

## 2-Acre Lease in Aransas County Brings Record Price

A lease in Aransas County brought a record bid from Atlantic Refining Company. The two acre tract, belonging to the Aransas County Independent School District, lies between Rockport and Aransas Pass, in the recently opened Aransas East Field area, and is the land formerly occupied by the Estes School.

The lease is in the John Phillips Survey, A-175, about 3000 feet southeast of Atlantic No. 1 Barber, gas-distillate discovery of the new field.

The bid of \$12,500—\$6250 an

acre—is the highest price paid for any lease ever made in Aransas County, especially as it this is for a period of one year, only. Previous high in the county was for a small lease on the Aransas airport, which brought slightly over \$3000 an acre.

## Daniel Speaks On Juvenile Problems

There is no cure-all for juvenile delinquency, said Jere Daniel, Chief Probation Officer, City-County Juvenile Department, of Corpus Christi and Nueces County, who addressed Rockport P-TA members Monday evening at the High School Auditorium.

Neither more recreation, stiffer divorce laws, nor censoring of comic books can replace understanding parents who, loving their children, refuse to be blind to their faults, and by proper training give them a firm foundation on which to build.

Just as there are many causes for juvenile delinquency, there must be many approaches to its correction. Each community must thoroughly understand its own

## DUPLICITY DISCOVERED ON PART OF PRESBY. MINISTER, AS HE JOINS PERCH CLUB

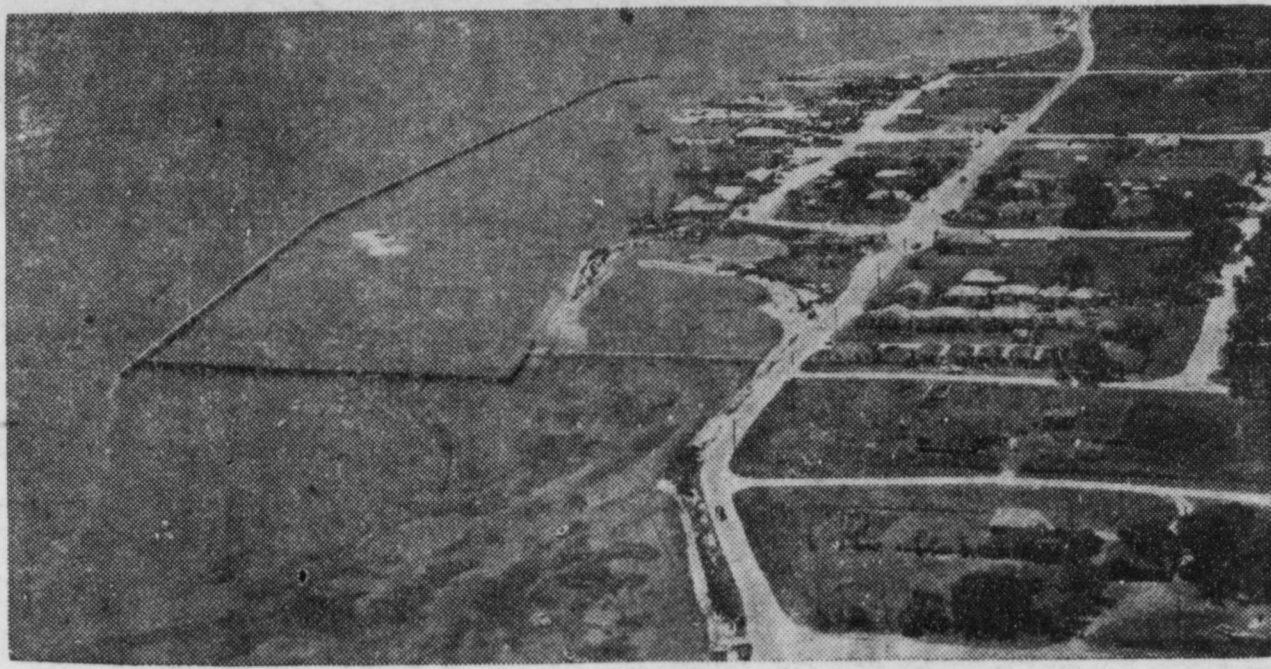

## Old-Timer Recalls Big Fish Catches of Yesteryear

The following article, written by Travis Moorman, Caller-Times Staff Writer, appeared in that paper Saturday, Nov. 13, 1954.

