

## Along The Waterfront



There is a full tide in the bays now and the water is more calm than it was last week—more and larger fish are being caught too.

Last Friday, Mr. Beakle of Sandra fished with Fred Christilles, catching 108 trout and on Saturday, Mr. Christilles took out two parties. Mr. Roland of San Antonio went out with him in the morning, getting 87 trout and in the afternoon Mr. McGregor of Mathis fished with him, landing 32 trout. On Sunday M. A. Giles of Grandview got 157 trout, while Mr. Blaylock of Aransas Pass landed 69 trout Monday.

Leonard Breeden of Castroville, fished with Bill Crist Friday, getting 65 trout and on Saturday Mr. Crutchfield of Houston caught 64.

There are quite a few fishermen going out from Perry Jones' Wharf recently. They are catching mostly trout but one man got two large flounder on a hook.

A few trout and quite a nice lot of gafftops are being taken at Snug Harbor this week.

Shorty Townsend took John and Ann Blocker of Kentucky out fishing last Friday. They caught 48 nice trout. Dr. Castel of Houston, fished with Shorty, getting 37 big trout. A party from Houston, fishing with him Monday, landed 31 nice trout.

R. F. McKnight of Rockport, fished out from Johnson's Bait Stand Tuesday, getting a 6½-pound trout. On Wednesday, Jimmy Smith (Smitty) and Randy Scibers caught 35 trout there, weighing from one to three pounds each. Mrs. Johnson said that there were several other parties caught fish down there but she did not check the number. She says the fish are running larger now and you can catch all the gafftops you want.

Mr. and Mrs. R. Brown fished with Earle Thomas on Friday, catching 66 nice trout and Saturday, Ben Morrill and party of Houston, landed 32 fine large trout. On Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, Mr. and Mrs. Brown went out with Thomas again—they got well over a hundred trout, weighing from three-quarters of a pound and up. Many of them weighed over two pounds. On Wednesday, Mrs. J. W. Lowe and son of Houston fished with Thomas, bringing in 35 nice large trout.

Abe Haas fished with Roy Hayes Sunday, getting 41 trout averaging a little over a pound each. Mr. Hutchins of Houston, caught 69 trout, 18 or 20 of which ran well over two pounds each.

## Few Cases of TB Found Here In Chest X-ray

Dr. H. F. Elliot, county health officer, reports that the mass chest X-ray found the fewest cases of tuberculosis it ever did in Aransas County this year, only four or five reports being positive. There have been a few cases picked up since the X-rays were taken and there are now seven or eight cases of active TB being treated in Aransas County.

## Annual Shrimporée at Aransas July 2-4

The annual Shrimporée will be held in Aransas Pass in July this year, on the 2nd, 3rd and 4th. Charles Marshall is leading in the King Shrimporée contest, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce of Aransas Pass. The contest will close on June 30 and King Shrimporée will be crowned at La Quinta Saturday night, July 3.

## Public Asked To Conserve Water Supply

The two new water wells, recently drilled by the city in connection with their program for expanded water and sewerage facilities, indicate that they should supply approximately 350 gallons of water per minute, which will about double the present supply. However, these wells have not been connected to the present system as the funds from the recently-passed bond election have not been received as yet.

The bonds have been signed and forwarded to the proper authorities, and the money should be available within a week or ten days. As soon as this money is received the entire water and sewerage program should get into full swing.

Due to increased watering of lawns and additional summer population, the present water supply has been overtaxed and at times the water supply has been exhausted. This condition has occurred in the late afternoons when so many are watering their scorched lawns. In a spirit of cooperation, city officials ask that property owners water their lawns in the early morning when the water pressure is higher and after the overhead tank has had a chance to fill. Within the next few weeks the new wells should be connected to the system and this condition should be remedied—so, please conserve water as much as possible for the next few weeks.

## Two Wrecks Occur On Highway 35, North

Sheriff A. C. Shivers has reported two wrecks which occurred on Highway 35 the past week.

Last Friday, a Shaw Transport truck, driven by Eugene Poole, on Highway 35, north of the Copano causeway, was making a left turn onto the road to the Glasscock Copano docks, when a 1953 Chevrolet driven by Edgar Birwell of Houston, collided with him.

No one was injured in the accident which caused about \$250 damage to the Chevrolet and \$25 or \$30 damage to the truck.

Monday, June 7, Mrs. George Pillow of Corpus Christi was driving north on Highway 35 near the county dump grounds when her car hit some oil on the road and caused it to overturn twice.

