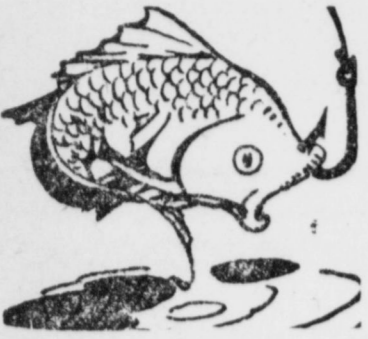


Along The Waterfront



Fishing has been slow in this area the past week with few people trying to catch the finny tribe. There is plenty of shrimp available for bait and a few nice fish have been hooked at the basin in Rockport.

Down at Johnson's Bait Stand the fishing has been very good recently. Last Friday, J. M. Renfro of San Antonio, caught a 7 pound drum and 11 redfish, one of the reds weighed 5 1/2 pounds. Mr. Collum of Rockport got 61 trout and Mr. Beardmore and Mr. Hodge landed six 3-pound reds and one flounder. Mr. Collum hooked 22 trout on Saturday. On Monday, Mr. Hodge caught one 6-pound red which measured 24 inches, one 3-pound red and one two pound red. One man fishing from Johnson's Monday, came in with nine 3 pound trout, and two nice reds. Mr. Rathmie caught 35 trout there Tuesday.

Jack Kammerer, fishing at Perry Jones' Wharf yesterday, came in with 75 trout and Dickinson of Aransas Pass landed 11 trout. Mr. Jones says there are very few fishermen out there but those who fish are doing well.

Women Threaten Men For Honors In Fishing Tournament

What's that about the weaker sex? Read this, gentlemen—and reconsider.

Three women are among the leaders in the local Chamber of Commerce's three-month-long win-visitor fishing tournament.

They are Mrs. C. M. Spires of Sharon Springs, Kansas, Mrs. Alford E. Anderson, 5052 Quail Ave., Minneapolis, Minn., and Mrs. Lillian English, 410 Villiarit Boulevard, San Antonio, Texas.

Mrs. English, with a 6-pound, 8-ounce catch, is one of the top contenders in the tournament's redfish division.

Mrs. Spires hooked a 4-pound, 12-ounce speckled trout to establish herself as a leader in the trout division. Mrs. Anderson checked in with a speckled trout weighing 4 pounds and 2 ounces.

And, says Mrs. Mary Juergens, manager of the Chamber and top tournament official, more women are getting out their rods and reels as the competition gets warmer.

The tournament started November 30. It will continue through February 27 in the five bays in the Rockport area.

At the moment, however, the men are clinging to first position in both divisions.

J. A. Hodges, of Crosbyton, is the leader in redfish competition with a 10-pound, 2-ounce catch. O. V. Wheeler, of Minneapolis, Minn., is first in the trout division by virtue of a 5-pound, 6-ounce snag.

But if the presence of the lady isn't a fair warning, then last year's results should be. The 1952-53 redfish competition was won by, yep, a woman—Mrs. B. H. Lieurance, of Kiowa, Kansas.

Prizes for the Fishing Tournament went to one repeat winner and one new one. Mr. C. R. Shirey of Fort Worth, Texas is the repeat winner, bringing in a 5 1/2-pound trout. A new winner in the redfish division was Jake Young of Wichita, Kans. with a 8 7/8 pound fish. Trophies will be awarded at the close of the tournament which is Feb. 27th, for the largest fish in each division for the entire tournament.

ARANSAS GAINS 70-BARRELER

William Herbert Hunt No. 2 W. G. McCampbell, Aransas County producer in the Puerto Bay Field nine miles northwest of Aransas Pass, has been completed for a 24-hour flow of 70.8 barrels of 45.2 gravity oil.

Gas-oil ration was 1,185-1. Production was through a 1/8-inch choke from 48 perforations at 6,735-41 feet in 5 1/2 inch casing at 6,801 feet, with total depth 7,284 feet. Tubing pressure was 400 pounds and casing pressure was 975 pounds. The oiler is on a 251-acre lease in James Orick Survey A-167.

Commissioners Court Holds In Special Meeting

There was a special meeting of the Commissioners Court of Aransas County held on January 30, 1954, with County Judge John D. Wendell, and Commissioners W. B. Allen, J. M. Sparks Jr., A. L. Davis and J. H. Mills, present.

One of the first matters of business discussed was the building of a road around the High School premises. It was moved by Commissioner Davis and seconded by Commissioner Mills to begin on this project immediately. Motion carried. It was further agreed by the commissioners that each precinct would pay their pro-rata share of the expense.

