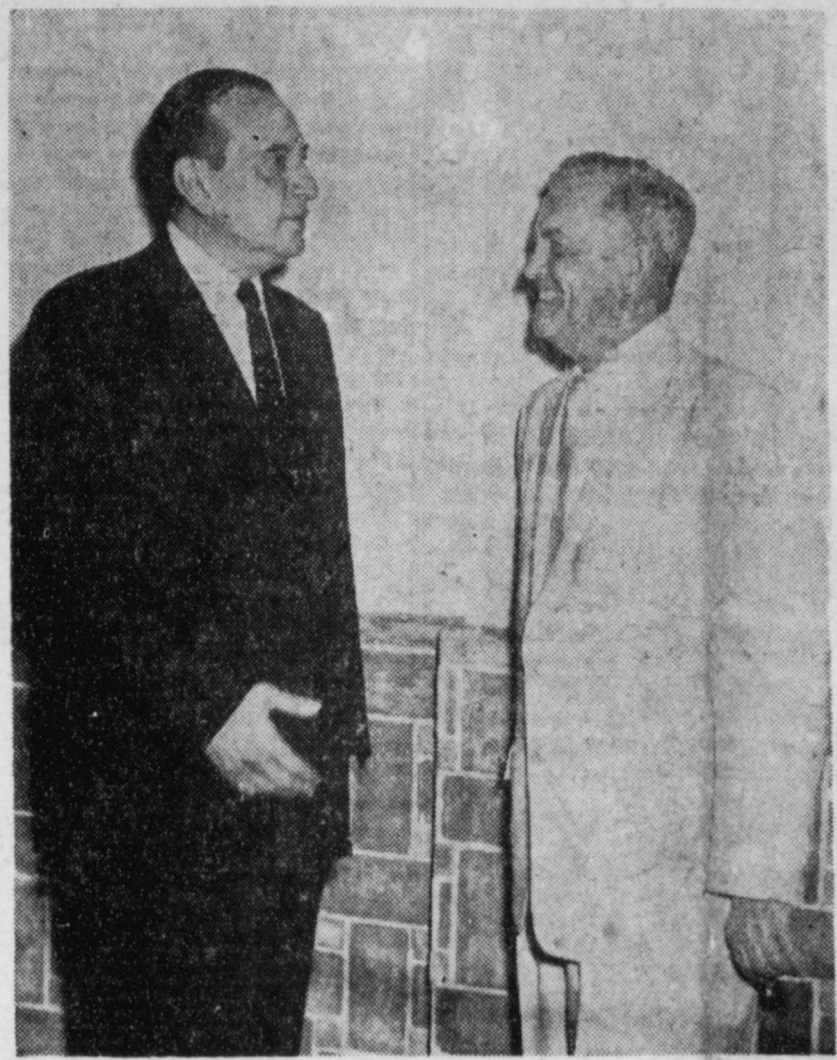

## USUAL 60-DAY DUCK SEASON SEEN

Texas Waterfowl hunters seem assured of a sixty-day season this fall, according to Howard Dodgen, executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

He said nesting reports from Canadian marshes indicate that the hatch has been normal, and that the large duck and goose population that migrated northward last spring will be increased to "satisfactory proportions."

The breeding duck populations in the prairie provinces are the highest in recent years and nesting conditions generally appear to be favorable for the production of young, it was learned from the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Biologists working in the area said that early migration of the wild ducks and geese combined with good surface-water and delayed plowing by farmers set the scene for the successful nesting by most species.

The biologists reported that when migrating waterfowl moved northward in the spring they found drier conditions in the north-central states and moved into Canada where they found highly favorable conditions.

"We have every reason to believe now that the Washington authorities, who have the final say on seasonal regulations, will follow our commission's recommendations and allow the full 60-day shoot," said Dodgen.

"Of course, we won't know definitely before around Aug. 15. The National Flyway Council meets in Washington Aug. 8 to correlate reports from the various flyways preliminary to reaching its final conclusions.

