Lost Boys Found Asleep In Brush

Two Lamar youths were found unharmed at 12:15 a.m. Monday after a 40-man search party had combed the heavy brush near Lamar for more than three hours.

The youths, Dailey Heldenfels, 14, and Rob Johnson, 12, left the home of the boys' grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert S. Johnson, about 4 p.m. Sunday to go horseback riding in a ranch pasture. Johnson warned them not to carry a gun and not to chase cattle, Sheriff Arlie Shivers said. He said nothing about not chasing deer.

A dog went along on the ride and jumped a deer shortly before sundown. The boys gave chase and found themselves lost in heavy brush after sundown. They tied and unsaddled the horses, made beds of the saddle blankets and went to sleep.

The family began looking for the two at dark and summoned Sheriff Shivers about 9 p.m. Members of the Rockport volunteer fire department and other citizens joined Shivers and his deputies in the

Shivers said the siren on his patrol car awoke the boys and they answered the shouts of the search party. They had bedded down for the night about two miles from the Johnson home.

The sheriff added that it took about three additional hours after the boys were found to round up all the volunteer searchers in the



The radar unit that forms the heart of any aircraft warning station is an extremely complicated piece of mechanism. One of the most interesting sections of the set-up is the main switch board, which can do almost everything but talk. Should something go wrong, bells ring, lights flash, and the resulting commotion indicates to technicians the exact part that is giving he trouble. Repairs are made on a unit basis. Spare units for all parts of the installation are on hand, and just as a radio tube is replaced, a bad unit is slipped out and a new one installed. This makes repairs a matter of only a few minutes or seconds, and service is never interrupted. The defective unit is then repaired in shops attached to the ACW

The 813th ACW Station, which will be built at Rockport this year, is part of a vast network of such stations. extending from the Gulf of Mexico to the Arctic, and from the Atlantic to the Pacific. Guarding the airlanes leading into America is its main job, and that of all the other stations. To do this efficiently, they have been placed under various commands, all of which channel their information to one to fence the City Dump Ground. great headquarters in Colorado Springs, the headquarters

The Rockport station is directly under the command of the 33rd Air Defense Division Headquarters, at Oklahoma City.

Loss of one ACW Station could leave a loophole in the net large enough to allow an enemy bomber to slip through and possibly destroy key cities or plants.

Hence, each of the stations in the web must be ready at all times to protect itself, and airmen and officers are taught the basic techniques of ground warfare.

Alerts, or practice sessions are carried off as if an actual emergency exists. Men assigned duty stations other than in the radar Continued on Page 8

Shrimp Fishery Now Most Important In U. S., Says Statistical Expert Of U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service

The report covered consumer father, Mr. S. T. Schleider. sales, retail inventories, consumer prices, and distribution methods with regard to shrimp, and produced some extremely interesting facts, not only for assembled fishermen, but for housewives of the

nation. The two months chosen for the study were August and September 1955, because August was a vacation month and September was a normal one, with children back in school and housewives doing their customary buying. It produced the following facts, regarding shrimp sales in that period, throughout the United States:

During those two months, U. S. housewives bought \$10.33 million worth of fresh shrimp; another \$10.27 million of frozen shrimp; and \$2.7 million worth of shrimp in cans. Converting this to poundage, they bought 13.93 million pounds of fresh shrimp; 10.8 million of frozen shrimp in various forms; and only 1.79 million in

Dr. Kahn pointed out that there was still a large potential market for the shellfish that had not been touched, if sufficient production could be found to supply it.

Fresh shrimp are handled by only 6% of the stores in the U.S., he said, although these sell 29% of the total food used; frozen shrimp were handled in 30% of
