

## Along The Waterfront



Fishing and hunting in this area has been very good the past week, especially in the basin at Rockport. Hugh Morrison says that fishing was the best in the Basin at Rockport during Christmas week-end, since 1951. He estimates that there were 5,000 pounds of fish taken out of there Christmas Day. Mr. Morrison said that the "norther" which blew before Christmas was the first time there has been enough cold weather to send fish into the basin since 1951.

Mrs. "Shorty" Townsend, fishing off her boat dock in the Rockport harbor on Dec. 20, landed 100 pounds of trout, weighing from 2 to 4 pounds each.

Fishermen going out from Floyd's Boat and Sales Co. from Dec. 29 throughout last Sunday, report the following catches: L. P. Northup of Clinton, Okla., landed 100 trout on Dec. 29. Herb Jones and party of Lubbock caught 93 trout, while Walter Jesse, of Austin, caught 53. W. C. Sikes of Dallas and Carl Kutzer of Rockport got 58 trout which weighed 78 pounds. Howard LaCour and George Stansbury of LaWood, Texas, came in with 100 trout, and Maj. Lee and Mrs. Lewis of Weatherford, Okla. got 67 trout, while J. M. Tompkins hooked 65.

At Johnson's Bait Stand last week J. M. Rogers and son of Springfield, Colo., got 35 drum and 49 trout, and Rowe L. Sams of Waco landed 60 trout. On Saturday Mr. Rethemeyer caught 90 trout and on Wednesday Mr. Boyd hooked 25 red fish and 30 drum, on Wednesday night, A. J. Johnson of Corpus Christi caught 40 drum and 16 red fish just a little way out from the shore. R. T., Jim and Russell McKnight got 160 trout on Dec. 26 at the stand.

Dr. Nash fished from Mills' Wharf, coming into the Rockport basin and other points, he got 175 fish in four days last week. Jesse Sapp went out from the Wharf Saturday and came in with a nice string of fish.

Duck hunting at the wharf was not quite so good as last year, due to too many fresh water ponds over the peninsula. On the 30th of December, there were 18 hunters out and they came in with 74 ducks most of them getting their limits and on Dec. 31, there were 11 out, bringing in 36 ducks. The Wharf was closed New Years but on Saturday there were 22 hunters out, coming in with 39 ducks and one goose, which was shot by Dr. C. E. Stoley of San Antonio, he also got 4 of the ducks killed. On Sunday there were 27 hunters out and they shot 83 ducks and 4 geese. The geese were killed by Capt. Lockmiller and his party of four from Brooks Field, they also killed 17 ducks. On Monday there were only two hunters went out and each of them got his limit. Mills' Wharf considers it had a fair season, there were 727 hunters went out from there, killing a total of 2,284 ducks and 29 geese.

## OIL STRIKE IN ARANSAS PRODUCES 273 BPD

Caroline Hunt Sands of Dallas No. 1 Mary Claire Bauer and others, Aransas County oil discovery 5.7 miles southeast of Austwell, has been completed for a daily flow of 273.29 barrels of 40.1 gravity, pipeline oil.

Production was through a 7-64-inch choke from 200 perforations at 11,158-98 feet. With total depth 11,285 feet, this test has 7-inch casing at 10,757 feet and 322 feet of 4 1/2-inch liner has been set in in the project.

Gas-oil ratio was 1,780-1. Tubing pressure was 3,755 pounds. The discovery is on a 463-acre lease in Thomas Newcomb Survey, A-165.

George W. Graham and Emory M. Spencer No. 2 Brundrett, Aransas County wildcat four miles west of Rockport, was preparing to run correlation log to 6,050 feet, permitted to a depth of 9,000 feet, the test is in William S. Tutton Survey, A-202.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 63 Copano Bay State, West Fulton Beach Field test in State Tract 47, has been completed for a daily flow of 102.66 barrels of 41.9 gravity pipeline oil.

Production is through 1/8 inch choke from 16 perforations at 6,296-6,300 feet in 5 1/2 inch casing set at 6,000 feet. Total depth is 7,302 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 1,433-1 and tubing pressure was 700 pounds.

Stanolind Oil and Gas Co. No. B1 5 State Tract 39, Fulton Beach Field producer seven miles north of Rockport, in Copano Bay, has been completed for a 24-hour flow of 105.47 barrels of 41 gravity, pipeline oil. The flow was through an 8-64-inch choke from 42 perforations at 7,133-40 feet in 5 1/2-inch casing set on bottom at 7,156 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 1,140-1.