"This group serves as a consulting agency to the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, the Department of Interior, which has final authority on all regulations concerning migratory game birds."

The commission recommended a 60-day season, the same as last year, with the opener Friday, Nov. 4. Bag limits would be the same—five ducks per day and ten in possession and five geese per day and five in possession."

Mrs. Mary Lake Segler, city secretary, attended a three-day "How to Do It" school for tax assessors which opened last Monday at the Rice Hotel, Houston, with more than 100 tax assessor-collectors from over the state attending.

The seminar was sponsored jointly by the Texas Association of Assessing Officers and Texas League of Municipalities.

The school sessions outlined methods of appraising buildings and property and the setting of values on such properties.

Principal speakers Monday were Phil Loving, chief appraiser of the Ft. Worth tax department; Aubrey Jones, tax assessor-collector of Pampa; Robert Cherry and William S. Hughes, both of Texas A&M College.

Fred Ankenman, Houston tax assessor-collector, was presiding chairman. During her absence, Mrs. Savage had charge of the duties of the office.

Managers and top executives from an eight-state area attended special courses of study with lectures by leaders in chamber of commerce work from throughout the country. Purpose of the institute, according to James G. Roberts, manager of the Southwestern Division of the national organization, was to both educate and inspire chamber executives to meet tomorrow's challenge in the cities in which they serve.

# Council Approves Street Lights on Austin, Market

## Mrs. Rene Hogue Killed In Wreck Tuesday Night

Mrs. Rene Hogue was killed, and her brother-in-law, Leander B. Hogue, critically injured in a two-car wreck on Highway 35, about three miles north of Rockport, Tuesday night at 11 p. m. Both were from Aransas Pass. Also injured were Ray Leon Smith, driver of the other car, and Alvin Linn, both of Rockport.

Hogue and his sister-in-law were in a 1951 Chevrolet which, from all appearances was struck by the old model Buick convertible driven by Smith, as almost the entire right side of Hogue's car, from just aft of the engine hood to over the rear wheels was caved in, while the front of the Buick was telescoped by the terrific impact.

Mrs. Hogue was dead on arrival at the Aransas Hospital. Hogue was in critical condition Wednesday morning, with a severe concussion and possible fractures of the skull, and had only partially recovered consciousness, according to Dr. H. F. Elliot, attending physician.

Smith was treated for a broken right arm and head lacerations, but was released from the hospital Wednesday morning.

Linn suffered from multiple lacerations over his entire body, a broken ankle, broken ribs, and slight head injuries. He is still in the hospital.

## Birth Certificates Needed For Children Entering School For First Time

Birth certificates will be required for children entering Aransas County schools for the first time in September.

Since Bureaus of Vital statistics are so rushed near the opening of each new school term, it is advisable that parents of prospective beginners obtain their certificates early, according to Albert Griffith, Jr., principal of Rockport Elementary.

Children born in Aransas County will find their birth certificates or record in the county clerk's office, or a copy may be obtained from the State Health Department's Bureau of Vital Statistics in Austin. Those born out of the county will find a certificate of record in the city where the birth occurred.

## Whispering Wind Wins Yacht Race

The Whispering Wind, owned by Norman C. Holmes of Corpus Christi, won the annual Corpus Christi to Galveston yacht race last weekend.

The Whispering Wind was adjudged the winner Monday after computations of handicaps had been completed. The boat won first of the fleet and first in Class A. The boat made the 155 miles in 24 hours and 43 minutes, and arrived in Galveston at 10:13 a. m. Sunday.

Sinsonte, owned by Carroll Blanchard of Houston, was second in Class A. Amada, owned by McKay and Wendell of Houston, won Class B, with Star Dust second. Star Dust is owned by George Francisco of Rockport.

Last in the race was the Mistress, which arrived Sunday night at 9:25 o'clock. The Confucious, property of William Edwards of Houston, withdrew and went into Freeport to dock.

