizenship for retirement, payment of pensions, annuities and social security. This makes the

certificate a most valuable piece of paper.

Birth registration is now standardized and compulsory anywhere in the United States. These records become permanent and accessible to those who may be interested. However, now and then, errors occur which cause difficulties later. Parents can take precautions against these errors by making sure the doctor spells all names correctly and fills in all pertinent facts, including the exact date of birth of the child. It is wise, too, for parents to obtain a certified copy of the record and file it carefully with other personal documents and papers.

If you have no birth certificate, write the county clerk at the county where you were born, state health officer or state registrar of vital statistics to request a copy. If none is registered for you, one of the best proofs is legally executed, notarized affidavits from relatives and close friends who will swear to the date, place, and your parent's names. Another widely used proof is to check Federal Census rolls for your official record in the first census after you were born.

Check your family files to see that every member has at least one certified copy of this important family record—the birth certificate.

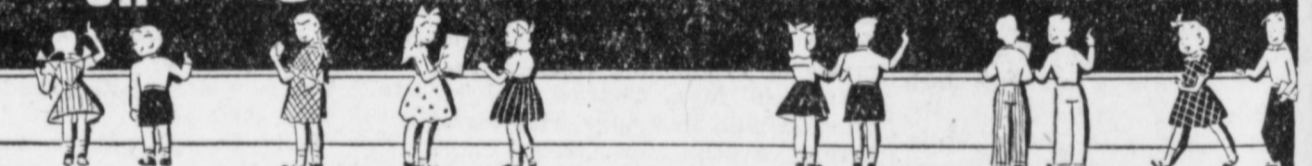

**Know Traffic Sign Shapes and Be Safe**

"Know their shapes, and be safe." Col. E. B. Tilley of Houston, president of the Texas Safety Association, and service advisor for the Gulf Oil Corporation was referring to traffic sign shapes when he offered this advice to motorists today.

"Traffic signs," he explained, "really can be 'signs of life' to motorists who heed them. Sign locations are determined by careful engineering studies, to guide and protect users of our streets and highways."

"These signs are designed in five basic shapes, and each shape carries a different type of message," he said.

Motorists should learn to recognize the shapes, Colonel Tilley pointed out, so that they can tell at a glance what type of problem they are about to meet on the highway. This will prepare them in advance to act on the sign's message when they get close enough to read it.

Colonel Tilley listed the five basic sign shapes and their meanings, as follows:

- 1. **EIGHT-SIDED**, painted yellow and black or red and white. This sign means STOP — one message, one requirement — never anything else.
- 2. **DIAMOND**, also yellow and black. This sign indicates danger ahead, carries such messages as Slow - School, Narrow Bridge, Men Working, or the directional symbols describing curves, intersections, side roads, etc. They mean: Slow down, stay alert.
- 3. **RECTANGULAR**, painted white with black or colored letter-

ing. These tell of speed limits, mark no passing zones, give other regulatory information such as parking rules. Obey their messages.

- 4. **ROUND**, yellow and black, signs warn of a highway-railroad intersection 300 to 500 feet ahead. These signs call for reduced speed and extra caution, so the driver can make sure no train is coming before he drives across the tracks.
- 5. **RAILROAD CROSSBUCK** marks the intersection of highway and railway. Cross only when the way is clear.

"These signs, and traffic signals and pavement markings for both motorists and pedestrians, deserve the same attention as is given a traffic officer," he said. Many traffic accidents would not happen if people using the

streets and highways obeyed the signs, signals and pavement markings put there for their guidance and protection, according to Col. Tilley.

He called special attention to the slogan, "Signs of Life — Know Them, Obey Them!" which is being featured in this month's traffic safety program by the Texas Safety Association and the Department of Public Safety.

**Health Officer Gives Tips on Beating the Heat**

Austin, Tex. — Beat the heat? Is this torrid weather sapping your energy from every body pore? Then State Health Officer George W. Cox has news for you.

