Officials also wish to remind persons desiring to haul their own garbage to the dumping site, that they are welcome to do so. They do not have to obtain a permit to haul their own garbage and trash. Persons wishing to haul on a commercial basis must first obtain a permit from the city.

It has been brought to the attention of city officials that residents of Rockport are hauling their garbage to the dumping

ground at Fulton under the impression that they are not allowed to haul their garbage to the city dumping ground. This is in error and Rockport residents are requested to use the site provided for them.
