

THE ARANSAS COUNTY COURT HOUSE BOND ISSUE

The Need

Some of the chief reasons for a new Courthouse are due to the increased activity in Aransas County through oil and real estate. Your County and District Clerk's Office does not have sufficient room for storage of records or even space to accommodate abstractors. There is also a need within the County and District Clerk's Office for a comparing room, away from office noises, where all records can be read back and thoroughly checked. Some of the compulsory needs your present Courthouse and Jail does not have, are quarters for juveniles, cells for the insane, and accommodations for men and women who serve as jurors. These facilities now create an emergency for something to be done immediately and have been included in the prospective courthouse and jail plans. Through the changes of time our present sixty-four year old Courthouse is very much out of date and does not have the conveniences, ample room, storage space or other means to comply with the present days fast growing County.

The Cost

Through careful planning and architectural design this modern Courthouse and Jail structure can be built for the approximate cost of \$272,000 and not more than \$282,000. This is complete with air-conditioning.

The Site

Through careful study the site for your prospective Courthouse and Jail has been chosen, taking into consideration cost, parking problems, suitably protected from high winds and storm floods, keeping in mind the 1919 storm, and a place suitably located to accommodate Aransas County citizens, as well as transient business. Block 121 Doughty and Mathis Division, a portion of R. R. Reserve, at the intersection of Highways 881 and 35, west of Highway 35 and North of Highway 881, has been chosen for a Courthouse and Jail site. This particular site was recommended by Dick Picton, Seth Steele, Emory Spencer and Jas Sorenson, Jr., a committee appointed by the Commissioners' Court, being the same people from the Chamber of Commerce who petitioned the Commissioners' Court for a new Courthouse and Jail. An alternate site has been given to the Commissioners' Court for consideration in Block 7, Doughty and Mathis Division, down town in Rockport. But after due consideration and checking of cost it was found financially out of proportion and would call for an additional \$55,000 to be added to the Bond Issue. It would also require three years extension to the Bond Issue which would constitute \$20,000 more in interest, making that site cost the taxpayer \$75,000 for site alone. The site that has been chosen will cost approximately \$6,000 and can be acquired without any difficulty and will not require any additional money over and above the \$300,000 issue for its purchase.

Who Pays Aransas County's Tax Bill?

As stated before there absolutely will not be an increase in taxes. A 25c levy has been allocated for Permanent Improvement, that is taken from your 80c operating tax. On the present valuation of \$14,862,351, of this amount \$11,334,590 is paid by oil companies, the remaining portion of \$3,527,761 is real estate and approximately 75% of this real estate is owned by people who do not live in Aransas County. This would mean that the taxpaying voter of Aransas County would not be paying more than 10% of the total amount of this Bond Issue. Our oil companies operating in Aransas County have expressed themselves as being very favorable for the Bond Issue and their willingness to cooperate in the future. It has been estimated by oil evaluation experts that the oil valuation in Aransas County in the next five years will be in the neighborhood of sixteen to seventeen million dollars. This bond issue will be for ten years, with a five year call. In other words with increased valuation from oil it is very possible that this \$300,000 plus interest can be paid for in five years. Is a county tax rate of \$1.00 per \$100 valuation oppressive? Your tax valuation is based on 16 2/3 to 20% of the actual market value. It would be good business to have a suitable Courthouse under this valuation, being paid for from sources that are willing to supply this money from our natural resources, keeping in mind that the county tax rate per one hundred dollars valuation is only \$1.00.

