

## Dist. Court Opens September Term With Very Small Docket

**Grand Jury Meets, Hands Down Five True Bills!  
Two Divorce Suits, One Trespass to Try Title  
And One Petition For Name Change Handled**

The 36th District Court, Judge W. G. Gayle presiding, opened its September term Monday with only a small docket. Civil suits were few, and the grand jury, which handed in its report Tuesday, returned only five true bills.

Everett Graves, of Harlingen, was charged with felony theft of \$300 from a purse in Bonnie and Doug's Drive In at Aransas Pass; J. W. Austin was indicted for forgery and passing; R. H. Nesbitt, held in jail at Port Lavaca, was returned to Rockport Wednesday, under indictment for passing a worthless check, and Donald E. Moore, of Victoria, was indicted for murder with malice, in connection with the slaying of Roland Thomas Dosier on May 2.

Only one man against whom an indictment was returned was still at large.

Civil suits and the setting of the docket occupied the first two days of the session.

O. S. Wyatt et al vs. Earl M. Baker et al, trespass to try title was non-suited.

W. H. Tinnerman, dba Aransas Pass Hospital, vs. Century Indemnity, suit for debt was passed for the term; George Harrington vs. P. J. Watson et al, trespass to try title is on appeal; Pat Truitt vs. Steve Truitt, divorce granted, with custody of the child awarded to the mother.

In the suit of Fulton Hoopes vs. W. C. Livingston et al, trespass to try title, judgment was granted for the plaintiff. Jesse B. Valdez vs. Antonio Valdez, the divorce was granted, with custody of the child going to the mother. The petition of Edwin Harold Keels, a minor, for change of surname was granted.

Court recessed from Tuesday evening until Thursday morning at 9:30 a. m.

### TEXANS BEGIN PAYING TAX BOOST

New laws, passed last spring by the Texas legislature, went into effect Tuesday.

Cigarettes, gasoline, beer and drivers licenses cost more today as higher taxes go into effect.

Cigarettes are up an extra penny a pack, gasoline taxes are up 1 cent a gallon and beer 16.9 cents a case. Drivers license fees double, from \$1 to \$2.

Two new statutes, one involves toughening of narcotic laws and the other involves juveniles.

The narcotics legislation provides that persons convicted of a second dope offense may be subject to life imprisonment, with a minimum sentence of 10 years.

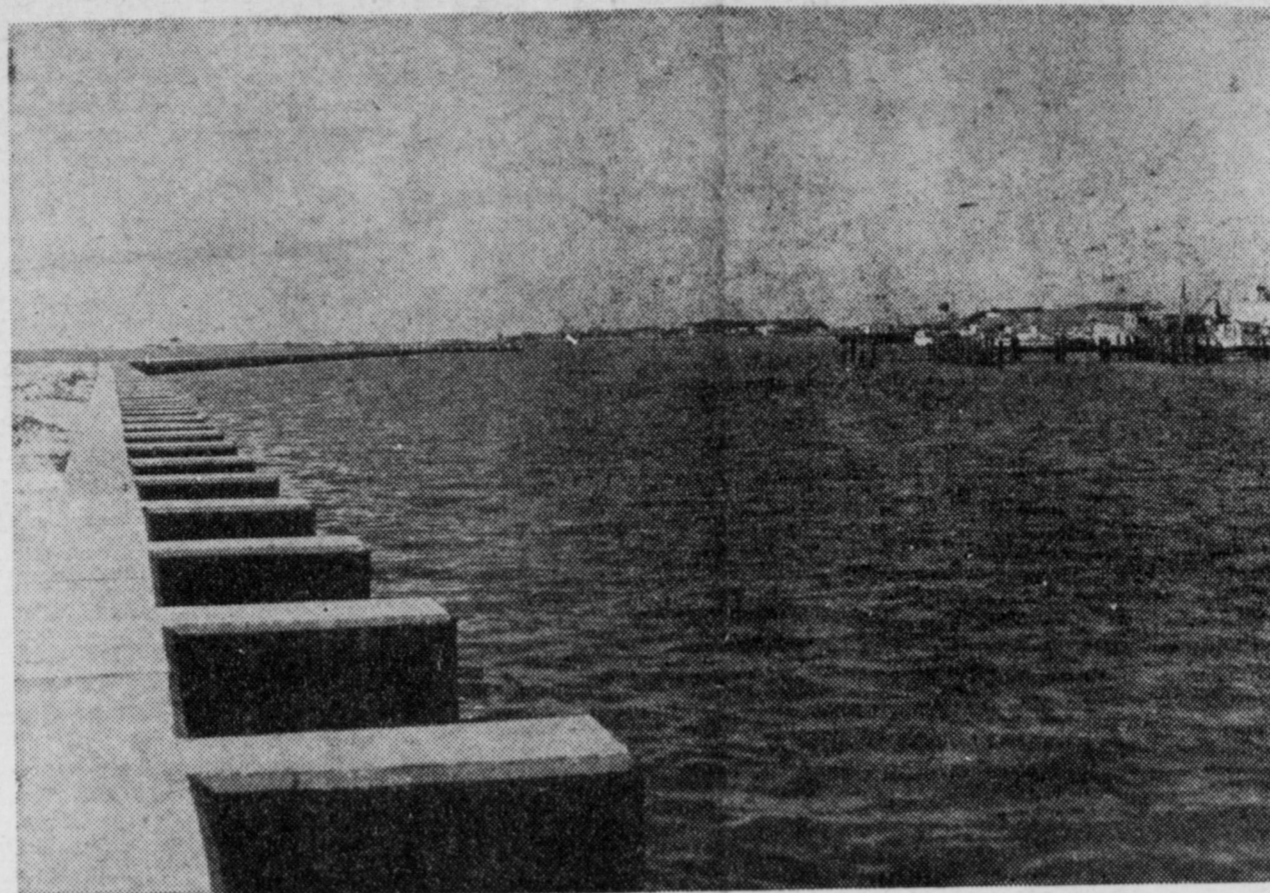
Three criminal statutes which set a minimum of a two year prison term and maximum of 25 years for persons convicted of molesting a minor.

