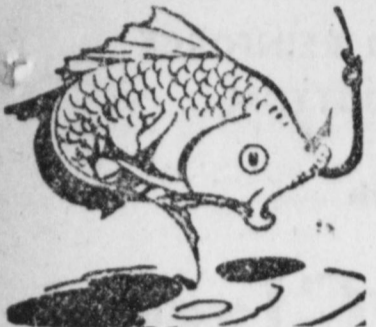


Along The Waterfront



Big redfish, trout and drum are being caught. Ducks and geese are being shot and everything is humming along the waterfront this week.

Joe Everitt reports that some large trout, also drum and sheepshead are being caught in the basin. A. J. Stanley, E. E. Stevens, J. C. Harvey and Harry Dretlich, of Crosby, Texas, all caught nice strings of trout weighing from 1 1/2 to 5 pounds each. Night fishing with live bait, Mr. Fuller, of Arkansas, caught a 6 1/2 pound trout.

Mr. and Mrs. A. V. Rambo have been getting lots of fine reds, weighing from 4 to 9 pounds each. They have caught about 50 of them recently. Part of them were caught near Redfish Point, between the Jolly Roger Camp and the Copano Bay causeway and some off the Good Luck Pier at Fulton. Mrs. Rambo is the better fisherman of the two.

Mr. Lenoir at Lenoir's Landing says that fishing is excellent since the northern. Wednesday Wayne Garrett, of Fort Worth and Ray McGee, of Beeville, caught 150 trout, some of them real big. They were still biting when they stopped fishing. The trout are biting extra good out there.

Fishing and hunting are both good at Mills Wharf now. There were two fishing parties out Tuesday. Each caught 30 or 40 trout and a few good redfish. R. L. Stripling, of San Augustine, landed 76 trout Wednesday, fishing with Harry Mills and Herbert Slack, of San Antonio, out with Jack Lawler, came in with 86 trout.

There are lots of hunters going out from the Wharf. Thirty-five went out Friday, the first day of the season, 15 of them got their full limit and most of the rest brought in 3 or 4 ducks. There were 6 geese also brought in that day. Fifty-one hunters went out from the Wharf Saturday. About half of them got their limit, with a majority of the rest bring in 3 or 4 ducks. Three Canadian geese were killed. The hunting report was about the same on Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, but on Wednesday, only 21 hunters went out and more than half got their limit.

More nice drum than any other fish are being caught at Jolly Roger, but they are getting some nice flounders, big reds, a few trout and sheepshead. They are getting the sheepshead off the pier.

People going out from Floyd's Boat and Sales Co. have been getting some nice catches, too, in the last two or three days. Mr. and Mrs. Colum, of Houston, got 295 trout. Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Cox, (Continued on Page 8)

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 24 Copano Bay State Tract 43, in the Fulton Beach Field, will be 1,380 feet from the north and 990 from the east lines of the tract. Permit depth is 7,200 feet.

The Atlantic Refining Co. No. 2 Jewell Fulton Unit, well in the East Fulton Beach (Zone E), was completed for 148.37 barrels of oil daily through 10/64-inch choke from 80 perforations at 7,754-75 feet. Tubing pressure was 700 pounds. Casing pressure was 1,150 pounds. Gas-oil ratio was 756-1. The well is in William Carper Survey, A-47.

All the tourists in this area are requested to register at the Chamber of Commerce building.