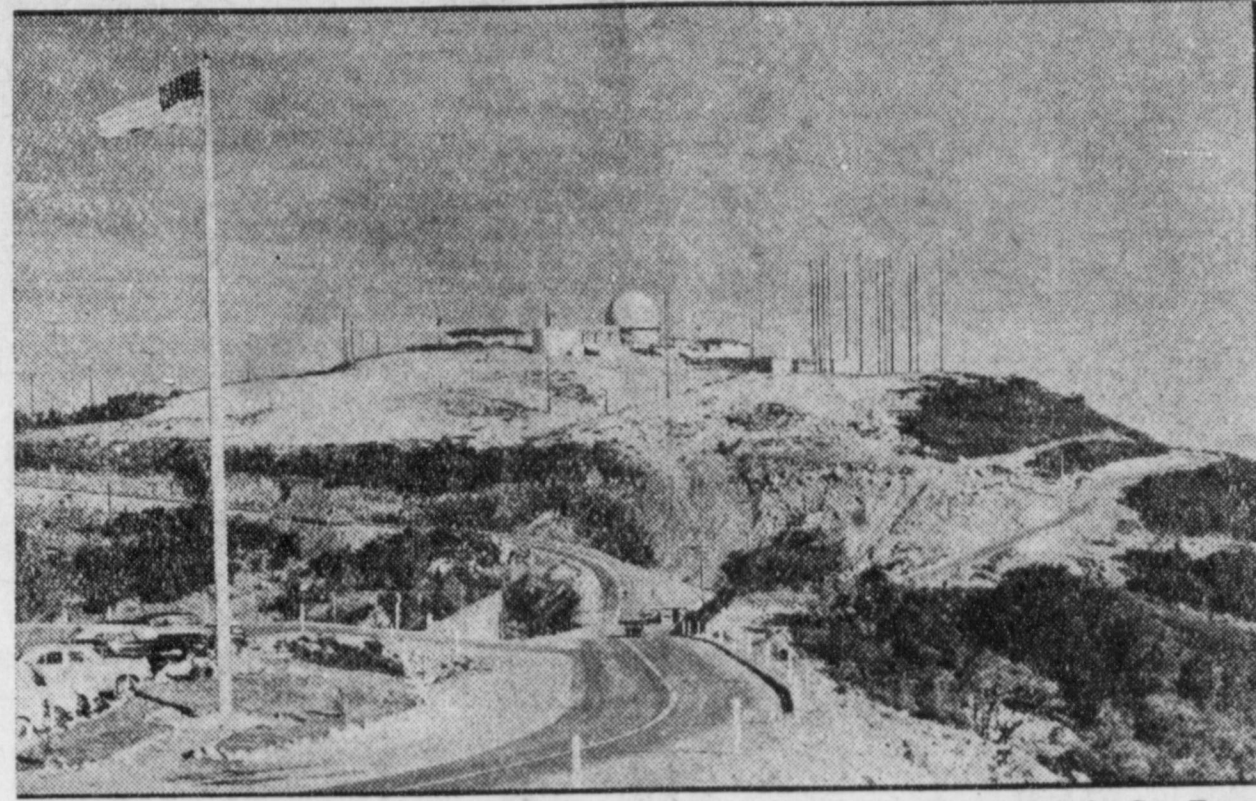

### City Taxes Become Delinquent Feb. 1

Those taxpayers within the City who have not paid their 1953 taxes are reminded by Mayor Seth H. Steele that all City taxes must be paid before January 31, 1954 to avoid penalty. Penalties amount to 1% per month. To some this may seem like a small amount, but by not paying in January another penalty, not so readily apparent is assessed.

All taxes not paid before the first of February go on the delinquent list and are turned over to the Delinquent Tax Attorney whose fee is 15%. The City by losing this 15% will then have to increase on all property to offset this amount if the same total amount is required to operate the City business.

Thus, it can be seen that those who wait are placing an extra burden on those who have paid properly and also on themselves by depriving the City of the 15% above mentioned.

As an example: If collections by February 1st are 85% and 15% is delinquent and assuming the delinquent collector gets 100% of this amount he would be getting 24% of the entire tax bill for the year. To offset this the City budget must be lowered and deprive those who have paid off something they had coming. For another year, theoretically, at least taxes would have to be raised to offset this loss.

From this point of view it seems only good business to the individual to pay the 1953 taxes even if the money must be borrowed.

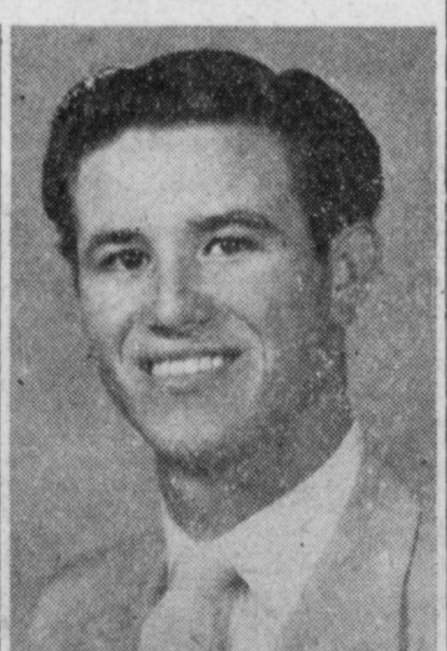

## IT'S THE LAW in Texas

### January Fifteenth Income Tax Deadline for Many

Have you planned on waiting until March 15th approaches before doing anything about your 1953 Federal income taxes? If so, it might be wise to make a quick check right now. For practical purposes January 15th, rather than the March deadline, is the last day of grace for many individuals. This is due to the Federal laws requiring certain persons to file Declarations of Estimated Income Tax—or the pay-as-you-go plan. Under those laws several million people are required each year to estimate their total annual income in advance, making quarterly tax payments based upon such estimates. The final quarterly payment for 1953 is due on or before January 15th, 1954.

