Universal Fishing License Law Affects Salt Water Sports Anglers

Salt water sports fishermen, who in the past have had no license problem, will soon be required to secure a license before playing their favorite sport.

The legislature, at its recent session, passed a measure which calls for individual fishing license by salt water sports fishermen for the first time, and raises the ordinary fishing license fee for fresh water anglers. The new law, which becomes effective Sept. 1, 1957, sets the license fee for both salt water and fresh water anglers at \$2.15.

Under the new law, it shall be unlawful for any person to fish in any of the waters of this state without first having procured from the Game and Fish Commission, or its authorized agent, a fishing license, the fee for which shall be \$2.15.

There are these exceptions: No persons under seventeen years of age and no person over sixty-five years of age shall be required to possess the license. No person, or member of such person's immediate family, shall be required to hold the license when fishing upon property he owns or upon which he resides. Also, no license shall be required of persons fishing with trotline, throw line, or ordinary pole and line having no reel or other winding device attached when fishing in the county of his residence. No other fishing license shall be required of a person who holds a commercial fishing license issued in this state.

Toddie Lee Wynne, Jr., of Dallas, president of Sportsmen's Clubs of Texas, an organization which pressed for passage of the universal fishing license bill, said the estimated \$650,000 to be raised annually by the fishing license act would be added to the new funds being earmarked for fisheries work.

The legislature also passed a bill raising the hunting license fee from \$2.15 to \$3.15. This new license fee likewise becomes effective Sept. 1, 1957.

Navigation Board Adopts Policy On Harbor Businesses

At the regular meeting of the Board of Navigation and Canal Commissioners, held on June 5, several applications for establishing business structures over Rockport Harbor were received, and the Board, after due consideration of these, issued the following statement:

"Since the primary function of the harbor is for boats, and not business enterprises, there should be no further businesses operating over the basin other than those existing now.

"It was only to improve the appearance of the harbor, and replace certain unsightly baitstands long in existence, that a limited number of small bait houses were built and carefully spaced. Their construction has in no way opened the door for further business ventures over the water. It can be readily understood that if the District were to set a precedent, by allowing introduction of a different type of business over the harbor, we would soon be flooded with applications of various kinds to the point where we would have to sacrifice dockage space."

Many Inconsistencies Between The Original Airport Contract And One Now Governing Operations At Site

"There are many inconsistencies between the first contract signed allowing the Navy to use Aransas County airport, and the later one signed in 1948," said County Judge John D. Wendell, "and the commissioners' reply to Navy demands for continued use, despite protests by commissioners and residents of Fulton, will depend a great deal on which contract takes precedence, and what legal interpretation is placed on it."

The original contract was signed in 1943, transferring 700 acres of land from the county to the Federal government, for a CAA airport, which could be used for touch and go landings by naval trainees. Paragraph seven of this agreement stated that from six months after termination of World War II the government was to be allowed joint and equal use of the field, for as long as it desired, without charge.

However, in 1948, after the field had been declared surplus and the county had once more taken over its management, a new contract was negotiated. This also allowed the government joint and equal use of the field and to take over in case of emergency declared by the President or Congress, without charge, using the field and any improvements, such as the big hangar the county has built for civilian use, by paying for such buildings added without Federal aid, and paying the necessary maintenance costs and a fair rental.

The Navy is willing to pay \$500 a month rental for joint use of the field for touch and go land-

ings; the Commissioners' Court and residents of Fulton don't want the Navy planes using the field at any price.

Fulton residents complain of the noise, which makes it impossible for students in Fulton Elementary School to hear at times, and interference with the tourist business waking late-sleeping vacationers and guests, who are irritated.

The County Commissioners are concerned with this, but still more with the fact that the Navy has not carried out its agreement governing use of the field.

"The first thing we knew," said one of the commissioners, the Navy had practically taken over the administration building and phone, and we had to move our airport manager out, despite the fact that it was supposed to be a joint operation. They've been awfully rough on the building, too.

"Navy officers would promise anything and everything, but they never stuck to any agreement they made, and we were unlucky enough not to have the agreements in writing.

"They're ruining our air traffic, despite the fact that we have a fine airport, and driving civilian planes elsewhere."

The Commissioners' Court met with Judge Wendell this morning to discuss the matter further, and this afternoon Judge Wendell had a meeting scheduled with Lee C. Clarke, Navy Realty Officer.

Tomorrow afternoon, a Navy delegation meets again with the Commissioners, in an effort to come to some agreement.

