### Senator Lyndon Johnson Discusses Cost of Living

Senator Lyndon B. Johnson says official government figures hold out little hope for relief from the high cost of living in the months ahead.

If anything, it may go even higher," Senator Johnson declared in an address this week.

Texas' Senior Senator discussed a letter he received from Secretary of Labor James F. Mitchell explaining the reasons behind the present all-time high level in living costs. The Senator had requested such an explanation when the Department's cost of living index reached the high mark.

The cost of living figures are made up of three separate categories, Secretary Mitchell explained. They include commodities bought by the consumer; services such as medical care, transportation, utilities, and recreation; and rent.

The cost of commodities shot up at the outbreak of the Korean War and have not varied much since then. The present level of the cost of living, Secretary Mitchell explained, is due to the fact that services and rents are just now beginning to catch up with commodity prices.

"According to Secretary Mitchell rents will go even higher if they follow the pattern that developed after the first World War," Senator Johnson said. "The Secretary also says that every month brings an increase in utility rates in some important city."

"These are discouraging signs that do not indicate any early hope of relief."

Senator Johnson said he could understand why prices increased at the beginning of the Korean War, but added he has not seen a satisfactory explanation of "why these costs stay up when prices paid to producers are falling."

"Practically every farmer knows he is making less money," he said. "Every housewife knows she is paying out more money to keep her family going. It just doesn't make sense."

Glenn Mundine will continue to run the other barber shop in Rockport owned by Elbert Mundine. He will divide his time between the shop in Fulton and the one in Rockport.

The City Council met in regular session Tuesday night at the City Hall, with Mayor Seth Steele presiding at the meeting.

Representatives of a bonding company and consulting engineers were present and a lengthy discussion was held concerning the water and sewerage situation in the city. It was determined that action must be taken to relieve the situation that prevailed during the past summer. If relief is to be had next summer immediate action must be taken.

The bond men present agreed to make a survey and submit recommendations as to the amount of money that would be available in the event of a revenue bond election. One of the consulting engineers was asked to submit a report on what the city would require for their needs. Both of these reports will be made without cost and obligation to the city.

After these reports are made they will be submitted to a group of citizens who will go over the plans with city officials and then the entire plans submitted to all of the citizens of the city so that it can be determined that such a revenue bond election should be held.

A resident of Aransas Pass was present and stated that he wanted to operate a taxi stand in the city. He was told that he should make an application in writing to the city and that action would be taken at the next meeting to determine the necessity of additional taxi service in the city.

A local plumber appeared before the council regarding an alleged violation of the plumbing ordinance. He agreed to correct the alleged violation.

The City will furnish water to the small park west of the Woman's Civic Club Building so that that area may be beautified.

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## IT'S THE LAW in Texas

MAKE CONTRACTS SPECIFIC,  
AVOID DISPUTES

Nearly every day all of us are making agreements with our fellow citizens. Our whole system of free enterprise and trade is based, to a large extent, upon mutual agreements or promises to do something in the future. The important thing we need to remember is to make every agreement perfectly clear whether it is oral or written.

Generally speaking, you can enter into a verbal agreement that is just as binding as a written contract. Consequently, the great majority of contracts that we enter into are never put into written form. But exact terms of an oral contract may be difficult to establish if a disagreement arises, and a well drawn written contract will help to avoid the unfortunate disputes which arise from honest misunderstanding.

Not every written contract meets the test of clarity, however. Suppose Mr. Householder has a piece of paper on which is written the heading "Proposal" and which thereafter reads as follows:

"We will build a garage for you on your lot for the estimated price of \$800, work to be done in a workmanlike manner. All of our work is guaranteed to your satisfaction. Subject to the conditions printed on the reverse side."

This is signed by the XYZ Company. Under this signature is the word "Accepted" followed by a line for the signature of Mr. Householder. His question is, should he sign it?

Here are some of the misunderstandings that might arise from such an agreement: The company has agreed to build a garage—yet nothing is said about the size or type of construction. It has not even been stated whether it is to be a single or double garage. There is no indication in the agreement as to where on the lot the garage will be built. It says nothing about when the work is to be

finished. There is no agreement as to whether Mr. Householder is to pay in advance, in installments, or not until it is completed.

Further, they have not actually agreed upon a price. The agreement refers to an estimated price of \$800. They should be specific and make either a fixed price contract or an agreement whereby the builder is reimbursed for his expenses plus a definite profit percentage. Perhaps the XYZ Company feels that if their expenses are higher than anticipated, they will be able to charge more than the estimated \$800. On the other hand, Mr. Householder probably feels that \$800 is the maximum price he will have to pay.

The most important prerequisite of a clear contract is that it cover the essential elements of performance. This is not as difficult as it might seem. Here is a good rule to follow: As to the acts of each party determine what is to be done, when, where and by whom. See that these essential parts are included in your agreement.

In addition, remember that if a contract is worth signing, it is worth reading and understanding—all of it.

### Family Security A Reason For Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving is one of the holidays of the year which is closest to the hearts of all the people. It is a day when families like to be together. On this day, millions of Americans sit down to a big dinner count their blessings, and hope for the continued safety and security of their families.

An important factor in the feeling of security which more than 67 million Americans enjoy is the insurance protection provided by the social security program, says H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration. Older workers who are about to retire no longer face the threat of poverty and destitution. By partially replacing the loss of earned income, social security insurance provides a bulwark against that threat.

The surviving widow and children of a deceased worker are assured that the family income will not cease with the worker's death.

Retirement payments to a worker and his wife range from \$37.50 to \$127.50 a month. In case of death, the insurance payments to a family may total as much as \$168.75 a month, according to H. M. Cleveland.

