Rockport Water, Sewer Bonds Okayed Saturday

A bond issue to finance improvements and extensions of the water and sewer system of Rockport carried by a large majority in last Saturday's election. There were 303 votes cast at this election, an excellent representation of the citizens eligible to vote in the issue.

The proposed issue of \$231,000 in revenue bonds was approved by a vote of 6 to 1. Of the total issue, \$35,500 will be used to retire outstanding bonds against the water works and sanitary sewer system. The vote by propositions was:

Proposition No. 1: Proposing the issuance of \$20,000 waterworks system revenue bonds; 254 for and 48 against.

Proposition No. 2: Proposing the issuance of \$15,500 sanitary sewer revenue bonds; for 248, 44 against.

Proposition No. 3: Proposing the issuance of \$109,500 in water works revenue bonds; for 246, against 48.

Proposition No. 4: Proposing the issuance of \$86,000 in sanitary sewer revenue bonds; for 245, against 47.

\$109,500 is allocated to be used for constructing improvements on the city's water system, and the \$86,000 is earmarked to build a new sewage disposal plant and improvements.

Mayor Seth Steele and members of the city council have asked The Pilot to express their thanks for the confidence expressed in them by the large majority given the revenue bond election Saturday.

Roddey Returns from Color TV School

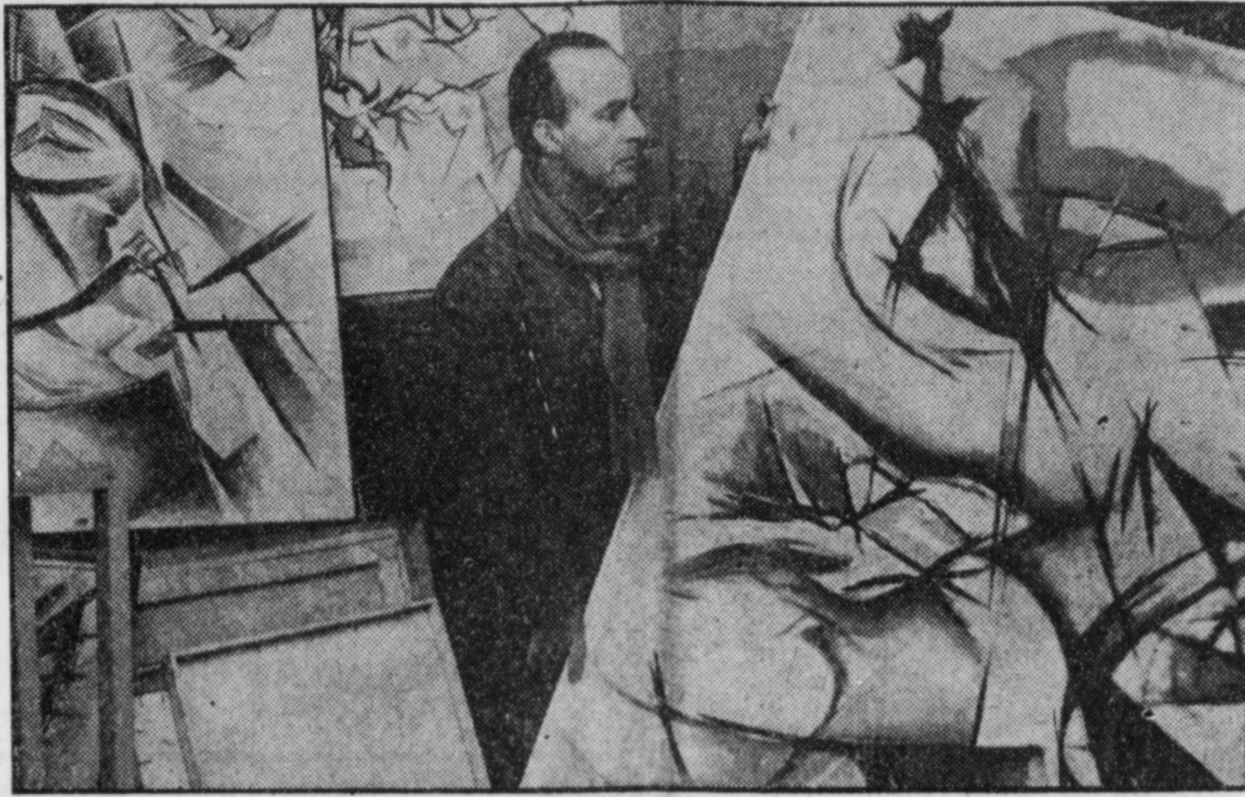
C. N. Roddey, local radio and television repairman, has returned from a two-day color TV lecture school in San Antonio. Mr. Roddey was one of a select few from South Texas to be invited by the RCA Radio and Television Co. of Camden, N. J., to attend this first demonstration of color TV in South Texas. The RCA company sent their mobile training unit, complete with lecturers, projection slides, test equipment and color TV receivers, to San Antonio to start the training of the television service technicians in the brand new field of color transmission and reception.