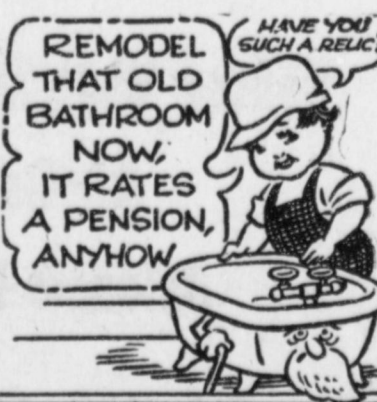

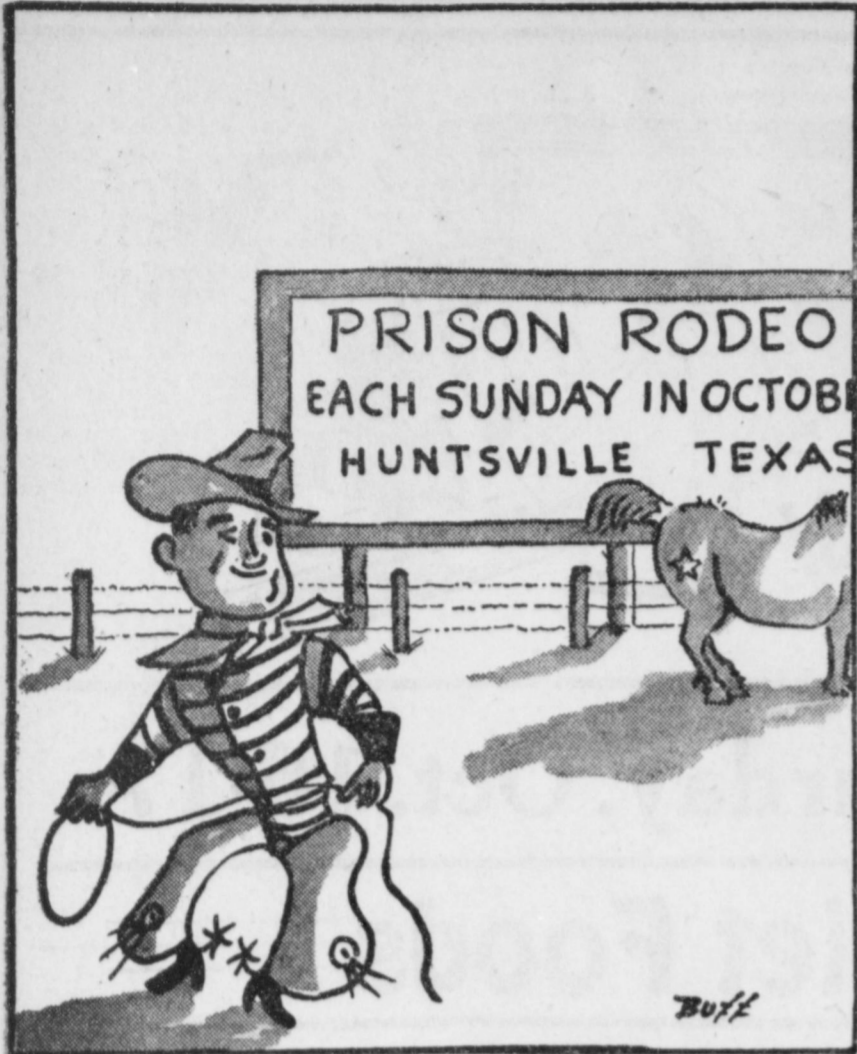

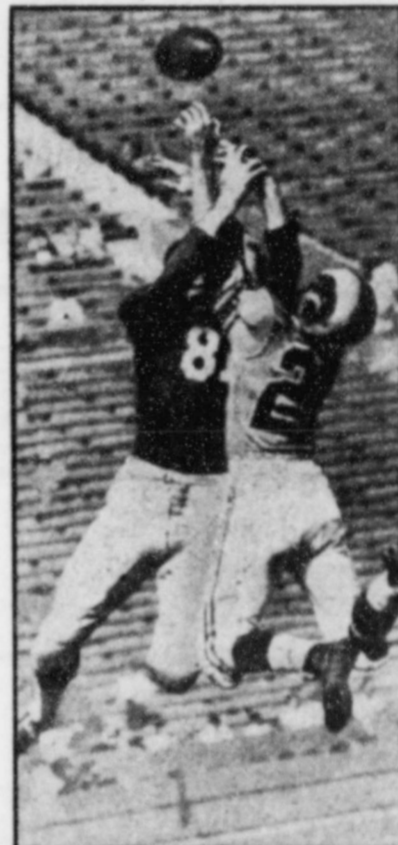
DOUBLE SORROW

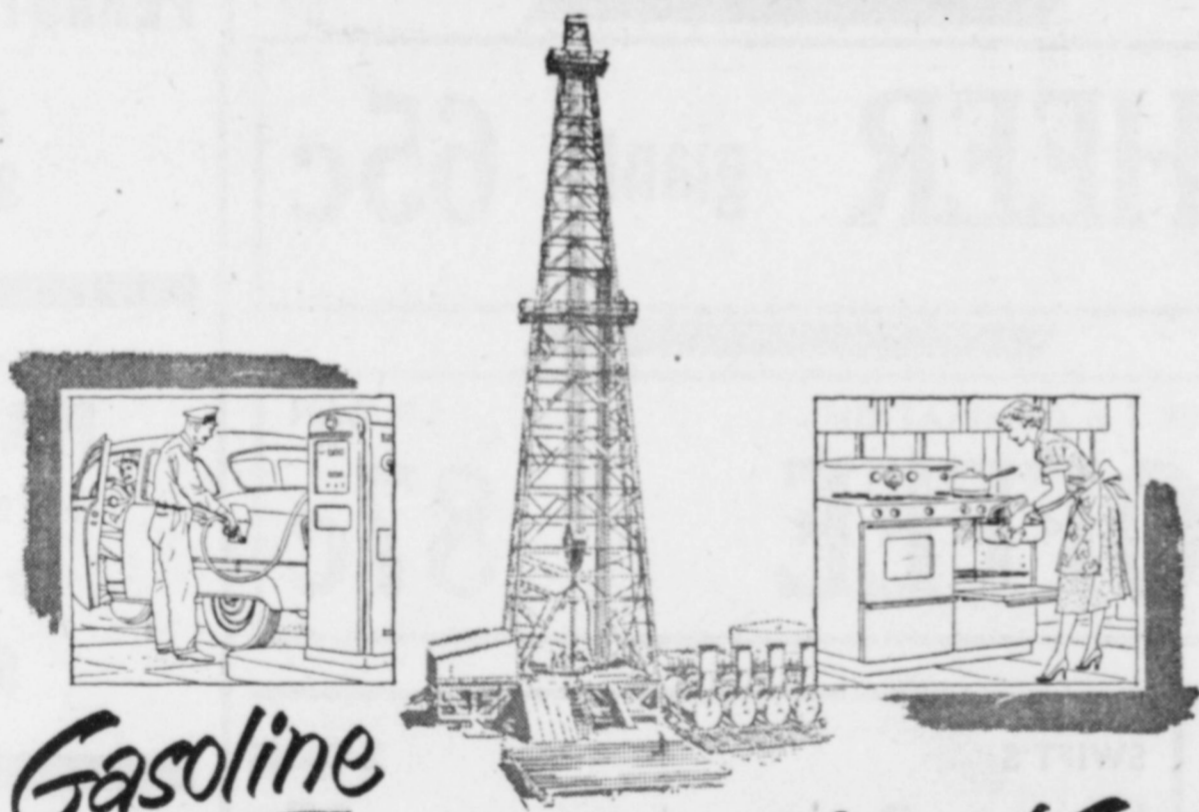

Gasoline for Sunday driving... or Natural Gas to cook next Sunday's roast?

DEFENSE COUNSEL OFTEN UNJUSTLY CRITICIZED

One of the cardinal principles of American law is that a man is considered innocent until proven guilty by proper legal proceedings. Practically everyone pays lip service to this ideal, but many fail to realize that the right to be represented by counsel is a logical and essential corollary of that theory of justice. There is a good deal of criticism of attorneys representing defendants in criminal cases. Much of this criticism is unjust.

