## **Strangest Fish of** All Brought to **Pilot Office**

brought the strangest fish of all to The Pilot office last Monday, for it was made of stone-a fossil of tremendous age.

The part Wright showed us (the forward half of the fish) was a little over a foot long, with gill cover and scales in perfect condition. Apparently, when it was alive it much resembled a red, and must have weighed three of four pounds.

This fish, a million or two years ago, swam in the great sea which covered Texas and reached far up nto Kansas.

One day it died and dropped to the bottom, where it was covered with silt which sealed it off and protected it from decomposition. Slowly, through untold ages the perfectly formed body turned to stone. Its original material was completely removed by solution, and as it was dissolved was replaced by minerals which preserved the structure of its scales and body, until at last they became hard and flint-like-a true fossil.

At the same time this happened, the silt in which it was covered also became rock.

Geological ages came and passed; the sea receded; and that part of the sea bottom in which the fossil was embedded became dry land-perhaps even hills-through which a river flowed.

## Man Injured In Plane **Crash On Padre Island**

James E. Simmons, 57, of Lovington, N. M., and Rockport, who was injured in the crash of a light plane early Wednesday on Padre Island, was in fair condition last night at Memorial Hospital. The crash occurred about 6 a. when a Beechcraft "Bonanza" struck a sand dune while landing and nosed over on the Laguna Madre side of Padre several miles below the causeway.

The budget in its final form was as follows:

Office expense, \$7,000 (down \$500); building repairs, \$1,000 (new item); operations, \$8,000 (up \$4,200); street fund \$12,000 (up \$6,000); street lights, \$2,500 (up \$1,200); garbage collection, \$15,-000 (up \$4,200); fire department \$1,00 (up \$500); social security, \$300 (new item); sewer improvement bonds, \$1,200 (same); school refuding bonds, \$1,300 (same).

Among minor items, the fire marshal's salary was advanced from \$25 per year to \$56.

City valuations have increased \$562,340. Last year they were \$2 .-468,220; this year they are \$3,-030,850. Of this \$2,468,510 are real values, and \$562,340 personal property.

Based on a 90% collection, the receipts from the coming year were forecast as follows:

Taxes, \$41,914; delinquent taxes, \$3,430; penalty and interest, \$156; franchise taxes, \$3,800; occupation taxes, \$675; building permits, \$400; miscellaneous, \$500; dog fees, \$125.

Water Superintendent Tom Shults was authorized to proceed with the construction of a 26x60 foot structure on the old sewer site, to house city vehicles and equipment.

It was agreed that repairs long needed for the city hall should be carried out; a new street light was okehed for the V.F.W. corner; and the council decided to install mercury vapo rlights along Austin Street. In addition, funds were set aside for street sweeping, repairs to garbage trucks, and

All these are included in the budget as outlined above.