Divorce will be made a bit more difficult by another new statute which extends the "cooling off" period between filing a divorce suit and final action. This is stretched from 30 to 60 days.

The hand of the law is strengthened in regard to possession of intoxicating liquor by minors. A new statute prohibits a person under 21 from purchasing, possessing or consuming alcoholic beverages unless accompanied by parents or a guardian or adult husband or wife.

Penalty for violation can run as high as \$100. Under the old law it was difficult to act against a minor for possession of an intoxicating beverage.

Another new statute makes it a felony to use slugs in pay telephones or to break into various types of coin-operated machines with the exception of those used for gambling.

## Navigation Board Meets; Sets Rules Governing District Harbor Operation

**Commissioners Outline Regulations for Boats Using Rockport and Fulton Basins; Set Rates For Slip Rentals; Purchase New Pick-up Truck**

The Board of Navigation and Canal Commissioners of Aransas County Navigation District No. 1, at their regular meeting Wednesday night defined the harbor and building lines at Fulton harbor; discussed progress of land acquisitions at the Cove; authorized purchase of a new pick-up truck; and approved rules and rates for operation of the district's harbors.

### 3 Wrecks Occur Here Over Weekend

Three wrecks occurred in Rockport over the weekend, all of them investigated by Deputy Sheriff Sherman Mundine.

Friday night, a 1949 Chevrolet, driven by Santiago Guerra, crashed into Well's car, parked in front of Nelda's Cafe, caroming off it, and smashing into the curb by Johnson's Drug Store. About \$700 or \$800 damage was done to Wells' automobile. The driver, Guerra, and his passenger, Felipe Garza, both fled the scene of the accident, but were picked up later.

Mundine said that Guerra was charged with DWI, while Garza was charged with being drunk in a public place.

Monday afternoon, John Henry Arthur, driving a 1935 Studebaker truck, was driving south on Highway 35, near the Triangle, when another car cut in front of him. Arthur jammed on his brakes, overturning his truck, and damaging it to the extent of \$250.

Monday evening, Warren Tistan, driving a 1947 Chevrolet, lost control of his car at an intersection in Fulton Oaks, and crashed into a corner of the carport at the Hodge residence, knocking down a post and crashing into the Hodge car. Damage to the house amounted to around \$50, Mundine said, while damage to Hodge's car was in the neighborhood of \$200.

No one was injured in any of the wrecks.

### FLOOD EMERGENCY SUCCESSFULLY MET BY RED CROSS

A. L. "Dutch" Bachman, local chairman of the Red Cross was advised in a telegram received this week that the call for emergency funds for relief of flooded areas in the east had been successfully met.

