Cedar Bayou To Be Opened

Cedar Bayou is going to be opened again! Harry Mills, speaking for the Rockport Sportsmen's Conservation Association, wasted no words when he explained the reason for an energetic fund raising campaign started by the club this week. This was his simple explanation.

During the first day more than \$600 was obtained "just from the Lamar and Upper Copano area," he said. Other towns and communities were to be asked to help out, too, including Refugio, Sinton, Bayside, Tivoli, and various hunting and fishing organizations.

Cedar Bayou, one of the southernmost natural passes still even partially open without aid from jetties or dredging, now stays closed the biggest part of the year. Only exceptionally high tides and strong winds bring water through the narrow channel.

The pass itself heads through the island only to dogleg within several hundred feet of the surf and parallel the island for more than a mile before emptying into the Gulf.

The Rockport Sportsmen's Conservation Association hopes to dredge a new mouth for the cut, making it a straight channel.

"It will be 30 feet wide and four feet deep," Mills said.

The State Game and Fish Commission gave the project its blessings, but has nothing to do with this operation, Mills added.

Aransas Try Tests Perfs

Western Natural Gas Co. No. 28, St. Charles, Aransas County wildcat eight miles northeast of Lamar, was preparing to perforate and complete from the "C" sand through section at 8,476-84 feet.

It earlier showed a working pressure of 60 pounds and yielded 1,070 feet of oil and 550 feet of brackish water on a 24-hour test through 3/4-inch choke from perforations at 8,193-203 feet. Bottomhole flowing pressure was 380 and 585 pounds with shut-in pressure 1,810 pounds. Section was squeezed.

The project, bottomed at 8,765 feet where 7-inch casing was set, is on a 46,445-acre lease, Aransas County School Land Survey.

Heep Oil Corp. No. 2 V. F. Neuhaus and others—J. R. Barry Estate, Aransas County Puerto Bay project four miles southwest of Rockport, was awaiting orders at 10,208 feet.

Drilling below 4,000 feet on an 8,600-foot permit was underway at Harrell and Southworth No. 1 Mary J. Baker, Aransas County wildcat three miles north of Rockport in J. W. Paup Survey, A-179.

Charles Hock Dies While on Fishing Trip to Rockport

Charles Hock, 72, of San Antonio, died here this morning at 9:00 while fishing in Aransas Bay with his son-in-law A. B. Crusius and friends.

Hock had been playing a big trout when he complained of feeling ill, walked back to the boat and dropped dead almost immediately after he had climbed in, members of the party told Sheriff A. C. Shivers, who investigated. Justice of the Peace F. Iansen rendered a verdict of death by heart failure.

Hock is survived by his wife, a brother, Harry, a son, Haldred Hock, and a daughter, Mrs. Alton Crusius, all of San Antonio, as well as grandchildren.

With him at the time of his death were A. B. Crusius, son-in-law, A. B. Crusius, Jr., grandson and Foster R. Cullin. Local arrangements were handled by the Cage-Marshall Funeral Home of this city. Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Judges' Job No Easy One Say Freeport-Rockport Outboard Marathon Planners

A judge's job is no easy one according to planners of the upcoming Freeport-Rockport fishing boat marathon, scheduled for August 11. The rules committee, they say, did some tall head scratching before they finally came up with a satisfactory definition of what constitutes an outboard fishing boat.

"While you can always get an argument that you can fish from any boat," said Fred Palmer, of Freeport, "it's equally true that a real fishing boat for these waters has certain recognized qualities apparent to anyone who knows anything about boats."

"Generally speaking, a fishing boat should have ample beam and depth to negotiate rough water, and has a more or less straight sheer or rising sheer line, some flare forward, and no interruption in the bottom planing surface. No non-trip chines or step bottoms qualify, and we do not think that transom jacks are a necessary part of fishing boat equipment."

"Of course, there are always borderline cases in determining whether a boat is a fishing type or not, so we drew up a measurement chart covering the various classes."

The chart Palmer refers to is included in the rules for the race, which may be obtained from either The Brazosport Boat Club, 105 Laurel Street, Lake Jackson, Texas, or from the Rockport, Texas, Chamber of Commerce.

