

## Along The Waterfront



Fishing along the water front is more or less spotted this week. Some fishermen report fine catches and some not doing so well, but there is a good tide and fishing should be very good by the weekend.

Last Friday, Mr. Freiburg and party, of Gonzales, fished with Fred Christilles, catching 86 trout and some redbait. Mr. Williams went with Christilles to the Gulf Saturday, bringing back 9 mackerel Sunday Wesley Nelius and Mr. and Mrs. Hoff, of Sealy, got 87 trout.

Johnson's Bait Stand reports that R. L. Johnson and Frank Bailey, of Fort Worth, got 50 specks last Saturday. Mr. McKnight brought in 5 large specks the same day. Sunday, Mr. Keys and party, of Beeville, landed 35 specks, the largest one weighing 4 pounds. Bill Ikard, of San Antonio, got 24 trout, while Dr. Rice, of San Antonio, caught 12 specks.

They did not keep a record of the fish caught at Mills' Wharf last week, but there were two or three boats out each day, all coming in with nice strings of fish. Last Thursday one boat brought in 76 trout and yesterday one had 99 fish and another one, 65.

Fishing was not quite so good at the Jolly Roger as formerly, quite a few small redds have been caught and a number of trout. The wind has been rather high out there, but there is a good tide and fishing should be good over the week end.

At a meeting in Judge Wendell's office last night, plans were formulated for a house-to-house canvass, selling tickets to a dance at the Woman's Club building which will take place Saturday night, Sept. 26.

At Wednesday night's meeting Clark Wren agreed to head a group of ticket-sellers in the southern portion of Rockport, while Mrs. John Cox will have charge of tickets sales in north Rockport. Mrs. Paul Wilhelm will head the house-to-house canvass in Fulton.

Residents of this area are urged to purchase these dance tickets even though they do not plan to attend the dance, for as Judge Wendell said at the initial meeting of this group, last week:

"I know of no greater humanitarian effort than to help provide treatment facilities second to none for the physically handicapped youngsters of this community and every community in the state. Texans can well be proud of the treatment center they have built. ## Stanolind Well Completed For 179 Barrels

Stanolind Oil and Gas No. 1 State Tract 10, Aransas County well in the Fulton Beach Field, three miles southwest of Lamar, has been completed for a daily flow of 179.8 barrels of 42 gravity pipeline oil.

Production is through 8-64 inch choke from 48 perforations at 6,891-99 feet in 5 1/2 inch casing set at 6,986 feet. Total depth is 7,511 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 917-1 and tubing pressure was 1,320 pounds. Location is in Copano Bay.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 60 State Tract 46, newly completed oiler in the West Fulton Beach Field D Sand, has been potentialized for 144.64 barrels of 44 gravity pipeline oil daily.

Production is through 1/2 inch choke from 24 perforations at 6,500-04 feet in 5 1/2 inch casing set at 7,276 feet. Total depth is 7,310 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 823-1 and tubing pressure was 1,125 pounds. Location is in Copano Bay.

Selby-Walker Corp. and P. G. Lake, Inc. No. 2 A. G. Collin, test in the East Fulton Beach Field, 3/4 of a mile northwest of Fulton, will be drilled as an exception to Rule 37 with location 50 feet from the south and 330 feet from the west lines of a 2.52 acre lease in the north half of Fulton Townsite Outlot 13 in David Lockard Survey, A-97. Permit depth is 7,800 feet.

Arkansas Fuel Oil Corp. No. 1 State Tract 4, wildcat five miles southwest of Rockport has been potentialized for 21.5 million cubic feet of gas daily on open flow.

Production is from perforations at 6,792-98 feet and 6,805-11 feet in 5 1/2 inch casing set at 7,235 feet. Gas-distillate ratio was 71,500-1 and distillate gravity was 60-1. Tubing pressure flowing was 2,394 pounds and shut-in tubing pressure was 2,437 pounds.

## School District Purchases New Bus, Station Wagon

The Aransas County Independent School District has purchased a new bus and station wagon.

The bus is a 72-passenger Superior body with an International chassis. The purchase price was \$4,375.00.

The new Ford station wagon was bought for \$2,225.00 and is used to transport the eight pupils from the Black Jacks to school.

There are four buses now hauling pupils to the schools. Bus No. 3 is used on Route 1, to Estes. The driver is Chester Barre. Daily mileage is 34.8 miles.

Philip Baldwin drives bus No. 5 on Route 2, to Fulton and Lamar with a daily mileage of 70.4 miles.

Bill Richards drives on Route 3 in bus No. 4, to Sparks Colony. He also drives to the High School cafeteria at noon, making a total of 23 miles a day.

Bus No. 1 is used on Route 4, to Rincon with Trioim Salch as the driver, with a daily mileage of 78 miles.

The four buses have a daily mileage of 206.2 miles. The buses are covered with fleet insurance, which is a saving of money for the district.

