"The Texas Farm Life Commission understands the situation and is working for an intelligent solution.
"During the past ten years we ave produced in Texas 32,330,00 bales of cotton and 60 per cent o has been sold on a demoralized narket. The Farmers' Union has een endeavoring to hold produc on down to consumption, but commercial organizations and government agencies have been ending their energies to increas ion.
