

Survivors Insurance Protects Families

As you walk down a busy street, an average of one out of evel twenty-eight persons you pass is a beneficiary of old-age and survivors insurance, according to H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration.

Of the 5.6 million people who were getting social security insurance at the end of June, more than one million of them were children. About 40% of the total are vivors of deceased workers.

"Nearly everyone knows about the payments to workers whose earnings are reduced or cut off in older years," Cleveland says, "but many workers overlook the fact that social security is family insurance which protects a worker's dependents against the loss of earned income after his death."

"Widows may receive monthly payments for themselves and for their young children until the children reach age 18. Widows may also receive the survivors insurance after they are 65 years old," he reported.

"In all cases, payments to the members of a deceased worker's family partially replace his average earnings during his working life," Cleveland explained. "The amount is figured from the record of the worker's earnings on social security jobs. Wage credits are also allowed for time spent in the military service during World War II and the Korean War, in determining the amount of family insurance which may be paid."

The families of deceased workers should apply for their insurance payments at the Social Security Administration, 424 Taylor Street, Corpus Christi, Texas.




