In a Chevrolet station wagon that he had fitted up for living, William C. Wilson, 74 years old, was found dead today, about 1:00 p.m., by Mrs. William Bardwell, of the Shell Shoppe.

Other bids were as follows: Constructors, Inc., of Hoston, bid \$248,840 on sheet steel construction, \$239,950 on concrete; F. & C. Engineering Company: \$241,300 on steel, \$245,750 on concrete; Austin Bridge Company, Dallas: \$230,144 for steel piling, \$228,-454 for concrete; Marine Construction Company, Port Lavaca: \$233,611 for steel, \$225,966 for concrete; and Brown and Root, Inc., who bid \$309,740 on the steel piling, and made no bid on the concrete.

The Board authorized Chairman Norvell Jackson to execute the contract as soon as the Richardson Company had satisfied the conditions of the contract docu ment. More than thirty people were present at the opening of the bids.

In our international relations, countries we have fought against in wartime suddenly have become valuable allies.
