

Oysters: Temperatures for this area averaged five degrees above normal for September. This has had an adverse effect on oyster consumption. The oysters which are being produced are generally small and of poor quality. The State of Texas has passed a regulation prohibiting the dredging of oysters in Galveston Bay. Nearly the entire bumper crop of last season was taken by dredges. Most of this production was by shrimp trawlers which used the oyster season to carry them over the lean months. Due to the increased labor involved in tonging as well as the fact that these shrimp boats are not usable for tonging, production of the Bay area is expected to decline considerably this coming



The fishing vessel Santa Antonreal "Fire Prevention Week," and all accounted for now anyway. ino, captained by John Rawlings, made port with 121/2 tons of prime yellowfin tuna taken in the central Gulf region. The fish weighed about 100 pounds each.

Last spring Fish and Wildlife Service specialists aboard the exploratory fishing vessel Oregon discovered that yellowfin were widely distributed in the Gulf and could be taken at subsurface levels with modified Japanese-style longline gear. Three successful tuna trips have been made to various parts of the Gulf and have found that the central Gulf's northbound current, between 88 degrees and 90 degrees west longitude, affords the best yellowfin fishing at the present time. Making use of this information, the Santa Antonino proceeded to this area and reported catches as high as 9 tuna per 100 hooks, a very good showing for this type of fishing.

Another commercial vessel, a converted red snapper schooner operating out of Pensacola, Fla., also has begun tuna fishing in the Gulf. Commercial interests in Mississippi are now reported to be
