LIONETTES PLACE 4th IN STATE MEET

Union Wildcat Sets Test 6,000 Ft.

Union Producing Co. No. 10 Tatton, Aransas County wildcat nine miles north of Lamar in J. M. Shreve Survey, was preparing to perforate and test around 6,000 feet. Working pressure was three pounds and recovery was 5,100 feet of salt water on a three-hour drillstem test through 1/4-inch chokes from 8,365-86 feet. Bottom-hole shutin pressure was 3,000 pounds.

Arkansas Fuel Oil Corp. No. 1 State Tract 4, wildcat five miles north northwest of Aransas Pass, was preparing to plug off a zone at 7,220-22 feet and move up the hole to test the field sand, after recovering salt water on a drillstem test from that section.

The wildcat is being directionally drilled from a surface site in Block 58, McCampbell subdivision, James Orick Survey, A-167, with bottomhole target 630 feet to the north in Puerto Bay.

Renwar Oil Corp. No. 1 United Producing Co. wildcat 5 1/2 miles west of Rockport in I. Gilliland Survey, has been plugged and abandoned at 9,020 feet. No shows were reported.

C. G. Glasscock No. 1 State Tract 1, wildcat seven miles northwest of Rockport, has been plugged and abandoned at 7,523 feet.

In the North Fulton Beach Field three miles northwest of Lamar, Stanolind Oil and Gas Co. No. 1 State Tract 10 was making hole below 6,500 feet and scheduled to log around 6,650 feet. Permit depth to 7,500 feet on a 320-acre lease.

Mazie Wrather No. 1 William Johnson, East Fulton Beach Field well, has been completed for a daily flow of 133.1 barrels of 42.8 gravity pipeline oil.

Production is through 9/64 inch choke from 24 perforations at 7,166-70 feet in 5 1/2 inch casing set at 7,242 feet. Total depth is 7,545 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 954-1 and tubing pressure was 850 pounds. Location is in Block 84, Fulton Township, in William M. Carper Survey, A-47.

Renwar Oil Corp. No. 6 State Tract 105, slated 9,100 foot West Fulton Beach Field test, will be 1,263 feet from the north and 330 feet from the west lines of the State Tract in Copano Bay.

C. G. Glasscock and Humble Oil and Refining Co. have scheduled a wildcat for immediate drilling three miles south of Rockport.

Their No. 1 State Tract 218, projected to 8,000 feet on a 320-acre lease, is 660 feet from the south and east lines of State Tract 218. A Glasscock rig was to be moved in at once.

Location had been made Wednesday for an 11,000-foot Aransas County wildcat at the Caroline Hunt Sands No. 1 Mary Claire Bauer, northeast of a deep gas-distillate discovery by the Lamar Hunt Trust Estate in San Antonio Bay.

The Bauer location is about two miles northeast of the Lamar Hunt Trust Estate No. 1 State Tract 59, the gas-distillate discovery at 10,532-42 feet. It is in the Thomas Newcomb Survey, A-65, in the extreme northeast corner of Aransas County.

The location is 660 feet from the south line and 1,320 feet from the east line of the 463-acre lease and is 5.7 miles southeast of Austwell.

Texas Duck Hunting Season Opens Nov. 6, Closes January 4

State hunting seasons for migratory waterfowl were made official Monday as Secretary of the Interior McKay announced hunting days for the 1953-54 season as selected by state game administrators.

The season for ducks, geese and coot in Texas will run from Nov. 6 through Jan. 4. Texas jacksnipe hunters can be in action Dec. 21 through Jan. 4.

Woodcock may be shot in the southeast portion of the state Dec. 12 through Jan. 20. The open season for woodcock is slated in Shelby, Nacogdoches, Angelina, Trinity, San Jacinto, Liberty, Chambers and all counties south and east. The daily bag limit is four and possession limit is eight where shooting is permitted.

Texas comes under the Central Flyway regulations which call for a season of 60 consecutive hunting days, the same as last year. The Pacific Flyway was the only area allowing a split season. Then Arizona and California were the only states choosing two 34 day periods rather than a 75 day continuous season. The Pacific Flyway will enjoy its longest season since 1947.

The daily bag possession limit includes five ducks, five geese, ten coot and eight jacksnipe. These limits do not include the mergansers. Daily bag and possession limit for American and red-breasted mergansers is 25 singly or in the aggregate of both kinds.

Included in the geese bag and possession limit may be not more than two Canada geese or its subspecies, two white-fronted geese, or 1 Canada goose and 1 white-fronted goose.

Texas will have no open season on the black-bellied tree duck.

Local Stockmen May Apply For Emergency Feed At Court House

Aransas County stockmen may make application for emergency feed at the Court House in Rockport on Saturday, August 29. Mr. V. O. Gorrell, chairman of the Drought Emergency Committee states that he will be at the court house to take applications on that date from 9:00 a.m. till noon.

Aransas County was recently placed in the drought emergency area. This makes stockmen eligible to purchase feed at reduced prices. The prices fixed by the Secretary of Agriculture for this feed will be \$35.00 per ton for cotton seed meal or pellets, \$1.00 per bushel for corn, \$.50 per bushel for oats, and \$1.10 per bushel for wheat.

Mr. Gorrell states that this feed is being made available to owners of stock cattle or sheep only and is not for commercial feeders. He states that orders will be limited to thirty day supplies.