## Confer With Officials of C.P.&L. And Decide On Mercury Vapor Lights

The City Council, at its regular meeting Monday night, conferred with officials of the Central Power and Light Company, and decided to install 35 new mercury vapor lights, replacing some of the older style lights now in use, and augmenting the number the city now has.

Starting at the corner near Curly Floyd, four lights will be installed one block apart on Market Street, and a fifth at the intersection of Market and Highway 35.

Beginning at Market, twenty lights will be installed on Austin Street at approximately 100 foot intervals. These are to be spaced in such a manner that they will eliminate shadows, and are of the same type as those now used by Aransas Pass. They will extend to the T. Noah Smith corner.

The other lights will be installed on Highway 35. Five of them, at block intervals, will reach from the Smith home to Pearl Street, where the new farm-to-market road joins the highway near the ball park. Five more at similar intervals, will reach from the Smith corner out Broadway, toward Duck Inn.

According to B. T. Hardeman, of Central Power and Light, these lights should be installed and in operation by Oct. 1.

Water Superintendent Tom Shults was authorized to investigate and report on the cost of a small tractor with necessary equipment for mowing weeds and handling dirt, as well as sweeping the streets.

State health officers who had investigated complaints on sanitary violations in the city reported that owners had been contacted, and in most cases had proved very cooperative, doing everything necessary to combat the nuisance.

One outcome of the meeting was the council's instruction to Ross Terry to press collection of delinquent city taxes, as there are quite a number of pieces of property whose owners are far in arrears.

Members also considered the advisability of obtaining an estimate on the cost of drainage work badly needed in the city, and the need for a zoning ordinance.

After visiting in Ireland, his mother will accompany him on a Continental trip, to visit the Shrine of Our Lady of Lourdes, in France, and Schoenstatt, Germany, where the Sisters who teach in Sacred Heart School have their headquarters.

From Schoenstatt Father O'Doherty and his mother will go to Rome.

This is his first trip home in seven years, and he will be gone until the latter part of September, when he will return to Rockport.

During his absence from his pastorate, the Redemptorist Fathers will be here in charge for the first month, followed by the Fathers of the Holy Family, who will hold services during the rest of the time Father O'Doherty is absent.

The Redemptorist Fathers will hold a two-weeks mission, starting Sunday—the first week for ladies of the church, the second week for the men. A special children's mission will be held on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday, August 1-3, at 10 a. m.

The wedding will take place on Aug. 9, at 8 p. m., in the First Presbyterian Church of Rockport, and a reception at the church will follow.