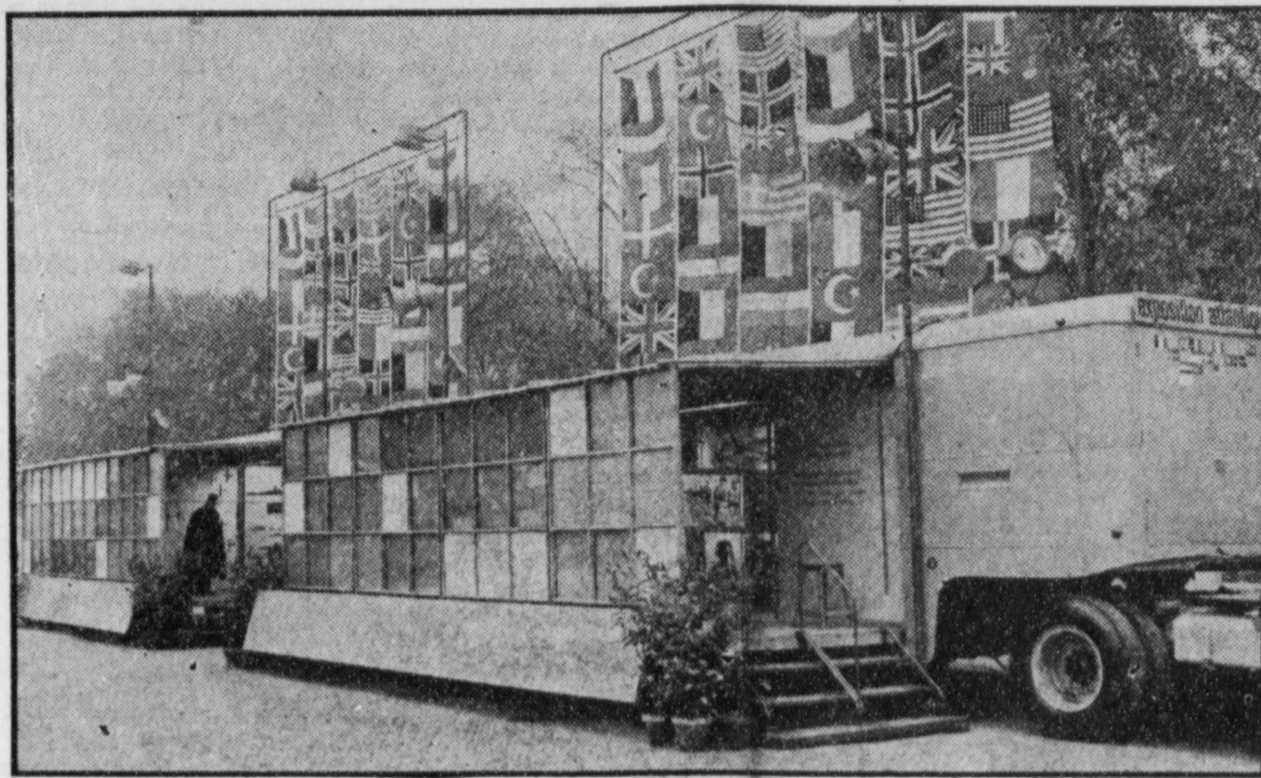
Mrs. Mary Juergens has the register ready and wants the winter guests to register by states this winter so they can easily locate others from city or state.

Children's Book Week, Nov. 15-21

Children's Book Week will be emphasized in the public schools, Nov. 15 through 21, and the slogan is "Reading is Fun."

While the Aransas County Public School are handicapped in that only the new high school building has a library room and librarian, the school board has made a generous appropriation for library books and materials.

\$3,000.00 has been allotted for this purpose. Roughly broken down it is as follows: \$800.00 for the Rockport Elementary school; \$800 for the Aransas County Junior high school; \$800 for the Senior high school; \$600 for the Fulton Elementary school. There are fewer pupils in the Fulton school than the others so their allotment is less.

In the two elementary schools and in the Junior high school where there are no library rooms, the school is establishing room libraries. The teachers will check books out of the principals office on a blue card and take them to their rooms where the pupils will check them out on buff cards.

Room libraries are not as good as both room and central libraries, but the pupils who really want to read can have the benefit of the books through the room libraries.

At noon Sunday in front of Mills' Wharf, Thomas Sloan of Midland, Texas, ran into the back of John Thomas Vestel's car.

Vestel is from Randolph Field. He had slowed up to make a left turn and Sloan hit him from the rear, damaging both cars but neither of the occupants were hurt.

Rawlins of Aransas Pass was driving north in a '51 Mercury on Highway 35 and ran into the front end of the pick up, it is claimed. The Mercury was badly wrecked and the pick up was damaged slightly. There was no one hurt.

Property Owners Meet With Navigation Board

The Aransas County Navigation Board met with some of the property owners along the Fulton waterfront, at the Chamber of Commerce building, Tuesday night. An agreement was reached as to the harbor line and necessary improvements in that area.

The meeting was very satisfactory and an estimated cost of the improvements for the Fulton harbor will come forth at an early date.

The Navigation Board is going to delay an immediate call of a bond election until they feel that the voters have been satisfactorily informed as to the scope and nature of the improvements.

The announcement was also made at the meeting that the Navigation Board has affected the purchase from the State of Texas of 604 acres of submerged land in the Little Bay area, immediately north of the present navigation patent.

Revival Services At First Baptist Church November 15-22

The recently completed nursery will be attended by a capable nurse at each service during the revival. The nursery will be open fifteen minutes before each service.

Commissioners Court Hold Meeting Monday

The County Commissioners met Monday in the County Judge's office at the court house.

The court accepted the State Highway Commission's offer to build the farm-to-market road from State Highway 35 at Rockport north to farm-to-market road 1781, a distance of approximately 2.6 miles. Approximately \$44,800 will be the cost. The county will furnish the right of way.

They also transferred some money to the mosquito fund.

The Commissioners Court decided to make Judge Wendell the purchasing agent for the county.

At the regular meeting of the City Council Tuesday night Seth H. Steele and Ernest Harrist were sworn in as mayor and alderman from Ward 2, respectively. Both men had won majorities in the recent special city election.