Last month four Flour Bluff youths were very much in the news after catching a large redfish with their bare hands in the mud flats off Padre Island.

Eighty-odd years ago this would have attracted no notice at all. More than likely the lad's parents would have sent them back to get another that would fit the frying pan better, says H. G. (Ham) Smith, oldest living native of Aransas County.

Smith, who will be 88 next Feb. 1, remembers that when he was five and still wearing dresses, he and his older brothers would wade out in half-knee deep water to cram big reds in oat sacks. Smith's duties consisted mostly of pushing a skiff along in the shallow water for his brothers to dump their fish in.

Smith was born in 1867 six and one-half miles south of here in a community then called Estes. A cemetery now marks the site of his birthplace. As a child he remembers seeing acres of big reds lazily around in the shallow water of the flats in front of his home with their top fins glistening in the light of the early morning sun.

As the sun warmed up the shallow water, the fish took to the deeper holes in the flats, Smith said. It was then he and his brothers were able to catch them in oat sacks.

"If we had only had a cast net, I expect we could have caught a wagon load many a time," he speculates.

The Rockport octogenarian is the son of a boatman, Capt. Francis Smith, who was lost when his sailboat capsized in the Gulf 80 years ago. Sixty, 70 and 80 years ago there was considerable passenger and freight traffic by boats along the coast. Fishermen at Rockport sold large catches to boat operators for shipment to other areas.

Smith said he and an older brother, Grover, had a standing order to supply the steamer that made regular calls at Rockport with 200 pounds of flounder. The

brothers would wait until they saw the steamer clear the pass to start out giggering. He doesn't recall they ever failed to fill the order and said the boat paid them eight cents a pound, about twice the regular market price.

In the winter of '94 after a hard freeze, Smith and several friends seized Aransas Bay at Fulton while the trout were still numb from the cold. He said they sold approximately 40,000 pounds of good-sized fish which were hauled away from the seine in wagons.

Fish were so plentiful in Smith's early days they were used for chickenfeed. But, he recalls the eggs tasted fishy if the hens were given too steady a diet of the seafood.

There was plenty of other kinds of meat also. The brush country back of Rockport was full of un-

branded wild cattle, hogs, turkeys, geese and ducks—all easy to get. Some of the best eating Smith recalls from his early days was meals of sea turtle from the turtle packing plant here at Rockport.

Rockport and Fulton were booming towns in his early days with meat, fish and turtle packing plants and a hide and tallow plant. The coming of the railroad, opening inland markets for the coastal cattle, raised the price of cattle to the point where the meat and hide plants couldn't operate profitably. Soon after the railroad, these plants all closed.

Smith made two trips up the trail as a youth. The first was a three and one-half month ride to Caldwell, Kans. with a herd of South Texas horses in 1883. The next year he signed on as a rider (Continued on page 8)

# \$415,000 Bonds Sold Thursday

## Aransas Navigation District Securities Sold To San Antonio Firm After Spirited Bidding By Half Score of Buyers

Some \$415,000 in Aransas County Navigation District bonds were sold to the high bidders, Austin, Hart, and Parvin and Russ and Company, of San Antonio Thursday, on a bid of par, accrued interest, and a premium of \$8466, making a net interest rate of 1.537.

Runners up in the spirited bidding were Fidler and Hess, Eddleman Pollok and Company, and the First National Bank of Dallas, bidding for their joint account, these firms offered a premium of \$8452.50, which would make an effective interest rate of 1.5381.

Other firms and their bids were: Republic National Bank and Harris Trust and Savings, a joint bid of \$8257 premium, which would have made a net interest rate of 1.5487; Rotan, Moses and Co., and Underwood Neuhaus, a premium of \$8060.39, with a net interest rate of 1.55954; Dewar, Robertson and Pancoast, Rowles, Winston and Co., a premium of \$7970 with a net interest rate of 1.5644; First Southwest Company, Rauscher, Pierce and Co., a bid of \$7658.50, with a net interest of 1.581502; Muir Investment Co., J. R. Phillips Investment Co., and Keith Reed and Co., a premium of \$6258.98, with net interest of 1.6579; Ronson Davidson, Shearson-Hamill, a premium of \$5,769.00, net interest 1.684; Equitable Securities Corporation, Richard L. Bradley, and McClung, Knickerbocker and Co., premium \$7,055, net interest of 1.55; and the Columbian (Continued on page 8)

