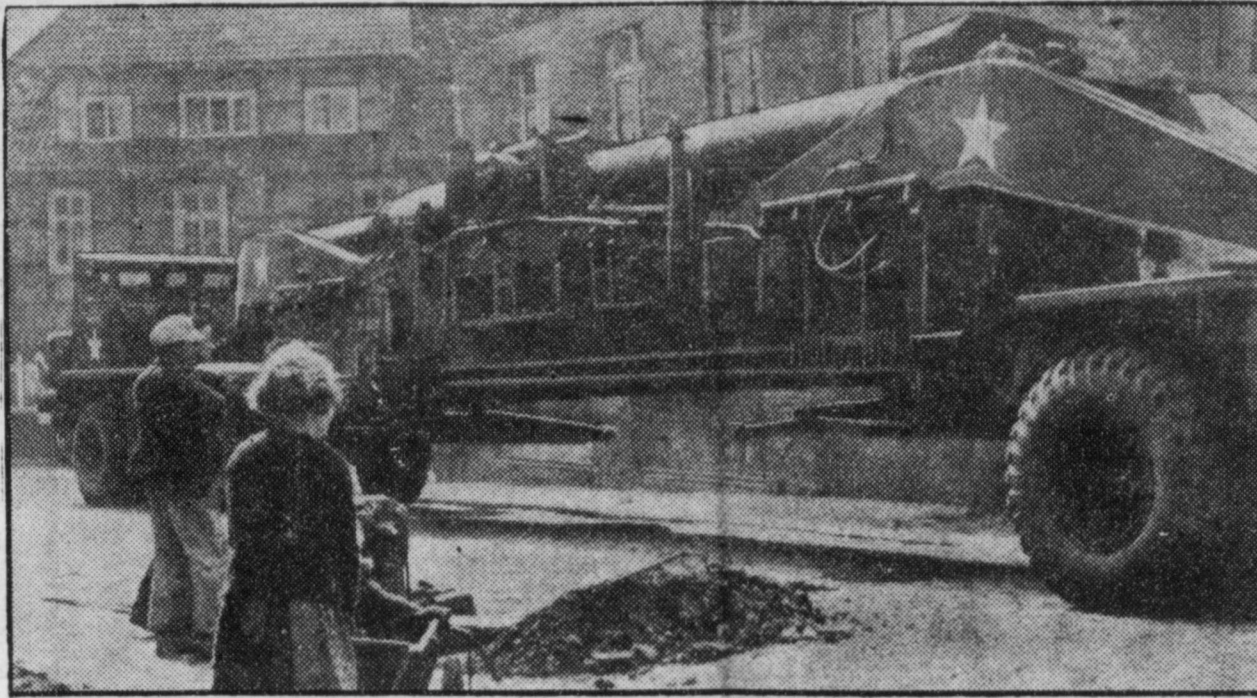

"The initial event went over so well that the company has repeated it twice annually since—each spring and early fall—now not to introduce the new store, but to familiarize people with new lines and new models that have been stocked since the last event."

The article then goes on to discuss the planning of the events, and their place in the advertising program of the store, and remarks that the coffee times have been so successful that others might well profit by the example.

## CATCH STATISTICS NEEDED

## National Fisherman Points Need for Better Knowledge of Sportsman's Take to Conserve Fish

In a recent editorial the National Fisherman emphasized the need for better and more complete fishery statistics.

With a continuing increase in the number of sports fishermen, and a consequent growing demand on fishery resources, considerable interest has been expressed in collecting better records of the sports fish catch.

Statistics have been kept for many years on the commercial catch, made by sportsmen, according to the editorial. One of these, California, reported that its million sports anglers landed over 35,000,000 pounds of food fish per year.

It is difficult to tell how many salt water sports fishermen there are, since California is the only state requiring a salt water license. However, the upward trend of sport's fishing popularity is evidenced by the record sale of 17,652,000 fresh water angler's licenses in the United States in 1953, a gain of over half a million from the preceding year.