### Board of Equalization Meets Tuesday, Sept. 29 To Answer Need of Increased Valuations

At a special meeting of the City Council Monday night, presided over by Dick Picton, mayor pro-tem, the budget for the coming year was completed. Others in attendance were Aldermen Chas. Garrett, Jimmy Hunt and Roy Rogero, City Clerk Frieda Diederich, City Attorney Clark C. Wren and Water Superintendent Tom Shults. It was decided that the garbage collection charges would be suspended and that

## Court House Election Set For Oct. 17

A notice of Election for the Issuance of Bonds for the erection of a new court house and jail for Aransas County, to be held October 17, was issued by the Commissioners Court on Friday, September 18, 1953.

The bond election would be in the amount of \$300,000.00. The bonds would mature not later than 15 years and would bear interest not to exceed 5% per annum.

Legally qualified voters of Aransas County who are resident property taxpayers and who have rendered their property for taxation shall be entitled to vote in this election.

A petition recently submitted to the Commissioners Court and bearing some 120 signers asked that if the election for the new court house passed that consideration be given as to the site for same and asked that a centrally located site be decided upon. The commissioners failed to act on this petition as they felt that the property asked for in the petition would cost the taxpayers quite a bit more than the site they have in mind.

collections as outlined in the garbage ordinance would be made free of charge to all residents of the city. All other articles contained in the ordinance will still be in effect.

The cost of operating the garbage department is estimated at \$8,000.00 per year and this amount is included in the budget which has resulted in an increased valuation of all property in the city. Practically everyone in the city has received notice of the increase and the following will be an attempt to clarify the situation:

The taxable property in the City for the year 1952 was \$1,806,640.00. As the tax rate is \$1.50 per \$100.00 valuation this would bring \$27,099.00 into the city. If all this money were collected it would still be inadequate to run the city affairs properly and so the following budget in the amount of \$39,560.00 was decided upon. The breakdown is as follows:

Salaries \$4,560.00, Operation \$3,500.00, New room and vault \$3,000.00, Policeman \$3,000.00, Misc. Expense (Fire Department) \$3,000.00, Road and Bridge Fund \$1,000.00, Additional Street Lights \$1,000.00, School House Refunding Bond \$1,500.00, Sewer Improvement Bond \$1,000.00, Cleanup of old dumping ground \$1,000.00, Garbage collection (new truck, insurance, salaries, etc.) \$8,000.00.

An explanation of the items listed in the budget are as follows:

Salaries: This includes salary of mayor, four aldermen, city clerk and city attorney; Operations: Expenses needed to run the office, supplies, etc;

New Room and Vault: The present office is adequate to handle the city business and an additional room is needed in addition to a vault to house records.

Policeman: A city policeman will be hired. Revenue obtained from arrests made by him should more than take care of his salary, but this amount must be set up in the budget to assure the salary.

Misc. Expense (Fire Department): To supply the volunteer fire department with financial aid as needed.

Road and Bridge: Repairs to streets that are badly in need of same and additional new streets.

Street Lights: The securing of additional street lights is badly needed.

School Refunding Bond: This payment has to be made each year until paid.

Sewer Improvement Bond: Same as above.

Cleanup of Old Dump Ground: The old dump ground has been closed, but much still has to be done in cleaning up the site and restoring it to a sanitary state.

Garbage Collection: By granting free garbage collection additional bookkeeping and clerical help will be eliminated and will result in a saving to the taxpayer in the end.

To raise the money for this budget property valuations had to be raised. A review of the tax rolls showed that much property had been rendered and assessed improperly, in most instances too low and unequal.

In an attempt to remedy this situation the council decided that they themselves would sit as an equalization board and take every piece of property and attempt to equally assess same. All property was carefully considered and an intrinsic value (below actual value) arrived at. This raised the city valuation to \$2,651,857.00. On the basis of the \$1.50 rate it was determined that a third percentage should be used to bring in the necessary money.

The City Council has spent some two months attempting to get all property in the city on an equal basis. For this work they have received no pay and they (Continued on Page 8)

ask that property owners fairly consider the raises before entering their complaints. The council is attempting to give the people much needed improvements and the only way that they can do so is to receive the necessary money for same. They feel that the manner in which they have gone at it is the best for all concerned, because the only alternative would be to ask for a bond election to provide these improvements and obtain the money in that manner and the unequal valuation of property would still be in effect.

The council will meet on Tuesday night, September 29, at 7:30 to hear reasons why such property should not be raised. In some instances mistakes probably have been made and in these cases they will be glad to remedy same.

From a dollar and cent standpoint, the free garbage collection will amount to a saving of \$18 per year in the residential section as the rates ordinarily would have been \$1.50 per month. This \$18 will offset an increase in property valuation up to \$1,200.00. In other words a piece of property that formerly was assessed at \$2,000.00 would cost the taxpayer \$30 in taxes. He would also have to pay \$18 a year garbage collection; making a total of \$48. If the valuation is increased to \$3,200.00 the taxpayer will still only pay \$48 per year.