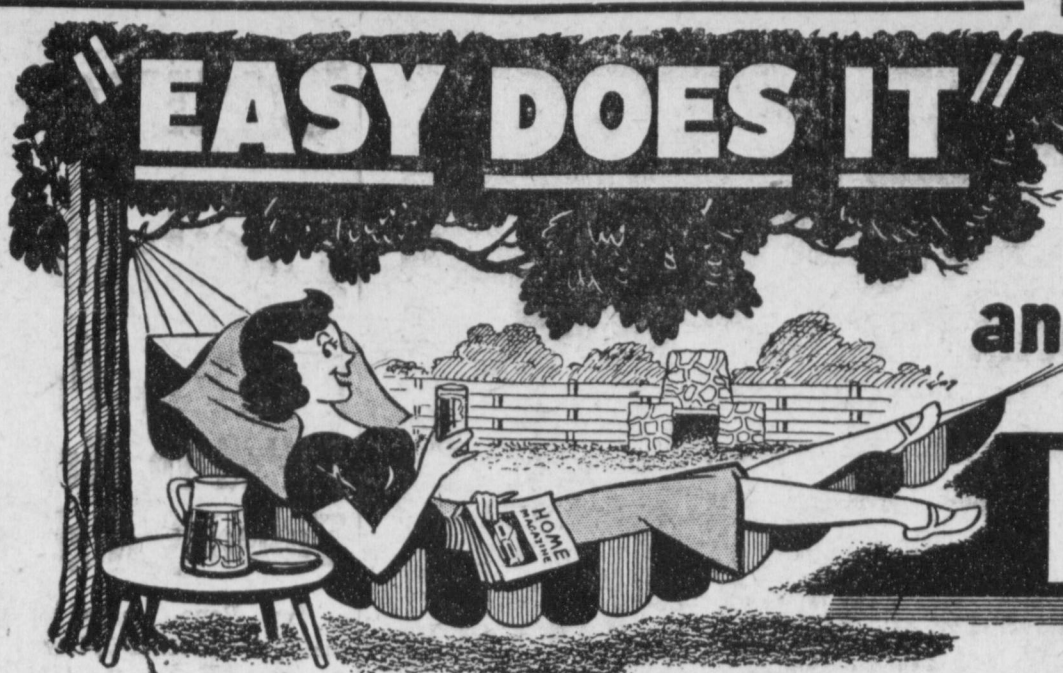

# Rockport Home of First Mechanically Refrigerated Meat Plant in America

Rockport was the home of the first mechanically refrigerated slaughter house in America, according to research done by Dean W. R. Woolrich of the School of Engineering at the University of Texas. From the machine installed in a packing house there, in 1871, by Daniel L. Holden, has grown the great meat packing industry on which America depends for much of its food.

Holden, a consulting engineer, was born in Higgensport, Kentucky, one of several brothers, and grew up in that state. During the Civil War he was Chief of the Magnetic Signal Corps with the rank of major in the Confederate Army.

Afterwards he and his brothers moved to Texas, where, among other ventures, they established a meat packery at Fulton, just north of Rockport.

In those days the great herds of longhorns that had multiplied on the Texas prairies during the conflict represented a large proportion of the available wealth in the state.

Amid such a plethora of cattle,

the great need of a market, and the lawless confusion following the war, an active trade in hides, bones, and tallow sprang up, the cattle being sold to packeries such as the one belonging to the Holdens.

The requirements for setting up such an establishment were simple, and the result was that at one time during the early seventies a dozen or more, including that belonging to the brothers, were exporting their products through Rockport. This was the center of the business in Texas, and rivaled Galveston in importance as a shipping point.

These packeries used no ice, and converted the meat into what was known as "mess" beef, from the fact that it was a common item of diet in the army. This was quoted at \$10 a 200-pound barrel in the 1840's.

Captain Richard King, who established his great ranch in 1853, and who for years was a partner of Mifflin Kenedy, another Rio Grande steamboat captain, tried a variant on this, even before the Civil War. He attempted to preserve the meat for shipment by infusing brine into the veins of the cattle immediately after they were slaughtered.

The experiment was unsuccessful, so he continued in the time-tried Spanish way, and had his Mexicans pour the tallow into barrels, hang the hides on the fence until they were needed, and throw the meat out to feed the hogs.

As a matter of fact, this was what happened to most of the meat. At many of the plants the cooked meat, after tallow was rendered, formed a favorite hog food, while some parts of the cattle, such as the loin, which had no tallow were fed raw to the pigs or given away free to anyone who would haul them off. Beef-steak by the wagon load was available for the taking.

Much of the waste from Rockport factories went into the bay, where schools of fish fed upon it and were easily netted. There was also a mound of decaying cattle carcasses, five or six acres in extent, on shore, that stunk to high heaven, and at which migratory ducks and geese feasted in thousands during their winter sojourn in the south.

Holden, seeking a way to turn this waste to some account, began exploring the possibilities of mechanical ice machines which were just being developed.

A Frenchman named Carre had developed one which would produce about 500 pounds of ice a day, and just prior to the Civil War one of these had been landed at Matamoras, Mexico, where it was used for a time, later being moved to San Antonio, and three more were imported in 1865.

Holden bought one of these and set it up in San Antonio, making many improvements on it. However, it was not the Carre machine that he used for the packery at Rockport, but one originally developed by a Philadelphia Dutchman, P. H. Vander Weyde, which worked on an entirely different principle.

