Wymore Lamar Test Indicates Gas Producer

Wymore Oil Co. No. 1 Mary Fox Kroeger, indicated gas producer in Aransas County's Lamar Field one mile northwest of Lamar, was coring below 7,255 feet after testing gas.

Working pressure was 1,500 pounds in 10 minutes on a test through 1/4-inch chokes from 6,975-87 feet under a 1,000-foot water cushion.

Plymouth Oil Co. No. 4-103 State Tract 103, slated 10,000-foot Aransas County wildcat four miles northeast of Rockport in J. Hollis Survey, A-76, was drilling below 6,200 feet in shale and scheduled to log at 6,400 feet.

Drillstem testing from 6,579-83 feet was underway at Plymouth Oil Co. No. 4-103 State Tract 103, scheduled 10,000-foot Aransas County wildcat four miles northwest of Rockport in Hollis Survey, A-76.

KVDO Broadcasts First Televised Image

Corpus Christi's first locally televised image was broadcast Wednesday from 2:30 to 8 p.m. The image was an unofficial test pattern broadcast to check the equipment for defects. Beginning Saturday, the regular test pattern will be broadcast with voice accompaniment from 1 to 9 p.m. every day until June 20.

Mr. Roddy, Roddy Television Service of Rockport, has also been getting ready for this test for the past two weeks, making field strength measurements. He received a very good picture of the test pattern from 6 to 8 p.m. Wednesday evening. The test pattern was a pennant with KVDO in large letters under it and "Corpus Christi" in script beneath KVDO.

KVDO is on channel 22, and Mr. Roddy says that with proper equipment, the people in Rockport should get excellent reception. The first live program is scheduled over KVDO for Sunday, June 20.

The 1955-1956 Consolidated Highway Program approval and release for planning operations was recently announced in Austin by the Texas Highway Commission. The purpose of the program is to set out specific projects on which construction is contemplated in order that engineering work, plan preparation and specifications may proceed and right-of-way be secured, according to T. O. Foster, Jr., District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department at Corpus Christi.

Highway No. 35, from Copano Bay Causeway to Refugio County Line, a distance of approximate 11.5 miles which work will consist of widening structures and shoulders.

Dog Ordinance Passed By City Council

The City Council has passed an ordinance regulating the keeping of dogs within the city limits of Rockport, which will become effective, July 1, 1954.

Anyone keeping a dog in the City of Rockport must pay \$1.50 license, before July 1, of each year and place the license tag on a collar around the dog's neck. A dog must be vaccinated for rabies before a tag can be bought. If the dog has been vaccinated, bring the receipt or allow the Pound Master to vaccinate it when you buy your tag.

The Chief of Police and his agent, the Pound Master, will enforce the ordinance.

The city will provide a pound for dogs not tagged after they have been picked up by the Pound Master. A minimum fine of \$2.00 will be charge to release the dog on the first day and \$1.00 will be added to the fine each day thereafter.

If a dog is not redeemed and bidders at public auction do not purchase the dog, it will be humanely disposed of. Any person who wilfully takes a collar off of a dog will be guilty of a misdemeanor and fined, not to exceed \$100.00.

Anyone violating this ordinance shall also be guilty of a misdemeanor and fined not more than \$100.00.

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CHECK YOUR CAR—CHECK ACCIDENTS

"Check your car — check accidents, today. Tomorrow may be too late!"

In those words Col. E. B. Tilley of Houston, president of the Texas Safety Association, and services advisor for the Gulf Oil Corporation today urged all motorists to support the vehicle maintenance program being conducted throughout Texas this month in cooperation with the Texas Department of Public Safety and the National Safety Council. This state-wide program is sponsored by all of official and non-official groups in Texas.

Colonel Tilley stressed the importance of having cars safety checked without delay.

"Accidents don't wait to happen," he said. "Bad brakes, worn-out windshield wiper blades and other neglected parts will let you down in an emergency. And an emergency can occur at any moment."

"Automobile dealers and service stations are cooperating with the vehicle maintenance program," he said, "and will check the following 10 points on all cars whose owners request the special 10-point safety check:

1. Brakes should take hold evenly on all wheels. The hand brake should be able to hold the car on any hill. Brake fluid should be clean and at the proper level.

2. Headlights should be at the proper level for maximum road illumination and minimum glare. Lenses should be clean and reflectors bright.