Should lawyers defend in court persons whom they know or have good reason to believe are guilty of the crimes charged against them? The recent Belden Survey of the attitude of the public in Texas toward lawyers and law problems shows that more than half of all persons interviewed thought it was wrong for a lawyer to defend such a person.

Such an attitude on the part of the public is rather startling to thinking people. Surely the guiltiest criminal has a right to a fair trial by the law of the land. Such a trial he cannot have without a competent attorney to see that a fair jury is selected and that only lawful evidence is introduced against him.

With reference to this feeling on the part of the public, District Judge James K. Evetts, of Belton, who served eighteen years as a prosecuting attorney before his election as district judge, recently offered the following comments: "The result of this survey is no surprise to me, in that during my eighteen years of prosecuting, this feeling has been made known to me by hundreds of persons."

"The feeling on the part of the general public in this regard is brought about to a great extent by the sincere efforts on the part of the defense counsel to see that his client receives the benefit of every legal safeguard to which he is entitled. These legal maneuvers are often misunderstood by the layman as an unethical effort to defeat justice, by delay of the trial, and by taking advantage of certain defenses that to the layman appear to be trivial technicalities."

"Attorneys are the only ones who can correct the erroneous feeling of the general public regarding the defense of one who appears to be guilty as charged. We attorneys should emphatically state to the inquiring person that it is one of the cardinal rights of the individual in a democratic society to be considered innocent until his guilt is established beyond a reasonable doubt by legal and competent evidence."

"The public must be brought to the realization that all who are charged with crime are entitled to the expert counsel and aid of an attorney, and that the sworn duty of such attorney is to see that each protective legal right, to which the accused is entitled, is afforded him."

Now and then a lawyer will overstep the bounds of his duty in defending those charged with crime. When that happens, the legal profession is even more indignant than the public generally, and appropriate disciplinary proceedings are instituted where warranted.

Meteorologist Discusses Hurricanes in This Area

—Corpus Christi, Tex. — Worried about hurricanes these days?

Then relax and listen to the words of a man who's an expert on the subject.

He's E. R. Etier, meteorologist for the U. S. Weather Bureau in Corpus Christi.

Says Mr. Etier: "There probably isn't a section of the Gulf or Atlantic coasts of the United States less likely to be struck by a hurricane than the southern section of the Texas coast."

The 200-mile stretch of shoreline from the south tip of Padre Island northward to the town of Rockport is what Mr. Etier calls "a blind spot" — an area most hurricanes don't even seem to see as they come roaring up from the equatorial waters of the Atlantic and the Caribbean.

"It simply is an area where climatic conditions seldom are right for a hurricane to touch shore," Mr. Etier explains.

"A hurricane thrives on moisture. It has to have plenty of water to keep itself alive. Here in South Texas we have a coastal plain that is backed up primarily by ranching country.

"There just isn't normally the over-abundance of moisture necessary to attract such a disturbance."

Mr. Etier points out a fact that he believes is often overlooked: Most hurricanes never reach land at any time.

"The majority fizzle out over the Atlantic and the eastern edge of the Gulf," he says.

"Those, in general, are the ones that whip up during the early and late stages of the so-called hurricane season."

While there is no established path for hurricanes, those that sweep further westward — Mr. Etier explains — usually race along until they sense the nearness of land through diminishing moisture.

Then, he adds, they generally spin away in a northerly or northeasterly direction until they lose

their punch or push ashore in a more favorable atmosphere.

"That means they are much more likely to penetrate the deep tropical areas along the shore of Mexico toward the south, and the heavy rainfall section of the upper Texas, Louisiana, and Florida coasts," Mr. Etier says.

The theory agrees generally with another widely accepted belief that hurricanes moving into the Gulf through the narrow "slot" between Cuba and the Yucatan have a tendency to follow the stronger branch of the Gulf Stream in a northeast direction toward Florida and the upper Gulf Coast.

The Gulf Stream splits at a point about 600 miles southeast of the south tip of Padre Island. The smaller branch runs close to the Texas coast.