Mrs. Pillow and Mrs. John Lowrey, who was in the car with her, were injured and taken to the Rockport Hospital.

## Dr. Elliot to Attend Victoria TB Meeting

Mrs. Joella T. Butler, president of the State TB Organization, assisted by other TB organizations, has divided the state of Texas into 22 geographical areas, in order to get a clear picture of tuberculosis conditions in the state.

Aransas County is in area 18, with headquarters at Victoria. Pat McEnroe Jr. of Victoria, is area chairman, and he has called the first area meeting for Friday, June 25, from 1:30 to 4:30 p. m. in the Central Power and Light Co. council room in Victoria.

Dr. H. F. Elliot, Aransas County health officer, plans to attend this meeting. Dr. Elliot said plans are underway to form a national TB organization in Aransas County, that the citizens may be eligible for money raised from the sale of Christmas seals.

Counties in area 18 are Aransas, Bee, Calhoun, DeWitt, Goliad, Gonzales, Jackson, Karnes, Lavaca, Live Oak, Refugio, and Victoria.

## Dog Ordinance Goes In Effect July 1

### Veterinarian Will Give Shots Saturday, June 19

Dr. Habletzel, veterinarian of Corpus Christi, will be at the city hall in Rockport, Saturday, June 19 at 9 a. m. to inoculate dogs against rabies in accordance with the recently passed dog ordinance which goes into effect on July 1.

The veterinarian was in Rockport the early part of the year for this purpose, but many dog owners failed to have their pets inoculated at that time.

Since it will be necessary for dog owners to show that their pets have been vaccinated against rabies before they can obtain the necessary dog tags on July 1, city officials asked Dr. Habletzel to come over again.

All dog owners are requested to avail themselves of this service if they have not already done so, as no tags will be sold to those who fail to do so and without the tags their pets are liable to be picked up by the pound master in compliance with the ordinance.

COTTON DEFOLIATION

Indications are that more cotton farmers in Aransas County will defoliate more cotton this year than at any other time in the past, according to E. R. Barribeau, county agricultural agent.

A complete report on defoliation of cotton by the Agricultural Experiment Stations of Texas is available at the county agent's office in Sinton.

The chemical pre-conditioning of cotton for mechanical harvest before frost by the use of defoliants and desiccants is part of a successful picking or stripping operation, and their usage has increased rapidly during the past two seasons. Indications are that the practice will increase still more during 1954 since growers recognize in defoliation and mechanical harvesting an opportunity to lower production costs, improve cotton quality and aid in insect control.

The success or failure of a defoliant or desiccant depends on a number of factors. Some of these that are known are: Characteristics of the chemicals and the rate and volume applied; the method of application; climatic factors, particularly moisture and temperature; cultural practices, such as fertilization and plant density; and the varieties grown.

