Rockport-Fulton Earnings Are Over \$1,250,000 Annually

Shrimp Sales Alone Gross That Amount Yearly; **Repairs to Pleasure Craft and Charter Boats** Help Raise the Ante to Respectable Proportions

Shrimp sales in Rockport and Fulton gross slightly more than \$1,250,000 per year, practically all of which is spent again in the area. This forms the largest single source of income in Aransas County, with the exception of oil. These figures, taken from sales actually reported by the fish houses, are probably more accurate than those used two weeks ago in reporting tourist income, when the statistics


