F. H. Hern, Houston, did almost as well catching 22 Friday, five Saturday, 28 Sunday, 47 Monday, and 13 Tuesday, for a total of 115 specks.

Thursday C. A. Watts, of Dallas, strung 14; Friday Dr. Jack Marsh, of College Station snagged 30. Saturday, Mr. Moore, San Antonio, brought in 28 fish; L. A. White, also of the Alamo City, caught 32 trout and 16 gofftops.

Sunday two other San Antonio anglers, Bobbie White and Lonnie Rogers, brought in one drum that weighed 3½ pounds, and nine trout that weighed 21 pounds gross, the biggest being 3¾ pounds. Munnie Housler, San Antonio, caught 38 specks, and E. C. Rodenburg, also of San Antonio, caught 10. Joe Sedlmeyer, Yoakum, fished Sunday, catching 25 trout; Monday he caught nine. On the same day, Dr. Marsh Sr. and Dr. Jack Marsh, went to the Gulf and came in with two mackerel, a ten-pound kingfish, and three jack crevalle that would weigh about 20 pounds each.

C. of C. Directors Meet Tuesday Discuss Problems

A postponed meeting of the Chamber of Commerce directors was held Tuesday evening, with barely a quorum present, and routine matters were discussed by those present.

It was voted to erect signs at various points in the region to direct people to Rockport, and to advertise the town's advantages.

Committee reports were made by various chairmen.

Mrs. Charles Roe Sr. reported that progress was being made on the boat race organization, and that a meeting of the tourist promotion committee, to be held Thursday evening, would probably complete the preliminary arrangements necessary.

Jack Baughman reported that rules for the race were being printed by the Freeport organization in charge of developments at that end.

The problem of attracting more high school senior trips was discussed and a sub-committee of the Tourist Promotion Committee group was directed to look into the matter.

Rev. A. Arnott Ward brought up the need of a ball diamond for larger boys and young men of the community, now that the church league was using Dickson Memorial Park, and the matter was referred to the Civic Affairs Committee, Seth Steele chairman.

Need of beach improvements at Rockport harbor was considered, and a committee with Grady West as chairman was appointed to go into the matter with the Navigation District.

Methodist Official Board Organizes

Sheriff A. C. Shivers said Gay was going south on Highway 35 when he swerved to miss several children playing on the highway and skidded in front of the car driven by Mrs. Flores.

She traced on the map of North America the various flights, the direction they took, their accustomed paths and meeting places. She pointed out that Rockport was in the direct line where the migrations from the north, the south, the east and the west met and crossed. In her collection were birds familiar to this area, done in ceramics, and sent to her by people who kept in touch with her work as an ornithologist.

"The original contract ran until June, 1957, Judge Wendell said, "and until it expires the Navy has every right to full use of the field. We have not signed a new contract for use of the landing strips after that time, despite local rumor."

Glasscock Hits New Discovery

C. G. Glasscock-Tidelands Oil Co. No. 3 State Tract 2, Aransas County A-2 sand discovery in the Shell Point Field 7½ miles northwest of Rockport in Copano Bay, has been completed for a 24-hour flow of 151.56 barrels of 44 gravity, pipeline oil.

Production was through 10-64-inch choke from perforations at 6,768-74 feet in 5½-inch casing at 6,830 feet, 16 feet off bottom. Gas-oil ratio was 1,200-1 and flowing tubing pressure was 825 pounds. Location is on a 535-acre lease.

A proposed 10,000-foot Puerto Bay Field prospect four miles northwest of Aransas Pass, Heep Oil Corp. No. 2 V. F. Neuhaus and others—J. R. Barry Estate—was drilling below 7,489 feet after testing oil.

Working pressure was 195 pounds and recovery was 5,000 feet of pipeline oil on a 20-minute drillstem test through ¼-inch chokes from section at 6,725-32 feet. Bottomhole flowing pressure was 2,450 pounds and shut-in pressure was 2,545 pounds.

A 20-minute drillstem test through ¼-inch chokes from section at 6,746½ to 6,752 feet showed a working pressure of five pounds and yielded 30 feet of rathole mud, slightly oil-cut. Bottomhole flowing pressure was zero and shut-in pressure was 910 pounds. Location is on a 427.28-acre lease in Block 59, McCampbell Subdivision.

early as April 18, 1955, efforts were being made to abate the noise caused by propeller-driven planes using the airport to practice landings, and that city, county, and Navy officials discussed the matter at some length.