## New General Motors Cars Hit Showrooms, Firms Hold Open House

New General Motors cars have begun to hit the showrooms, and this week two firms in Aransas Pass will unveil their new models at open houses to be held Friday and Saturday. Justin Snyder Pontiac Co. will serve coffee and doughnuts and will give door prizes; the George Clark Chevrolet Co. will dispense its traditional brand of hospitality to those coming to see the new cars.

The Chevrolet is new from rubber to roof, with the large-car look of the Oldsmobile. It has the same overall length as last year, but is from 2 1/2 to 6 1/4 inches lower, and has two inches more hip and shoulder room inside. With wrap-around windshields they have 18% more glass and visibility. The station wagon even has wrap-around rear windows. Tubeless tires are standard equipment.

The new Pontiac is also 2 1/2 inches lower, and, in some models, as much as 3 1/2 inches longer than last year. The new V-8 engine has stepped horse power up from 127 to 180, and an optional carburetor will boost it to 200. The Pontiac for 1955 incorporates more engineering innovations than any model since Pontiac was first introduced in 1926. The new car has 109 outstanding new features. The new bodies with panoramic windshield, and increased glass at side and back have 26% more "see through" area. In all, 12 body styles are offered this year by Pontiac.

## Mayor Seth Steele Attends So. Texas Meet In Victoria

Mayor Seth Steele and Mrs. Steele attended the 28th annual meeting of the South Texas Chamber of Commerce held in Victoria this past week. Nearly 200 delegates from South Texas counties attended the two-day meeting that ended Friday.

State aid to water districts and heavier support of water conservation laws were proposed in a feature speech Friday by Howard Tellepsen, presi-

dent of the Houston Chamber of Commerce. He recommended the State of Texas underwrite the bonds issued by cities, water districts and river authorities for construction of dams, reservoirs and other water conservation projects.

He also described the present water laws as being outmoded and suggested either strengthening or replacing the State Board of Water Engineers.

"The average annual runoff of Texas streams is about 62 million acre feet. Last year we only captured and used about 8 1/2 million acre feet, slightly more than 10 percent, with the balance being wasted into the Gulf of Mexico," he said.

Other speeches were made by Weldon Hart of Austin, chairman of the Texas Employment Commission, and Claiborne B. Gregory of San Antonio, chairman of the section on taxation of the Texas Bar Association.

E. L. Powell, San Antonio lumberman was reelected president.

Other officers elected were Dardus E. Proper, a brewer of San Antonio, vice president, and H. A. Fahrenthold, San Antonio banker, secretary - treasurer. Their terms end in October, 1955.

Two men of this area were named to the executive committee. They are J. E. Pickering, Victoria lumberman, and Arvie Elliott, banker from Edna. The board of directors includes Frank Diebel of Port Lavaca, Ben Sloan of Point Comfort, Claude McCan of Victoria, Judge S. G. Sample of Edna, Alton L. Griffin of Goliad, C. W. Denman of Yoakum, and A. D. Rooke of Woodsboro and Roy V. Regero of Rockport.

## General Election Will Be Held Tuesday, Nov. 2

Widespread interest is gradually being developed in the 11 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution to be voted on at the general election, November 2.

No organized opposition has appeared against any of the proposals. However, campaigns are being pushed for several of them.

Reports from over the state indicate somewhat of a draw between active support of various amendments and a general tendency to vote against some or all of them because of some question as to the results of writing such changes into the Constitution.

Amendments are discussed here in the order in which they will appear on the ballot.

## AMENDMENT NO. 1

Senate Joint Resolution No. 7 authorizes the Legislature to increase State spending for Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Dependent Children, by \$7,000,000 a year.

## Farm Census Now Under Way in County

This fall, for the sixteenth time since 1840, the Federal government is taking an inventory of its resources. This inventory is now well under way in Aransas County, according to J. L. Baughman, who is making the survey in the county. Up until 1920 these important inventory surveys were made every 10 years. Since 1920 they have been conducted on a 5-year basis. The 1954 Census of Agriculture will be taken in October and November covering the year 1954.