3. Rear and stop lights should operate properly. Directional signals should also be checked.

4. Tires should be checked for wear and proper inflation.

5. Wheel alignment should be checked.

6. Exhaust system and muffler should be completely checked by a qualified mechanic.

7. Windshield wipers should be operating, with blades checked after the heavy winter to see they are "live" and clean.

8. Glass should be clear, free of cracks or discoloration.

9. Horn should be audible for 200 feet.

10. Rear-view mirror should give a clear view of the road behind.

HEALTH DEPT. URGES STRICT ATTENTION TO FLY CONTROL

Austin, Tex. — The Texas State Health Department urges strict attention to sanitation as a fly control measure. The main sanitation problems responsible for fly production are neglect phases of community clean up, like garbage storage, disposal, animal shelters and insanitary disposal of decaying industrial wastes.

Now is a good time to clean up the insanitary conditions around your town and home. Every time you destroy a breeding place, you stop whole colonies of flies before they can start. Insecticide spraying is effective only after a complete clean-up job and only if sanitary conditions are maintained throughout the year.

Proper garbage storage is one of the most important factors in good sanitation. Garbage should be stored in water tight, galvanized metal containers with a tight lid. Dispose of all cans, bottles and other rubbish. Proper disposal of garbage collected is equally im-

Legal Aid Organizations Offer Equality Before Law

Self-evident is the fact that all citizens are in need of the services of an attorney at various times. Some citizens are not able, due to circumstances beyond their control, to properly compensate such services.

Texas lawyers, recognizing this need, have formed Legal Aid Clinics in several of the larger cities of the state. In a number of towns too small to support a clinic, a Legal Aid Committee has been formed. Its members are attorneys furnishing necessary legal services to the indigent. In other towns, legal aid services are provided by each private practitioner as worthy cases are brought to his attention. The Legal Aid attorney performs a vital function in our social order. To understand his role, we must begin with the basic fact that a legal aid client does not seek charity. The late Associate Justice Wiley B. Rutledge of the U. S. Supreme Court once said, "Equality before the law in a true democracy is a matter of right. It cannot be a matter of charity, or of favor, or of grace, or of discretion."

The legal aid client, therefore, is asking for what is his right—that he be given the justice to which he is entitled under the law. His poverty prevents him from securing the legal assistance and advice needed for the protection of his rights.

In providing these professional services, the Legal Aid attorney serves the highest social obligation, that of securing justice to those who under the law should have it but who otherwise might not obtain it.

This function places special and serious obligation upon the Legal Aid attorney. In the first place, his duty is to accept the client who is financially unable to employ private counsel. He cannot reject a client for personal reasons or convenience or because the case may be difficult or uninteresting or disagreeable. To do so is to close the only door of justice and to defeat the very purpose for which the legal aid organization he represents was created.

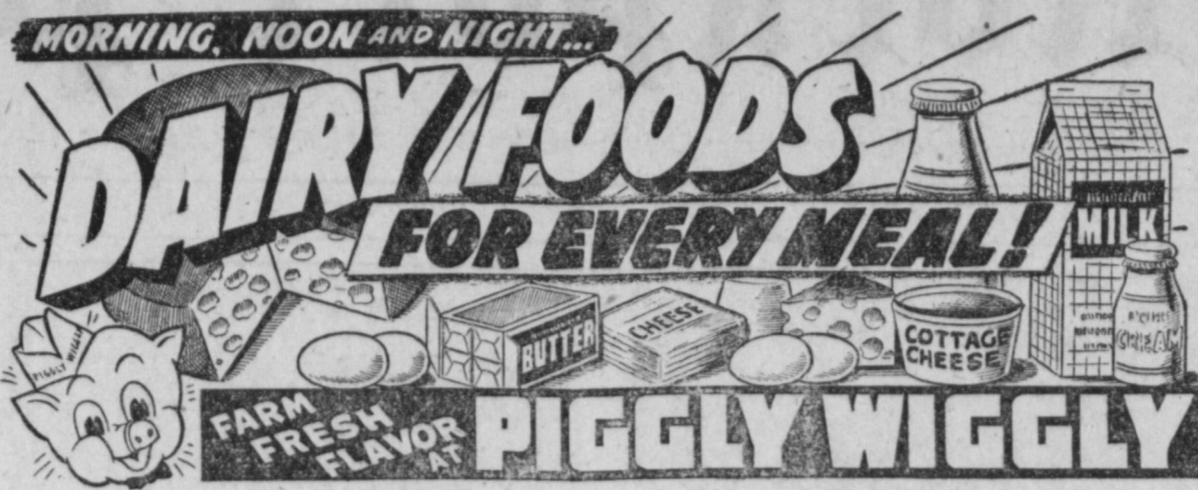
Finally, a Legal Aid attorney must be more than a lawyer. His daily work confronts him with more than legal problems. Innumerable problems of his clients submitted to him are of a personal nature and the legal problems are inevitably interwoven with financial, social and oftentimes domestic difficulties. He must have an insight into these difficulties and problems and know and make use of the social resources of his community available for their solution.