"Observing a few simple hot weather living rules can mean relief from this sweltering heat," the doctor says. For instance:

Cut down on the amount of food eaten at any one time. Eat a few crackers or some fruit between meals if you get hungry. Many people feel better in hot weather if they eat fewer protein foods such as eggs, fish, and meat. Fruit and vegetables in season makes fine "cool comfort" diets.

Water is constantly being lost through perspiration and has to be replaced or painful heat cramps will result. Office workers probably get enough salt through ordinary eating, but laborers may need 2 or 3 extra teaspoonsful each hot day.

Children who play hard and perspire freely need a little extra salt. Salted nuts or crackers is an agreeable way for them to get it. They won't object at all.

Don't wear clothes that hinder evaporation of perspiration, because that's the way body temperatures are kept normal. Wear loose, light clothing, preferably light in color.

Suit your exercise to your strength. Swimming is unquestionably the best summer sport, since it cools rather than overheats the body.

Take a warm bath before bedtime, and get eight hours of sleep regularly. An oscillating electric fan which keeps the air in motion without harmful direct drafts will make sleeping more comfortable and the next day's heat less oppressive.

Sun rays are most intense between 10 a. m. and 4 p. m., so stay out of their way during those hours if possible. If not, be sure your head is covered.

Observing these rules can make for more summertime comfort. Dr. Cox points out. A June-to-October vacation in Alaska would help, too.

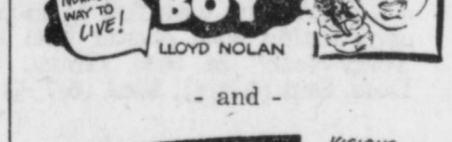

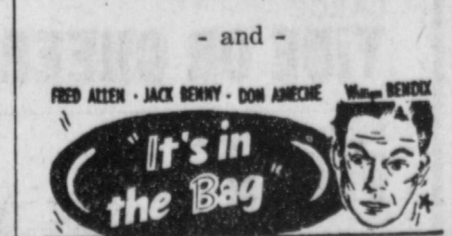

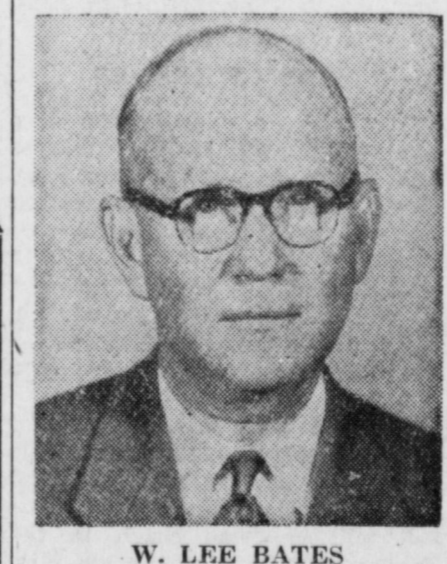

## Two New Laws Will Govern Texas Truckers

Texas truckers have a pair of new laws to bone up on within the next few days.

Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has announced that the two measures, which were enacted by the 53rd Texas Legislature, will go into effect on Aug. 26.

One of the laws provides that if a trucker overloads his vehicle in excess of the gross weight for which it is registered and is caught by the officers; he will be required to apply to the nearest available county tax assessor-collector for additional registration in an amount to take care of his overload before he can continue his trip. If he is over the maximum legal weight, Garrison said, he can still be unloaded on the spot, under the old law, before being allowed to proceed. Exception is made in the case of livestock or perishable merchandise, in which instances the operator shall be permitted to seek the nearest practical point along his route where his load may be protected from damage or destruction before being required to secure the additional registration.

The other law, Garrison explained, provides, generally, that any operator, other than the registered owner or his agent, of a commercial motor vehicle or truck tractor must file with the State Safety Department a copy of the lease or other agreement under which the vehicle is being operated. In addition, he must carry copies of the lease and of the letter of transmittal to the department in the vehicle.

Kent Odom, chief of the License and Weight Division of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said that this law is designed to curb "outlaw" truckers who afford no protection to shippers. He said that a copy of a booklet, giving detailed explanations of the law's provisions, will be sent to any trucker who requests it by writing to him at Austin.