Mr. Roddey stated that color TV is beautiful beyond all imagination. The color TV receiver will reproduce a greater range of various color than is possible at present either in the printers or the motion picture field. They also reproduce the black and white transmissions.

Color TV receivers are very complicated and rather costly. A twelve inch receiver contains over three dozen tubes. The present price of one of these receivers is about \$1,200. A twelve inch color picture tube sells for \$265. Needless to say, due to the extreme complexity of these receivers repair work will come to a higher bill to the owner than does work on black and white.

A twelve inch color picture tube contains over a half million phosphor dots. To be exact 195,000 red dots, 195,000 blue dots and 195,000 green dots. Each dot must be exactly in its allotted space. If there is any deviation the tube is rejected. As these various phosphors are caused to glow the color combinations are developed on the face of the picture tube.

Mr. Roddey was also shown through Television Station WOAI by Mr. Duncan, the manager. Mr. Duncan is now installing his color transmitting equipment at WOAI and expects to be ready to televise color programs by the middle of June if they can complete a small gap in the microwave chain from Chicago by then. Color transmissions cannot be carried over the telephone cable in their present stage of development.

In the 100 yard dash, Camehl, Cannon and Brinkley went to the semi-finals and then Cannon and Brinkley continued to the finals where Brinkley placed third.

The 440 yard relay fell into a streak of hard luck in dropping the baton after leading the field. In the 220, Camehl led his heat as did Cannon in the 180 yard low hurdles, but their time was not fast enough to qualify for the finals.

In the high jump, Bradshaw made a good showing until he went out at 5 feet 7 inches. Next Saturday the Pirate track team will journey to Angleton to compete in an invitation track meet there.

CHAMBER DIRECTORS DISCUSS PROGRAM OF WORK FOR YEAR

An effort will be made to interest property owners along the main street in a face lifting program for their buildings and zoning for the city will be a number one project of the civic affairs committee.

A committee was appointed by the president to arrange something for the Aransas County Emergency Corps in recognition of their volunteer work.

Layne-Texas Low On Water Well Bid For City

Water and Sewer Applications Now Being Received

The City Council, meeting in regular session at the city hall, Tuesday night awarded the contract for drilling two water wells for the city to Layne-Texas Co., who submitted the low bid for the wells. Drilling of these wells will start immediately as the first step in the program to provide adequate water and sewage disposal for the citizens of Rockport as a result of Saturday's bond election.

Irving Seligmann, consulting engineer, was given the go-ahead signal on work necessary for the drawing up of plans and specifications for the sewage disposal plant. As soon as this phase of the program is completed contractors will be asked to submit bids for the work to be done.

The council requests that citizens who are interested in being connected to the proposed additional water and sewer lines to be constructed, make application immediately for this service at the city hall. They will be asked to give their name, property description, where the connections are desired, number of connections required and other pertinent information. From the information received city officials will determine the locations of lines whereby the most people may be served to the best advantage.

A certified public accounting firm was employed to make an immediate financial statement of the city finances and a complete audit of the city books at the end of the fiscal year which has been set at September 30 in order that the new billing system purchased recently, which is scheduled for delivery in September, may go into effect.

Aransas County Band Places in Second Division In Sight Reading

The band won second division in sight playing and fourth division in concert.