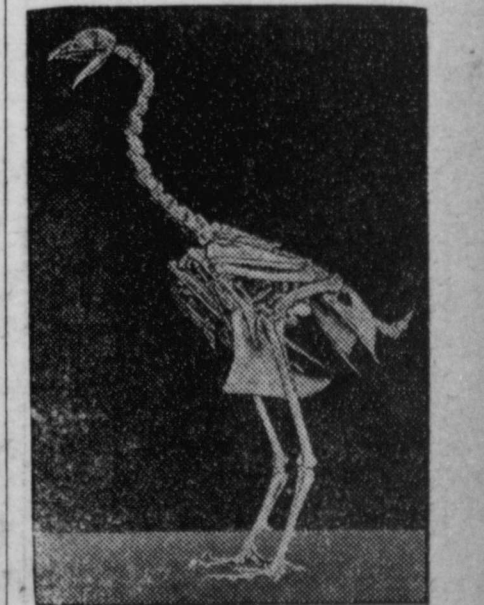
The Pirates will enter the Waelder tournament on December 3-4. Coach Segler says that a full schedule will be furnished at a later date, just as soon as one can be filled.

**Social Security Benefits Explained**

The new social security law has a special provision for the families of deceased workers who could not collect benefits before because the worker hadn't worked long enough under the old law. It applies when the worker died after June 1940 and before September, 1950. If you are the widow of such a worker, you should take definite action to get the survivors benefits to which you may be entitled under the new law.

Under the old law, for example, a worker who died in June, 1950 would have needed twenty-six calendar quarters of covered employment to be fully insured. Under the amendments, if he had as much as six quarters, or a year and a half of work on social security jobs, or military service after 1939, his widow and children can now draw the survivors insurance if they are otherwise qualified.

The first payments under this provision will be for the month of September, 1954. The insurance may now be paid for the children under age 18, to the unmarried widow who has such a child in her care, and to widows after they are 65 years old.

If you are the survivor of a worker who died before September 1, 1950, and if you weren't eligible for social security benefits before, you may now be. Maybe you didn't apply before, or perhaps you waited too long to apply for the benefits to which you would have been entitled. Under the new law you may apply for your survivors benefits until September, 1956.

## Aransas Has Dual Strike, New Wildcat

Aransas County had a new dual oil discovery completion and a deep wildcat coming up as the week ended.

A. O. Morgan and B. A. Wales No. 1 J. D. Stanley and others, opener of oil production in the Aransas Field 2½ miles northeast of Aransas Pass, was dual completing on perforations from 7,304-07 feet after earlier flowing an estimated 150 barrels of pipeline oil daily through 12/64-inch choke. Tubing pressure was 460 pounds.

The oil discovery previously was gauged on an eight-hour test through 10/64-inch choke from perforations at 7,804-07 feet and rated a 24-hour flow of 161 barrels of pipeline oil. The gravity of the oil has not been reported. Tubing pressure was 775 pounds and gas-oil ratio was estimated around 700-1.

The discovery, which has 7-inch casing at 8,962 feet with total depth 8,974 feet, is on a 20-acre lease in John H. Phillips Survey, A-175.

Rudco Oil & Gas Co. has planned immediate drilling of a scheduled 10,000-foot wildcat in the West Rockport Field area about 1½ miles northwest of Rockport.

The Tyler firm's No. 1 Travis Bailey is 330 feet out of the southwest corner of the 10-acre lease in the extreme east portion of the Bailey fee in Joseph Fessenden Survey, A-65. The test is 2,630 feet east of Renwar No. 1 Bailey, a producer.

Two miles west of Rockport, Jack Modesett, F. William Carr and Conroe Drilling Co. No. 1 J. W. Lockhart was preparing to core at 8,025 feet after earlier logging to 7,868 feet. The scheduled 9,000-foot test is on a 102-acre lease.

A proposed 9,500-foot West

Rockport Field test 2½ miles west of Rockport, Heep Oil Corp. and others No. 3 Zeph Rouquette and others was drilling below 4,610 feet.

Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 1 State Tract 692, Aransas County tidelands wildcat 14½ miles north-east of Port Aransas in the Gulf of Mexico was installing blowout preventor preparatory to testing on acidized perforations from 13-889-918 feet.

C. G. Glasscock of Corpus Christi has staked location for an Aransas County wildcat 7½ miles northwest of Rockport in Copano Bay.

