NOVEMBER DRAFT QUOTA DOWN

Austin-The state draft quota for November calls for the induction of 1,062 Texans into the armed forces. This compares with an October quota of 1,122, previously announced. Both the November and October quotas are Texas's share of a national call for 23,000 men. A total of 2,565 men are also scheduled for combined physical and mental examinations in November. This compares with an October call for 2,-630 previously announced. Local board quotas for the November induction call and November physical-mental examinations are scheduled to be mailed to the local boards by state Selective Service headquarters the last week in Sep-

Instructions received with the November call for induction of men limit inductions to men 20 years old or older, with drafting of men below that age being authorized only if the call cannot be filled with older men.
