

## Association's Activities Of Benefit, Says N. F. Jackson

Retiring President of Texas Shrimp Association Reviews Progress Made by Shrimping Industry in 1955, Citing Important Part Played by Group

"The 1955 activities of the Texas Shrimp Association have been of much benefit to the shrimping industry of the state," said retiring president N. F. Jackson, of Rockport, who pointed out that the Association had been able to accomplish these only through organization. Jackson's speech, and reports on shrimp marketing, by Dr. Richard Kahn, of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Washington, D. C., and advertising, by Murray Wheeler, Publicity Director of National Fisheries Institute, were highlights of the Association's Sixth Annual meeting at Brownsville, attended by shrimp producers from as far apart as Mexico and Florida. Election of officers for 1956, and a 120-plate dinner for members and their wives climaxed the meeting.

The Association, Jackson said, had been successful in working out agreements with the oil companies, seismograph operators, and the State Land Office, minimizing bottom damage from shooting, with consequent loss of nets and gear by trawlers. In addition, he pointed out, legislation affecting the fishery, at both state and national levels had been dealt with; relations between fishermen of this country and Mexico were extremely amicable due to Association efforts; some of the difficulties in obtaining adequate marine insurance at an equitable rate had been overcome; and a very effective advertising and publicity campaign had been made possible.

Kahn's report, the result of an extensive survey by the Fish and Wildlife Service, pointed out methods by which shrimp consumption could be increased, as did the talk of Murray Wheeler.

Nine directors were elected for 1956. These included Sam Snodgrass and Ray Tolson, Brownsville; Carlton Crawford, Palacios; J. B. Jackson, Rockport; John Clegg and Morgan Daniels, Port Lavaca; Sidney Herndon, Corpus Christi, new president of the organization; N. A. Hardee, vice president, and John Carinhas, Jr., secretary, both of Brownsville.

Chamber of Commerce ballots for election of new directors were mailed Monday, according to Mrs. Mary Juergens, manager. Six new directors are to be chosen, out of a slate of 14. Five of these will serve for full terms of three years, one will serve for two.

Outgoing are: James H. Sorenson, Jr., B. T. Hardeman, Mrs. H. F. Elliott, H. H. Dick, William Johnson, and H. E. White. Johnson was elected at the beginning of 1955 to serve out the unexpired term of Mrs. Roy Hinton, who resigned from the board, and H. E. White was later appointed in place of M. A. Cannon, to serve until a regular election was held.