His No. 2 State Tract 2, projected to 7,500 feet on a 535-acre lease, is 330 feet from the south and east lines of Tract 2, Copano Bay.

The test is 1½ miles west of Highway 35. Hunt holds the Virginia Tatton fee to the north and east and Copano Oil Co. has the O'Connor fee to the northwest.

Heep Oil Corp. and others No. 3 Zeph Rouquette and others, slated 9,500-foot West Rockport Field test 2½ miles west of Rockport, was making hole below 3,400 feet. It had earlier spotted 10½-inch casing at 1,050 feet.

The Elmox Oil and Gas Corporation, Houston, has applied for permits to operate in Aransas Bay, State Tract No. 220 and 222, approximately five miles south of Rockport. They propose to erect structures and do work in connection with drilling oil wells at the above location. The drilling structures would include four alternate types of structures, any one of which would be used at a particular well site. These four types are: drilling barges sunk on the bed of the waterway supporting a derrick having a top elevation of about 173 feet at mean low tide with a center guide structure that may be left as a protective structure; a derrick having a top elevation of 175 feet erected on a 140 by 150-foot fill foundation connected to shore by a 12-foot roadway, the foundation and roadway covered with shell or in deeper water inclosed within a bulkhead and having an elevation of 5 feet above mean gulf level; a timber pile foundation with a derrick having a top elevation of about 160 feet above mean gulf level erected thereon and a boiler and pipe rack barge sunk on the bed of the bay adjacent to the derrick foundation, the overall dimension being 45 by 291 feet; a timber pile foundation with a derrick having a top elevation of 160 feet above mean gulf level erected thereon with a barge sunk adjacent to the drilling structure and a separate pile-supported pipe rack, the overall dimensions being about 75 by 340 feet. Tank platforms 28 by 66 feet overall would also be erected within the area and channels would be dredged within shallow water and service pipe lines and flow lines would be placed within the area.

## Humble Quits \$1 Million Deep Test In Gulf

A 15,000-foot Texas tidelands wildcat in Aransas County is being abandoned by Humble Oil & Refining Co. The dry hole reportedly cost \$1 million.

Humble has been making the test several miles off St. Joseph Island. The 15,000-foot depth is one of the deepest tests ever made in the Gulf of Mexico.

There was no immediate announcement from Humble on plans for drilling other tests in the block leased last December from the State.



AN ORDINANCE

REQUIRING A BUILDING PERMIT FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OR THE ALTERATION OF ANY BUILDING WITHIN THE CITY OF ROCKPORT, TEXAS; REQUIRING THE PAYMENT OF A PERMIT FEE; PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION OF THE ORDINANCE; AND REPEALING ALL OF THE ORDINANCES, IF ANY, IN CONFLICT THEREWITH.

SECTION 1. That it shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to construct or structurally alter any building within the city limits of the city of Rockport, Texas, without obtaining a permit therefor issued by the City Secretary of the City of Rockport, Texas, except where the total cost of such construction or alteration does not exceed \$25.00.

SECTION 2. Application for such building permits shall be made upon a form furnished by the city, and shall be sworn to by the applicant before an officer authorized to take acknowledgments.

SECTION 3. Each applicant for

a building permit shall pay to the City Secretary of Rockport, Texas, before such permit is issued, a minimum fee of Five Dollars (\$5.00) and an additional One Dollar (\$1.00) for each One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) of construction or alteration cost, or fraction thereof, above Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00).

SECTION 4. Nothing contained in this ordinance is intended to conflict nor shall this ordinance conflict with the fire limits ordinance regulating the construction or alteration of buildings within the fire limits of the City of Rockport, Texas.

SECTION 5. All ordinances of the City of Rockport, Texas, pertaining to the obtaining and issuance of building permits, and all ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 6. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not to exceed One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00).

**Brieger Wins Fourth In Chess Tournament**

Robert Trevino won 500 pesos or forty dollars. The second place winner won 250 pesos or twenty dollars, and the third place winner won 100 pesos or eight dollars.

**Big Tax Session In Legislature Looming**

Evidence is mounting the Fifty-fourth Texas legislature, which convenes in January, may be a "big tax" session.

Gov. Shivers has given the word to business and industry leaders stantial increases in expending the state is entering an era of subtleties—chiefly because of the steady gain in population.

