

Another measure in proper fly control is proper screening of homes. Each householder should check the screens on his house for holes that will allow flies to enter. Repairing of screens will help to protect food from contamination by fly borne disease organ-

The importance of fly control can be realized when it is known that flies carry and spread such diseases as typhoid fever, the dys-enteries, infant diarrhea and other diseases. Fly control is an individual and community duty. It is the job of every persons and every locality and the results will benefit