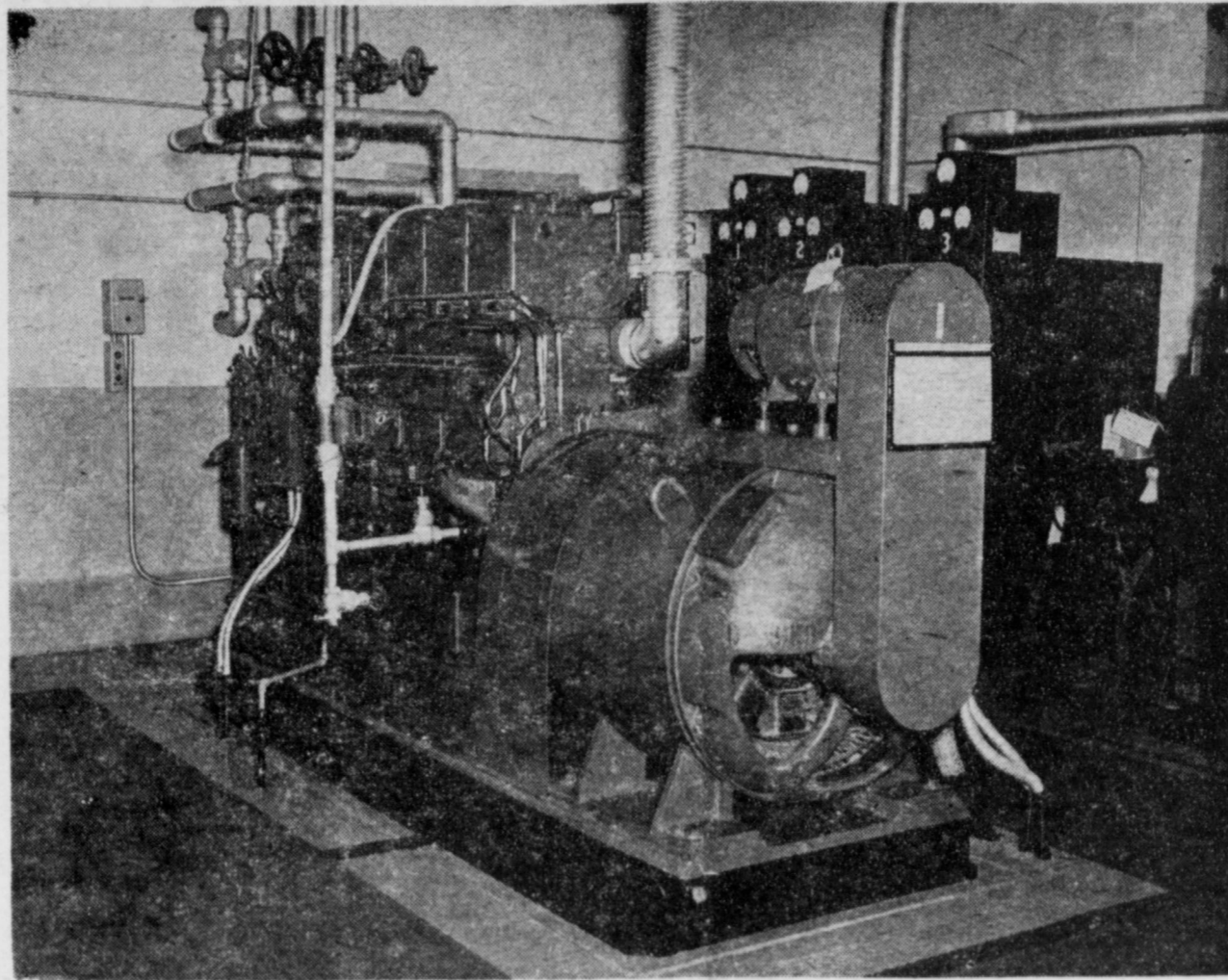

**B&PW Plan Benefit For March of Dimes**

While the ACW station to be built in Rockport will operate on power furnished by the Central Power and Light Company, a powerhouse containing four of these Diesel generator units, costing \$28,000 each, will be built, for use in emergencies. Venhorst, in charge of construction of the new station, says that in cases of hurricane or flood, where local power is no longer available, one of these units could be hooked to city lines, to take care of vital necessities like hospitals. Installed in an engine room so clean it shines, with no encumbrances to gather dirt or oil these Diesels can be in operation in less than 30 seconds, with current going out over the lines. Major Venhorst demonstrated one of them for The Pilot, and it actually took only about 28 seconds, or less time than is necessary to light a cigarette.

## Stephen Schleider Dies In Family Home

Stephen Schleider died at the age of 87 at the family home in Tivoli, Friday, Jan. 13 at 5 p.m. Rosary was held at the residence Saturday at 7 p.m. with services at the Catholic Church Sunday at 4 p.m. Burial was in the Tivoli Cemetery.

Mr. Schleider was born June 1, 1868, in Austria. At the age of 13 he came to this country with his family, settling in Washington County. At the age of 24 he married Miss Josephine Benke, also of Washington County. From then on he spent the most of his life in Refugio County, around Tivoli. He was a retired farmer at the time of his death.

The Schleiders were among the first five families to settle around Tivoli, in the days when groceries had to be bought in Victoria, transportation was by wagon. The other pioneers have long gone before him.

To this union was born nine children, one daughter dying in infancy. The eight survivors are as follows: Mrs. A. E. Schulze, Danerang, Texas, Mrs. P. E. Fagan and Miss Blue Schleider, Tivoli, Texas, and Mrs. B. J. Woolley, Kilgore, Texas, Mrs. Ted Atwood, O. J. Schleider, J. H. Schleider and V. A. Schleider all of Rockport; also 13 grandchildren and 18 great-grandchildren. All the children and grandchildren were present at the funeral except a granddaughter, Mrs. George Scott of White City, Kansas, and a grandson, Stephen Atwood, who is in the armed forces stationed at Fort Lewis, Wash.