But, Mr. Etier hastens to add, his views aren't intended as a

slap at the other Gulf coast areas. "The danger from hurricanes is pretty well restricted all along the western coast of the Gulf," he says.

"And that danger, when it crops up, is better calculated now than ever before. Air Force and Navy reconnaissance planes scout all disturbances. We keep constant checks with our instruments. And —unlike the people in tornado and earthquake areas—everybody has plenty of time to take necessary precautions."

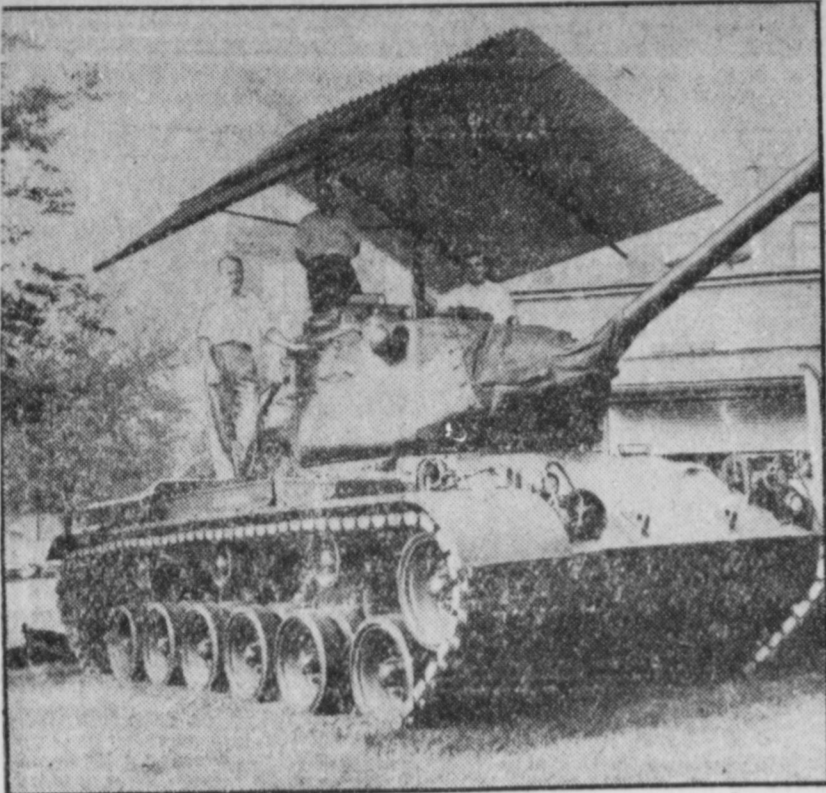

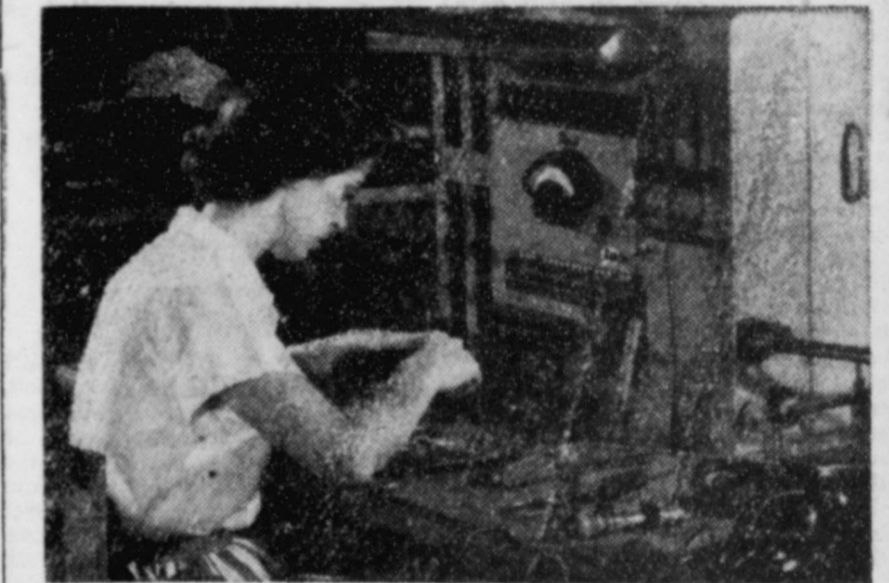
**Refuge Birds
Change Abode**

Austwell—The stage is being set for one of Nature's exciting events over on the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge, according to Julian Howard, Refuge manager. The stars in the feathered spectacle are the giant Whooping Cranes which summer in the far north and the return south in October to winter on the Refuge. Supernumeraries in the great outdoor classic are the myriad waterfowl, shore birds and songsters which likewise seek winter sanctuary in the ancestral wintering grounds of the Whoopers.

Preliminary to the annual fall rendezvous of the assorted winged species, some birds which summer on the famed Black Jack Peninsula have departed for wintering areas farther south. Conspicuous among these are the lurid Roseate Spoonbills. But the main attraction are the majestic Whooping Cranes which, by last winter's count, number only twenty-one. Howard's staff shortly will begin a rigid vigil to check the whoopers backing. Meanwhile, the word has gone out to hunters everywhere to help them along to a safe voyage by NOT shooting at any large white birds.

Family Protection Is a Common Goal

Old Age and survivors insurance protect families and strengthens the community, according to H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Social Security Administration in Corpus Christi.

In planning for the future, each of us must at some time ask these questions: What is going to happen to me when I am too old to work? What will happen to my family when I die? The answers to those questions affect our lives and the lives of those close to us.

Social Security insurance is a part of the answer for most workers and their families, Cleveland said.

"The primary purpose of old age and survivors insurance is to provide a foundation of family protection to minimize the serious financial distress that results from old age and premature death. Social Security is the Nation's basic family insurance program," he continued. "It is insurance for which we pay during our working years. For the retired worker at 65 or later, it is an assurance of a definite income. In the event of the death of a younger worker, it is real protection for his widow and children.