The telegram, from Ellsworth H. Bunker, at the organization's St. Louis office, read as follows:

"Wish to advise you that through generosity of the American people our chapters have today reported in contributions and pledged gifts to the Red Cross flood disaster fund more than \$10,000,000. This assures us of sufficient funds to meet adequately Red Cross requirements in eastern states flood relief operations. You are therefore authorized to inform the people within your chapter jurisdiction in whatever way seems proper to you that with funds available CMA contributed and pledged CMA no further contributions are necessary. Chapter leadership in this effort has been outstanding and we are grateful for your support. ## Harbor Opening Will Take Place Sunday

**Celebration Marks Dedication of New Basin Planned to Accommodate 130 Craft of All Types from Outboards to Big Shrimp Vessels**

The new harbor which stretches along the waterfront at Fulton ranks as one of the finest to grace the booming Texas coast and its dedication Sunday will mark the fulfillment of a long-time dream by Aransas County residents and the completion of a project actually started nearly a decade ago.

On the basis of size alone, the harbor merits its share of attention.

### Pirates Meet Mathis In Season Opener Friday

The Aransas County Pirates open their 1955 football season tomorrow night at 8 on Pirate Field, with Mathis, of District 32A, the opponent.

### Musical Educator To Help Organize Beginning Band Classes in Schools Here

The Southwest's most noted music educator, R. V. Leach, will be in Rockport Thursday and Friday, Sept. 14 and 15, to help Band Director Jerry Hoffman organize beginning band classes in the elementary and junior high schools.

Director Hoffman says that to bring the band department up to par, beginners are desperately needed, and that this offers a chance for parents with children wishing to join the band to talk to an expert on musical education.

Hoffman pointed out that this is an excellent chance for a child to acquire a low cost musical education.

The school furnishes instruction, books, and uniforms, and the student has a chance to rent an instrument for three months to see if he or she is talented enough to warrant going ahead with the instruction.

Leach and Hoffman will be at the Rockport Elementary School Thursday, Sept. 14, from 4:00 to 5:30 p. m., and from 7:30 to 9:00 p. m.

It is 1,500 feet long and its width ranges from 300 feet at its entrance to 480 feet at a point near its north end.

It has slips for 130 boats, and it can accommodate anything from a skiff to a 75-foot shrimper.

Besides it has paved parking area measuring 90 feet by 600 feet. But size alone doesn't tell the full story of this outstanding marine installation.

The Fulton harbor is a major step toward meeting the demand for new and expanded harbor facilities along the western Gulf Coast.

And—perhaps most important of all—it is a key link in the long-range development of a chain of harbors along the Aransas County waterfront by the Aransas County Navigation District No. 1.

The dedication ceremony—which is expected to attract several thousands of visitors—will start with a fish fry and shrimp dinner prepared by the Fulton Lions Club shortly after noon.

At 3:30 p. m., the harbor will be formally opened when Col. Willard D. McCrone, commander of the Galveston District of the U. S. Engineers, snips a rope across the harbor entrance.

Colonel McCrone also will deliver the main address.

Other speeches will be made by Commander William Sisley, operations officer of the Corpus Christi Naval Air Station, and Dan Chamberlain, manager of the Corpus Christi Chamber of Commerce.

Before the formal harbor dedication and speech-making start, there will be plenty of other activity.

At 1:45 p. m., a helicopter from the Corpus Christi Naval Air Station will stage a rescue demonstration in the arbor area.

At 2 p. m., a 20-member precision drill team from the Corpus Christi Naval Reserve Training Center will perform under the direction of Lieut Frank Fannin.

Immediately afterward, the same unit will stage a communications demonstration.

Following the dedication ceremony, representatives of the Port Aransas Coast Guard station will stage a vessel inspection demonstration.

The Coast Guard unit will be headed by Joseph C. Chighizola, station commander.

Throughout the afternoon, the Naval Air Station will have a crash boat on hand inside the Fulton Harbor. It will be open for inspection.

The Aransas County High School Band will provide music for the event, and Perry Horine—Corpus Christi insurance executive—will sing several patriotic songs.

Rev. George Merriman, of the Fulton Baptist Church, will make the prayer of dedication.

The Second Battalion of the 141st Infantry Regiment of the 36th Division of the National Guard will provide a weapons display. The unit is headquartered in Corpus Christi and is under the command of Major Harold Easley.