At that time, Navy officials pointed out that as the changeover was made from prop to jet-driven planes, fewer and fewer aircraft would use the local airport, which cannot be fitted for jets, due to insufficient ground for the long runways needed.

It was thought that completion of a new field for jets in the Alice-Orange Grove area would help speed this changeover, as more and more pilots were checked out on jets, and that, as a result, use of the Aransas County Field could be curtailed sharply beginning last fall.

However, the Navy notified Judge Wendell recently that it would need the field here until the expiration of its contract. Use of the airport by the Navy pays approximately 90% of the cost of operation.

Junior Rangers Hold Camp at Stella Maris

For the second consecutive summer, the Junior Rangers, 41 in number, from Corpus Christi, Robstown and Aransas Pass are attending training camp with headquarters at "Stella Maris" in Lamar.

The group, sponsored by American Legion Post 248 of Corpus Christi, is unique in the fact that it is the only organization of its kind in this part of the country. The membership numbers 100, ranging in age from 6 to 14 years.

A non-denominational group, it came into being about 3½ years ago for the purpose of training young boys in military tactics and in good citizenship by teaching them to serve in the home, school and church. The boys sign up for a period of one year with a \$5 monthly fee to cover the expenses of the camp.

The camp site, located on an elevation overlooking Aransas Bay, has all the aspects of a military camp with sleeping quarters, mess hall, showers, canteen, obstacle courses and parade grounds.

Dwight McCready, Diocesan director of bands in the Catholic School of Corpus Christi, is the director of the camp and he is assisted by Carroll R. Bailey, band director of the Cunningham Junior High School, who directs the camp band. Mrs. Bailey serves as life guard and first aid administrator and Mrs. Ruth Linebarger, also of Corpus Christi, is the nurse.

The boys spend a full day with a schedule which starts at 6:30 a. m. with the flag raising ceremony, followed by calisthenics, obstacle course competition, shower and breakfast. Band practice, military drills, sham battles, competitive games and a rotary system of KP and clean up duties, occupies the time until lunch, which is followed by a 1½ hour rest period. The afternoon is spent in swimming and various water sports, including aquaplaning.

Part of the camp "equipment" which has added much to the enjoyment of the boys' schedule, has been the advent of two donkeys, which figure in the competitive games and create many surprises during the day's schedule.

Chow time finds the boys ready for food and for an evening of television and movies and the day officially closes with the sounding of "taps" from the parade ground and the pier over the water, echoing over the area in a most impressive manner. Rigid discipline is maintained throughout the camp by a corps of officers within the organization.

Each Sunday morning the boys attend the church of their choice in Rockport. Drill time and the marching band, just preceding the evening meal each day, is the signal for spectators to fringe the high iron fence surrounding the enclosure for a glimpse of the boys in full dress uniforms, thus giving them an insight into the activities of this camp dedicated to making boys good citizens, developing physical fitness and furnishing wholesome knowledge and entertainment.

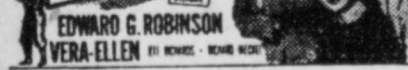

Oil Field Know How May Revolutionize Shrimp Industry

Warren O'Kane, a retired oil field driller of San Antonio, has developed a gadget based on an oil field instrument that bids fair to revolutionize the shrimping industry and solve many of the fishermen's problems.

And shrimp fishermen do have problems—a lot of them.

Because of changes in the fishery during recent years, boats have been working deeper water than they did in the early days of the industry and, as a result, it has been more and more difficult for them to discover what is happening to the giant trawls that they drag along the floor of the sea.

Sometimes these nets will be ripped to tatters on a sunken ship or on rocky bottom. At others, a school of sharks may take over, ripping the net to pieces to get at fish and shrimp with which it is filled.

In cases like these, if the fishermen don't feel the jolt when the net is fouled, they sometimes continue for hours with an empty and worthless net.

On the other hand, if shrimp are plentiful, fishermen may fill their nets within the first hour or so, and be unaware of it. When this happens, they continue to trawl until their regular pick-up time, which may be two or three hours later, losing the school of shrimp.