Country Club Swimming Pool Contract Is Let

Live Oak Country Club will have a swimming pool by August 1, it was announced this week. E. F. Falgout, club president, said a contract has been let to Associated Tile & Granite Co., San Antonio, for construction of the pool at cost of \$15,150.

Falgout said the contractor will start work on the pool immediately and barring bad weather it should be completed and ready for use by August 1 or earlier.

The fan-shaped pool will be 70 feet long with a width of 25 feet at the deep end and 40 feet at the shallow end. It will range in depth from 2 1/2 feet to 10 feet. The pool will have a concrete bottom with granite sides. Concrete sidewalks will extend around the pool. They will be six feet wide except at the deep end where they will be 12 feet wide.

Falgout said the children's wading pool 10 x 20 feet is included in the contract along with filter equipment and lighting.

The pool will be located just east of the clubhouse where it may be observed from the patio.

Concession, Golf Links Planned

Mrs. Charles Roe, Sr., Plans Waterfront Facilities For Recreational Purposes, With Consent of Navi. Dist. to Include Miniature Golf Course

At a special meeting on Thursday afternoon, the Navigation District and Mrs. Charles Roe, Sr., agreed upon erection of recreational facilities on the Rockport waterfront.

According to Mrs. Roe, she intends to erect a concession stand near where the old Patio once stood, and to build a miniature golf course on the triangle of land on which the Woman's Club now stands, hoping, by offering these facilities to make the town and harbor more attractive to tourists and casual visitors.

Plans for the building are now being considered, and Mrs. Roe hopes to have it completed in the near future.

The concession will dispense soft drinks, bathing needs, and similar items, which are not available at the present time, and will have attached rest rooms.

C. of C. Directors Meet, Discuss Law Enforcement Here

Chamber of Commerce directors, at their regular meeting on Tuesday night discussed a number of matters, including the need of more law enforcement in city and county areas.

A number of the directors were concerned over growing vandalism, traffic evasions, peeping toms, thefts and similar evidences of law evasions, and it was decided at the meeting to bring this to the attention of various civic bodies of the area, to see what can be done to correct the situation.

One of the more distressing aspects of this at the present time has been the growing use of automobiles by minors without driving licenses who pay no attention to traffic safety regulations, several of the directors pointed out.

In addition to this, the group took up the matter of a ball park needed for the older boys of the community, who are no longer able to use the old diamond, which is now being used to foster the church league. This matter was turned over to the civic affairs committee, Seth Steele, chairman, for action, and it was suggested that the committee contact city, county and school board officials, to see if another suitable site could not be located.

Tom Roper reported to the directors on road signs for the area, and Mrs. J. D. Griggs, chairman of the membership committee, announced that three new members had been secured since the last meeting. These were: Balboa Courts (Mr. and Mrs. William Hottle), Phillips Service Station (L. W. Hight) and Chester Johnson.

Mrs. Charles Roe, Sr., reported for the tourist promotion committee, on the progress of plans for the outboard marathon to be held here August 11, and Jack L. Baughman, chamber publicity chairman, gave a line-up on the publicity releases being made on this. Before the race has been finished, he said, every daily newspaper, most of the weekly newspapers, and all the radio and TV stations in Texas, to the tune of 494, would have been contacted at least six times on the race with information on it and the beauty contest. Plans for these will appear in next week's Pilot.

Mrs. Mary Juergens, chamber manager, pointed out that she was receiving more and more requests for rates on some sort of package deal, whereby large groups could come here, at so much per day, covering food, room and entertainment. Seth Steele pointed out that this might well be handled on a coupon basis, books of tickets being issued to cover these things for a flat price. A committee, Melvin Borchert, chairman, has been appointed to look into the matter.

The directors then took up the matter of insurance for the Chamber of Commerce building, and authorized Jack McDavid to prepare the necessary papers for this.

The new pit and sheltered arbor make a nice addition to the waterfront, and the Lions are to be congratulated.

Sale of Two Rockport Tourist Courts Closed: Expansion Planned

Both transactions were handled by Mrs. R. B. Sipe.

The sixteen unit motel will be operated under the name of Balboa Courts.

Hottle has plans for extension of the facilities of both courts, and intends to start construction this week on a fishing pier one thousand feet long, to be lighted for night fishing, and intends to expand the courts sometime in the near future by adding at least six more units.

