

On the 30th of December, there were 18 hunters out and they came in with 74 ducks most of them getting their limits and on Dec. 31, there were 11 out, bringing in 36 ducks. The Wharf was closed New Years but on Saturday there were 22 hunters out, coming in with 39 ducks and one goose, which was shot by Dr. C. E. Stoley of San Antonio, he also got 4 of the ducks killed.