O'Kane, an old-time driller who has his own boat at Corpus Christi, was struck with these problems, and remembering his use of drilling-control tensiometers in the field at Signal Hill and elsewhere, decided that if an instrument could be developed that would show whether the net was under strain or not, it should be possible

2741 Texans Enter Armed Forces In May

Austin, Texas. — A total of 2,741 Texans entered the armed forces in May, and 2,849 were separated during the same time.

This was revealed Friday in a report made by state Selective Service headquarters to the national Selective Service headquarters in Washington.

Of the 2,741 individuals entering the uniformed services from Texas in May, only 554 were drafted, the remainder entering by enlistment or other voluntary means.

"Actually, many of the men inducted were volunteers," Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said.

He explained that a provision of the Selective Service regulations allows men from the age of 17 to 26 to volunteer for induction through draft boards. Seventeen-year-olds must have written consent from parents or guardians.

State Selective Service sent 988 men to armed forces examining stations during May. A total of 601 was found acceptable for service, the remaining 387 being rejected, a rejection rate of 39 per cent.

Four physicians were examined and found acceptable for armed forces service during the month.

No physicians or dentists were ordered for service during May from Texas.

Tests have shown that a snagged net is easily detected by a sudden jump in the reading shown on the recording tape of the instrument. When the net is filling with shrimp, a slowly increased reading shows as long as the net is in shrimp territory, but when it levels off, then it's time for the boat to turn and go back over the same territory she has just traveled, picking up more shrimp. A slowly decreasing reading can show when a hole has been ripped in the net by sharks, with its contents spilling out, and an abrupt drop, complete destruction of the gear used in catching shrimp.

Such knowledge, which shrimp fishermen have never had, is of course, invaluable, and saves them time and dollars. It takes only three or four torn-up nets (which may easily happen in a day) to more than pay for the instrument.

Padre Island Has Been Flooded Many Times Says Expert

According to report recently issued by the U. S. Engineers, and authored by Dr. W. Armstrong Price, consulting geologist and former member of the Oceanographic Department at Texas A&M College, Padre Island has been flooded many times in the last hundred and twenty years.

The report, issued by the Beach Erosion Board in connection with the recently expanded responsibilities of the Corps of Engineers in prevention of hurricane damage, is a study of the hurricanes that have affected the coast between 1818 and the present. In it, Dr. Price devotes a section to the long, narrow island which parallels our southern coast.

The island, he says, was once more or less continuously walled just back of its gently sloping beach by a chain of dunes, 15 to 25 feet high, and covered with vegetation. Gaps between these were the sites of washover floods.

These ranged, Price says, from mere reactivation of the washover channels by floods no more than three or four feet high to greater ones accompanied by extensive wind and wave erosion of the dunes, in which the waters reached five to eleven feet above mean low tide.

This, plus drought, have greatly changed the appearance and economic productivity of the island, he states, rendering them almost totally unfit for ranching. Wind-erosion in the northern end has carried away much of the sand, allowing debris, including Indian artifacts and relics of early Spanish and European colonists to settle, exposing them to the public gaze after having been buried for centuries.

During the period between 1829 to 1949, according to Price's figures, no less than 31 floods have swept over the island. Twenty of these the geologist classifies as floods, eight of them he characterizes as high floods, and three are labeled great floods. Rate of flood occurrence is calculated at one in every three to four years, with a maximum flood occurring every 30 or 40 years during the period.

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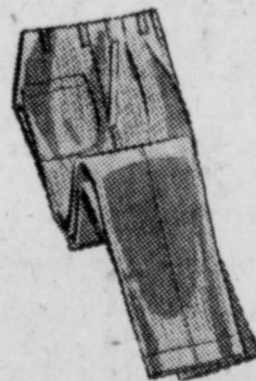

Marine News

According to an announcement in Local Notice to Mariners issued by 8th Coast Guard District, New Orleans, La., the U. S. Corps of Engineers, Galveston, advised 24 May 1956 (Notice to Navigation Interest No. 56-33), as follows:

"Navigation interests are advised that firing practice will be conducted on the gunnery ranges of the U. S. Naval Air Station, Corpus Christi, Texas, from 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday during the period 4 June through 29 June 1956.