Every attorney performing legal aid services is conscious and aware of these serious and important obligations. The demands of the job are great, but so also are its rewards. Nothing is more gladdening than the appreciative handshakes of a grateful client, the only reward in his possession to give. The Legal Aid attorney knows the deep satisfaction of seeing justice secured. He knows that a vital tenet of democracy is being fulfilled, justice to all regardless of poverty or wealth. Through his services, democracy rests more secure.

Fly control is an individual and community duty. It is the job of every persons and every locality and the results will benefit everyone.

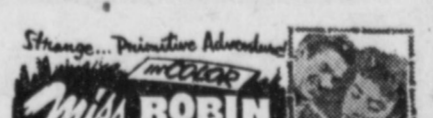

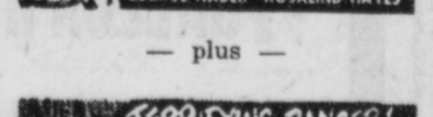

ORDINANCE REGULATING THE KEEPING OF DOGS IN THE CITY OF ROCKPORT; PROVIDING FOR A DOG POUND; PROVIDING FOR THE REDEMPTION OF DOGS AND THE DISPOSAL THEREOF IF NOT REDEEMED; PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE AND PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE IS CUMULATIVE OF OTHER ORDINANCES UNLESS IN CONFLICT.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCKPORT, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. There is hereby levied and assessed upon each dog, male and female, kept or owned within the city of Rockport, Texas, an annual tax of One Dollar and Fifty Cents (\$1.50), which tax is due and payable on or before the 1st day of July of each year hereafter, and it is hereby made the duty of the owner or keeper of any dog, male or female, to pay over to the Chief of Police of the City of Rockport, Texas, or his duly authorized agent, the said dog tax on or before the 1st day of July of each year hereafter.

SECTION 2. The Chief of Police shall collect or have collected under his supervision all dog taxes, and he may employ, with the advice and consent of the City Council, a special officer to be known and designated as Pound Master, whose duty it shall be to carry out the terms and provisions of this Ordinance, and the Chief of Police shall be authorized to pay unto the Pound Master a commission on all dogs impounded as hereinafter provided in the amount of \$2.00 per head. The Chief of Police shall be responsible to the City of Rockport for all moneys collected under this Ordinance, and shall make monthly reports in writing of all moneys collected under this Ordinance to the City Clerk of Rockport, and shall pay over to said City Clerk all money so collected at least once each month.

SECTION 3. Upon payment of said Dog Tax the Chief of Police, or his authorized agent, shall furnish the owner or keeper of said dog or dogs with a tag on which is stamped the number of registration with the year for which said tax is paid, which tag the owner or keeper shall attach to a collar securely fastened around the neck of such dog, male or female; and no dog shall be allowed to run at large without the proper tag attached to the collar around the neck of such dog. In no event shall the Chief of Police, or his duly authorized agent, issue a license tag to any owner or keeper of any dog unless such owner or keeper shall exhibit to him a vaccination certificate issued by a licensed veterinarian or the Pound Master certifying that such dog or dogs have been vaccinated against rabies by him. And in the event that such vaccination certificate is signed by the Pound Master, such certificate must be accompanied by written authorization signed by the owner of such dog or dogs allowing the Pound Master to so vaccinate such dog or dogs against rabies.

SECTION 4. All dogs kept within the City of Rockport, Texas, are hereby required to be vaccinated against rabies by some licensed veterinarian or the Pound Master on or before the 1st day of July of this year and on or before the 1st day of July of each year hereafter.