The information collected in this census will show how many farms are in each area; how many livestock and poultry are on these farms; how many acres of land were under cultivation this year and what the harvest was; and the kinds of facilities—electricity, running water, telephones, television sets, milking machines, etc.—that our farmers have available.

The good management of our farms, our businesses, and our Government requires timely, accurate information such as that supplied by this census. The main purpose of the 1954 farm census is to provide good information about our farms and farm people.

The agency responsible for taking the 1954 Census of Agriculture is the United States Bureau of the Census. Headquarters for the Bureau of the Census is located in Washington, D. C., but it has field offices throughout the United States.

### Commercial Fishermen Already Seeking Tuna

Commercial fishermen have begun experimental voyages into the Gulf of Mexico for tuna as a result of Fish and Wildlife Service explorations, said Stewart Springer, research chief of the service, in a talk to the Gulf Marine Fisheries Commission at San Antonio last Friday.

Springer showed a movie that detailed fishing methods of the federal research ship, Oregon, in conducting explorations in the Gulf over the past two years.

Commercial quantities of the yellow-fin tuna were substantial, said Springer, to lend hopes that offshore commercial fisheries could be developed for that species in the Gulf.

Springer also told of red shrimp that exists in the deep Gulf, an area not being fished by Gulf shrimpers. He said the Oregon would make test trips strictly for the purpose of determining availability of red shrimp in respect to commercial fishing possibilities.

The commission also heard a discussion on the red tide, killer phenomena that occurs in the Gulf, especially in the Florida area. William Wilson and Albert Collier, Fish and Wildlife Service, biologists, spoke on the subject.

### Deep Magnolia Try Hunts for Lost Oil

Officials of Magnolia Petroleum Company said recently that the project in the Gulf of Mexico may find an oil source that has been lost since early Spanish explorers first saw evidence of it more than company's latest offshore drilling four hundred years ago.

In 1543, survivors of Hernando DeSoto expedition found oil on the surface of the water surrounding their ships near what is now Sabine, Texas. Recently, Magnolia spudded in its first wildcat well in Texas offshore waters ten miles southwest of Sabine and eight miles off the coast of Jefferson County.

Location of the well was based solely on modern geophysical and geological exploration methods, but spokesmen in Dallas stated that as a coincidence the point chosen seems "fairly close" to that described in an account of the De Soto adventure written in 1557 by a nameless explorer known as the "Gentleman of Elva."

The chronicle tells how, after the death of DeSoto, Spanish ships picked up the survivors at the mouth of the Mississippi River for transportation to Mexico. Near the extreme southeastern corner of Texas the fleet was buffeted by a severe gulf storm. Leaks developed in the hulls, and the ships put in to shore.

On the waters, the Spaniards found a dark scum. Recognizing it as similar to pitch, they used it to caulk the bottoms of their leaking ships. According to the University of Oklahoma's Dr. Carl Coke Rister, an oil industry historian, it was the first use of petroleum by white men in the Western Hemisphere.

Magnolia officials said the DeSoto account was the first of many stories told of surface oil on the Gulf waters near Sabine. None has been reported in recent time. But several months' work with offshore exploration equipment has indicated that oil may be present in the area.

The wildcat well will be Magnolia's first effort to locate oil off the Texas shore, though the company has developed several fields off the Louisiana coast. The location is Magnolia's Gulf Tract 10, Well No. 1, leased from the State of Texas and is located on one of two adjoining 5,760-acre tracts. The company's permit is for a 13,000-foot well to be drilled from a platform in water 36 feet deep.

