Hebronville Clinches District 31A Championship

Hebronville's undefeated Longhorns, who were pushed all over the field in the first half but refused to quit, fought back to overcome the Woodsboro Eagles, 13-0, Friday night at Woodsboro.

Hebronville's eighth consecutive victory practically clinched the District 31A championship. The Longhorns need to win only one of their final two games.

An overflow crowd of 2,400 hardly ever stopped cheering—for Woodsboro in the first half and for Hebronville in the second.

Woodsboro tore the Longhorns apart in the first two periods, but the Eagles were stopped twice inside the 20-yard line and the half ended a scoreless tie.

Hebronville looked like a new team in the third quarter and scored on a 50-yard march the second time it got the ball.

Gonzales, Hebronville's quarterback and tailback, was the star of the night with some fancy broken field running and passing. He suffered a pulled shoulder muscle in the fourth quarter, but his injury was believed to be minor.

Gonzales passed for all 35 yards that Hebronville gained in the first half. He was hard pressed by Eagle rushers. Hebronville lost a net six yards rushing the first half, compared to Woodsboro's plus 140.

Cippel and Gonzales did some remarkable punting, averaging 37.6 yards on seven kicks.

A second-quarter safety gave the Flour Bluff Hornets the edge for a 9-7 victory over the Benavides Eagles in a District 31A game at Flour Bluff, Friday night.

The safety was the result of a bad pass from center and a fumble in the backfield when the Eagles were on their own 10. Leonardo Saenz of the Eagles recovered the ball in the end zone.

In the same quarter, the Hornets moved up 7 more points when Donald Claybrook scored from the 8, and Tommy Jarrett went over right tackle for the extra point.

The Eagles scored their lone touchdown in the third period. Saenz set up his on tally with a 40-yard run to the 5. He then took it over for the score. Juan Salinas converted.

The Bishop Badgers won their 31A conference game with the Premont Cowboys at Bishop last night in a hard-fought game, 20-12.

Bishop's James Singleton, tackle, blocked a punt in the Premont end zone to tally the first Badger score. Cowboy Frank Gonzalez retaliated several plays later with a one-yard ram through center.

Badger Alfred Shafer, end, snagged a 50-yard pass from Quarterback Bobby Rich to put Bishop in the lead in the opening play of the second quarter. Ronnie Bull kicked the extra point.

Jack Justice, Badger fullback, made the only third quarter score with an 8-yard run. The conversion was successful.

Marine News



According to a report from a northwest fishing trade journal, two boats are due to arrive in the Gulf soon for experimental fishing. The boats the "Sunbeam" and "Paul L" are operated by Dan Luketa, who has designed a net reel setup, which in preliminary tests has shown promise of changing some ideas in the trawl fleet.

The reel setup is so designed that cables and doors on the net can be unhooked as they come aboard and stored out of the way while the net is being recovered. The wings of the net are snapped to the reel and reeled up during recovery.

Another innovation being tried out with the new gear is a set of trawl doors which Luketa claims will not mud down. In tests of a model set of doors, Luketa said, they worked well. The doors are V-shaped and have variable bridle lengths to aid in depth and directional control of the wings while fishing. The doors are hinged for storage close aboard when not in use.

The Fifth Annual Meeting of the Gulf States Marine Fisheries Commission was held at the Gunter Hotel, San Antonio, Texas, October 21st and 22nd. Official action was taken by the Commission in favor of the proposed Fish and Wildlife this was the last sanction of official fishery groups needed to obtain complete industry accord in this matter. The survey is to be carried out in much the same manner as that made of the domestic tuna industry, with the studies and survey supervised from Washington, D. C., and including a very large amount of contract research with qualified research organizations in the economic field.

Biological investigation will include a study of the shrimp populations of the Gulf to determine the effect of environmental changes on shrimp production, in order to provide information to maintain the maximum sustainable productivity of these shell fish. Additional personnel will be added to the Fish and Wildlife staff for the purpose of collecting and disseminating commercial fisheries statistics in the Gulf area.

Texas landings from October 19 to November 5, inclusive, were as follows: Galveston and Freeport: Shrimp, 3592 bbls.; snapper, 11,000 pounds; oysters, 90 bbls.

Port Lavaca and Palacios: Shrimp, 1341 bbls.

Aransas Pass, Rockport, and Corpus Christi: Shrimp, 7102 bbls.; drum, 5730 pounds; trout, 1260 pounds; snapper, 310 pounds; redfish, 1450 pounds.