Following the afternoon program, participants in the dedication ceremony and a group of special visitors will be taken for a boat cruise along the Aransas County waterfront.

At 6:30 p. m., a reception will be held at the Live Oak Country Club. Mrs. Charles Roe Sr. and Mrs. Homer Elliot will preside.

The arrangements for the entire program are under the direction of Mayor Seth Steele of Rockport.

He will be assisted by Mrs. Mary Juergens, manager of the chamber of commerce, and Norvell Jackson, chairman of the board of commissioners of the Aransas County Navigation District No. 1.

BOARD SETS RULES

Continued from Page 1

bors shall immediately, in either of these harbors, report such arrival to the harbormaster and register his or her vessel and arrange for berthing or anchorage facilities for the said craft.

2. No one in charge of any vessel shall permit it to occupy any berth or slip without having first registered it with the harbormaster, and paying therefor the proper fee and being properly assigned to a berth or slip.

3. No person in charge of any vessel shall transfer it from one slip to another, or sub-let any berth or slip assigned to them, without having first obtained the written permission of the harbormaster. Sale or transfer of the title of any vessel shall immediately cancel the berth assignment of such vessel, and a new berth or slip assignment must be obtained from the harbormaster within 48 hours after such sale or transfer is made.

4. No person in charge of any vessel shall allow it to occupy any berth or slip until rental for said berth or slip has been paid, or allow any berth or slip to be occupied by said vessel after the period for which rent has been paid shall have expired. All rent for berths or slips is payable in advance at the harbormaster's office in Rockport.

5. No person shall operate more than one boat from a single berth or slip, except those vessels carrying skiffs, either as lifeboats, or for the purpose of transferring persons and cargo or supplies to and from such vessel, without written permission of the harbormaster.

6. All vessels to which permits for a berth or slip may be issued to occupy any berth or slip in either of the above basins shall be entitled to the use of city water and/or electricity without charge; provided, however, that if, in the opinion of the harbormaster or commissioners of the Navigation District, an excessive amount of either is used, or water or electricity is wasted, the privilege of free use of water and/or electricity may be revoked, and the occupant of the berth or slip required to install a meter and to pay for the water and/or electricity at the same rate as then prevails for domestic use by the citizens of Rockport and Fulton.

7. All docks adjacent to the slip occupied by any vessel or boat must be kept clean by the owner of said craft, and no person shall throw or allow any refuse, trash, or material of any kind to be thrown overboard into either of the basins. All surplus fish and bait must be properly disposed of by any persons having the same in their possession.

8. No person shall, at either of these harbors, leave any fish, trash, bait, refuse, or material of any kind upon any wharves, docks, T-heads, streets, or breakwater, and no person or persons shall pump the bilge of any water craft into the water of either basin, or throw or deposit any oil in said basins.

9. No person shall leave any equipment, material, or supplies on the docks or land surrounding the said harbors, unless the said material or supplies be contained within a locker, which locker shall

struct, or erect any structure of any kind on any of the T-heads, seawalls, breakwaters, berths, slips, or at any place within either the harbor at Rockport or the harbor at Fulton, or upon lands surrounding those harbors belonging to the Aransas County Navigation District No. 1 without written permission being first secured from the Board of Navigation and Canal Commissioners of Aransas County Navigation District No. 1, which board shall have complete control as to the type and specifications of such structures.

11. No person shall make any alterations or repairs or additions of any kind to the docks, slips, or appurtenances thereto within either of the said basins.

12. No vessel or water craft of any kind whatever will be permitted to moor or tie up at any place within either of said harbors, or over any submerged land owned by the Aransas County Navigation District, or to be beached on any property owned by said district, which is in a badly deteriorated condition, or which is likely to damage other vessels, or which might become a menace to navigation. Such vessels and water craft are hereby declared to be a public nuisance, and if the owner fails or refuses to remove such vessel from the property of Aransas County Navigation District No. 1, such vessel shall be removed by the harbormaster.

13. All persons injuring or damaging the docks, slips, or wharves within these basins, or property of the Aransas County Navigation District, no matter where situated, shall immediately reimburse said Navigation District in an amount equal to the cost of repairing such injury or damage. All lease agreements entered into by and between the said Aransas County Navigation District No. 1 and persons desiring to dock or moor their boats within the said harbors, or elsewhere within the property owned by the said Navigation District shall provide for a specific lien

on such vessel or watercraft, its equipment and appurtenances in case such vessel damages docks, slips, wharves, or any property of the Aransas County Navigation District within either of the above basins or elsewhere on the property of the said district by reason of negligence on the part of operators, or in the handling and operation of said vessel.

