This jet stream is a sporadic, high-altitude wind, resulting from the interplay of tropical and polar at from 20,000 to 35,000 feet, from hour to hour, Graff pointed out.

In wintertime this stream, starting over the bleak coasts of Siberia, crosses the Pacific, drops southward along the western coast of the United States, swings to to Rockport and Corpus Christi and then takes a northern and eastern course, past Dallas and towards the Atlantic coast.

Postal patrons this coming Christmas season can speed the processing and assure quicker delivery of their Christmas parcels most of them in south Texas. and cards by availing themselves During that time he has disof various postal services and free postal information pamphlets, about early surveys in the region. Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield announced today.

The services mentioned by the Postmaster General include:

1. This year, for the first time, sealed parcels may be mailed at the third- or fourth-class postage rates without labels, notations, endorsements, or hieroglyphics of any kind authorizing the opening of the parcels for postal inspection. Packages sealed with modern sealing materials or even with just plain Christmas seals should carry better in the mail than unsealed ones. Strong cord should also be used.

2. Combination Mail, which was used for the first time during last Christmas season, and which permits a mailer to enclose a letter or message inside a gift parcel and pay the appropriate postage on it plus the postage for the package itself. Postage for letters must be placed on outside of

3. Certified Mail, also used for the first time in the 1955 season, which permits mailers to have proof of delivery of Christmas letters, cards or parcels having no intrinsic value for a postal fee of 15 cents plus first-class post-

The free postal pamphlets available at all post offices are entitled "Packaging and Wrapping Parcels for Mailing" and "Domestic Postage Rates and Fees".

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



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

Acronize has been approved in the United States for use on poultry and the formula developed for fish has been under study for some time by officials of the United States Food and Drug Administration. Formulas for use on red meat and other perishable food products are also under study.
