## County Agent Barrineau Mas Supply of Rat Poison

E. R. Barrineau, agricultural agent for San Patricio and Aransas Counties, who was appointed to the office of the late Mr. Gibbs, informs the citizens of the two counties that he has a supply of Warfarin Rat Poison on hand at his office in Sinton.

The supply of poison was purchased through the area rodent control office in San Antonio. It seems to be the latest thing in controlling mice and rats and is considered the safest and most satisfactory method around the home and on the farm. A charge of 20c a pound is necessary so that a supply may be kept on hand.

A suggested guide for controlling cotton insects for 1954, was prepared by the Agricultural Extension Service and Experiment Station, is available in the county agent's office. The recommendations are about the same as they were in 1953.

A large number of farmers have reported damage to their corn crop by the corn ear worm cutting the bud out of the plants. Control of the worm doing this damage is extremely difficult, due to the fact that the worm is located in the plant. The most recommended control is spraying with DDT at the rate of about two pounds per



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Law Protects Attorney-Client Confidences

Most people do not realize how zealously the information given by a client to his lawyer is guarded. It is a fundamental principle of the legal profession that all information confided to lawyers must remain secret. It is the property of the client the same as though it were money, and is not the property of your lawyer to give away. There are only three people in whom you can confide and know that your confidence is protected. They are your lawyer, your doctor and your minister.

Even the law itself protects you in your relationship with your lawyer. No one can compel him to divulge any information confided to him by a client. The reason for this protection is obvious. Unless you are able to confide fully and completely in your lawyer, he is unable to help. He cannot protect your interests unless he knows

Total cost of the program for ALL crops for the 20-year period annual report to read at the May meeting. was \$7,110,136,889. More than half of this was accounted for by losses on potatoes and eggs, which are no longer supported.

These figures show that the cost of the price support program on all commodities over twenty years has averaged approximately grade. 50 million dollars a year.

Other Subsidies: The Library of Congress has made a tabulation of Current Expenses for Aids and squares and punch. Special Services (Subsidies)" for 1954. The total shown is \$15,194,-

Of this sum, agriculture will receive \$520,000,000. Thit will cover the cost of the price support program, the school lunch program the International Wheat Agreement, the Sugar Act, and all other aids to agriculture.

The tabulation shows that busi ness will receive \$1,063,000,000. Labor will get \$222,000,000. Veterans will receive \$4,445,-

000,000. International aids will total \$7,544,999,000.

Other aids and special services will amount to \$1,533,000,000.

Time for a Long Look: As I told Texans in Lubbock last fall, it's time for us to take a long, cool look at all these subsidies. We could reach the ridiculous point where the whole economy would be subsidized-which would be the same as no subsidy at all. Meanwhile, however, I think it would be a mistake to single out just one group supported by the government, and ignore all of the others.