These insurance payments represent a minimum of financial security for a worker and for his family. They may be supplemented in many other ways; by private insurance home ownership, saving, or other income. Thus, through the efforts of each worker and his family, the fear of destitution no longer exists, and Thanksgiving is a more meaningful holiday.

**Traffic Safety Rules Explained By Col. Tilley**

"The driver as well as the walker has a responsibility in the field of pedestrian safety."

Col. E. B. Tilley of Houston, President of the Texas Safety Association, and Services Advisor for the Gulf Oil Corporation made that statement today, speaking in connection with the November pedestrian safety program being sponsored by the Texas Safety Association in cooperation with the Department of Public Safety.

"The pedestrian has the most to lose in an encounter with an automobile, and should protect himself," Col. Tilley said, "but he could follow all the rules of safe walking and still become the victim of a motorist who didn't observe the rules of safe driving."

He mentioned as one of the most common driver offenders the Crosswalk Creeper, who stops at the red light but keeps edging over the line. "It gives walkers the jitters," he explained, "and makes them afraid they may be run down before they get across the street."

"And the driver who ignores the crosswalk and stops half or all the way across it is just as bad," Col. Tilley said.

"Then there's the fellow who blows his horn without slowing down and expects the pedestrian to get out of his way," he pointed out.

"The Traffic Light Jumper is even more dangerous," he said. "This driver watches the light and the instant it changes, zooms off without checking to see if a pedestrian is in the way."

"Such poor driving habits can be dangerous, both to the motorist and to the pedestrian," Col. Tilley said. Motorists need to follow all the rules of safe driving, all the time, to insure their safety and the safety of the often innocent pedestrian.

**Dr. Cox Warns Against Carbon Monoxide**

Austin.—There is no doubt that carbon monoxide—associated with gas heaters, is one of the most deadly and least publicized of all the poisonous gases, said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Carbon monoxide is formed when there is not enough oxygen mixed with the burning gas, or when the design and operation of the equipment is faulty.

With a toxicity comparable to the gases that have been used in warfare not enough attention has been given to the deadly effects of prolonged exposure to carbon monoxide. The gas claims far more than its share of accidental deaths in Texas.

Dr. Cox makes the following recommendations for use of gas heaters:

- 1. Make sure the heater is properly adjusted.
- 2. Use metal tubing for connecting stove to gas line and check for leaks.
- 3. Always ventilate a room when the heater is burning.
- 4. Do not use any artificial gas in a heater designed for natural gas.
- 5. Never let the stove burn all night.

Carbon monoxide from automobile exhausts is a big health hazard warns Dr. Cox. He said many motorists have wrecked their cars and been listed as a highway death when carbon monoxide was the real killer. Cars should never be run in garages with the doors closed.

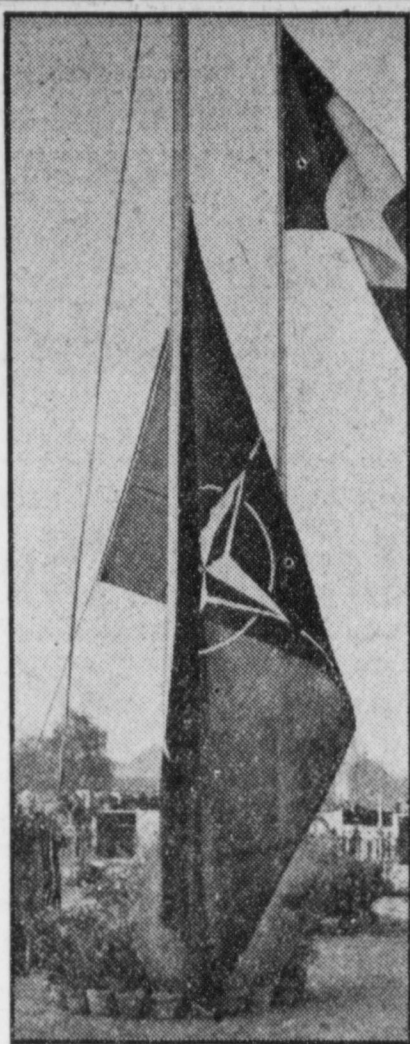

## STATE DRAFT QUOTA SET AT 1,264 MEN FOR DECEMBER

AUSTIN—A December state draft quota of 1,264 men was received Monday at state Selective Service headquarters, Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state draft director, said Tuesday.

The quota is the Texas share of a national call for 23,000 men. The November quota, announced in late September, was 1,210. The October quota for Texas, now being filled, is 1,208.

General Wakefield said that, under present plans, local board quotas to fill the December call will be placed in the mail "sometime next week."

State draft boards will also receive a call for physical examinations, to be sent out also next week, for delivery in December. The state call for December examinations will total only 986 men.

Instructions were received from national Selective Service headquarters that all deliveries of men in December would be made through December 18 on account of Christmas holidays.

Instructions also were received that, where possible, only men 20 years old or older would be inducted in December. If necessary, any board may call men under 20 to reach its quota.

The number of men under 20 being inducted in Texas continues to be less, General Wakefield said. Sixteen men out of every 100 inducted in September were under 20. The figure was 19 out of every 100 in August.

This compares with 32 out of every 100 the past June. General Wakefield attributes this mostly to a reduction in monthly quotas, which was forecast even before the truce in Korea. He says he expects draft quotas to go up by June of next year.

## Masonic Lodge Finishes New Meeting Hall

The Masonic Lodge of Rockport has completed its new lodge hall, just north of Rockport on Highway 35.

A special meeting was held at the new building on Thursday, Nov. 5, with the District Deputy R. H. Inglefield, Sr., of Corpus Christi as guest. Mr. Inglefield made an inspection of the building and approved the construction.