"Without these payments, which are earned by workers under this contributory system, the ability of many people to pay for necessities would be drastically curtailed or entirely ended," Cleveland explained. "These payments make it possible for families to remain together and, at the same time, reduce the drain on both public and private welfare funds."

LETTER TO THE EDITOR—

To the Editor, Rockport Pilot.

The \$300,000 bond issue for a new courthouse in a new location which taxpayers of Aransas County are asked to approve next Saturday has raised a few unanswered questions in the minds of a number of taxpayers. Now is the time to think about the answers to these questions. I am sending them to you for publication with the hope that they will be answered in the Pilot at the same time, next Thursday.

1. What is wrong with the present courthouse that it cannot be expanded or modified satisfactorily to meet today's needs. If this can be done for one fourth of the cost, how can the \$300,000 for a new courthouse be justified?

2. If we have surplus tax money, what is wrong with using it for waterfront improvement; or for providing better facilities for health and sanitation county-wide; or for quick freeze facilities and storage for perishables to benefit our important seafood business; or for better upkeep and maintenance of our roadways and parks; and other improvements of a public nature.

3. Since most of our taxes come out of the same pocket, city-county-state-schools, why not look ahead to the need for tax monies to provide the additional facilities which our increasing school population will require? Why not set aside surpluses to apply on these future needs which we can now foresee?

4. If we can't set tax surplus money aside for future needs, what is wrong with lowering the county tax rate? Has it been concluded that such a decision would be too great a shock for the human system to absorb? Or is such a course too old fashioned to consider?

In all fairness to the taxpayers and to those who receive the benefits from public improvements, and that is most of us, why not have more public discussion of the needs of our growing community to the end that these needs can be properly appraised, planned, given priority, and financed within our reasonable means to provide.

Must a taxpayer who believes in the merits of public discussion, as a prerequisite to sound planning, so necessary to secure the public support needed to carry out an orderly program of growth and community expansion which is now evident to most everybody.