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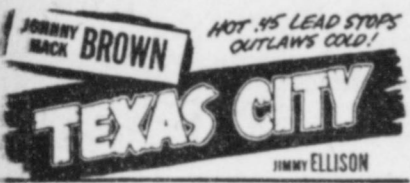

CAR INSPECTION DEADLINE DRAWS NEAR — APRIL 15

Austin, Tex. — Some three-quarters of a million Texas motorists who are driving about the streets and highways of the state today had better take a close look at their calendars.

That's the number who have, as yet, failed to submit their autos for the annual safety inspection and there's but one remaining month to attend to it.

Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today in Austin that a "log jam" of vehicles at the inspection stations can still be averted unless a majority of the owners of the uninspected vehicles all decide to wait until the deadline before attempting to meet the provisions of the modified inspection law which was enacted by the last Legislature.

"There is no apparent possibility of an extension beyond the April 15 deadline, the safety director stated, "but long waiting lines will not be encountered if the owners of cars which have not yet been inspected will visit their inspection stations right away and not put it off until the last minute."

George Busby, chief of the DPS Vehicle Inspection Division, announced that 3,900 inspection stations are now in operation and that they are inspecting about 150,000 cars weekly with none of them reaching anywhere near a capacity "saturation point."

Rockport Fire Department Called to Aransas Sat.

The Rockport Fire Department was called to Aransas Pass about 5 o'clock Saturday evening to help fight a fire at the Rose Lumber Co. on the north side of Aransas Pass, but when the Rockport firemen arrived on the scene the fire was under control.

This is the second time a local fire truck has been sent to Aransas Pass within a month, but the fire Saturday was not as severe as the one two weeks ago when the DuBose building was destroyed.

Scout Committee Meets And Plans Activities

At a meeting of the Boy Scout committee held last Thursday evening, plans were laid for a more active participation in the scouting program. The following appointments were made by J. L. Baughman, chairman of the committee: Arley Shivers, chairman in charge of transportation; Jack McDavid, chairman of the advancement committee; M. W. Cochran, finance committee and secretary; Clyde Townsend and Vic Schleider, merit badge counselors.

Visiting the meeting was Bob Reddell, of the Corpus Christi Scout office, who went over various phases of Scout activities with the committee.

Bill Gray told of camping plans for the summer, stating that, in connection with these plans, a number of items were still needed by the troop to put it in first class condition for a season of activity. Among these were: Three large frying pans, preferably 14-inch or more in diameter; 2 large 15-gallon pots, like those used by the army for making stews and soups, and at least two new or used Coleman lanterns. Anyone having such items that they would like to donate to the troop should get in touch with Bill Gray (telephone 229) and they will be picked up.

The committee also discussed the possibility of raising some money for the troop fund, so that various incidental troop activities could be financed. For instance, lumber, material, and labor are needed to complete building a chuck wagon from a trailer recently donated by Mr. Cochran; money is needed for the registration of the troop for camping activities of the summer; funds or material are needed to complete the Scout Hut (which, incidentally, is also used by the Girl and Cub Scouts), and the problem of boys needing uniforms is one that always confronts the troop.

It was pointed out that while funds raised on the annual drive went for the expenses of Scout headquarters, which furnishes leaders to instruct scoutmasters, den mothers, and other local people interested in scouting, and furnishes camping places like Camp Karankawa, as well as literature and overall planning without which the Scouts could not operate, the local troop fund was always insufficient to meet running expenses. This fund comes from membership dues of the boys, which amount to a nickel a meeting, and are barely sufficient to keep the Scouts and troop registered with the national organization.

Appreciation was expressed to the troop's sponsoring organization, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, for their interest and help over the years, and it was brought out that this is Troop 49's twenty-fifth anniversary. Last year, the V.F.W. sent one Scout to the National Jamboree in California; furnished four badly-needed tents for the boys' camping activities; and absorbed various other small expenses without which the troop could not have operated. However, the belief was expressed that other citizens of Rockport might like to participate also, and aid the troop, either with materials or donations to the troop fund. Anyone interested should get in touch either with Scoutmaster Bill Gray, or with M. W. Cochran, finance manager for the troop, or with one of the members of the committee, which includes, besides those named above, Dick Fox, Bill Johnson, and Marion McElveen.
