

## **Oregon Makes Good** Shrimp Catches, **Sees More Tuna**

The Oregon returned to Pascagoula Sept. 24 completing the second leg of a 5-week deep-water shrimp trawling trip in the northeastern Gulf of Mexico. The basic objectives of this cruise were to make preliminary trawling coverage of the red shrimp depth range along the Louisiana coast west of the Mississippi Delta.

Sixteen drags using a 40-foot trawl were made in 125 to 250 fathoms along the Florida coast between 87° west longtitude and 28° north latitude. Catches of red Sirimp throughout this area were small (1 to 14 pounds per 2-hour tow). No indications of comment cial concentrations were located south of 29°30' N. and 87°08' W. (210 fathoms west of Cape San Blas). From this position west to 88°05' W. good catches were made in depths of 200 to 285 fathams. Using an 80-foot balloon net, 150 to 295 pounds of red shrimp were caught per 3-hour drag, averaging 225 pounds per drag. Fifteen drags with the 40-foot trawl were made along the Louisiana coast in depths of 100 to 300 fathoms west of Southwest Pass. Catches ranged from 6 to 13 pounds per drag in the 150 to 300 BAPTIST CHURCH fathom range. Very poor trawling BARBECUE STARTS bottom was found throughout this area. Two rigs including nets and doors were lost due to bogging. Three other drags resulted in severe tear ups. Two drags were made off Southwest Pass in depths of 55 to 65 fathoms to obtain silver porgies paign for a new educational build-(Stenotomus caprinus) for future trials as tuna long-line bait. Two hundred and fifty pounds of 8-10 count porgies were frozen. Ten pounds of very large (3-5 headson count) brown-grooved shrimp were also taken in each catch. Large numbers of schooled blackfin tuna and skipjack were observed throughout the areas worked. Night-light collecting yielded several hundred juvenile skipjacks.



boards volunteer for induction." The Air Force led in the number of reported enlistments, but also headed the list of men separated. Selective Service local boards sent only 138 men for mental-physical examinations in August. A total of 78 was found acceptable by the Army, the remaining 60 being declared unacceptable for service.

During August, Texas draft boards registered 6,745 males, nearly all of them 18 years of age. "Prospects now are that these





Rapid and progressive loss of released birds was quickly apparent when a study was made of hatchery quail that had been stocked in various areas.

Thirty days after they were liberated, 35 birds out of every hundred had perished. In sixty days a bird a day had died. In three months, eighty out of every hundred were dead. After four months, only 12 were alive; at the end of five months there were six birds left. In seven months 93.3 birds were lost.