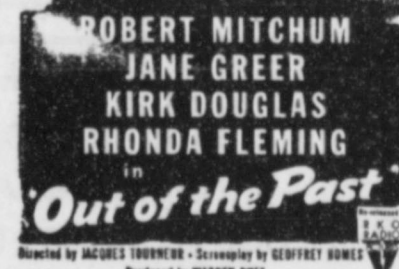

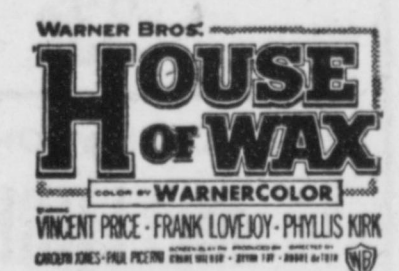

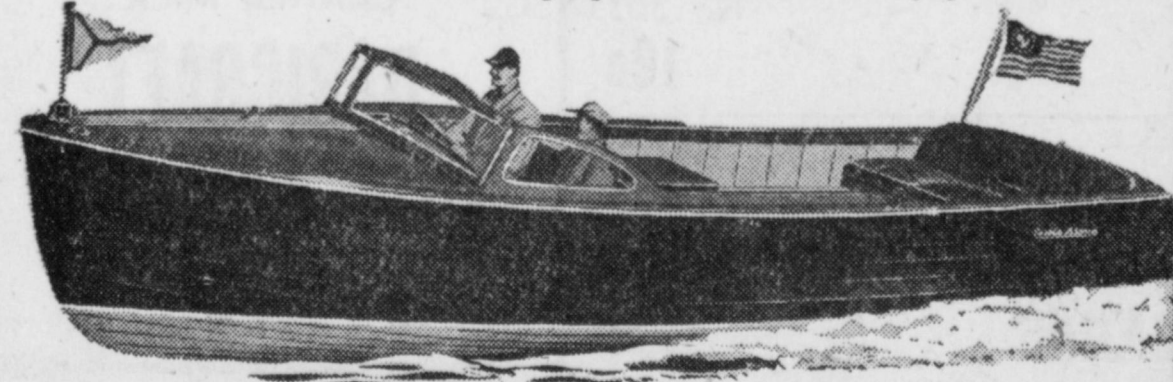

**ORDINANCE**  
REGULATING THE KEEPING OF DOGS IN THE CITY OF ROCKPORT; PROVIDING FOR A DOG POUND; PROVIDING FOR THE REDEMPTION OF DOGS AND THE DISPOSAL THEREOF IF NOT REDEEMED; PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE AND PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE IS CUMULATIVE OF OTHER ORDINANCES UNLESS IN CONFLICT.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCKPORT, TEXAS:  
SECTION 1. There is hereby levied and assess upon each dog, male and female, kept or owned within the city of Rockport, Texas, an annual tax of One Dollar and Fifty Cents (\$1.50), which tax is due and payable on or before the 1st day of July of each year hereafter, and it is hereby made the duty of the owner or keeper of any dog, male or female, to pay over to the Chief of Police of the City of Rockport, Texas, or his duly authorized agent, the said dog tax on or before the 1st day of July of each year hereafter.

SECTION 2. The Chief of Police shall collect or have collected under his supervision all dog taxes, and he may employ, with the advice and consent of the City Council, a special officer to be known and designated as Pound Master, whose duty it shall be to carry out the terms and provisions of

this Ordinance, and the Chief of Police shall be authorized to pay unto the Pound Master a commission on all dogs impounded as hereinafter provided in the amount of \$2.00 per head. The Chief of Police shall be responsible to the City of Rockport for all moneys collected under this Ordinance, and shall make monthly reports in writing of all moneys collected under this Ordinance to the City Clerk of Rockport, and shall pay over to said City Clerk all money so collected at least once each month.

SECTION 3. Upon payment of said Dog Tax the Chief of Police, or his authorized agent, shall furnish the owner or keeper of said dog or dogs with a tag on which is stamped the number of registration with the year for which said tax is paid, which tag the owner or keeper shall attach to a collar securely fastened around the neck of such dog, male or female; and no dog shall be allowed to run at large without the proper tag attached to the collar around the neck of such dog. In no event shall the Chief of Police, or his duly authorized agent, issue a license tag to any owner or keeper of any dog unless such owner or keeper shall exhibit to him a vaccination certificate issued by a licensed veterinarian or the Pound Master certifying that such dog or dogs have been vaccinated against rabies by him. And in the event that such vaccination certificate is signed by the Pound Master, such certificate must be accompanied by written authoriza-

tion signed by the owner of such dog or dogs allowing the Pound Master to so vaccinate such dog or dogs against rabies.

SECTION 4. All dogs kept within the City of Rockport, Texas, are hereby required to be vaccinated against rabies by some licensed veterinarian or the Pound Master on or before the 1st day of July of this year and on or before the 1st day of July of each year hereafter.

SECTION 5. It shall be unlawful for any owner or keeper of any dog, male or female, to allow or permit any such dog to run at large in the City of Rockport, Texas, without a proper dog tag securely attached around the neck of said dog; and it shall be unlawful for any owner or keeper of any female dog to allow such female dog, while in heat or season, with or without a dog tag, to run at large in the City of Rockport, Texas.

SECTION 6. It shall be the duty of the Chief of Police, or his authorized agent, to capture and impound in a pen to be provided by the City of Rockport, Texas, for that purpose and called the Dog Pound, any dog, male or female, found running at large within the City of Rockport, Texas, without a tag as provided for in this ordinance, and any female dog, in heat or season, with or without such tag; and if such impounded dog is not redeemed and reclaimed from said dog pound within the time required under the provisions of this Ordinance, the Chief of Police shall advertise said

dog for sale by posting for twenty-four hours at the door of the City Hall in Rockport, Texas a notice of such sale, which said notice shall describe the dog or dogs to be sold, and shall state the time and place of such sale; and the Chief of Police, if such dog or dogs are not redeemed prior to such sale, shall sell such dog or dogs at public auction, starting each dog at a price of no less than \$2.00; and if such dog or dogs are not sold at such sale the same shall be bought by the City of Rockport, and immediately disposed of in some humane manner under the direction of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, if such Society will recommend a manner of disposal, and if not such dog or dogs shall be disposed of humanely.