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Marine News
 According to the latest statistical report by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, landings of fish and shellfish in Texas have declined approximately 17 million pounds over the same period a year ago, most of the drop being accounted for by decreased production of shrimp.
 Landings of these shellfish in the first three quarters of last year amounted to 53.5 million pounds, contrasted with only 38.29 million during the same period this year.
 At least part of this drop is due to smaller catches from the Campeche and Mexican coastal areas south of the Rio Grande where Texas boats have, for some years, fished the high seas outside Mexican territorial waters.
 These fishermen have always been a bone of contention between this country and Mexico, and since recent Mexican efforts to extend their offshore limits to a hundred miles have failed, Mexican

 gunboats have increased their harassment of American shrimpers, with the result that production from the entire area south of the border has declined greatly.
 In addition, a number of Texas boats fishing off Campeche have preferred to make the shorter run to Florida with their catches, and have unloaded them there, to the detriment of Texas statistics.
 Fishermen throughout the Coastal Bend areas were more inclined to attribute the drop in actual production along the Texas coast to high seas and stormy weather which have been exceptionally prolonged this spring.
 "I do not feel that our low production is due to any shortage in shrimp," one prominent operator said, "but we have been badly hampered by the weather, and still are, even though we're coming to a time of the year when we should be able to do some consistent fishing."
 In other species reports for the period, redfish declined 48,797 pounds; trout dropped 75,254; flounder production tapered off from 74,831 in the first eight months of last year to 42,233 pounds in the same period of 1956; production of black drum dropped 205,000 pounds; red snapper dropped from 808,722 to 518,070; sheepshead dropped eight tons; 7,000 less pounds of warsaw were produced, and menhaden declined 1.2 millions, while other species were off in proportion.

His new charge is slightly larger than the Aransas Refuge, which contained only 47,000 acres, but like the Texas sanctuary, that in Oklahoma also contains some vanishing species on its 60,000 acres. There are more than 1,000 head of buffalo, constituting one of the largest herds in the world, and approximately 350 head of longhorn cattle. Besides this, the Wichita Refuge is noted for its elk, deer, antelope, and wild turkeys, all of which would be destroyed if landgrabbers in the army have their way, and turn the refuge into an adjunct of nearby Fort Sill.

The refuge is famous for its scenic attractions and camping facilities also, and last year nearly a million visitors used its facilities, the second highest count in the Wildlife Refuge system.
 The rugged terrain, with granite mountains which intrude an ancient sedimentary area, offers a wide variety of attractions, and under the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service program the refuge has been improved to become a classic example of the tall grass prairie such as the earliest settlers found in this country.

Whooping Cranes' 'Papa' Transferred

Julian Howard, the whooping crane's papa, has been transferred from Aransas Wildlife Refuge, which he has managed for the past seven years, to manage the Wichita Mountains Wildlife Refuge, near Lawton, Oklahoma, effective about July 15.
 Assistant refuge manager J. J. Harmon will be acting manager over the Aransas refuge until a permanent appointment is made.
 Wichita Mountains Refuge is, at the moment, a political hot potato, due to the army's effort to grab most of the sanctuary for artillery practice and, some conservationists claim, to furnish armed forces brass with a hunting preserve.
 Nevertheless, it is a promotion for Howard, and practically amounts to a return home, for he was stationed there for many years before coming to the Aransas Refuge in 1949.

Since that time, he has been the papa of the whooping cranes, and under his unremitting care, during the winter stay, enough cranes have been sent back north each year to raise the flock to a record breaking 28 birds, without Crip, Josephine and their baby.
 Besides the whoopers, Aransas Refuge cared for great numbers of other migratory birds, as it was one of two key sanctuaries on the Texas coast. Every winter around 100,000 ducks, 17,000 geese and 2,500 sandhill cranes (first cousins of the whoopers) made their home on the refuge. Along with these were approximately 300 species of passerine and shore birds, javelinas, and enough deer to allow the State of Texas to trap more than 11,000 for stocking other Texas ranges.

Howard says he will miss the whoopers which have occupied so much of his time during the past years, but he added, "the Wichita Refuge is on their flyway, and maybe one or two of them will stop off to see me, now and then."