14. No house boat shall enter or remain in either of the said basins, except yatching houseboats that are power driven, without written permission to do so under such terms as may be provided by the harbormaster.

15. No person shall be permitted to sink or place any permanent anchor or "dead man" in either of said basins for the purpose of mooring vessels thereto without first securing the written permission of the harbormaster.

16. No tug boat, freight boat, barge, or other boats used for commercial purposes, such as for loading and unloading freight, shall be permitted to moor, or tie up to the docks, slips, or public wharves in the harbors without first obtaining permission from the harbormaster, who shall specify where such mooring may be made, and assess the rate that shall be charged for such accommodations.

17. No person shall solicit business or sell or offer for sale any article whatsoever from the sidewalks, streets and parkways or in or on the property of Aransas County Navigation District No. 1 without first securing written permission from the Board of Navigation and Canal Commissioners

of Aransas County Navigation District No. 1.

18. No person shall place, erect, or construct any sign or signs on any of the docks, slips, wharves, or other portion of the property of Aransas County Navigation District No. 1 unless such signs have the approval of the harbormaster and of the Board of Navigation and Canal Commissioners of Aransas County Navigation District No. 1.

19. No person shall operate any boat or watercraft within the waters of the said harbors at a speed greater than 5 miles per hour.

20. No person shall operate any watercraft within the confines of the property of Aransas County Navigation District No. 1 while under the influence of intoxicating liquor.

21. No vessels of any sort may be loaded or unloaded in either harbor except at points designated by the harbormaster for this purpose, and no cargo of any sort may be loaded or unloaded at these designated points except upon payment of the established wharfage rate for the commodity being handled, whether it be scaffold or other cargo.

22. No vessel may occupy a public wharf in either harbor, except in case of emergency and upon approval of the harbormaster, for a period of more than two hours in any 24 hours, without payment at the established rate.

Rates for slip and berth rentals shall be posted in the offices of the harbormaster at Rockport and Fulton.

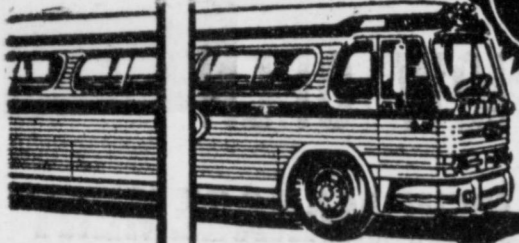

The nation was watching Rockport when the first experiments of their kind were begun here by the State Health Department, Naval authorities and city and council officials on the effectiveness of DDT in combating insects bred in standing water after a storm. Two preliminary sprayings of DDT had been made by aid over Rockport and Fulton. . . . A fire in the Rio Theatre had caused an estimated \$5000 damage. MORE TEXANS ENTERING ARMED SERVICES THAN RECEIVE DISCHARGE

Austin, Texas. — For the first time in about a year, more Texans are entering the armed forces than are getting out.

This is apparent from reports to national Selective Service headquarters from the state draft headquarters in Austin.

In July, 4,272 Texans entered the armed forces, 3,970 being separated at the same time.

"It is the first time since Aug. 1954 more Texans have gotten in the various uniformed services than have gotten out," Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, said.

"Each month, from September 1954 through June 1955, the number being separated exceeded the number being taken in," he added.

Of the 4,272 Texans going into the armed forces in July, 556 were drafted, the others going in by enlistment or other voluntary means.

The state's 137 draft boards sent 1,453 men for physical-mental examinations by the army in July. Of this number, 814 were declared acceptable by the army.

During July, the local draft boards registered 4,918 males, most of whom were youths reaching their 18th birthday. The federal draft law requires all males to register when they are 18 or five days thereafter.

SOCIAL SECURITY RETIREMENT TEST EXPLAINED

You may earn as much as \$1,200 a year and still be eligible to receive the full amount of your social security benefits.

However, if you earn more than \$1,200 a year, from any type of work, whether or not it is covered by social security, benefits for one or more months may not be payable. This information comes from H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi social security office.

He explained that payment can be made for some months to beneficiaries who earn between \$1,200 and \$2,080 a year. One month's payment is withheld for each \$80 earned above the \$1,200.