Port Isabel: Shrimp, 5646 bbls.; drum, 23,870 pounds; trout 3,070 pounds; snapper, 790 pounds; redfish, 20,000 pounds; croakers, 2560 pounds; pompano, 700 pounds; and flounder, 200 pounds.

Brownsville: Shrimp, 10,555 bbls.

Oysters: Temperatures for this area averaged five degrees above normal for September. This has had an adverse effect on oyster consumption. The oysters which are being produced are generally small and of poor quality. The State of Texas has passed a regulation prohibiting the dredging of oysters in Galveston Bay. Nearly the entire bumper crop of last season was taken by dredges. Most of this production was by shrimp trawlers which used the oyster season to carry them over the lean months. Due to the increased labor involved in tonging as well as the fact that these shrimp boats are not usable for tonging, production of the Bay area is expected to decline considerably this coming season.

Work on the Rockport Yacht and Supply marine lift is progressing rapidly, and it will not be long before this lift is in operation. At the same time, a new street is being opened to the waterfront on the south end of the property. As soon as this is completed, the old entrance will be closed.

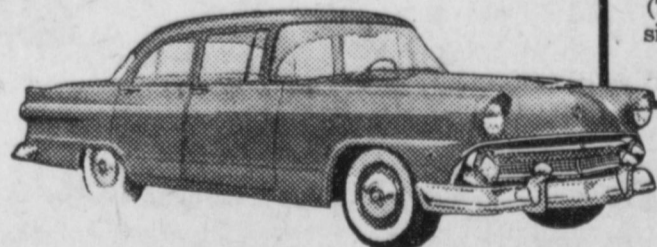

Old Copy of Pilot Found By Mrs. Clobberdants

Recently, Mrs. J. F. Clobberdants unearthed a copy of the Pilot dating back to July 25, 1919. This was in the days when Heldenfels' shipyard was in full swing, and the main news in the issue concerns the launching of the wooden steamship "Baychester".

According to the front page story, there was to be a big excursion from San Antonio to Rockport on the day of the launching. An oyster roast was to be held, and there was to be fish chowder for everyone, and especially southwest Texans. State officials, including Texas' governor and his aides, Federal representatives, and influential citizens of the area were all expected to be present.

The legislature had just enacted a special law allowing the city of Rockport to build and own docks. "This", says the paper, "is what Rockport has been wanting and working for during the past forty years. Now we have made a step forward, and cannot recede."

The oil situation was interesting. "J. C. Corrigan has transported derrick lumber to the island and C. C. Harris informs us that lumber for his first derrick has been purchased". Harris, by the way, was vice president of the Texas Coast Syndicate.

Two oil seeps had been discovered during that week. One was in Turtle Bayou at the east end of the Harris tract, and the other was directly under the home of Mrs. Minnie Harwell. This house was built partly over the bay, and crude oil from beneath it was seeping into the water in quantities.

The Japonica had tied up at the Sorenson wharf with 120 Shriners and their families aboard. They had come to Rockport for an oyster roast, but because their entertainment committee had made a mistake, and got them there a day ahead of schedule, they ate ham sandwiches instead. They had a brass band along, and ate in the old Bailey pavilion which used to run out into the water east of the Aransas Hotel.

Rockport, in a game that went ten innings had beaten Corpus Christi 12-4. Battery for Rockport was Courtney and Gotwald; for Corpus Christi, Montgomery and Wiggins.

An interesting note says: "Heavy Rain Here. Probably the heaviest rain for many years visited Aransas County Tuesday and Wednesday of this week. About 7 and 7/10 inches of rain fell, which flooded the city. A tent show which pitched its tents near the railroad was in a pool of water two feet deep Wednesday morning. The rest of the paper is made up of legal and church notices and a few personal news items. Evidently the editor was as hard put for news in those days as he is sometimes even now.

Changes in Your Social Security

When Congress enacted the new amendments, it did so with the view of bringing old-age and insurance benefits better in line with current earning levels and living costs. And equally important are those parts of the law which extend the coverage of social security to more people, and in this way benefits are made available to more workers in their retirement and to their families when they die. Now nearly nine out of ten workers are included under the program. And of about 63 million jobs in the nation, more than 55 million are now covered by social security.

Another provision increased the benefits to those who are already receiving retirement and family insurance payments as well as to those who will qualify for them in the future.

Perhaps it should be pointed out here that old-age and survivors insurance benefits are payable only to the families of those who have worked long enough on social security jobs to be insured under this law. Social Security benefits are paid out of a trust fund built up from the social security taxes of employees, employers, and the self-employed, plus accumulated interest. Thus the financing of the system is completely self-supporting.
