

If we expect to grow we must preserve the old familiar things as well. Modern structures do not possess the sentimental values we have for old things although they may add beauty to our town. Don't we have room for both?

There are so many vacant lots in Rockport that I am sure you can find a place suitable for the new building, but please, let's preserve this old and time-worn friend for posterity.

The red and yellow rings of the coral snake touch one another, while those of the harmless species are separated by a black ring.

> The harmless species most closely resembling the coral is probably the Mexican milksnake, found in South Texas as far north as Kerrville. Two relatives, Cope's milk snake and the western milk snake are much like it in coloration.

Unlike most poisonous snakes, the coral is a burrower, coming out at night or after a warm rain to feed on small lizards and snakes. It is generally found in or under retten logs or other trash.

Unlike the rattler, the coral does not coil and strike, but sways the forward part of its body from side to side until it can take hold and begin to chew with its short fangs, which are not hollow, but which have grooves in their sides

and confusion, but what are the real evils which need correcting? Is the problem simply one of

too many campaigns, too much organizing and soliciting, too many 'gimmes"? Or is the problem actually that

the total given in all the separate campaigns still leaves unmet eds and unsolved proble that the real task is to find means of raising the maximum of funds and of diverting every possible penny from campaign costs to service programs? The records show that united fund campaigns do raise more money-that typical American voluntary co-operation

Thorough analysis and accurate definition of the problem are half the solution. By doing a painstaking job on this, the committee can pave the way to success, not only in organizing, but also in operating a united fund campaign in the years to come.

According to the latest survey of fisheries prospects, shrimp prices should remain fairly steady red from Terrell in East Texas during the second quarter of the

> Landings of shrimp during the first quarter were light but generally increase during May and June each year, although the majority of landings usually occur during the third and fourth quar-

> Imports of shrimp in 1954 amounted to over 41 million pounds, slightly exceeding the five year average of preceding years. However, they were over a milhion and a half pounds less in January than they were in the same month in 1954.

Shrimp in cold storage on March 1 was less than 23 million pounds, nine per cent less than those of 1954, but 19 per cent higher than the previous five year average.


Average frozen shrimp wholesale prices at Chicago rose from 13 cents lower than similar shrimp sold for in March, 1954. However, if prices continue to increase, crease, movement of frozen shrimp will be slowed down as landings