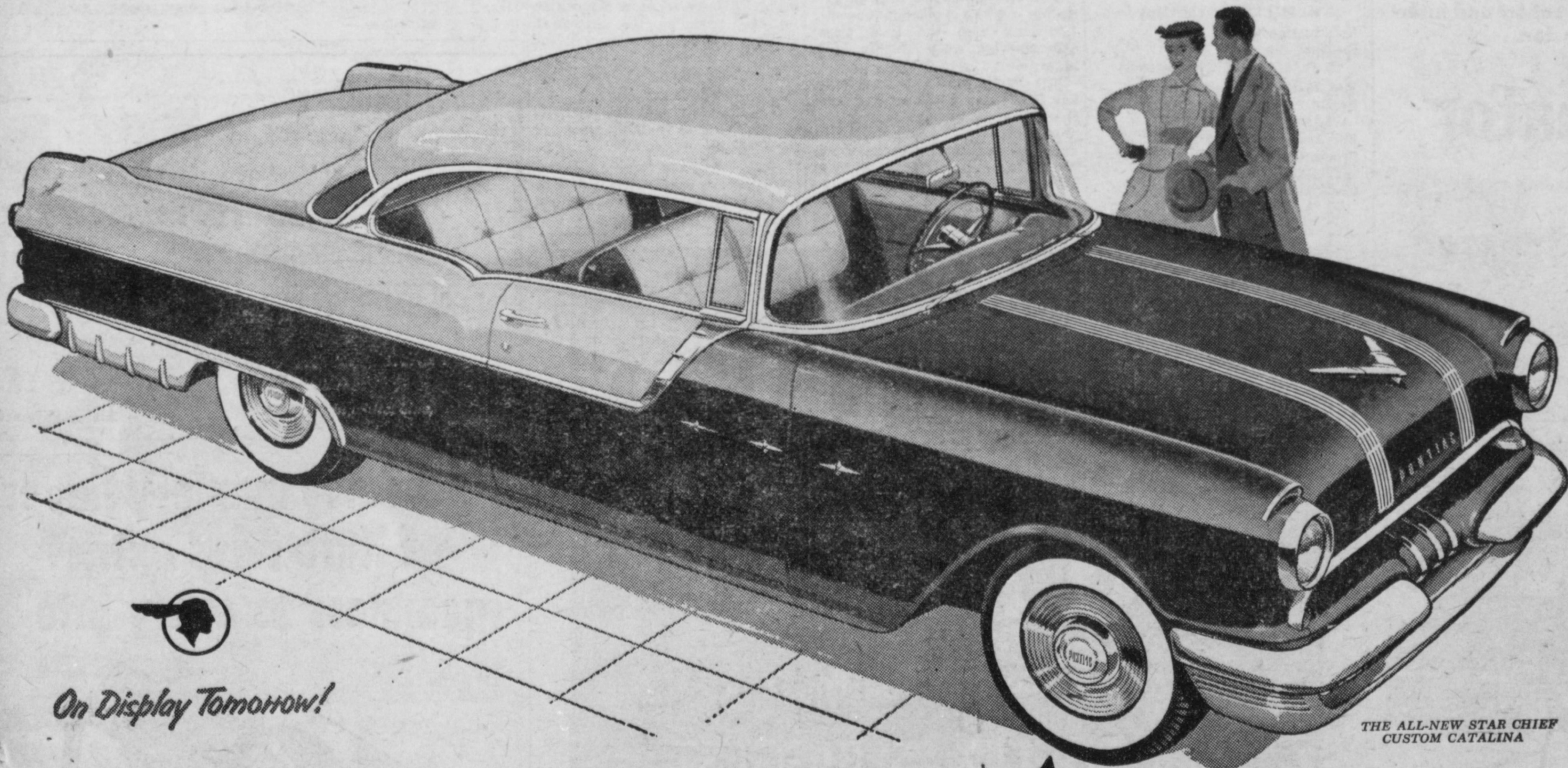

#### NOVEMBER DRAFT QUOTA DOWN

Austin—The state draft quota for November calls for the induction of 1,062 Texans into the armed forces. This compares with an October quota of 1,122, previously announced. Fresh Water From The Sea

Inasmuch as three-fourths of the earth's surface is deep sea, water is the most abundant substance there is.