Cars Are Damaged In Wreck On Highway 35

Tuesday evening Robert L. Madden was driving south on Highway 35 near the intersection of Highway 35 and the Fulton Beach road in a 1949 Oldsmobile. Nathan Joseph Perrin, of Houston, driving a 1953 Plymouth sedan ahead of Madden is alleged to have slowed down or stopped causing Madden to run into his car, knocking it into the back of a 1946 Nash which was in front of him. The Nash was driven by Edwin August Nast of Rockport.

There was about \$50 damage to Nast's car and about \$500 to each of the other two.

Examinations for drivers licenses will be given at the Court House Friday, August 28. Persons who want a license should be there to take the test.

There were 63 votes cast for the re-allocation and 11 against.

LeRoy L. Belzung Is New State Park Manager

LeRoy L. Belzung has been appointed manager of the Goose Island State Park at Lamar, and has already assumed his duties.

F. Jansen, Justice of the Peace, at Fulton, says Mr. Belzung stated that he has been hired to take care of the park and enforce the rules and regulations of the State Parks Board for this area and he requests the cooperation of all citizens and tourists who go to the park.

Included in these rules are the following: no intoxicating beverages are to be in the park limits, or no gambling devices operated there. Fishing will be allowed in the park at specified times and places and the traffic is limited to defined roads, trails and parking areas, with the speed limit on the park being 20 miles per hour.

Fireplaces and grates are provided for fires and the visitors are requested to burn all refuse in the grates or deposit same in receptacles provided. In order to protect the birds and animals in the park dogs and cats will not be permitted to run loose.

Guests are not to pick the wild flowers or mutilate the trees and shrubs. Loud and unnecessary noise, language or unbecoming conduct should be restrained so that other visitors may rest.

Mr. Belzung has already been forced to arrest a man from Corpus Christi for speeding. He hopes that no other arrests will be necessary.

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WHAT'S IN A NAME?

If your name is Smith, you are one of more than one and a fourth million Smiths who have Social Security account numbers. And if you happen to be John Smith, there are 60 thousand others with your name.

The Johnsons, Browns, Williamses, Joneses, Millers, Davises, and Wilsons follow the Smiths in that order in the number of persons with those names in the central records office of the Social Security Administration in Baltimore, Maryland. More than 100 million separate wage accounts have been set up for workers, according to H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi office of the administration.

"Since so many people have

names that are similar or identical to others, to insure accuracy, the records of the earnings of each worker are kept by his social security account number as well as his name," Cleveland said.

In discussing the quarterly wage reports which employers submit for their employees, and the earnings reports which the self-employed send in each year, he emphasized the importance of reporting the name and number correctly.

"Every report of earnings should show the name and number of each worker as they are shown on his social security card. If an employer neglects to ask to see it, a worker should show the boss his card when he starts to work on a new job," Cleveland says.

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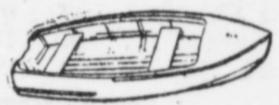
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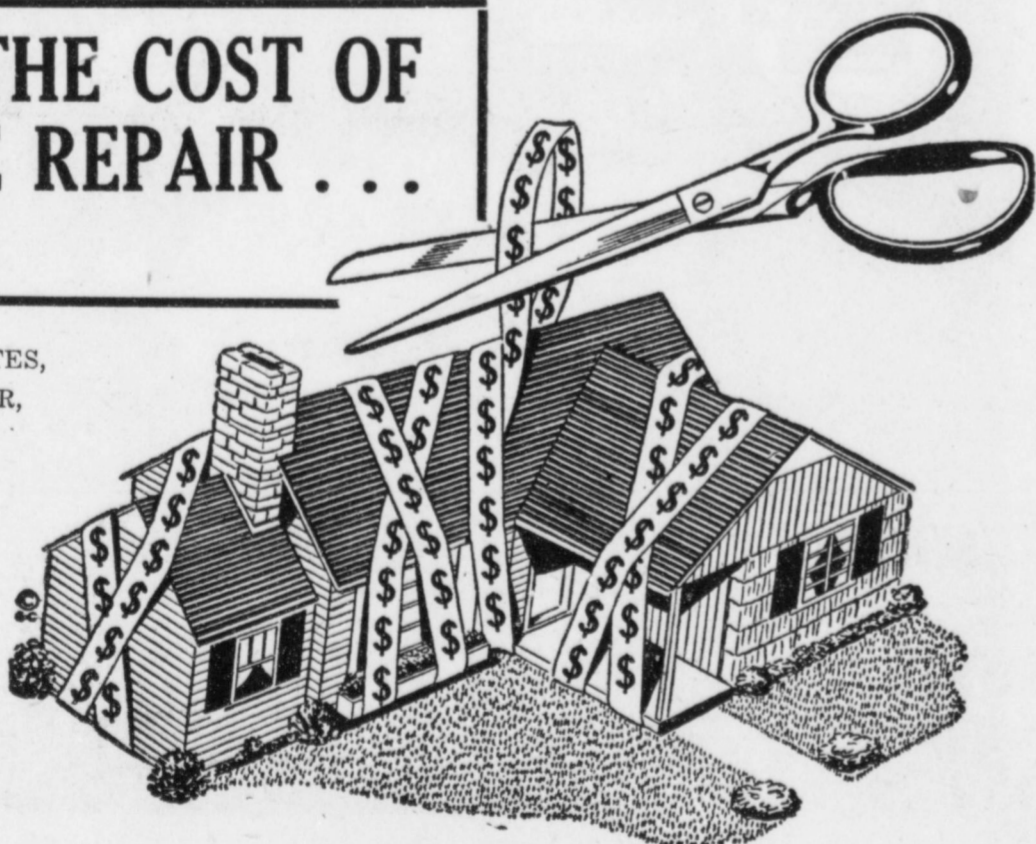


