

# **Secures Tentative**

**CAA Allotment** Judge John D. Wendell has been successful in securing tentative allotment of \$10,000 in CAA funds to the airport here, according to a letter received this week. The letter, which is self explanatory,

reads as follows:

Honorable John D. Wendell, Ashby B. James et al vs Sullivan County Judge, Aransas County,

> In response to your request to participate in the Federal-Aid Airport Program, the Administrator has tentatively allocated \$10,-000 for a project at the Rockport Municipal Airport at the United States share of allowable project costs in performing the following airport development:

Install lights on NW/SE runway, \$6,000

for the development specified above and may not be applied to other development without the approval of the Administrator.

Under the terms of the Federal Airport Act an actual grant of funds can only be made after a project application (incorporating plans, specifications, and other basic documents) has been submitted and opproved. Therefore, this tentative allocation of funds is subject to your project application meeting the requirements of the Act and the regulations promulgated the render. This allocation is made with the understanding that you will immediately begin the preparation of the details of your project in order that a Project Application may be submitted as soon as possible.

### **Austin Firm Low** On Radar Bid, Says County Judge

According to a report received Wednesday morning by County Judge John D. Wendell, an Austin firm was low bidder on the construction work for Rockport's ACW station.

The bids were opened Tuesday, February 14, at the office of the Corps of Engineers, U. S. Army, in Galveston, and the Ricks Construction Company, of Austin, was low on both the original specifications, and on an addition for air conditioning the station dining hall. They made a tender of \$970,-416.19 for the buildings and paving, with an additional \$12,195 for the air-conditioning.

Next low was the Coastal Bend Construction Company, of Corpus Christi. They bid \$992,992.30 for building and paving, and \$12,000 for the air-conditioning.

As of Wednesday morning, contracts had not been awarded.

"Wind", said Leland Edwards, of the New York firm of Edwards and Hjort, specialists in tall buildings, "was a thing that had to be considered when buildings like the Empire State were first thought possible. It is easy enough to build a structure strong enough to reach many stories above the ground, but when they're too high and too thin, they're not stiff enough to withstand wind sway, unless especially designed, and would cause people some unpleasant sensations, at least, without

careful designing." Edwards ought to know, for he was in complete charge of the Empire State building design and construction. This was before he had his own firm, and while he was still employed by the H. D. Balcom Company, a construction firm in New York, but, since then he has been the godfather of many of the world's important buildings, either as designer or as consultant.

While still working with Balcom, he had charge of building a new library for Louvain University, in Europe, to replace the one destroyed by the Germans in World War I. The building that he erected later suffered the same fate in World War II, but this is one of the few he has been concerned with that is not still in existence.

Edwards, while at Balcom's was n charge of the design of the General Electric Building, the home office of the Irving Trust, (Continued on page 4)

One school And now comes fashion to please fish strikes the bait with its bill to kill it, and the other school maintains that the striking action of the bill is a delusion and that erational advantages are taken the fish crushes the bait in its jaws. Both probably are right in certain cases. In taking the bait, usually trolled at several knots on the surface, the fish rises behind the bait, and, after looking it over, approaches from the rear. When within striking distance, the bill is seen to rise above the bait and appear to strike at it with a downward or often a sidewise motion. At times this may actually be an attempt to stun or kill the bait with the bill, but more often the sailfish is probably attempting to take the bait directly into its mouth. An examination of hundreds of baits which have been struck by sailfish indicates that in nearly all cases they had been partly crushed between the jaws. Scales were missing from both sides of the body where the jaws had closed over the bait. Observations of sailfish feeding showed schools of from 6 to 30 individuals milling about small groups of 'pilchards" forcing them into compact schools. At short intervals, while the pilchards were kept bunched up by the circling sailfish, a single sailfish would break out of the circle and swim rather slowly directly through the pilchards, thrashing vigorously side-