Representatives of a paving concern, of Corpus Christi, were present at the meeting and submitted prices which were accepted by the council for the black-topping of a strip of Water St. The section to be worked on will run from Johnson's Bait Stand some 1600 feet north. This part of Water Street has been badly in need of repairs for some time.

Recent heavy rains have necessitated the digging of an additional pit at the city dumping grounds. Water Superintendent Tom Shults was instructed to have the work completed as soon as possible.

The water and sewerage situation was discussed. It was decided that something must be done to relieve the situation. During the past summer the present water wells were insufficient to supply the demand and several times the city was completely out of water.

In the event of fire during such a period it would be impossible to supply water to properly fight a fire of any size. The city at present enjoys a 25% reduction in insurance rates due to the efficient operation of our fire department. However, if the water situation is not remedied, residents of the city are in danger of losing this reduction.

The sewerage plant at present is operating at capacity and a complete working over and enlargement of the system is necessary if health standards are to be maintained.

The only solution to the problem lies in the issuance of revenue bonds so that adequate water and sewerage may be had. Consulting engineers have discussed the problem with city officials recently, but no official action has been taken at present.

Neighboring cities have recently held revenue bond elections for the same purpose and in all cases the elections carried by a large majority. Just recently Refugio passed a \$500,000 bond issue for water and sewerage. Sinton, Goliad, Beeville, Seadrift, Aransas Pass and many other cities have successfully passed similar elections and the situation in these places will be remedied.

Steele, Harrist Elected To City Offices

At a special election held in Rockport, Thursday, Nov. 5, 1953, to elect a mayor and one alderman in Precinct 2, Seth H. Steele was elected mayor. Mr. Steele is a local building contractor and president of the Chamber of Commerce. He was elected mayor to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of J. W. Higgins. Steele received 221 votes, the other candidate, James J. McCabe had 54 votes. There was one write-in vote for D. R. Simmons.

The vacancy in the office of alderman was created by the resignation of Thomas D. Picton and there were no candidates for the office, but there were twelve names written in. Ernest Harrist was elected, he received 48 votes; M. B. Mullinax, 12; W. C. Stevenson, 7; John Haynes, 2; John Cox 1; Ray Thomas, 1; Chester Johnson, 1; W. M. Christ, 1; Bill Crist, 1; John McDavid, 1; John Roark, 1; and W. L. Haynes, 1.

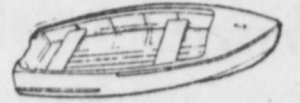

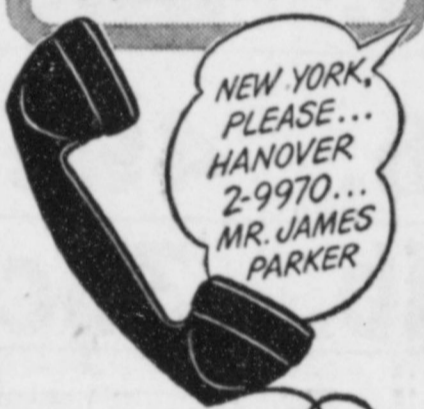

Prospects Fair On Deer, Turkey

Austin.—Texas deer and turkey have rallied somewhat from the severe drought period and prospects are for a fair season, according to the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

The annual big game hunt under the General State Law opens November 16 and continues through December 31. There are special seasons for larger areas like West of the Pecos, Panhandle and Possum Kingdom, as well as several special dates on the county level. Bag limits and shooting hours likewise vary.

An expected 100,000 hunters will take to the field for the fall classic. The kill on deer usually runs about 40,000 in Texas. The turkey harvest is estimated at close to 6,000. Both deer and turkey suffered from the prolonged drought but rains beginning in the late summer have at least partly relieved the crisis, on the basis of reports to the Executive Secretary.

Even in Deep South Texas the deer have rallied, although there was some die-off in the heat of the summer. Game Warden Supervisor Herbert Ward of Catarina and Supervisor John E. Hearn of Cotulla agreed that deer were on the upturn although some ranchers in their area will restrict the harvest.

Game Warden Supervisor G. M. Stricklin of Beeville said deer are coming back in his area which embraces the lower coastal plain.

In the Hill Country, game wardens reported a definite pickup in deer prospects and said wild turkey were slowly rallying from three bad hatching seasons.

The Executive Secretary advised hunters to study their Game Law Digest on hunting regulations and to look up the local game wardens for any additional information needed.

Social Security Tax Rate Will Be Increased On January 1

The social security tax rate for persons whose work counts toward old-age survivors insurance is scheduled to increase on the first of January, H. H. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi social security office, reminded employers, employees and self-employed people today. This scheduled increase in tax contribution is in accordance with the 1950 amendments to the social security law, and was enacted by Congress in anticipation of future obligations of the program.

the law will have 2 percent instead of the present 1½ percent deducted from their pay beginning with the first of January, on earnings of up to \$3600 a year; their employers will contribute an equal amount.