Holden bought Vander Weyde's patent and began to improve on it, finally building a machine that worked much in the manner of those we have today, although, of course, it was much more primitive. It compressed ammonia which was carried through brine tanks by a series of coils, expanding as it went, and absorbing the heat from the brine.

He tried out his first machine in New Orleans, and installed another at Memphis, and in 1869 took out other patents on the improvements in his own name. By this time he had installed the improved machines in Galveston, Houston, and Bonham, Texas, for the purpose of making ice, which was frozen in cans suspended in the brine, chilled below the freezing point of fresh water.

In 1871 he installed a complete compression system at the packery in Fulton, and this unit was used to chill and cure beef for shipment to Liverpool. This plant, according to Dean Woolrich, "was evidently the first mechanically refrigerated abattoir in the United States." (Editor's note: Dean Woolrich's paper was called to our attention by Harry Traylor, who helped on some of the original research).

### Survey to Probe Fishing Craft Insurance Problems

A nationwide survey aimed at bringing about lower insurance rates for domestic fishing craft by reducing losses was announced today by Secretary of the Interior Douglas McKay.

The survey will be conducted by Boston University's Bureau of Business Research under the supervision of the Fish and Wildlife Service. It is the latest in a series of projects made possible by the Saltonstall-Kennedy Act — designed to aid the American fishing industry through research and development.

Preliminary work is now under way by virtue of a government contract whereby \$50,000 was made available to the university on June 30 for operations to extend over a period of 18 months. Personal interviews with insurance people will reveal premium incomes, claim payments, expenses, and profit or loss. Interviews with vessel owners will bring forth information on loss experiences.

Some of the more important questions to be asked in the survey are:

What are the effects of present conditions in the insurance field upon the economic situation in the fishing industry?

What is the frequency and severity of losses?

What relation do present expenditures for safety have to total cost of operation?

Why have many domestic insurance companies withdrawn from the field?

What are the problems of safety equipment and safety education in the fishing industry and can insurance costs be reduced by safety work?

What role can labor unions play

in the solution of the problem? Is there a need for new and expanded insurance programs?

Has there been (and is there still) a reluctance on the part of fishing craft owners to install safety equipment and establish safety rules?

While the scope of the survey has been determined by the Fish and Wildlife Service, the actual operations will be administered by James W. Kelley, director of the University's Bureau of Business Research, Professor Warner C. Danforth of the Bureau (directly in charge of the work), and Professor R. H. Blanchard of Columbia University who will serve as a special consultant.

**WIDOWS AND CHILDREN MAY NOW QUALIFY FOR PAYMENT**

Some persons in this area may be losing monthly social security payments because of a lack of knowledge of a new provision in the Social Security Act, according to H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi district office of the Social Security Administration.

The 1954 amendments reduced the amount of work required for a person who died between June 1940 and September 1950 to be insured. Under the present law, Cleveland said the deceased must have had only about a year and a half of social security work or creditable military service to be insured. He urged survivors of such deceased workers to check with the Social Security office about possible payments, now.

A number of claims in this area have already been reopened and benefits formerly denied are now being paid. Widows aged 65 or over, and widows with children under age 18, are affected by this change.

**Amendment of Danger Zone Off Matagorda Asked By Airforce**

An amendment of danger zone regulations governing the aerial target area off Matagorda Island has been asked by the Secretary of the Army. The proposal is in a bulletin issued by the U. S. Engineers. is as follows:

Amendment desired: The applicant requests that the existing regulations, be amended as follows: A new sub-paragraph (a) (3) will be inserted stating, "Area C". The waters of the Gulf of Mexico and of San Antonio Bay off Matagorda Island encompassed by a circle having a radius of 5 nautical miles (approximately 5.76 statute miles) centered at latitude 28° 12' 00", longitude 96° 40' 30". Existing sub-paragraph (a) (3) will be renumbered (a) (4) and the first sentence therein will be changed to state, "Areas A" and "B" will be used daily from sunrise to sunset." A new sentence will be added to the renumbered sub-paragraph (a) (4) stating, "Area C" will be used nightly from sunset to sunrise for photo flash bombing." Sub-paragraph (b) (1) will be reworded to state, "Except in an emergency involving danger to life or property, no vessel shall enter or remain in Areas "A" and "B" between sunrise and sunset or Area "C" between sunset and sunrise unless authorized to do so in writing by the enforcing agency."

