The Alamo Heroes Monument will rise to a height of 802 feet, the highest structure in the world. It has been designed along modern lines to possess strength and stability such as would not have been possible when the tower of Babel was built, for modern engineering A good road connecting a farm has made possible feats that ere impossible then or, for that generation ago, yet with all the advance the science of engineering has made this monument will be one of its greatest accomplishments. 



The Legislature has Adjourned.

The Legislature adjourned on April first. Be it said to the credit of the administration of Governor Colquitt, that every-, thing possible was done to comply in good faith with all the platform demands. The Legislature passed more constructive legislation than has been enacted by any other legislature for a quarter of a century. There were ten constitutional amendments submitted. Toward reform in court procedure, a law was passed abolishing the degrees in murder, that will reduce the chances of murderers to escape. A law was passed requiring the court to charge the jury in both criminal and civil cases before argument, and require exceptions to the charge to be made at the time the charge is given. Assignments of errors in appellate procedure were abolished and the motion for new trial is now to be the assignment of errors. The liquor laws were strengthened, and 9:30 o'clock closing of saloons is to be enforced under heavy penalties.

A bill passed requiring the court to submit cases tried on special issues. This will greatly simplify the work of the jury and will prevent many miscarriages of justice, as lawyers will have to address themselves to the facts in the case, and not confine their time to muddling the issues. The lunacy law for habitual drunkards will if enforced, reform or take off the streets many of the old time boozefighters. Shipping whiskey into prohibition territory is penalized.

Our representative, Hon. R. B. Humphreys, was one of the leaders in all important legislation and has made a record that has brought him into prominence as a candidate for speaker of the house in 1915. Mr. Terrell, the man he voted for speaker was never overruled by the house in a single ruling. and never let the house get away from him a single time. Terrell's record as speaker has justified Mr. Humphreys in voting for him as speaker.



Austin, April 1.-The first called session of the Thirty-third legislature is set for July 21, 1913. This will make the legislature be at work when the returns from the vote on the constitutional amendments are being sent in to the seat of government. Incidentally, the weather may be

Governor Colquitt broke the scription. long silence he has maintained in regard to the calling of the extra session last night, and when the date, July 21, 1913, was read out by the reading clerks, the members of the legislature, weary with the long strain of day and 36 night sessions, responded with a cheer. There is no doubt that the members are getting pretty

The Governor's proclamation follows:

Whereas, the Thirty-third Legislature has adopted a concurrent resolution fixing the hour for adjourning the regular session thereof at noon, April 1, 1913, without making appropriation for the support of the state government, as provided by the constitution shall be done:

Now, therefore, the failure of the legislature to pass such appropriation bill creates an extraordinary occasion justifying the governor to convene the legislature in extra session, and I do hereby call the same to convene in the capitol in the city of Austin. at 10 o'clock a. m., Monday, July 21, 1913, for the following purposes, to wit:

1. To make appropriations for the support of the state government and its institutions, and the repair, restoration and erection of necessary public buildings for the matter discussed necessarily being fiscal year beginning Sept. 1, 1913, and ending Aug. 31, 1914.

2. To consider and act upon such other matters as may be presented by the Governor, pursuant to Section 40 of Article 3 of the constitution of Texas.

In testimony whereof, I hereunto sign my name and affix the seal of the state at Austin, Texas, the 1st day of April, 1913. (Signed) O. B. Colquitt,