A Declaration of Estimated Income Tax must be filed by every citizen or resident who receives annual wages (subject to withholding) in excess of \$4500, plus \$600 for each exemption claimed. For example, a single person with no dependents who last year received wages in excess of \$5100 is required to file a declaration. If he has one additional exemption, he need not file unless his wages exceeded \$5700 during 1953. This latter figure would also apply to a married couple without dependents filing a joint return.

In other words, the amount goes up \$600 for each exemption the taxpayer is entitled to claim, including any exemptions for age or blindness.

A Declaration of Estimated Income Tax must also be filed by any person with annual income from sources other than wages (subject to withholding) in excess of \$100. This is true even though their total income did not exceed \$4500 plus \$600 for each exemption. Of course, individuals whose incomes did not exceed \$600 1953 need not file, even though no tax has been withheld.

Those falling into the required

category who have failed to file declarations at quarterly intervals during 1953 make amends by filing either a final declaration or an income tax return by Jan. 15th. At the same time they should pay any balance of tax owed the government on their entire 1953 income.

Now, if paying the entire balance of your tax prior to January 15th is going to be a difficult matter, due to a quirk in the tax laws you may avoid penalties by paying at least 80% of your total tax at that time and the remaining balance by March 15th. This would involve filing both a declaration (by January 15) and a tax return (by March 15).

The first quarterly declaration on 1954 income is due on or before March 15th. (This column, based on Federal law, is written to inform—not to advise. No person should ever apply or interpret any law without the aid of an attorney who knows the facts because the facts may change the application of the law.)

When the couple left on a wedding trip to Austin, the bride wore a knit suit of toast brown wool with matching accessories. The couple will make their home in Rockport.

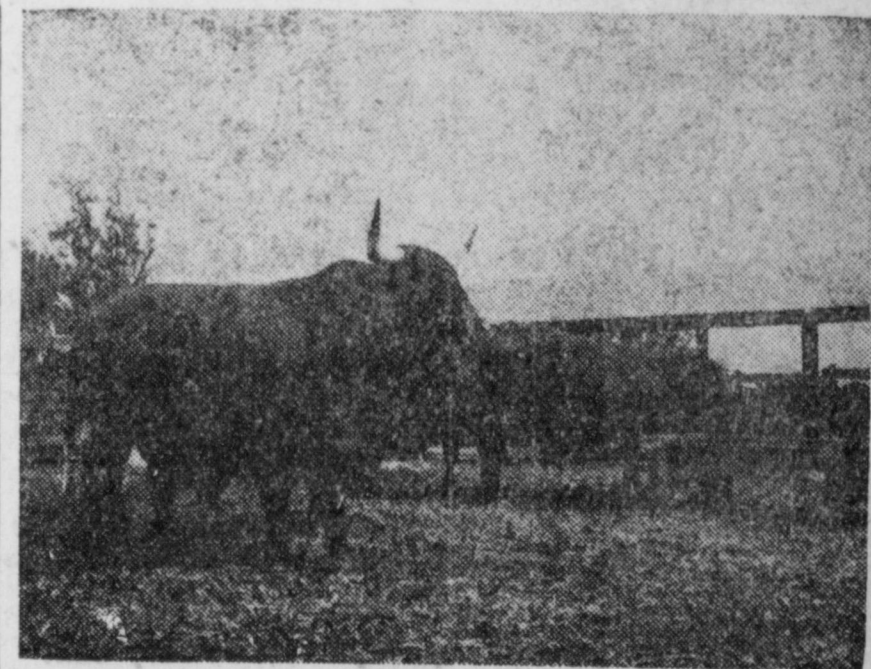

### The HomeGrounds

(By Mrs. Emma H. S. Reese)

While the outdoors may not have quite the appeal of warmer weather, we on the Gulf Coast have the pleasure of many mild days when the garden calls us. This week we see some frost damage, which, while not so severe as further north, requires attention. Foliage droops, and flowers have a scorched appearance, due to loss of moisture and searing winds. What to do now?

In the first place, water well, and protect from drying winds as much as possible. Wet plants and surrounding mulch with hose as soon as the cold wave is announced. "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure", and a slight protection of papers, cloth or branches will prevent much damage. If the shrubs are protected about the roots with earth, peat moss or grass clippings, it will help. If damage has been done, do not be in too much of a hurry to cut off wilted portion. This is for two reasons.

Pruning encourages new growth and worse damage may occur with later frosts. Wet well the plant and surroundings, and remove only obviously wilted and dead portions which hurt the looks of the plant. When all frost danger is past, in the Spring, the plant will have recovered unnecessary loss of blossom wood.

Do not leave protection on too long. Gradually remove the covering so that air may get to the plant. Moveable frames of light wood, with boxes and baskets for smaller plants, are suggested.