It was moved by Commissioner Allen that county buy all heavy grease and oil for maintainers and other equipment from the Gulf Oil Company for the year 1954, and until February 1, 1955. The motion was seconded by Sparks and carried unanimously.

Judge Wendell was authorized to contact Dug Bartlett and extend the garbage ditch at the County dump ground near Fulton.

The construction of a concrete foundation at the road barn to set an 8,000 storage tank for road oil on, was discussed. Commissioner Sparks moved to hire this work done, seconded by Allen, the vote carried unanimously.

A revenue bond election—aimed to stamp out Rockport's long-standing water and sewer system problems—has been authorized by unanimous action of the City Council.

The action was taken at a meeting last Thursday. Mayor Seth Steele announced the election will be held late in March and will involve a proposed issue of about \$200,000.

"We intend to ask the voters to approve an issue that will give us the necessary improvements to make our water and sewer systems meet state standards and to take care of Rockport's constantly increasing needs," Mayor Steele said.

The proposed improvements call for:

Drilling two new water wells. Constructing a 100,000-gallon elevated water storage tank or equivalent underground storage.

Equipping the water supply with a stand-by engine to assure pressure at all times.

Constructing a new sewage treatment plant at a location away from populated areas.

Expanding both the water distribution system and the sewage collection system to meet increasing demands for service.

"These improvements are absolute musts," Mayor Steele said.

The improvements to be provided with funds raised through the proposed bond issue were generally agreed upon at meetings between Council members and bond and engineering consultants with interested civic groups.

As planned, the water system improvements will cost about \$85,000, with about \$77,000 pegged for sewer improvements and about \$3,000 for water well and sewer plant sites.

The remaining bond money will be used to refund water and sewer bonds which still are outstanding.

Mayor Steele said it was decided that a revenue bond issue—rather than a tax bond issue—would be requested because "we felt, in this case, it was more appropriate."

"With revenue bonds, the improvements will be paid for only with revenues from the water and sewer systems," Mr. Steele explained.

"It will not place any burden of any sort on people who do not use the systems, and it will not have any effect on taxes, valuations, or water rates.

In addition, he added, the revenue bond program will not tie up the city's general bonding power.

Full details for the bond election, Mayor Steele said, will be worked out in the next three weeks.

Texas Public Schools Will Celebrate Century of Progress

A century of phenomenal progress will be celebrated by the Texas public schools during 1954, their centennial birthday year.

The 100th birthday of the public school system falls on Jan. 31, but the observance is scheduled to last all year because there is so much to celebrate.

Today's Texas public schools are a far cry from their humble beginning back in 1854, when the per capita payment was 62 cents and the permanent school fund was started with an initial endowment of \$2,000,000. The per capita payment has now grown to \$68 and the permanent school fund to \$249,016,781.

In the same state where youngsters used to be considered lucky if they were given three or four months of schooling a year, a minimum foundation program now guarantees every child a minimum of nine months of school each year.

Despite these vast improvements, Texans have not yet achieved the goal outlined by their forefathers. The Texas Education Agency, the Texas State Teachers Association, the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers and other participating groups hope the centennial celebration will renew the interest of the general public in its schools and lead to additional improvements.

It was on January 23, 1854, that a group of Texans converged on Austin for a mass meeting. "We will not only be the Empire State in point of territory," they solemnly resolved, "but in the number and excellence of our institutions of learning."

It was a bold boast from a young state—one which had been admitted to the Union less than nine years before. But just eight days later, the Common School Law was enacted. It established the free public school system of Texas.

It was the first mile of a long road—still under construction—that leads to happiness and prosperity. It is a well-traveled road, with traffic increasing at an astounding rate. There are 72,000

The six periods are: Jan. 31, official birthday; March 1-7, Public Schools Week; May-June, end of school year; September, beginning of new school year; October, State Fair time; and December, statewide Citizens Advisory Conference on Education.

Different communities will observe different dates, significant to the public schools, in different ways during the centennial year. But they will all be trying to accomplish the same purpose: to acquaint the public with school problems and to urge the public to help in working out solutions that will give 1,600,000 youngsters in our public schools a better education.

By Chartered Busses

The Good Shepherd Class of the Methodist Church is sponsoring a tour by charter bus, of the famous and fabulous King Ranch, A. and I. College, and points of interest enroute. Set February 11, aside on your calendar. Tour will leave from the Rockport Chamber of Commerce grounds at 8 a.m. returning in the late afternoon.