SECTION 5. It shall be unlawful for any owner or keeper of any dog, male or female, to allow or permit any such dog to run at large in the City of Rockport, Texas, without a proper dog tag securely attached around the neck of said dog; and it shall be unlawful for any owner or keeper of any female dog to allow such female dog, while in heat or season, with or without a dog tag, to run at large in the City of Rockport, Texas.

SECTION 6. It shall be the duty of the Chief of Police, or his authorized agent, to capture and impound in a pen to be provided by the City of Rockport, Texas, for that purpose and called the Dog Pound, any dog, male or female, found running at large within the City of Rockport, Texas, without a tag as provided for in this ordinance, and any female dog, in heat or season, with or without such tag; and if such impounded dog is not redeemed and reclaimed from said dog pound within the time required under the provisions of this Ordinance, the Chief of Police shall advertise said dog for sale by posting for twenty-four hours at the door of the City Hall in Rockport, Texas a notice of such sale, which said notice shall describe the dog or dogs to be sold, and shall state the time and place of such sale; and the Chief of Police, if such dog or dogs are not redeemed prior to such sale, shall sell such dog or dogs at public auction, starting each dog at a price of no less than \$2.00; and if such dog or dogs are not sold at such sale the same shall be bought by the City of Rockport, and immediately disposed of in some humane manner under the direction of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, if such Society will recommend a manner of disposal, and if not such dog or dogs shall be disposed of humanely.

SECTION 7. (a) The owner or keeper of any dog or dogs captured or impounded under the terms of this Ordinance shall be permitted, at any time within forty-eight hours after such dog or dogs have been impounded, to redeem, reclaim and again obtain possession of such dog or dogs upon payment to the Chief of Police, or his duly authorized

agent the sum of \$1.00 for each day or fractional part thereof, with a minimum of two days or \$2.00 payment, for such time as every such dog may have been impounded, which sum so paid to him shall be by the Chief of Police be paid over to the Pound Master as compensation for feeding, handling and housing such dog.

(b) It shall be the duty of the Chief of Police and duly authorized Pound Master to enforce the terms of this Ordinance; provided, however, that the terms of this Ordinance shall not be applicable to dogs following countrymen into the city.

SECTION 8. The Chief of Police, the Pound Master, or any policeman of this city shall have the right and duty to shoot or kill any dog manifesting the symptoms of rabies and any dog showing a disposition to bite.

SECTION 9. Any person who shall wilfully take from any dog a collar or tag shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$100.00.

SECTION 10. Any person violating the provisions of this or-

dinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$100.00.

SECTION 11. This ordinance shall be cumulative of all other stock and dog ordinances and regulations of the City of Rockport unless in conflict with the terms of said ordinances or regulations, in which event such portions of such prior ordinances and regulations in conflict are hereby repealed and this ordinance shall prevail.

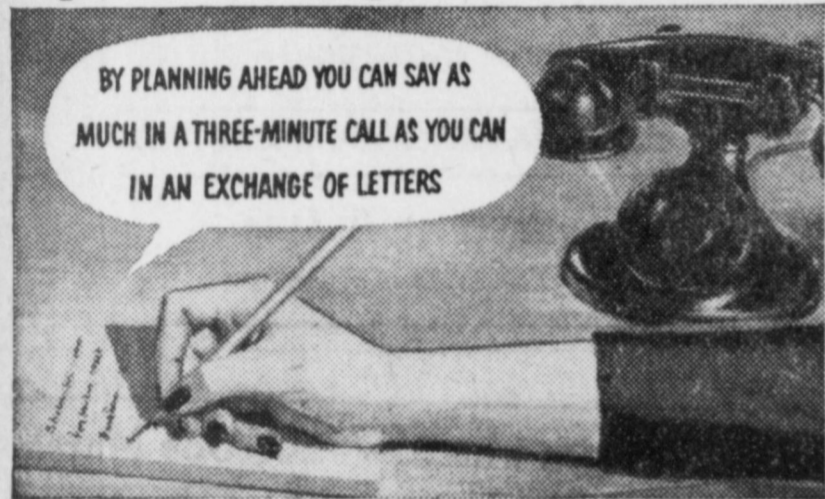

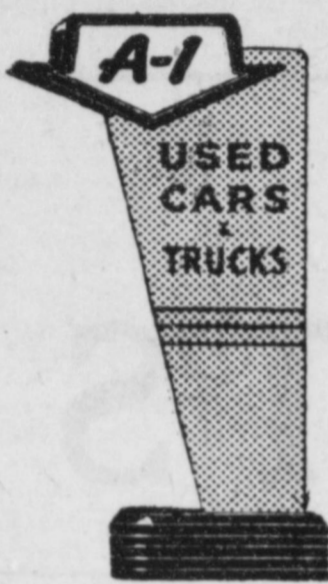

"There is no age limit for social security," So says H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration.