SECTION 7. (a) The owner or keeper of any dog or dogs captured or impounded under the terms of this Ordinance shall be permitted, at any time within forty-eight hours after such dog or dogs have been impounded, to redeem, reclaim and again obtain possession of such dog or dogs upon payment to the Chief of Police, or his duly authorized agent the sum of \$1.00 for each day or fractional part thereof, with a minimum of two days or \$2.00 payment, for such time as every such dog may have been impounded, which sum so paid to him shall by the Chief of Police be paid over to the Pound Master as compensation for feeding, handling and housing such dog.

(b) It shall be the duty of the Chief of Police and duly authorized Pound Master to enforce the terms of this Ordinance; provided, however, that the terms of this Ordinance shall not be applicable to dogs following countrymen into the city.

SECTION 8. The Chief of Police, the Pound Master, or any policeman of this city shall have the right and duty to shoot or kill any dog manifesting the symptoms of rabies and any dog showing a disposition to bite.

SECTION 9. Any person who shall willfully take from any dog a collar or tag shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$100.00.

SECTION 10. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$100.00.

SECTION 11. This ordinance shall be cumulative of all other stock and dog ordinances and regulations of the City of Rockport unless in conflict with the terms of said ordinances or regulations, in which event such portions of such prior ordinances and regulations in conflict are hereby repealed, and this ordinance shall prevail.

