Rockport Will Be Honored At S. A. Livestock Show

Rockport will be honored at the 1954 San Antonio Rodeo and Livestock Show during Gulf Coast Country Day, Thursday, Feb. 18, according to H. R. Murphy, chairman of the day-long celebration. The show runs Feb. 12-21.

Events scheduled for Gulf Coast Day include judging of Jerseys, Holsteins and the Junior Dairy Show, and Southtown and Suffolk sheep. A Polled Hereford Breeding Cattle Sale will be held starting at 1:00 p.m. During the evening performance of the Everett Colborn World's Rodeo, there will be a Parade of Champions.

Special honors will be accorded visitors to the Livestock Exposition at the Texas County Coliseum, including radio and television interviews originating from the grounds. Visitors will be accorded special recognition during the rodeo performance on their special day.

Rev. T. H. Pollard Resigns As Pastor Of Presbyterians

Rev. T. H. Pollard has resigned as pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in Rockport, effective February 28, at which time he will have served the church 12 years and three months.

The latter part of December the Presbyterian Church at Woodsboro called Rev. Pollard to be pastor there and he and Mrs. Pollard, believing it best to accept this call, requested Presbytery to dissolve his pastoral relations with the local church and announced his resignation at the meeting of the Men of the Church on January 4, and the congregation voted on January 17, to concur with this request.

Rev. and Mrs. Pollard and their two sons, Marvin and Harris, moved to Rockport, December 1, 1941. Rev. Pollard says he will always remember he preached his first sermon here the day Pearl Harbor was bombed.

When the Pollards started their work here the Presbyterian Church had a membership of between 60 and 65. It was a Home Mission Church and owned one piece of property on Market Street. Soon after the Pollards came the church bought the manse from Fred A. Bracht and moved a small building from back of the manse to the church lot for use for classrooms. A short time later they bought a bungalow and moved it from Ingleside to use as additional classrooms, and bought four lots where the present church (continued on page 5)

National Foundation For Infantile Paralysis Helping Local Child

B. T. Hardeman, chairman of the March of Dimes drive in Aransas County, says that the Drive is now in full swing. The Woman's Club is planning a benefit game party for the March of Dimes on Friday night, January 29, and the envelopes mailed out the first of last week are coming in. This envelopes should be mailed to A. C. Glass, treasurer of the Aransas County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, although those mailed to the postmaster, Marion McElveen or Mr. Hardeman will be given to Mr. Glass.

Jack Horton, chairman of the Aransas County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, said that Irma Solis, of this city, is being treated by the National Foundation and referred The Pilot to her parents for details. Irma is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Mike Solis. Mrs. Solis says that Irma was stricken with polio when she was 21 months old and she is now eight years old. She was first taken to the Memorial Hospital in Corpus Christi and later placed in the Crippled Children's Hospital in Corpus Christi for a while. Her legs are still crooked and on Nov. 4, 1953, Mrs. Solis took her to Dallas for treatment. Irma is still there. They put a cast on her for a month and then put braces on her. The doctors think they can operate on her in a year and straighten her legs and feet, Mrs. Solis said.

Mr. Hardeman has ordered some more posters with the 3-D tube which will be placed in public places around the county. He did not have enough in the first shipment to place in all business houses.

The "Prevention Program" alters the Dimes split. Previously the money has been divided equally between the National Foundation and the 3,100 County Chapters. Now it has to be divided three ways, one third going to the polio prevention program which plans to use \$19,000,000 in its GG program in 1954, making necessary to double the number of dimes given.

Commissioners' Court Discusses Bond Issue

The Commissioner's Court met Friday of last week and agreed to call an election for a bond issue for a new Court House and Jail, in the near future.

The present courthouse, erected some sixty-four years ago, is deemed inadequate by the county officials to carry on the increased business at this time in the county.

Some of the chief reason for the need of a new Court House are due to the increased activity in Aransas County through oil and real estate transactions.

The County and District Clerk's office does not have sufficient room for storage of records or even space to accommodate abstractors. There is also need within the office for a comparing room, away from office noises, where all records can be read back and thoroughly checked.

The present court house and jail does not have quarters for juveniles, cells for the insane, and accommodations for men and women who serve as jurors. These facilities now create an emergency for something to be done immediately and will be included in the perspective courthouse and jail plans. Through the changes of time our present court house is very much out of date and does not have the conveniences, ample room, storage space or other means to comply with the present day's fast growing county.

A bond issue for \$300,000 to build a new court house and jail was defeated October 17, 1953, by a vote of nearly two to one. There were 233 votes cast against and 119 for.

As explained before the other bond election there will not be an increase in the taxes for payment of the bonds necessary for the new court house and jail.

personnel.
Mr. Gibson spoke on "Education For What?" He said it is well in the schools to stop and think, and define what they are trying to do, and evaluate their purposes and goals. Three main concepts of education are to: (1) develop the art of using all resources. (2) Americans believe in using intelligence to provide for the general welfare of all, (3) That all education is an attempt to meet the needs of all the people, to provide for maximum development and prepare people to make maximum contributions to all.

Mr. Gibson also gave other points on Education: To educate for the fullest participation in our democratic way of life; For the improvement of universal free education for all; to educate for participation and the right to achieve; and that with privileges go duties and obligations. He stressed that the school must teach the dignity of work—that work is honorable; also the appreciation and strong respect for an ethical character, moral and spiritual values, fair play and honesty. He said that the schools must educate for the needs of a changing society; and to teach the children to develop all the skills they are capable of developing. This must be done by the school, the home, the church and the community working together.

Mrs. J. B. Jackson, president, presided at the business meeting. The recommendation of the executive board was accepted: That the school board use the \$250.00, which was given previously toward the purchase of a projector for the Elementary and Junior High schools.

Plans are being made for the eye and teeth examination this month, which will complete the health clinic.

Mrs. Bob Ayers on Civil Defense, announced that the First Aid course had a full class enrolled and was making nice progress. She also stated that they are making a list of blood types and would appreciate any one knowing their blood type to register with her.

Mrs. Weldon Cabaniss, chairman of the Library project announced that 48 of the 50 books bought for display had been purchased by individuals for the Elementary and Junior High library. The books had been on display at the Woman's Club, the Lions Club, and the Rotary Club, and thanks are extended to those groups for their co-operation in this project. The P.-T.A. voted to buy additional books amounting to \$200.00 for the library.

A resolution was read and accepted which asked the school board to consider the employing of a teacher of public school music for next year for the elementary and Junior High school.

The Association voted to give one life membership, amounting to \$25, which money is used for extension work, and a life membership committee, consisting of Mrs. Chas. Garrett, Mrs. Floyd Smith and Mrs. Wm. Johnson was appointed.