This will make the new regulations, if granted, read: 204.162 Gulf of Mexico off Matagorda Peninsula and Matagorda Island, Tex., and San Antonio Bay off Matagorda Island, Tex.; Air Force practice gunnery, bombing, rocket firing and photo flash bombing ranges.

(a) THE DANGER ZONES. (1) Area "A". An area off Matagorda Peninsula approximately 59 statute miles long and 29 statute miles wide, with its north-west boundary generally parallel to and about 15 miles offshore, described as follows: Beginning at latitude 28° 41', longitude 95° 17'; thence to latitude 28° 21', longitude 94° 59'; thence to latitude 27° 55', longitude 95° 52'; thence to latitude 28° 16', longitude 96° 08'; and thence to the point of beginning.

(2) Area "B". The waters of the Gulf of Mexico off Matagorda Island encompassed by an arc of a circle having a radius of five statute miles centered at latitude 28° 17', longitude 96° 32'.

(3) Area "C". The waters of the Gulf of Mexico and of San Antonio Bay off Matagorda Island encompassed by a circle having a radius of 5 nautical miles (approximately 5.76 statute miles) centered at latitude 28° 12' 00", longitude 96° 40' 30".

(b) Use of areas. Areas "A" and "B" will be used daily from sunrise to sunset. Area "A" will be used for air-to-air gunnery and as an emergency live bomb salvo area. Prior to the salvo of live bombs, aircraft will clear the area, using both radar and visual means to insure that no vessels are in the area. Area "B" will be used for air-to-ground gunnery, dive bombing, rocket firing, horizontal bomb-

(c) The regulations. (1) Except in an emergency involving danger to life or property, no vessel shall enter or remain in Areas "A" and "B" between sunrise and sunset or Area "C" between sunset and sunrise unless authorized to do so in writing by the enforcing agency.

(2) Vessels making scheduled trips over prescribed routes will be given prior written permission to transit the danger zone by the enforcing agency. Vessels so authorized to transit the danger zones shall pass directly through without unnecessary delay and shall display such identification as may be required by the enforcing agency.

(3) The regulations in this section for Areas "A" and "B" shall be enforced by the Commanding Officer, Bergstrom Air Force Base, Austin, Texas, and such agencies as he may designate. The regulations in this section for Area "C" shall be enforced by the Commanding Officer, (to be determined by using agency).

**Texas Fishery Landings For April 3.9 Million Lbs.**

Landings of commercially produced fish and shellfish during April, 1955, totaled only 3.9 million pounds, compared with 4.6 million a year ago. This represents a decline of 677,600 pounds, most of which can be accounted for by the drop in menhaden production.

Total landings of all species for the first eight months of the fiscal year amounted to 65 million pounds, compared with 68.2 million for the same period last year. This drop is accounted for by the decrease in menhaden production. Last year, for the first eight months, the total production of these fish amounted to 22,324,320. This year only 8,283,040 pounds have been produced.

While menhaden dropped, there have been substantial rises in production among most of the other species of importance. For instance, redfish are running ahead of last year by 150%; trout have exceeded last year by 125%; and the drum catch has jumped from 314,143 pounds last year to nearly a million so far this year.

This, of course is to be expected. There has been no freeze since 1950-51, and the fish have had a chance to increase both in number and size, and will probably continue to do so until the next weather cold enough to destroy them.

