

Rockport C of C Directors Hold Called Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Rockport Chamber of Commerce was omitted, due to the semi-annual banquet, and replaced by another called during this week.

Director Dick Picton, who is also a member of the Navigation Board, reported that the Naviga-

tion District was experimenting with a tiling jetty at Fulton, and is doing everything possible to keep the beach there from eroding. He also said that nothing had been done in regard to construction between the mainland and Frandolig Island.

Tom Roper, immediate past-president of the Chamber, and an active worker with the Chamber for the past five years, tendered his resignation as director due to ill health, and the Board accepted it with regret.

The publicity and tourist promotion chairmen reported upon the recent outboard marathon, from Freeport to Rockport. Mrs. Charles Roe, chairman of the tourist promotion group, said that the cost of the affair had been largely met by funds allotted to her group and by a small amount realized from the entrance fees, but reported that there was still a balance to be met. The Directors voted to take this from the general fund of the Chamber, rather than to call on the men and firms who had underwritten the project.

Need for new folders during the coming year was discussed, both for mailing pieces and for distribution at sports shows and through travel agencies. Mrs. Mary Juergens, Chamber manager, said that the last ones prepared by the Chamber had almost been exhausted.

President Arthur Bracht then asked the Board to express an opinion on formation of a Coast Guard Auxiliary Unit in Rockport. The Directors voted to ask the Coast Guard Auxiliary Unit in Corpus Christi to furnish a speaker to explain what such a unit is, what its duties are, and how one may be formed. The time of such a meeting will be announced later.

A letter of thanks was forwarded to Judge W. G. Gayle, of the 36th District Court, expressing the Chamber of Commerce's appreciation over the fact that this year, for the first time in 50 years, he had decided not to open the fall term of court on Labor Day, but to wait until the day after.

Capt. and Mrs. Bruce Davis Tour England and Scotland in This Issue

Last week we left Captain and Mrs. Bruce Davis and their family on the shores of the English Channel, getting ready to tour both England and Scotland. Captain Davis' letter to his parents here, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Lee Davis, continues:

Leaving Dover we drove on through London to North England—Leicester, where we spent the night. Our objective the next day was Bradford in Yorkshire. This has a personal interest since Mary's family (Mr. and Mrs. S. F. Jackson of this city) that is a branch of them, came from there. We went to the town of Bowling (which spelled correctly is Bolling) now a part of Bradford. Here we visited the home of Mary's ancestors, Bolling Hall. It is that branch of the family from which Bart derived his middle name.

The hall is quite old, the earliest portion, the tower, dating from 1320, possibly earlier. It is in a perfect state of preservation, as it has been converted into a museum. The earliest Bolling in the area was William de Bolling, who must have been a good man because in 1165 he and his sons were benefactors to Kirkstall Abbey—not too far away.

I visited Mr. Snowden, who is an authority on the Hall and family. He showed Mary and I photostatic copies of documents (originals in the British Record office) pertaining to the various generations of the Bolling family who lived here, including many of the marriage charters which indicated that the family was more interested in land than in a loved one.

Of special interest was the story of Robert Bolling who lived at Bolling Hall. During the Wars of the Roses he was compelled to support the Lancastrian side, which was the losing one. He and his son fought at the Battle of Towton, on Palm Sunday, 1461, when the Lancastrians were completely routed. He escaped death, but was named in a bill passed by the first parliament of Edward IV's reign and attainted of high treason. In 1465 his estates were

County Court Deals With Three DWI Cases Since First of Sept.

The third, State of Texas vs. David Madison Davidson, was tried Monday afternoon. Madison plead guilty and was sentenced to three days in jail, loss of his driver's license for six months, and to pay a fine of \$50, with \$21 costs.

Commissioners' Court Accept Bids on New Courthouse Counters

The Commissioners' Court, at its regular meeting, accepted a bid of \$33,336.90 from Al's Woodworking Shop, to furnish counters in the new County Clerk's and County Tax Assessor-Collector's offices. Items that went to make up the bid were: Millwork, \$1675; finish hardware, \$194.60; Counter tops, \$302; Finishing and painting, \$180; labor, \$500; miscellaneous items, \$326. 40; and 5% fee, \$158.90.

Discussion of the matter of compiling a delinquent tax return supplement for the past two years then came before the commissioners. These, on a motion made by W. B. Allen, decided to employ the C. R. Law Tax Records Company to compile these records, after January 1, 1957.

A discussion was held among the commissioners upon the operation of the Sheriff and Tax Assessor-Collector's office, and the assessment of real property by the assessor. It was unanimously decided by the commissioners that the present budget is sufficient for the operation of the office, and County Judge John D. Wendell was directed to write a letter to Sheriff and Tax Assessor-Collector A. C. Shivers, stating that the commissioners' court wishes, and the disposition they have taken in regard to the collecting and assessing state and county taxes.

Judge Wendell's vacation period was set at any other time after September 13th, and the Judge's secretary, Mrs. Guy Barber, was also granted two weeks, the same as other county employees, with the right to reject the vacation and to receive two weeks' salary in advance.

Two thousand dollars were transferred from to the General Fund of the County to the Peace Officer's Salary Fund.

District Court Has Busy Session

Grand Jury Returns Five True Bills During Early Part of Session, Then Reconvenes This Week; Four Men Sentenced; Five Divorces Granted

The 36th District Court, Judge W. G. Gayle of Beeville, presiding, has had one of its busiest fall terms in some time, dealing with a number of criminal cases as well as the usual civil docket.