The new rates will apply to all taxable wages paid after December 31, 1953, regardless of when earned.

The social security tax for the self-employed is scheduled to increase from the present 2¼ percent to 3 percent, for the period commencing January 1, 1954. Since the self-employed whose work is covered by the law pay their tax just once yearly at the time of filing their Federal income tax return, they will pay the present 2¼ percent social security tax on their 1953 income that counts toward social security. This will be due no later than March 15, 1954. Their first payments at the increased rate of 3 percent will be due March 15, 1955, for the calendar year 1954.

In the meantime the Internal Revenue Service reports that employers will be furnished late this year with income tax withholding tables and Federal Insurance Contributions Act (social security taxes) tables reflecting rates applicable next year.

The next scheduled increase, six years from now, in 1960, will be to 2½ percent each for employer and employee, and to 3¼ percent for the self-employed.

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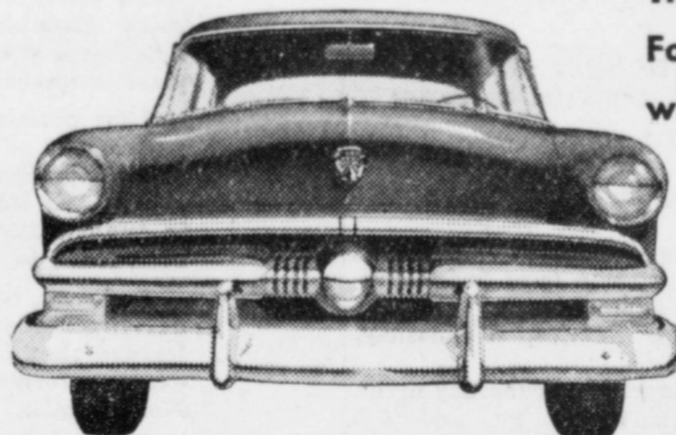

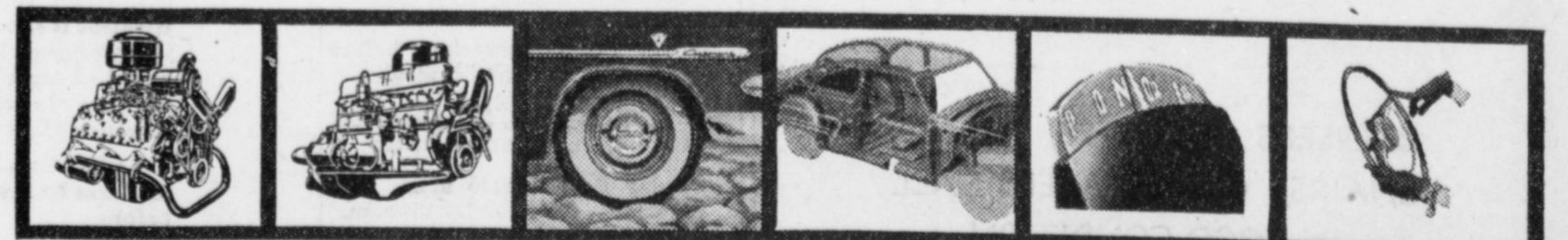

The Home Grounds
(By Mrs. Emma H. S. Reese)

This week the Home Gardener is still cleaning up, making the most of mild, pleasant weather, which we hope will last for some weeks, before cold drives us indoors. We are transplanting bulbs and hardy perennials, dividing old clumps and setting out new ones, and planting flower seeds for spring blooming. Seeds may be planted in tins or flats, and tender bedding out plants may be preserved for next year's start. A cold frame, very simple made, is of great value for this purpose, and more easily cared for than in the house. Good direction for making this may be had from any lumber mill, and from the Garden Dept. of the Corpus Christi "Call-Times," whose articles by Mrs. Penny Peckenpaugh give us so much help in this region. The Corpus Christi Garden Book is also a good source of information, as our coastal country is different from some of the areas described in other books on the garden. Care should be taken, in following any directions, to make sure they apply to local conditions.

Especially is this true of pruning. This necessary part of garden housekeeping should be approached with great care. There are three uses of pruning: Shaping to remove dead wood and badly placed or too large branches and masses of foliage; cutting back, to increase the yield of flowers and fruit, propagation; taking cuttings which will be planted elsewhere to produce new plants.

Pruning as an operation is not harmful in itself, but each cut should be undertaken with care. Most pruning and shaping is best done while the plant is dormant, as too early cutting back may cause abundant new tender growth which will suffer from even a light frost. Exceptions to this are spring flowering shrubs and roses that should be pruned after flowering. Dead wood may be removed at any time.
