After two years of planning, the Aransas County Independent School Board, at its regular meeting Tuesday night, issued a call for an election to be held on Saturday, December 3, to decide whether or not a \$675,000 bond issue shall be made to provide money for badly needed elementary buildings at Rockport and Fulton, and for a Junior High School, a gymnasium, and a possible home economics build-







One clue led to another, and finally scientists began sampling the blood of birds in the region, and soon discovered the culprits. birds such as thrushes and skylarks teemed with the virus, but more important in spreading the epidemics were herons, plumed egrets, cattle egrets, cormorants and blue magpies, on which the female mosquitoes fed when no humans were available.