Yet, paradoxically enough, about half of mankind today—including large areas of the United States—faces a serious water-shortage. That situation has developed primarily because Nature's distributive process, over which puny man has no control, has broken down in spots.

Now practically all the water that people use (99.99 per cent of it, scientists say) comes from the sea. The sun's heat produces water-vapor that forms clouds. The winds carry those clouds across the land until they cool off to form water again and fall as rain.

Thus earth's atmosphere operates as a vast water-still, for which the sun's heat supplies the motive-power. But from man's viewpoint, the machine works badly. The wind bloweth where it listeth, and the rain falls wherever sufficient water-vapor and chill air happen to collide. As yet the rainmaker, with his silver iodide and dry ice has not been able to influence that process materially—but he keeps on trying.

Then why do not the scientists compete with Nature and distill fresh water direct from the sea. The answer is, they have been trying to do that these many years. Engineer, chemist and physicist have devised numerous methods of converting salt water into fresh water. Those devices work perfectly in the laboratory.

The cheapest process so far tested, osmotic membrane filtration, costs 10 cents a thousand gallons for sea water, or one cent for brackish water. That method is still in the laboratory stage at the University of Florida.

Marine News



Shrimp landings in the Rockport-Fulton area were 57,495 pounds of tails for the week ending October 16, and 103,000 pounds for the week ending October 23.

Port Isabel has recently acquired the Shrimp Marketing Association a cooperative which is engaged in buying and selling shrimp. It was formed for the purpose of creating a more stable market on a quality product.

Shrimp production in the Northwest Gulf of Mexico continued heavy over the past thirty days. Weather conditions have retarded boat operations in this area recently, but when able to fish trawlers are still making substantial catches.

The Texas bay season has not proven too productive to date. Although white shrimp are being taken, production is scattered and sizes range mostly from medium to small.

The Northern Gulf area is producing white shrimp, mostly Louisiana with the East Coast also showing white shrimp landings.

The South Gulf area production has been interrupted by bad weather with no recent landings reported. The Carmen-Campeche area was experiencing more or less normal production before weather halted fishing operations.

A couple of the latest gadgets

in boating, that should prove useful or fun, are listed in the last issue of Boat and Equipment News. They are a new, low-priced echo sounder for the small boat owner, and a waterbike. The echo sounder, which registers from 2 to 80 feet, is priced at \$169, and can be installed in less than two hours while the boat is still in the water. The Waterbike, an easily assembled craft, looks like a bicycle on pontoons, and can be assembled in 20 minutes. Price is 200 bucks.

The Humble Oil and Refining Company proposes to construct a 12 x 24-foot wharf, connected to shore by a 3 x 141-foot walkway at a location 0.7 miles east from the northeast end of Copano causeway.

American fishermen are showing greater respect for Mexican territorial waters and as a result there have been no incidents during the past few months.

Maj. Gen. Rodolfo Sanchez Taboada, here on an official 12-day inspection tour of U. S. naval installations, made the statement at a news conference. As Navy minister, he is in charge of all maritime affairs in Mexico including port development and fishing.

American shrimp boats have been seized repeatedly in the Caribbean by Mexican ships on charges they were violating Mexican territorial waters. Mexico claims her territorial waters extend to nine miles from her coast.

Asked if this issue had been resolved, Gen. Sanchez said: "We have been having fewer problems because of a disposition on the part of the American shrimp fishermen to respect our territorial waters. There have been no incidents during the past several months."

Gen. Sanchez said this attitude was due to both the fishermen and the U. S. government.