The shrimp catch this year is also ahead of last by almost 10,000,000 pounds. During April, this area produced 1556 pounds of redfish, 10,923 pounds of trout, 1389 pounds of flounder, 2898 pounds of drum, 834 pounds of mullet, 29,036 pounds of red snapper, 208 pounds of grouper, 365 pounds of mackerel, 2425 pounds of gafftops, 29 pounds of pompano, 1154 pounds of warsaw, 667 pounds of scrap fish, 776, 170 pounds of red shrimp, and 7601 pounds of white shrimp.

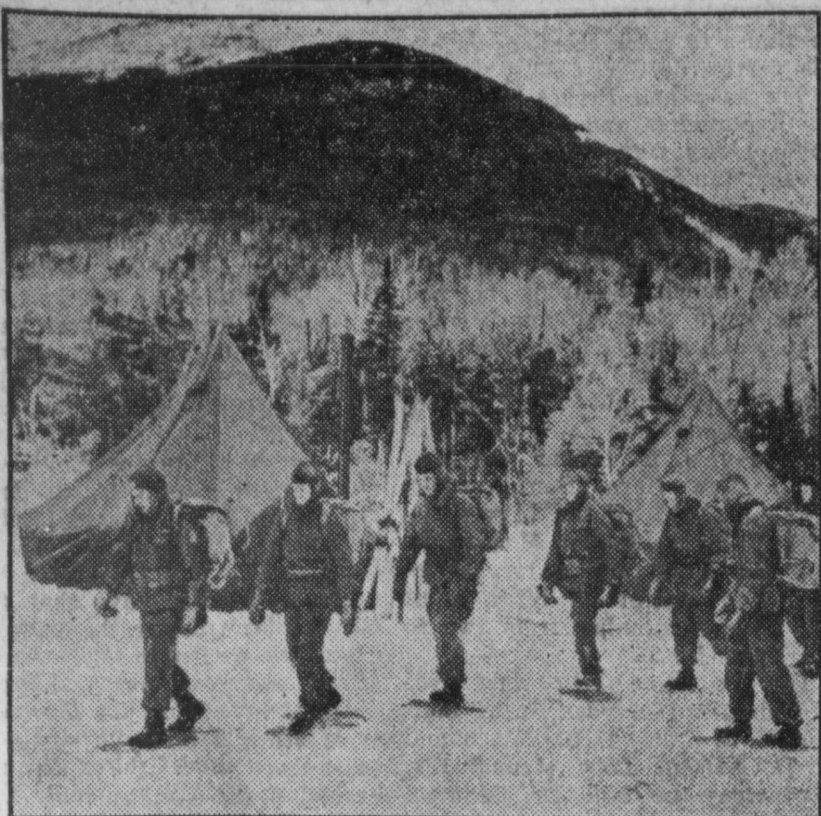

**ARE YOU FILLING YOURSELF WITH CLEANING FLUIDS?**

The following is taken from a lecture given at the recent Firemen and Fire Marshal Training School at A&M College by a research chemist from Chicago, according to Carl Osborne, Fire Marshal.

"Carbon Tet" (Carbon tetrochloride) one of the principal ingredients of many household cleaners (often recommended because it will not burn like gasoline or naphtha) and certain types of fire extinguishers, can be a deadly poison both by absorption through the skin and by inhaling the fumes. When used without rubber gloves it is absorbed through the pores and is deposited in the liver and kidneys, being an accumulative poison (not being eliminated by these organs) it gradually breaks down the tissues of the liver and/or kidneys causing cirrhosis of the liver and kidney infections that cause serious illness or death.

The fumes of "carbon tet" are irritating to the throat and lungs at 25 parts to the million parts of air and dangerous at 50 parts to the million parts of air. Due to the fact that these fumes are not detected by the human nose until they reach 80 parts to the million, it is evident that when you can smell them you are subjecting your lungs and throat to a higher incidence than is safe. "Carbon tet" causes small blisters, containing hydrochloric acid, to form on the mucus membrane of the throat and lining of the lungs. Continued breathing of the fumes causes these blisters to burst, shutting off the supply of oxygen to the lungs, causing critical illness or death.