Charter busses arriving at the main gate at Santa Gertrudis about 10:30 where they will be met by John Cypher, Jr., who will be in charge of the King Ranch tour.

The group will visit the racing stables, see race horses and quarter horses. The tour was designed to give the visitor a scale view of just about everything that goes on at the ranch. In the Rancho Paloma pens may be seen the Santa Gertrudis steers, weighing 2,800 pounds. The road leads on to the Dairy Barn Dam, one of the Water Conservation projects on the Santa Gertrudis Division.

Entering the headquarters area, the group will see the veterinary offices and operating rooms. Back of these the thoroughbred training barn and track. The auction ring where sales are held each fall. Also the quarter horse stallion barns.

Another point of interest is the modern dairy barn and Jersey herd. Past these is the Santa Gertrudis colony of homes for the

ranch employees, and the ranch school. You will see the Coton Pasture where old Coton, one of the famous Santa Gertrudis breeding bulls and a great-grandson of the foundation sire, Monkey, is spending the last years of his life. **The HomeGrounds
(By Mrs. Emma H. S. Reese)**

Lovely weather after so much cold! A lot can be done in the yard, without being in too much of a hurry to remove litter, as extremes of heat and cold are still to be expected. The same goes for pruning. Keep in mind that it is better to wait for settled warm weather, than to run the risk of frost damage to tender growths. All dead wood and straggling branches may be removed, new beds dug and trees and shrubs moved. Rose bushes planted in February often bloom well the first year. Peat moss and leaf mold can be worked into the beds, the compost heap forked over, (I hope everyone is remembering not to let the raked up leaves be thrown away, as they are an excellent source of humus).

Flower seeds of tender annuals may be started in flats if not already attended to, which will give a start on growth before the weather gets too warm. This is where one can only try both ways, flats and open planting, as our seasons vary from year to year. Slow germinating seeds may be planted in the open ground where they are to remain, if the seed bed is kept moist and overcrowding is avoided.

I cannot emphasize too strong-

ly the desirability of a well defined garden plan. This should include desired improvements and additions, which need not all be done at once. This is a fine time to do some of this work, before the yard becomes the outdoor living room that we enjoy so much later. Lay new walks, build that barbecue pit, which may be simple or elaborate, but is always fun, if you keep it away from shrubbery and inflammable material. One word more: Exchange with your neighbors, and notice what

they are planting, too. I always have a lot to give away, and probably you have.

and fronts on Little Bay. This bay fans out into Aransas Bay north of and adjacent to the Rockport Yacht Basin. This east bay waterfront exposure provides the natural setting for the view of Little Bay and on to Aransas Bay. The shoreline has had little if any erosion from the wind and waves so well has Frandolig Island protected Little Bay on the east. Many winter visitors will recall the wild duck and bird haven which Little Bay provides for the wild fowl.

From the bay shore county road the sloping land rises as much as twelve feet above the bay. The timbered plateau, several hundred feet back from the bay, maintains a minimum elevation of eight feet above Little Bay. Half of this ninety acre tract is covered with live oak trees with the lovely youpan shrub trees generously distributed throughout. Not a tree or shrub will be cut down uselessly. Careful planning is being done. The roads and utilities will be moved about to save the trees and natural shrubs. The developers of this subdivision are pleased to find that the planners and officials of the Federal Home Administration are equally determined to plan the layout of this fine property in such a manner as to preserve its many natural assets and beauty.

This fine residential subdivision will have restrictions which are practical and will safeguard residential values. It will not be possible to use this residential property for any form of commercial activity. The restrictions will provide the protection the home owner needs for at least twenty five years, and after that the majority



of the home owners will decide what changes, if any, should be made.

The Federal housing officials believe that this Rockport area can use a subdivision which meets their minimum requirements. They have told the developers that this planned development as now laid out will meet their requirements for approved mortgage finance. This does not mean that any lot purchaser is denied the privilege to build and finance as he sees fit—as long as he meets the restrictions and his plans pass the architectural committee's general approval.

A word further about this architectural committee. On a project of this nature where the saving of every tree is important, it is not practical to set up iron clad building lines on the lots to protect each home owners view and his shade trees. This committee will be set up to be an impartial group to give the necessary time and thought to the location of each home and further to see that the plans call for the use of good construction materials and meet the minimum size requirements specified for the buildings.

These restrictions and the use of an architectural committee are not new—they are used throughout Texas in practically every well developed subdivision. They have proved their value to home owners. Sale of the waterfront lot will

begin within two weeks and sale of the first section of wooded lots will follow soon thereafter.