"Mariners are cautioned to avoid the following described area in Laguna Madre in which projectiles may fall:

"The area has as its northerly and southerly limits, respectively, lines drawn at 90° from the centerline of the Gulf Intracoastal Waterway at Latitude 27° 31' 12" north, Longitude 97° 18' 00" west (Mile 570.1), and at Latitude 27° 27' 09" north, longitude 97° 20' 07"

west (Mile 575.2), and extending in a westerly direction to the westerly shore of Laguna Madre. The easterly and westerly limits, respectively, are the westerly edge of the Gulf Intracoastal Waterway and the westerly shore of Laguna Madre.

"A large red flag will be displayed from an elevated position in the immediate vicinity of the firing point from which firing is being conducted.

"The channel proper of the Gulf Intracoastal Waterway is out of range of the firing and navigation therein will not be affected by the firing practice."

A fisherman from Iceland has discovered a great new shrimp ground extending 140 miles along India's Malabar coast.

The UN Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) announced this today. It said the rich new bed is four miles wide and so big it will furnish the basis for a whole new industry in India.

The discovery was made recently by G. S. Illugason, an Icelander who works for FAO, while he was

trawling in a 22-foot FAO boat.

The White House announced on June 4 a series of actions designed to benefit the United States fishery industry.

The new program, which is the result of several months of intensive study within the administration, will be implemented in two steps.

First, Department of the Interior officials will undertake immediately the necessary preliminary steps for the creation within the department of a new bureau with sole responsibility for federal programs related to the fisheries. The new bureau, which will be called the Bureau of Fisheries, will come into existence on July 1, and will take over administration of all fishery responsibilities now vested in the Fish and Wildlife Service.

Secondly, the administration will request Congress to enact into law a comprehensive commercial fisheries program which will provide a broad charter for the agency. The administration bill, which in some respects is modeled after the so-called Saltonstall-Kennedy Act due to expire next year, would authorize the Secretary of the Interior to conduct needed investigations and research into all phases of fishing activities including oceanographic, biological, statistical, and economic studies of the distribution and abundance of fishery resources, the development of new and improved methods of fishing, and the development of improved handling methods and techniques. In addition, the bill would authorize research into the

nutritive value of fish and fishery products, and many other activities designed to promote the flow of fishery commodities in domestic and foreign commerce.

The provisions of the Saltonstall-Kennedy Act dealing with the transfer of certain funds from the Department of Agriculture under Section 32 of the Act of August 24, 1935 would be continued on a permanent basis and the present 3,000,000 dollar limitation on expenditure of these funds would be removed.

Finally, the administration proposal includes the establishment of a special \$10,000,000 revolving fund to be used to make loans for the maintenance, repair, and equipment of fishing vessels. Loans made from the fund will carry interest rates of not less than three per cent and could be made for periods of up to ten years.

Implementation of these proposals will strengthen the government's efforts to assist the fishing industry and underlines the administration role the United States Fisheries play in the nation's economy.

Try These On Flounder

In discussing the merits of their favorite food fish, a westerner may praise his rockfish, an easterner his shad, and a southerner his pompano, but all will agree that flounder is a nationwide favorite. Flounder is nationally known because it is caught in nearly all of our coastal waters and is not only sold fresh but is also filleted, frozen, and shipped to all parts of the country.

It ranges in size from 1 to 5 pounds, is white meated, and has a sweet, rich flavor. Fishermen recognize the qualities of flounder and know that it does not need to masquerade under a fancy trade name. Although "fillet of sole" appears often on menus, it is not related to the renowned English sole but is usually one of the species of flounder taken in our American waters.

Flounder fillets may be prepared by any of the basic cooking methods of frying, baking, broiling, or in an endless variety of combination dishes. The home economists of the Fish and Wildlife Service recommend "Baked Fillets of Flounder" as part of an easy oven dinner.

BAKED FILLETS OF FLOUNDER

2 pounds of flounder fillets
1 teaspoon salt
Dash pepper
1/4 cup butter or other fat, melted
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1 teaspoon grated onion
Dash paprika

Thaw frozen fillets. Sprinkle fillets with salt and pepper. Place in a single layer in a well-greased baking pan. Combine butter, lemon juice, onion, and paprika. Pour sauce over fish. Bake in a moderate oven, 350° F., for 20 to 25 minutes or until fish flakes easily when tested with a fork.