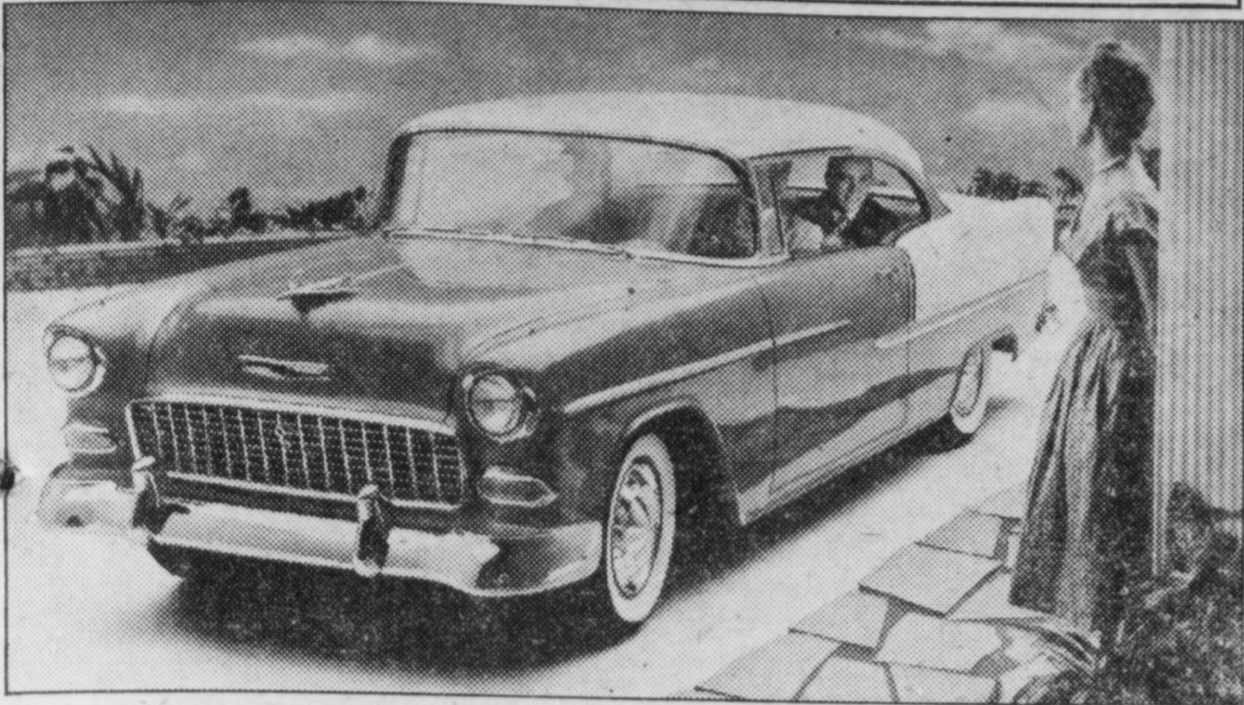

**Heavy Rains Throughout Live Oak Area**

The same storm which caused so much damage in Portland brought Live Oak Peninsula between eight and nine inches of rain, and helped practically everyone in the area. Cattle raisers who had been buying feed think that this moisture and the feed it will bring will carry them to the first of the year.

Back along the Market Street Road, and, for that matter, in Rockport itself, much ground was under water during the height of the downpour, and even as late as Sunday many of the pastures were still inundated.

Incidentally, while the rain helped grass, it also helped the grass burrs, and there are some parts of the peninsula that would probably produce between 100 and 120 bushels of burrs per acre if it was possible to thresh them.

Actually, while all the research is being carried on by various agencies to improve agriculture, it almost seems as though there ought to be at least a little directed towards grass burrs. They'll grow where nothing else can or will. If some scientist could develop a burr-less grass burr, (like Luther Burbank developed the spineless cactus) his name ought to go down in history as one of the benefactors of humanity. If, on top of that, he could cross it with alfalfa, so that stock would eat it, South Texas' feed problems would be forever solved.

The storm, to return to it, caused considerable damage everywhere it hit. Tree limbs were blown down; small buildings were demolished, signboards were toppled for miles, and there is hardly a one left standing between here and Corpus Christi.