He has asked the Texas research league, a privately-endowed government study group headed by President Hines Baker of Humble Oil and Refining Co., to investigate possible new sources of revenue—which means taxes.

Shivers cited the fact Texas collects \$550,000,000 a year in direct taxes—a big share of it tied to the petroleum industry—while California collects more than \$1,500,000,000.

Ninety-three cents out of every tax dollar collected by the state goes to four big categories—public education, highways public welfare and state hospitals.

It's these same four where larger expenditures seem unavoidable. The research league itself has already called for more money to be spent on the state hospital system, where the government has made only slight inroads into the overcrowding problem despite much-increased spending.

The patient load is continuing to climb at an alarming rate.

Public education at all levels is costing the state more money each year. In the lower schools, the scholastic population is mounting faster than buildings can be constructed and new teachers hired to take care of it.

Tuesday the people voted on whether they want to spend an additional \$7,000,000 a year on old age pensions and other public welfare. One of the 11 constitutional amendments to be voted upon in the general election would raise the financial ceiling from its present \$35,000,000 to \$42,000,000.

A concerted drive is under way to enact a higher gasoline tax to raise at least part of this revenue. Highway officials would like to have a 2-cent increase but a 1-cent hike stands a much better chance of passing the legislature.

A big new source of spending is water conservation. Members of the Texas water resources committee, which was created by the legislature, will push a 3-cent property tax to get started on a multi-million-dollar program of state aid to local water projects.

The proposed increase in the ad valorem tax would scarcely affect small homeowners, but would tap large property holders and industry pretty substantially.

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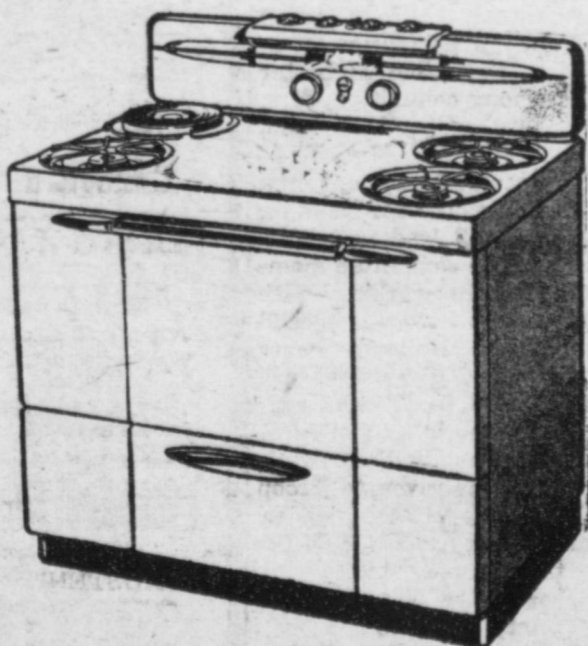

with one of the three herds the King Ranch drove to market. Smith said he had daily clashes with the herd boss and his crew had just about the worst cook in Texas. By the time the herd reached the Red River, Smith was fed up with food and had tired of the arguments with his boss and turned back.

About 65 years ago, Smith operated a pleasure boat out of Corpus Christi then a city of approximately 4,500. His means of transportation was a sailboat but hunting, fishing and moonlight parties were just as popular in those days as now, he declares.

"We believe from the number of requests we have received in the past for harbor space that we shouldn't have any trouble making the Fulton harbor a busy place," Jackson said.

"Many of the shrimp boats operating in the Gulf right now have no permanent berthing place for the simple reason that there aren't enough places to go around."

The sand dredged from the Fulton harbor will be spread along the Fulton waterfront. It will form a bathing beach about three blocks long.

A park will be built as part of the development to connect the harbor and the beach with the Fulton waterfront.

The harbor at the Cove is expected to open the way for industrial development of the 10-mile-long strip of flatland heading southward from Rockport to Aransas Pass.

The extent of first-phase work at the Cove remains to be determined.

But a T-shaped harbor 6000 feet wide and with turning basins at each end is pegged for eventual development.

The harbor will connect—like all the other Rockport-Fulton harbors—with the Intracoastal Canal. It will be designed primarily for use by industrial craft, although a section will be reserved for commercial and pleasure boats.

The Cove harbor will have the added advantage of being beside a railroad line operated by the Southern Pacific and Texas Highway 35, the main coastal traffic route.

The initial work on the Cove harbor will cost \$145,000.