If this condition does not cause trouble at this point due to greater resistance of the particular person, this poison would still build up in the liver and kidneys the same as absorption through the skin.

**Precautions:** (If you must use this type of cleaner).

1. Handle only with rubber gloves, having no leaks, so it does not come in contact with the skin.
2. Use only where breeze or electric fan blows the fumes away from you. When you smell it you are in danger.
3. This gas is heavier than air, therefore make sure small children or babies are not on the floor near you as the concentration of gas could be fatal to them before you noticed the fumes.

**Symptoms:** (These may not show up for from two to 10 days in mild cases) Sore or irritated throat, shortness of breath, nausea, loss of coordination of muscles, especially of hands and arms, dizziness, violent headache, coma (loss of consciousness).

"Carbon tet" fire extinguishers in the home (usually a pump type or hanging glass ball). This type of extinguisher will smother a fire very quickly by shutting off the oxygen that is needed to keep the fire burning, but the same rules apply as for cleaning fluids lest you shut off the oxygen to your blood with serious or fatal results.

A further danger with "carbon tet" types of extinguishers is that when carbon tetrochloride comes in contact with extreme heat it generates phosgene gas (same as used to kill our men in the First World War) and this is dangerous at 5 parts to the million parts of air, therefore if you use one of these extinguishers on a fire be sure you do not breathe any of the fumes or enter a room where one of the glass ball type has put out the fire until the place has been thoroughly ventilated.

Phosgene gas is immediately fatal if breathed when there is any alcohol in the blood stream, therefore if you have had (only one) drink stay away from any possibility that there may be some present. Also if a person is taken to a doctor for treatment of phosgene gas he should be told as the symptoms are similar to a heart attack and the administration of adrenalin would be instantly fatal in most cases.

It would be advisable to clip this article and tack it up near your fire extinguisher or in your laundry room as a reminder of the danger of using "carbon tet" products.

Further information can be obtained through the fire department or fire marshal.

A recent death caused by the use of carbon tetrochloride was that of Margo Jones, Broadway show producer. Doctors said that fumes from this fluid inhaled two weeks ago, while rugs were being cleaned in her apartment, were carried by the bloodstream to her kidneys causing uremic poisoning.

## ADDITIONS TO THE U. S. FLEET OF FISHING VESSELS, MAY, 1955

A total of 42 vessels of 5 net tons and over received first documents as fishing craft during May 1955, according to the U. S. Bureau of Customs. This represents a decrease of 52 vessels (55%), compared with the 94 fishing craft reported for the corresponding month of last year.

In the Gulf section only 6 vessels were documented, compared with 33 reported for May 1954, a decline of 82 percent. The South Atlantic and Pacific sections each had 13 additions, the Chesapeake Bay section had 4, and the Middle Atlantic and Alaska sections each had 3.

During the first five months of 1955 a total of 151 vessels were documented for the first time as fishing craft, compared with 366 for the corresponding period of last year, a decrease of 59 percent.

## WILLIAM BEETLEY HOME BUILT IN 1867

Early records show that the property on which the William Beetley home now stands was conveyed from Doughty and Mathis to W. A. Williamson, while Rockport was still a part of Refugio County, and it is presumed that he built the house about 1867.

S. G. J. Beetley, county judge, bought the house in 1873. He was judge and sheriff of Aransas County for 22 years.

There were several children in the family, including the present owner.

The original cedar blocks used in building the place are still in excellent condition, as are the timbers of the foundation. These are of hard pine, joined with wooden pegs.

The flooring is an inch thick and six inches wide. Front walls are of cypress boxing, and are sided vertically. The doorway, with hinged sidelights, opens into a center hall with large rooms on each side, and there is a shutter doorway between the hall and dining room. The thick doors are three feet by seven feet. Square nails are used in the wall, hand wrought in the old days by blacksmiths.

The outside chimney and plan have all the charm of early American architecture. (Editor's note: This description was originally prepared by Mrs. Travis Bailey for a talk given before the Woman's Club, and is one of a series being presented by The Pilot).