He explained that the original Social Security Act did not apply to workers after they reached age 65. However, that provision of the law was changed to remove the age limit in 1939.

"A person who is now over age 65 can become insured and eligible to receive the retirement benefits with as little as eighteen months of covered work.

"Such a person continues to pay the social security tax as long as he works, after age 65 the same as before, even though he may be receiving the old-age insurance payments at the time," Cleveland continued.

"Everyone who works, either in his own business or for some one else, is covered by social security unless his occupation is specifical-

ly excluded by the law."

Babies who work as photographers' models, and older people who do handwork in the crafts or who operate a business from an arm-chair, all have earnings accounts in a huge accounting office in Baltimore, Maryland, according to Cleveland.

"Individual records of the social security credits for more than 115 million people are maintained in the central accounting office," he said. "Those records include earnings of persons ranging in age from a few weeks to more than ninety years old. Each person has his own social security number."

Mowing helps eliminate weeds, sprouts, bushes and vines from pastures and favors their replacement by desirable grasses.

It also tends to keep grasses in a tender, growing condition, making them more palatable and nutritious to grazing animals.

Mowing should start when the most prominent weeds commence to bloom—before they have a chance to produce a seed crop, says E. M. Trew, extension pasture specialist, who stresses the importance of regular mowing in pasture management.

Eastern bitterweeds, a common pest in bermuda grass pastures, need early and repeated mowings to prevent them from making seed. Set the mower high for the first clippings and then lower for subsequent mowings, Trew recommends.

Fall blooming weeds are weakened by earlier mowings, but fall cuttings are added insurance against production of seed.

Mowing alone, however, does not build a good pasture, Trew notes. The soil must be sufficiently fertile to make good yields from grasses and, or legumes either growing naturally or from seedings. He recommends pasture fertilization.

In studies by the Angleton Agricultural Experiment Station, ber-

muda grass when mowed produced twice the forage and four times as much total protein and phosphorus as did unmowed bermuda. Tall growing bunch grasses often are injured by mowing. The low growing grasses tend to form a sod, and respond best to mowing.

Malathion comes about as close to an "all-purpose" insecticide for home garden use as anything now available.

It has many of the same properties as chemically powerful and poisonous parathion, but is less toxic to man and warm-blooded animals, says Neal M. Randolph, extension entomologist.

Over 800 cases of the debilitating illness have been reported by private physicians so far this year. That's a substantial increase over the number reported for the same time period last year, says Health Department Epidemiologist Dr. Gordon Grace.

Most medical authorities believe the disease is spread by person to person contact through nose and throat discharges, Dr. Grace pointed out. But he said a number of cases have been traced to contaminated food and water.

Infectious hepatitis literally means "infectious inflammation of the liver." It is a virus infection which occurs sporadically all year long, but which subsides somewhat during the summer months.

Grace said there are no experimental animals on which tests can be conducted, and the virus cannot be "cultured" or grown in a laboratory. Older people, he said, are apparently immune. Subclinical cases—people who have the virus but are not sick—are not uncommon.

The disease is characterized by a flu-like onset, accompanied by a low-grade fever of 99-101 degrees for two or three days. The liver area is tender, and the patient has little appetite.

Later, the skin turns yellow, fever returns, and the liver area is sore and tender. Walking increases pain because the inflamed liver is thus aggravated.

Gamma globulin in the proper dosage gives a temporary immunity, Grace said. The blood fraction is made available through the State Department of Health to private physicians who administer it to family contacts of patients

and to institutional cases. An outbreak in a community usually lasts two or three months, Dr. Grace commented.

He said the best individual and community defense against the weakening condition is scrupulous personal hygiene and good environmental sanitation.

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
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