Active pallbearers were grandsons of the deceased: Norman Falksen, Otis Rouquette, Jimmy and Laine Fagan, Johnny Atwood and Hank Schleider. Honorary pallbearers were the remaining six grandsons: Louis Turner, George Scott, Stephen Atwood, Ollie Schleider Jr., Danny Woolley and Phillip Genty.

## Sheriff, Deputies Sued In Federal Court By Negro

A \$101,000 damage suit was filed against three Aransas County sheriff's officers in federal court Tuesday by a Rockport Negro who claims a deputy seriously injured him while making an arrest. The suit was filed by Samuel Dennis against Sheriff A. C. Shivers, Chief Deputy Sherman Munday and Deputy W. L. Haynes.

Dennis asked for a federal court hearing because, the suit contended, he did not believe he could get a fair trial in Aransas County.

He gave as reasons the fact that no Negro has ever served on an Aransas County jury and that the defendants are in a position "to materially effect or control a jury panel."

Dennis alleged that Haynes, while arresting him on a disturbing the peace charge, knocked him unconscious and then beat him about the head until the deputy's blackjack was broken.

He said in his petition that he had not resisted arrest or otherwise given Haynes a justifiable reason for the alleged beating.

Haynes told a reporter Tuesday that Dennis was drunk at the time of his arrest on a warrant for disturbing the peace. The deputy said Dennis resisted the officer and was struck only once, and that time with a gun.

Dennis said in his suit that the alleged beating fractured his skull, necessitating a steel plate, paralyzed his throat and caused him to have convulsions.

He said he lay in his county jail cell unconscious for 20 hours before being taken to Memorial Hospital in Corpus Christi.

The deputy said he grabbed the man's arm in making the arrest and led him to the car, despite considerable resistance.

"I had my blackjack hanging on the dashboard. When I reached in to grab for it he grabbed it from my hand, breaking the strap. I hit him with my gun when he drew back to hit me. I hit him only once and he was unconscious for only a few minutes."

The deputy said he had no explanation for the head and neck injuries listed in the damage suit. He said that night he was told by prisoners that Dennis was "acting funny;" and that he called a physician. He said the doctor found nothing wrong, but sent Dennis to a specialist in Corpus Christi the next day, following complaints by Dennis.

The suit alleged that Haynes had beaten other persons and that Sheriff Shivers and Deputy Munday were negligent in allowing him to remain on the county force.

The Aransas County Emergency Corps was well represented in Alice Sunday, as volunteer firemen from 25 Coastal Bend cities gathered for their quarterly meeting.

Highlighting the morning business session in the VFW Hall was the election of new officers of the South Central Division of the state organization. Chief Paul Dacke, of Kingsville, was the retiring president.

Registration began at 10:00 and the business session lasted until 12 noon. Lunch was then served to firemen and their families. Most of the 25 fire departments were represented by teams in the competitive races testing skills useful to firemen.

In the pumper hookup races, first place went to Premont No. 2, with a time of 19.1 seconds. The Paris Rules Hose Hookup Race went to Annville, with a time of 19.1 seconds. Premont No. 1 was second, in 19.7 seconds, and Taft No. 2 finished third in 19.8 seconds.

Rockport did not compete, but the men from here studied the races, and will form a team to compete at the next quarterly session of the district, which includes Mathis, George West, Ingleside, Aransas Pass, Rockport, Fulton, and towns and cities out through Falfurrias and Kingsville.