This \$1,200 rule, or retirement test, does not apply after you reach age 72, because benefits may be paid after that age, regardless of how much is earned.

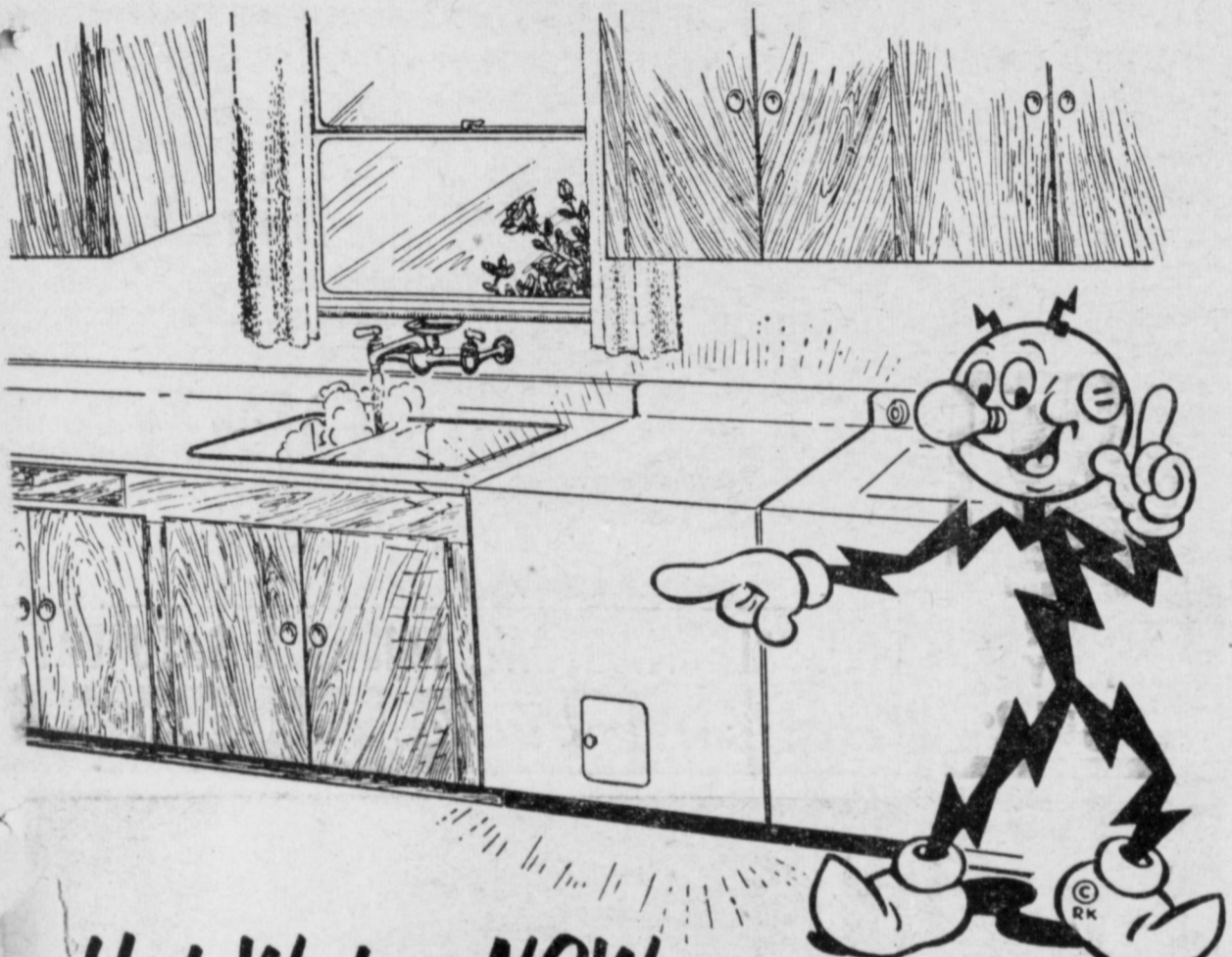

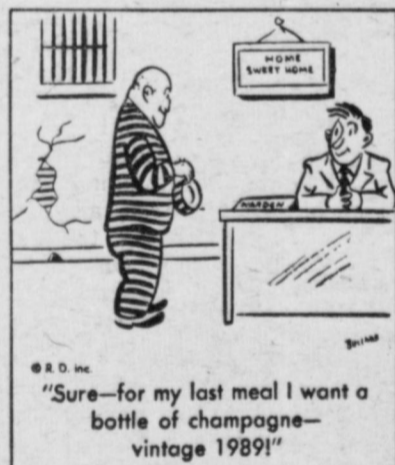

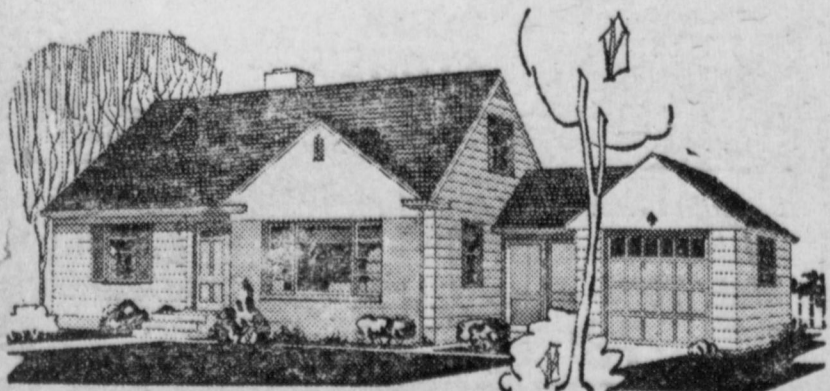

**WILSON HAS DEEP TEST**

Sam E. Wilson, Jr., of Corpus Christi has scheduled immediate drilling of a deep Aransas County wildcat just west of Rockport. ## Stricter Standards On Auto Inspection Effective Sept. 15

Stricter standards for auto-inspection will become effective September 15.

In the future, the brake check will include a check of the pedal reserve. Vehicles with conventional brakes may not have less than two inches between the pedal and floor board when brakes are applied. The pedal reserve for power brakes will be one inch.

The check to determine if a vehicle going 20 miles an hour can be stopped within 30 feet will be continued. New, however, is a provision for rejection if there are visible leaks at the brake lines and wheel cylinders.

All cracked or broken tail lights, stop lights, clearance lights or reflectors must be replaced before vehicle may be approved. Vehicles on which directional signal lights are required must have the lights in operative order. Semaphore type signals are not affected under the provision.

Adjustment or headlights will also be changed for vehicles which use the headlight which were recently invented. All 1956 model cars are supposed to have the new type headlights which are built with a reflector which provides indirect lighting and cuts down glare. The new lights will afford greater visibility for night driving.

With the new invention, headlights may be set as little as two inches below direct center at a distance of 25 feet. Old type headlights will continue to be set at three inches below center at the time.

This year, for the first time, the inspection division is requiring that all mechanics at official inspection station must take a written examination before they can conduct the checks.

## Underwater TV Shows How Shrimp Trawls Work

Extensive underwater TV experiments by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service have shown how shrimp trawls work, and give some valuable pointers on what fishermen should know.

