Clean-up Week Scheduled For May 23-28

Spring Clean-Up Week in Rockport and Fulton is scheduled for May 23-28, according to Carl Osborn, fire marshal, who pointed out that this week, Clean-Up Week is an excellent time for families to begin a campaign against fire. He makes the following recom-

First, throw out all combustible rubbish you can find in your home. Everyone can help. And as you clean each room, look around for other fire hazards there.

For instance, you may find frayed electric cords, or outlets that are carrying more than their share of appliances, or fuses bigger than the 15-ampere ones recommended for most household circuits. There may be too few ashtrays handyor the ashtrays may be too small, or the kind that tip over easily. You may notice that kitchen curtains are hanging dangerously near a gas burner, or that your stove needs to be cleaned of grease that has accumulated in the oven or broiler.

After all possible hazards have been corected, you may think the campaign is over-but instead, it's only beginning. Fire plays tricky rules. It can be your friend so convincingly that you may forget how easily it can become your enemy if you lower your guard.

Eighteen members of the San Antonio Audubon Society and three members of the Houston Outdoor Nature Society made a with the Hagar's at Rockport Cottages.

The trip was primarily aimed at studying migratory and nesting birds in the Rockport and Fulton area. Members of the party reported that close to one hundred species of birds were seen in the two days they spent here.

Highlights of the trip were the sight of 18 roseate spoonbills, 20 buff-breasted sandpipers, 15 Wilson's phalaropes, 10 glossy ibis, 1 yellow-crowned night heron, species of terns, 9 species of sandpipers, many Cassin's sparrows, 20 eastern kingbirds, 2 yellowbilled cuckoos, and 12 white peli-

cans, besides the usual water birds. There were also hundreds of migrating barn swallows, lark sparrows, and red-backed sandpipers in the area.





2,626 Texans Enter Armed Forces in April While 4,904 Discharged

Austin, Tex. - While 2,626 Texans were entering the armed forces in April, 4,904 were separated, it was shown Tuesday on an official report sent to Washington by the office of the state director of Selective Service.

Lt. Col. Morris S. Schwartz, deputy state Selective Service director, said that, of the 2,626 Texans who entered the armed forces in April, 2,225 went in by enlistment, the remaining 401 going in through the draft boards.

While these men were beginning and ending military service, a total of 5,998 young men, mostly 18-year-olds, registered with the state's 137 draft boards. Practically all of the total registration involved males reaching their 18th

The federal draft law requires that all males in the United States register with a draft board on their 18th birthday, or within five

days thereafter. State Selective Service boards forwarded only 67 men during April for physical-mental examinations for military service. Thirty-five of this number were accepted by the army, the remaining 32 being rejected.

ANGLERS DROWN AT RECORD RATE

Austin, Tex. - Texas fishermen and boaters are drowning at a record rate so far this year, according to Game and Fish Commission records.

The Commission's executive secretary said game wardens blame mainly carelessness and inexperience in operating new and strange watercraft equipment.

Eighteen fishing and boating fatalities already have been reported this year. The total as compiled by the State Board of Health for the entire year of 1954 was only 44 victims involving small boats.

The executive secretary said nost of the fatalities in this year's unprecendented toll are from boats overturning principally from power causes or from rough water.

The 44 small boat victims in 1954 were in addition to the 397 persons who drowned from all other causes in Texas. This was an increase of 42 over the 1953 casualty figure.

The 1955 death rate has become o alarming that some remedial steps have been advocated. The Fort Worth United States Engineers office announced that small craft warning stations have been installed at Garza-Little Elm Reservoir. Houston city authorities have become officially concerned over the dangers in Lake Houston as reflected by fatalities. And the Corpus Christi Caller-Times newspaper editorially advocated definite safety measures after the second drowning this year in Lake Corpus Christi. Fifty persons have drowned in this lake






