County Voters to Express Sentiments On New Courthouse Saturday

The polls open at 8 a.m. Saturday, to allow Aransas County voters to express their wishes for or against a new courthouse, and will remain open until 7 p.m. that evening.

This marks the third try of the Commissioners' Court to attain such facilities for the county, and to replace the 65-year-old building that has been found entirely inadequate

The Proposition

The proposition to be submitted to the voters reads:

"Shall the Commissioners' Court of Aransas County, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of the said county in the total principal sum of Four Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$400,000), to mature serially at such time as may be deemed most expedient by the Commissioners' Court, but not later than fifteen (15) years from the date thereof, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed Three Per Centum (3%) per annum, and to levy ad valorem taxes sufficient to pay the interest on the said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal thereof at maturity, for permanent improvement purposes, to-wit: the construction and erection of the county courthouse and jail building in the City of Rockport, the County Seat of Aransas County, Texas, pursuant to authority conferred by the construction and laws of the State of Texas."

\$171,775.36. Of this, oil companies and others, with an assessed valuation of \$13,706,445, would pay for \$137,-064.45.

This leaves a balance of \$34,-710.91 for people who own real property in the county to pay. **Real Property Owned**

Outside County

The following figures are based on county tax records.

Over 75% of the real property in Aransas County is owned by people living outside Aransas County, who would pay \$26,038.18 of this halance.

Citizens of the county, the only ones who can vote on the bond issue, own less than 25% of the real property, and would contribute only \$8,677.73, or 5.05% of the total taxes.

As there is no raise in rate or assessed valuation contemplated, this would mean that 5.05% of the money paid now as county taxes, in any one year, by citizes of the county, would be devoted to the courthouse. The balance of the cost would be borne by oil companies and others.

What This Means