With the submerged TV unit it was possible to view the nets from front, top, rear, and several side angles. Good close up views were obtained of the twine, doors, floats and leadlines, and to see the effects of different methods of rigging the gear.

Results showed that an important consideration in performance of trawls is the speed at which they are towed. Excessive speed causes the lead lines to leap frog, with resulting loss of catches. Too slow a rate results in a smaller spread between the doors, a result also obtained when an excessive amount of cable is paid out.

By increasing of the towing legs between doors and the wings of the net, the doors were spread more widely, the net opening was enlarged, and the mesh more fully opened. At the same speed, with this rig, the net opening was increased by as much as six feet on a 40-foot net. The greater opening did not decrease the height of the net, but the mesh appeared to be more square than diamond-shaped.

## STATE DRAFT CALLS FOR 534 MEN FOR OCTOBER

Austin, Texas. - A state draft call for 534 men for October was announced Friday by Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director.

The quota, the state's share of a national call for 10,000 men, is two less than the September quota and 12 less than the August quota. Calls have ranged between 500 and 550 a month during most of 1955.

Local board quotas for the October induction into the army were mailed from state Selective Service headquarters on Sept. 1.

There will be no physical-mental examinations of men for military service through the draft boards in October, except in isolated cases, General Wakefield said.

With the exception of volunteers and possible delinquents, the October induction call will be filled only with men who on Oct. 1 are 21 years of age or older, General Wakefield said.

Directions to induct only the older age groups came from the national director of Selective Service, Major General Lewis B. Hershey, in conformity with the law.

These instructions were received with the October quota.
