The current count shows 1172 whites, 591 boys and 581 girls, and 16 negroes, seven boys and nine girls. The census includes all children who will

> CHANGES IN YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

Today, I want to explain the provisions in the 1954 amendments to the Social Security Act as they relate to agricultural employees. Farm operators will want to know about these changes if they have hired help on their farms or if they work for some other farm em-

Before 1955 a work regularity test kept many farm workers from building social security protection for themselves and their families, but under the new law, the test of regularity for farm employees has been eliminated. Beginning January 1, 1955, the farm helper is included under social security if he earns \$100 in cash wages from any one farm operator in a calendar year.

If the farm employee is paid from \$100 to \$200 in cash wages in a year by one farm employer, he will earn one quarter of socia security credit. He will be credited with two quarters if he earns \$200 to \$300 in a year, and he will receive three quarters if he makes between \$300 and \$400 in wages from the same farmer. For cash wages of \$400 or more in a year from a farm employer, the farm worker will be credited with four quarters of coverage or credit for the entire year. His earnings up to \$4,200 will be reported for social security purposes. Total cash wages of less than \$100 paid to him by any one farmer will not be credited to his social security account.

The farm operator will report the wages that he has paid to his employees and he will send social security taxes to the Director of Internal Revenue, Austin, Texas. 





The final decision for annexing the above mentioned area to the San Patricio Soil Conservation District lies with the resident land-owners holding title to land within the proposed area.

According to law, this teritory can be annexed to the San Patricio Soil Conservation District if two-thirds of the resident landowners within the territory file a petition making the request. The petition has been drawn up and is now being circulated by Mr. Blackie Rouquette. Mr. Rouquette will try to contact each of the landowners in person but in case he has been unable to reach you, and you are interested in signing this petition you can contact him at Rockport, Phone No. 3719 or at his home in Fulton.

Who is in the San Patricio Soil

Conservation District? Local land owners and operators who have agreements with the District to carry out a sound soil and water and plant conservation plan on their farms and ranches. Land owners, after voting to establish a district under the state law, elected five land owning farmers and ranchers as District Supervisors to handle the business of the District. Neither the State nor Federal government controls these men. These men give their time unselfishly and are not on salary. These men represent the land owning cooperators in the District in the vital work of soil and water conservation. Therefore, in essence, the San Patricio Coil Conservation District is every person living in the District because each citizen is vitally concerned with the result of the District.

How does the San Patricio Soil Conservation District operate? Even though the District is a legal subdivision of the state it was organized by land woners and is operated by and for the land owner. The work of the

District is handled through the five locally elected Supervisors. The San Patricio Soil Conservation Service under which technicians are provided to help landowners in the following: (1) Make surveys to obtain scientific information needed to make accurate recommendations on land use and treatment (2) Assist the farmer and rancher in the development of a scientifically and economically sound farm and ranch plan for his land (3) Assist the farmer and rancher to bring about the proper use and treatment of his land in accordance with the plan (4) Technical assistance in program maintenance where the conservation practices have been applied but where (a) changes in ownership, (b) changes in the system of farming, or (c) new or improved technology required further technical assistance from the Soil Sonservation Service.

How long has this been going on in the San Patricio Soil Conservation District?

The District began work in March, 1947 after a plan of operations was developed by local land owners. These land owners reached an agreement with the Soil Conservation Service to furnish technical assistance and the Sinton Work Unit was established. Educational and other valuable assistance is furnished by the County Agent, Home Demonstration Agent, Vocational Agriculture Teachers and others.

-INCOME TAX FACTS No. 1-New Federal Tax Law May Save You Money

The "Ides of March" will no longer hold any terror for the assessed taxpayer, but the new tax deadline of April 15 can be just as ala if you don't start early to prepare your federal income tax return.

Most taxpayers report their income for the calendar year on a cash basis, and the new rules are explained here as they apply to these typical taxpayers. Anyone who uses a different fiscal year or reports on an accrual basis should check the official instructions to see how he is affected.

Completely Revised Tax Rules

Last August the Internal Revenue Code was completely overhauled by Congress and thousands of changes were made affecting taxpayers. It is estimated that every year a million taxpayers overpay their income taxes by a total of more than \$100,000,000. More milions of taxpayers pay less tax than is due. making them liable for assessments, interest and possible penalties.

With the many changes of the new law there is even greater danger of mistakes this year unless you read the instructions and prepare

your tax return with great care. This is a good reason for starting long before April 15. Here's another:

You May Get a Refund

If you find that more tax has been withheld from your wages than you actually owe, you will be entitled to a refund of the difference. The sooner you file your return, the sooner you are likely to get your

What are the chances of a re fund? Well, your tax will probably be less because of the reduction of approximately 10% in tax rates since last year, but you have been

your pay.

Many newly authorized deductions, however, may cut down your tax bill below the amount that has been withheld, thus entitling you to a refund.

New Savings This Year

Here are some of the changes, to be discussed in later articles, which may cut your tax this year:

1. More single persons are entitled to "head-of-household" status. 2. Medical expenses are deductible to a greater extent. 3. Certain health and accident

benefits are not counted as income. 4. The \$600 exemption applies to various dependents not previously eligible.

5. A special deduction of as much as \$600 for child care is now available in some cases to working wives. widowed and divorced persons. 6. Tax may be reduced by new credits for dividends and retirement

7. Salesmen and other employees who travel may benefit from new rules on expense deductions. 8. New provisions may benefit

anyone who bought or sold a home in 1954. 9. Farmers get new deductions

10. Businesses are helped by liberalized depreciation rules and other changes.