The Rockport harbor improvements—involving an expenditure of \$30,000—will include dredging of the present basin, landscaping and improving the harbor area, and construction of a beach with the sand lifted from the basin floor.

Two heavy timber groins will be built along the beach area to help hold the sand in place.

The Frandolig Island project is still in the future—but there's a chance it will jell within the next two or three years.

It calls for construction of still another harbor for commercial, charter, and pleasure boats, and development of the remainder of the island into a recreational area.

The Rockport-Fulton waterfront development program ties in with the approved plans by the federal government to dredge an Intracoastal Canal "short cut" which will bring the bulk of canal traffic close to shore in front of Rockport, Aransas Pass, and Ingleside.

The "short cut" would trim almost four miles off the present canal route by eliminating a swing out to Port Aransas on Mustang Island and down the Corpus Christi ship channel.

The project has already been approved, but presently is awaiting the appropriation of funds by the U. S. Congress.

The U. S. oil industry celebrated its 95th "Birthday" in August. That's the month in which the first well was drilled in Titusville, Pa., in 1859.

Securities Corporation, First of Texas Corp., premium \$6011, with net interest of 1.675.

These bonds will finance a long range development of a chain of harbors and beaches along the Rockport-Fulton waterfront which promises to touch off the biggest recreational and industrial boom ever known to this section of the Texas coast.

The plan—mapped for the Navigation District by the engineering firm of Lockwood and Andrews—calls for:

1. Immediate construction of new harbors in front of the Fulton business district and in the Cove area south of Rockport.
2. Improvement and dredging of the existing Rockport harbor.
3. Creation of bathing beaches with the sand removed from the Rockport and Fulton harbors.
4. Eventual purchase of Frandolig Island—a strip of land in Aransas Bay directly between Fulton and Rockport—for development of an offshore harbor, park, and beach.

"We know we must keep pace with progress if our communities are to continue to grow and to prosper," said Norvell Jackson, chairman of the Navigation District board.

"With the shrimp fleets of the Gulf concentrated in our area, we have a greater demand for berthing places than ever before."

"That demand is compounded by the increase in marine activities in connection with oil development in our tidelands, and by the constantly-growing number of pleasure boats in the Rockport-Fulton area."

"We simply are trying to meet the needs of our area—and we know very well that if we don't we cannot possibly move ahead."

The biggest immediate expenditure—\$240,000—will go into the development of a harbor at Fulton which will have stalls to accommodate approximately 130 commercial, charter, and pleasure boats.

The harbor will be 10 feet deep, and it will be constructed behind a concrete breakwater which was built earlier by the Navigation District.

"We believe from the number of requests we have received in the past for harbor space that we shouldn't have any trouble making the Fulton harbor a busy place," Jackson said.

"Many of the shrimp boats operating in the Gulf right now have no permanent berthing place for the simple reason that there aren't enough places to go around."

problems first, and then plan to remedy them. The approach must be tailored to fit the case.

Juvenile delinquency is increasing, Mr. Daniel said, because the number of youngsters is increasing. However, he pointed out, the actual percentage of delinquency remains about the same.

As each year passes, he said, more and more governmental units are realizing that everyone has a responsibility for children's welfare, and that old methods of dealing with the problem have not brought satisfactory results.

At the same time, he pointed out, the entire population—community and state—has a responsibility. Nevertheless, he said, the child's family is still the most important influence in his life. The home shapes and develops his personality, and the family is the key to a child's character.

The church can do much to reinforce the family's role, by helping a child achieve personal and social integrity. It can help young people to arrive at a scale of values, and give them spiritual faith and confidence in issues at stake in life, and responsibilities of citizenship.

"When you see a community that has weak churches," Daniel said, "and schools with the attitude that the sole responsibility of the teachers is to teach, you will find a community that has nothing constructive for its youth. Youth has a natural desire for fun and excitement, and those desires will be met in one way or another, either by constructive means, or by destructive means."

"It is how the community meets this problem, and how it is constantly changing to meet the particular needs of its youth, that the adequacy of uplift of a community can be determined."

"The challenge of youth must be met. Community growth must be continuous—not a hot and cold situation—and it must be all-embracing, combining the efforts of all families, all schools, and all churches. Unless these conditions are complied with, delinquency will grow; and social problems will multiply until the time and expense involved will present an insurmountable obstacle, too great for community resources to overcome."

A question and answer period followed Mr. Daniel's talk.