The grand jury, which convened on Sept. 4, the first time in fifty years that court has not opened on Labor Day, handed down five indictments, on robbery by assault, cattle rustling, theft of personal property in excess of \$50, and worthless check, and reconvened on Sept. 12.

Juan Tomas Tristan, Pedro Guzman, and Rosendo Ramirez all plead guilty to a charge of robbery by assault of D. T. Jordan, of Aransas Pass. According to the evidence Tristan held a knife on Jordan, while he and Guzman robbed the Aransas Pass man of \$16 and his watch. The third man, Ramirez, took no actual part in the holdup, but remained at the wheel of the car while the hijacking was going on.

Judge Gayle sentenced Tristan to three years in the penitentiary; Guzman was given a three-year suspended sentence; and Ramirez was also given a suspended sentence, but drew only two years instead of three.

Joe Ramirez, sentenced in the spring term of court to a 3-year suspended sentence after being found guilty of the burglary of a local filling station, had his suspension revoked and was sentenced from two to three years in the state penal institution.

On the civil docket there were an unusual number of suits for trespass to try title. Seth H. Steele vs. C. J. Pitman was awarded to the plaintiff, as were similar suits as follows: Seth H. Steele vs. John McFarland et al; J. R. Allen vs. Herbert Gunner et al; Aransas County Independent School District vs. the City of Rockport; Gussie Lee Cassell vs. W. M. Hynes et al.

In Robert McBride et ux vs. Aransas County, suit for a permanent injunction, the plaintiffs were denied an injunction and filed notice of appeal. In Mary Sylvia Stelle vs. Walter Neal Steele, writ of habeas, the plaintiff was held in contempt of court.

Five divorces have been granted so far. These were: Marie McRae vs. W. M. McRae; Willie May Mullin vs. James M. Mullin; Eva Sanchez Saenz vs. Thomas Saenz, divorce granted and custody of child awarded maternal grandparents; Naomi Johnson vs. Hubert Johnson; Leo Nelson Prophet vs. Barbara Prophet; and there were a number of similar suits still to be heard.

Two cases of cattle rustling were tried on Tuesday, Sept. 11, against George W. Farrell and A. L. Dubberly. Both defendants waived juries. Farrell drew a 3-year suspended sentence; Dubberly was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary.

Two other criminal indictments were being held, pending the arrest of the defendants, those for theft of personal property and for obtaining money with a worthless check.

The guest speaker, Mr. E. L. Galylean, director of research and records for the Texas State Teacher's Association, Austin, will speak on Teachers' Retirement Amendment No. 4, which will be voted on November 6 at the general election.

returned to him by the king, to whom he addressed his petition. In 1487 he died and his will expressed the wish to be buried "before ye Hie Aultar of Bradford Kirk", the church, now a cathedral, which we visited. Mr. Snowden presented me with some photos of the Hall taken a few years ago.

From Bradford we drove north into Scotland to Edinboro, as the Scots call it. This is a city where some of my ancestors lived, and with a name like Bruce Gordon I felt completely at home. We visited the Castle and strolled the park opposite Queens Street. The afternoon was misty, but, despite this, there was a concert going on and the boys were real enthused by the bagpipes. The British jack was flying from every window, as the Queen and Duke had been visiting there the previous day.

I was anxious to visit my relatives at Glasgow, so pushed on. We arrived there to find that they had gone to north Scotland, to Inverness. They had written me a letter with their address, but we hadn't gotten it before we left home. Having missed the connection altogether, we went to Greenock, where I visited my grandfather's grave. Leaving Greenock we drove north along Loch Lomond, through some beautiful country. We spent the night here and went on by way of Ardlin, Crianlarich, to Killin, down to Stirling, where we visited the castle. The boys picked some heather which was in bloom, although it is not until August that it really comes into its own. Unfortunately the sprigs we were going to send disappeared.

Our next stop was at Wigton, a small town whence came some of Mary's folks. My trip to Ireland I gave up.

We proceeded south to Dumfries and Carlisle, and spent the night at Lancaster. This is where the Bartons, Mary's ancestors, came from, from Ireland—an officer in the forces of the Earl of Essex. They had lands in the County of Monaghan, where Captain William Barton was Captain and Governor of Carrickmacross Castle. He fought in King James' army and it was in this castle that the Reverend Thomas Barton, who came to America in 1730, was born. He settled in Pennsylvania, and married Esther Rittenhouse, sister of David Rittenhouse, first director of the U. S. mint. The first Rittinghausen (as the name was spelled originally) was born in 1644 in Germany and came to Pennsylvania in 1689, where he built the first paper factory on the American continent. In 1706 he was also elected a Mennonite bishop, and is buried in the churchyard at Germantown, Penn.

The Reverend Thomas Barton had a very colorful and interesting life on the Pennsylvania frontier, where he was rector of St. James Church. He fought in the French-Indian Wars, was a graduate of Trinity College, Dublin, and during the American Revolution remained a loyalist, dying behind the British Army lines in New York in 1780. He is buried in the chancel of St. George's Church there.

His son, William, educated in England, was appointed a judge by General Washington, and was one of the co-designers of the United States seal. Imagine this of a son whose father was forced to quit the country because of his British loyalty. William's son, William Paul Crillon Barton was a navy officer, author, professor of botany at the University of Pennsylvania and organized and became the first chief of the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery.
