The play was well executed and covered thirty-eight yards. Try point was wide and the game ended with the final score in favor of the Pirates, 13-0. The Pirates showed some very sharp blocking for the first game of the year.

James D. Donaldson, regional chairman for the Texas Council for the Promotion of Poetry, is promoting the affair, hoping to make it a memorable one.

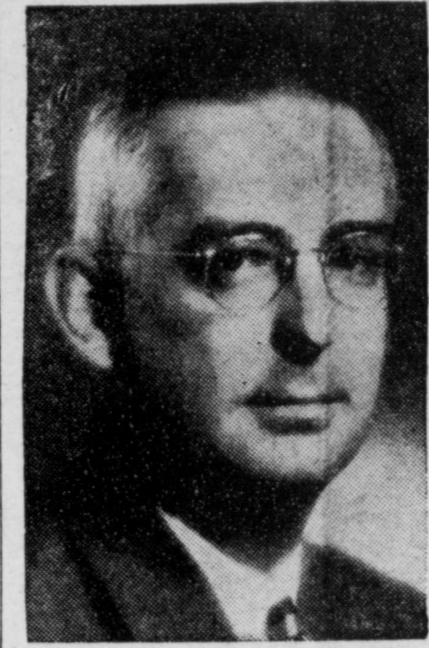

## Rotary District Governor to Speak Here September 21

Governor of District 185 of Rotary International, Thos. B. Sammons, Jr., will address the Rotary Club of Rockport Sept. 21. Mr. Sammons, who is making his official visit to each of the 36 Rotary clubs in south Texas, will also confer with Pat H. Greene, president of the Rockport club; Byron T. Hardeman, secretary; and committee chairmen on Rotary administration and service activities.

Mr. Sammons, president of Hayes-Sammons Company in Mission, was elected District Governor for the 1955-56 fiscal year at Rotary's Golden Anniversary Convention in Chicago last June. ## Still No. TV As Hassle Goes On

While lawyers raged, and the Federal Communications Commission at Washington listened to charges and counter-charges hurled by three competing applicants for a permit to operate VHF TV Channel 10 in Corpus Christi, the area still remained dependent on San Antonio and stations still farther away for what programs reception allowed them to see.

The commissioners, in a two-hour session, heard attorneys for Superior Television, Inc., K-SIX Television and KEYS-TV engage in a session in which everybody appeared to be wrong.

Accusations were made that KSIX had misrepresented facts and peddled stock in violation of the Texas Public Securities Act were voiced by a counsel for Superior, and KSIX's attorney said that it wasn't so.

Attorneys for both KSIX and KEYS attacked Superior on the grounds of alleged dominating control by absentee owners in Los Angeles and Tulsa.

The upshot of the whole thing was that no permit was granted, and the Commission said that it might be two or three months before it can make up its collective mind on who will get the permit and when.

The Atlantic Refining Company was granted an easement across a county road in Fulton, and there be no other business, the meeting was adjourned.

## Helicopter Demonstration Watched With Interest At Harbor Opening

A helicopter rescue demonstration put on by a team from the Naval Air Station at Corpus Christi was watched with much interest by the crowd at the dedication of Fulton Harbor Sunday.

As the whirlybird made a pass over the new harbor, one of the crew dived from it into the water. Supported by a life jacket, the man to be rescued signaled his position by a colored smoke signal such as those used by pilots forced down at sea, and the 'copter swung back above him, where it hovered long enough to lower a ladder up which the rescued man climbed.

The crew then landed on the beach adjacent to the Lions' fish fry stand, and were inundated by all the youngsters in the area, who were given a chance to inspect the helicopter.

Also present at the celebration were a crash boat from NAS, and a Coast Guard Auxiliary vessel, and a weapons team from the 2nd Battalion, 141st Infantry, of the 56th Division of the National Unit who staged an interesting display of their arms, which attracted almost as much attention from the youngsters as the helicopter.

Several units of the Naval Reserve and Coast Guard that were expected to attend could not do so, as they were alerted for service during the emergency in the valley towns, many of which have been flooded out during the past week.

## Southwestern Bell Representatives Claim Not Sufficient Revenue From Rockport Exchange; Want Business, Residences Phones Up \$1

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company representatives Stan Bell and John Tucker told the City Council at its regular meeting Monday night that they were not receiving enough revenue from the Rockport exchange and renewed their request to up phone rates \$1 per month on business and residential phones, except for four-party lines, which would remain as they are.

After considerable discussion, the Council expressed itself as willing to approve a 75 cent raise on business phones and a 25c raise on single and two-party lines for residences, effective in January, providing that the telephone company would agree not to ask for another raise for at least two years.

Bell stated that he would have to take the matter up with company officials before he could make any reply.