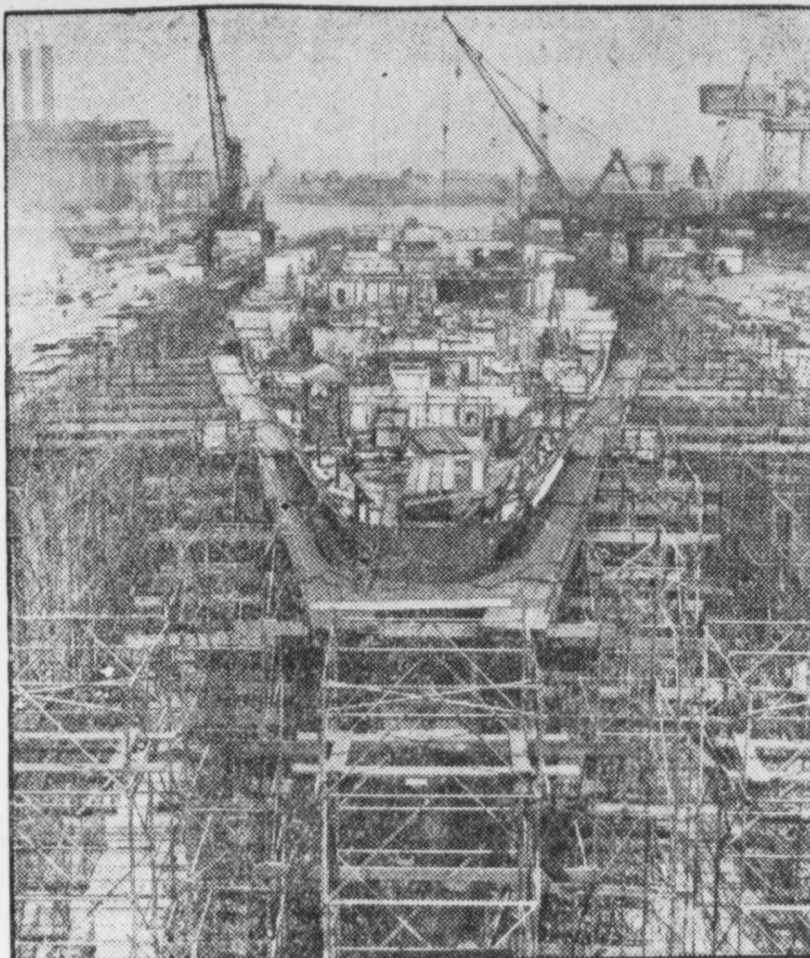

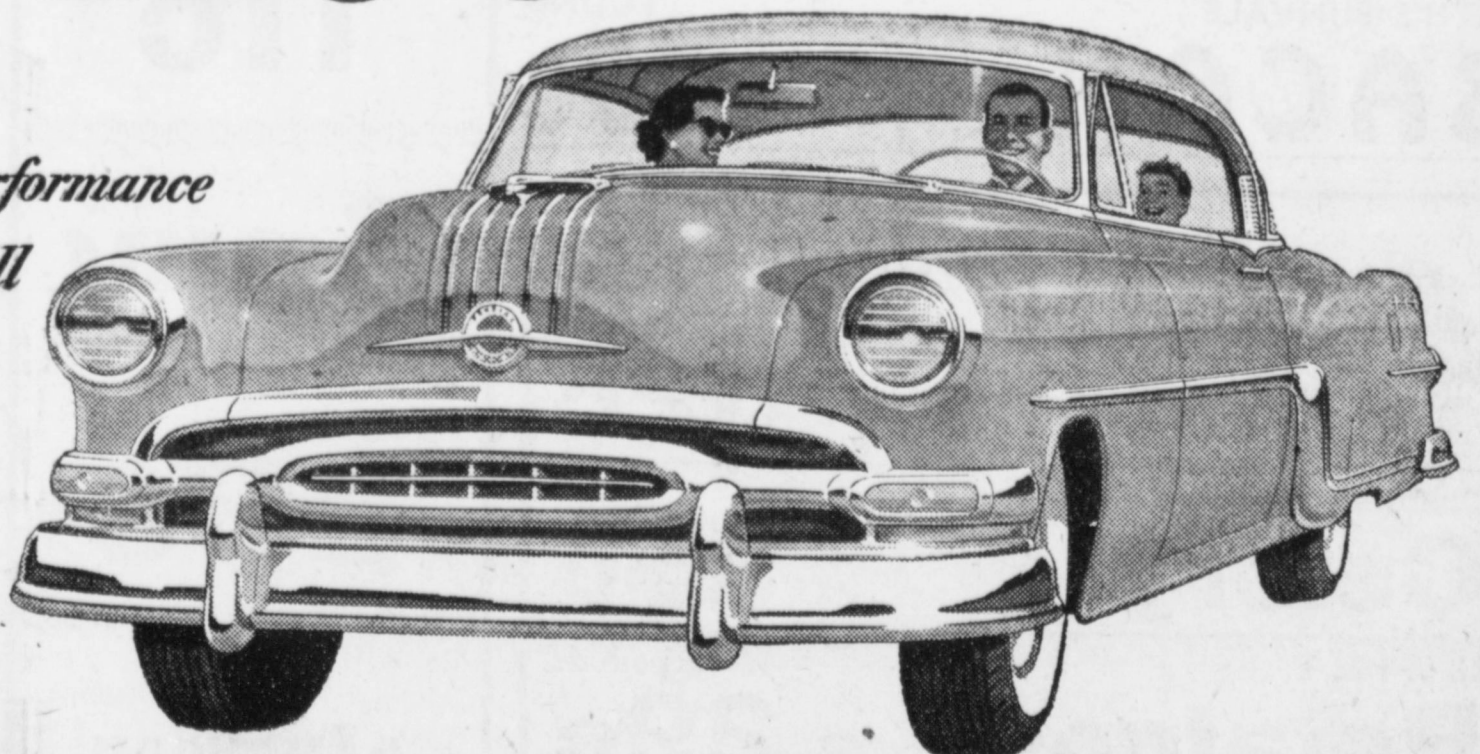

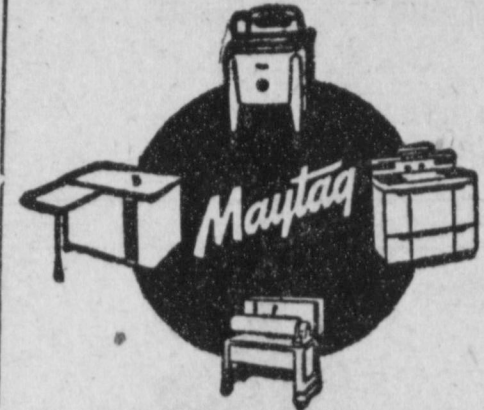

## SEPARATION FROM ARMED SERVICES EXCEED ENTRIES

Austin, Tex. — For every 100 Texans who pulled off armed forces uniforms in May, 83 others put theirs on.

A total of 895 Texans were drafted into the armed services in May, 2,239 were reported as enlisting, and 3,758 were separated, according to an official report mailed to Washington by the office of Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state director of Selective Service.

Separation of Texans from the armed forces has exceeded entries over the past months, Lieutenant Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, deputy state Selective Service director, said Thursday.

The same report showed that local boards in the state had 1,123 men examined for possible service in the armed forces during May. Of this number, 565 were found unacceptable by the armed forces.

Colonel Schwartz pointed out that acceptance or rejection of men for the armed forces is the responsibility of the armed forces under the law, and not the responsibility of Selective Service.

"Over the entire period of Selective Service experience in Texas," Colonel Schwartz said, "about one-third of the men are rejected for service by the army examining stations."