## Air Force Asks Rental Survey

Lt. Schwartz, Project Officer on Radar Station, And Officers from Tinker Air Force Base Here to Determine Housing Facilities Available for Unit

Lieutenant W. R. Schwartz, project officer on the 813th ACW Squadron base to be built at Rockport, was here Friday, to discuss housing possibilities in the Rockport area, for married personnel of the unit. Accompanying him was a survey team from Tinker Air Force Base at Oklahoma City, Headquarters of the 33rd Air Division (Defense) under which the Rockport station will operate. They were Lieutenant Estabrook Glosser, Jr., from the office of Director of Installations and Deputy for Materiel of the 33rd, Lieutenant E. F. Bysinski, and George Toothacher, of the same command.

The officers discussed possibilities of obtaining land in the area for government housing, if this becomes necessary, with County Judge John Wendell.

They also visited Mrs. Mary Juergens, manager of the Chamber while in town, and asked her to assemble data on potential rent property here.

Mrs. Juergens said that everyone in the region having such property should call the Chamber of Commerce at 825, and register it with her. This data will aid the government survey team in arriving at conclusions on housing problems.

She called attention to the fact that this means not only property now vacant, but all rent houses and apartments in and around Rockport and Fulton. She also asks that information be given at the same time as to the type of housing, and the amount of rent asked for it.

## Mrs. Joe Everitt, Augusto Rodriguez Badly Hurt Tues.

Mrs. Joe Everitt and Augusto Rodriguez, both of Rockport, were badly injured Tuesday, and three others, Susanna Sanchez, Apolonio Morales, and Daniel Sanchez, suffered minor cuts and bruises in an automobile wreck at 4:30 p.m. Tuesday afternoon, at the corner of Austin and Orleans Streets.

According to investigating officers, Mrs. Everitt, in a '56 Ford, was driving north on Austin St.; Sanchez, with the other three in his car, a 1950 Plymouth, was driving west on Orleans Street, when they collided. The Plymouth was practically demolished, and Mrs. Everitt's Ford suffered considerable damage.

Mrs. Everitt, who was alone at the time of the accident, was given first aid treatment at the Elliot-Hughes Clinic, and later taken to the Aransas Hospital where, under X-rays, it was discovered that her neck was broken in two places, and that she had also suffered a fractured pelvis. Susanna Sanchez received severe lacerations of the fingers of her left hand, and Apolonio Morales was treated for cuts and bruises.

Dr. L. G. Wood, summoned to the scene of the accident, staunchly the bleeding on Rodriguez, who had been partially thrown through the windshield of the Plymouth, and then removed him to Rockport Hospital. From here he was later transferred to Memorial Hospital in Corpus Christi, for an extremely delicate neuro-surgical operation to repair the facial nerves which had been severed, paralyzing one side of the boy's face. Sanchez, who received head cuts, did not require hospitalization.

**Mrs. Hagar's Prophecy Based on Robins in Area Fulfilled this Week**

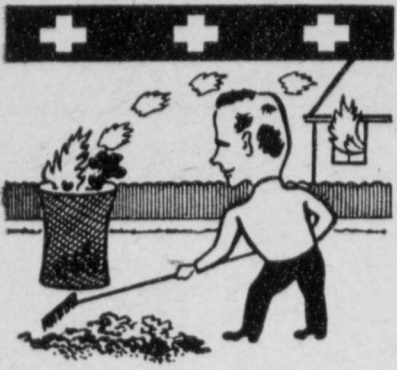

in the area have expressed the hope that Rockport, instead of attempting to skyrocket rentals and prices, will cooperate with the Air Force in making it possible for the married personnel at the base to obtain necessary housing and other accommodations at reasonable rates.

One of them pointed out that, with good roads between here and neighboring towns, and with most of the men who will be stationed at the base owning cars, any attempt to raise prices unduly could hurt our relations with the Air Force, and force these people to find accommodations in Aransas Pass, Ingleside, or even Corpus Christi, to the financial loss of this region.

If government housing should become necessary, or if personnel have to seek quarters elsewhere at a more reasonable rate than they can find in Rockport, at a conservative estimate, between \$4000 and \$5000 a month will go elsewhere that could have been spent in this region.

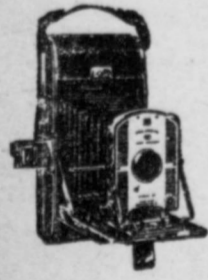