Commissioners Vote To Pay Attorneys For Moore Trial

The Commissioners Court at its regular meeting on Monday, voted to pay local attorneys Ellis L. Clark and Joe Caldwell, court appointed to defend Donald Eugene Moore, for expenses incurred during the trial.

Clark, who was also attorney for the defendant in the Hawkins manslaughter trial, will also be reimbursed for costs he defrayed in that case.

Two new subdivision plats were also approved, the Oscar Lee subdivision, embracing the Beacon Courts property, and the Bayview addition.

The matter of voting a 5c per \$100 tax for parks to be constructed and maintained by the County was then discussed, but Commissioners decided to postpone any such action at present.

Aransas Wildcat Testing at 9,272

Slick Oil Corp. of Houston No. 1 K. E. Werland, slated 9,800-ft. Aransas County wildcat nine miles northeast of Gregory, was bottomed at 9,272 feet drillstem testing an unreported interval. No information is being released on drillstem tests at the project in Section 52, Sixth Addition to Taft Farm Lands.

Getty Oil Co. (Tidewater Oil Co.) No. State Tract 124, slated 10,500-ft. wildcat 3 1/2 miles northeast of Rockport in Aransas Bay, was drilling below 9,809 feet with mud logger.

Board roads are being built at Tennessee Gas Transmission Co. No. 6 Bennett C. Ocker, slated 9,600-foot wildcat eight miles southwest of Austwell in Block 4, Lucas Subdivision, Maria Jesusa Ximenes Survey, A-224. J & C Drilling Co. of Refugio has the contract.

Heep Oil Corp. and others No. 3 H. T. Sellers, West Rockport Field test three miles west of Rockport, was logging to 8,620 feet on a 10,000-foot permit.

Section from 8,291-8 feet showed a working pressure of two pounds and yielded 1,200 feet of oil and gas-cut water cushion, 90 feet of oil-cut rathole mud and 1,519 feet of salt water on a test through 4-inch chokes from 8,291-98 feet. Bottomhole flowing pressure was 2,800 pounds and shut-in pressure was 3,290 pounds.

Working pressure was zero and recovery was the 1,200-foot water cushion, 90 feet of salt water and 30 feet of rathole mud on the test through 1/4-inch chokes from 8,539-50 feet. Bottomhole flowing pressure was 665 and 570 pounds and shut-in pressure was 2,505 pounds. Location is on a 1,354.2-acre lease.

Camp director is Mrs. Shelby Torrance, instructor of physical education at Del Mar College.

Mrs. Torrance is a graduate of the University of Texas and took her master's degree at Columbia University. She was at Camp Arcadia in Maine for one year and was head counselor and assistant director of Camp Abana in Maine for four years.

Mrs. Torrance is assisted by: Miss Audrey Deanna Schroeter of Yorktown, business manager; Mrs. Dan Brown of Aransas Pass, waterfront director; Miss Ruby Lee Pyle of Odem and Miss Sue Ann Cox of Victoria, assistant waterfront directors, and Miss Elizabeth Ray of Corpus Christi, camp nurse.

Unit leaders are: Deborah Lee Trapp, Kathleen Weatherford, La Verne Ross and Pat Ocker. Lillian Burnett of Corpus Christi is assistant unit leader.

'Either or Else', Navy Tells Court

Representatives of Naval Air Station Tell Commissioners That Naval Personnel Could Operate Airport If This is Necessary

The Navy moved four of its biggest guns into action Monday afternoon and — in effect — told protesting Aransas County Commissioners that it was a case of either or else — either the Commissioners' Court agreed to extend the Navy's lease on Aransas County Airport for touch and go landings, or else the Navy would take over and operate the facility itself, causing the county to lose \$5000 annual rental.

Seven File For Navigation Board

Seven men, the three incumbents and four others, have filed for the three positions on Aransas County Navigation Board No. 1 that fall vacant in July of this year.

N. F. Jackson, Dick Picton, and Raymond Owens, each of whom has served two terms as Navigation and Canal Commissioners, have filed for re-election.

Alex Scott, M. W. Cochran, W. S. Coaker, and Ted Atwood are their opponents.

The three having the highest number of votes will be commissioners, as the vote is on a county-wide basis.

The election possesses more than usual interest, due to the fact that the commissioners, instead of being elected for two years, as in the past, with all terms expiring at once, will be chosen for two, four and six-year terms, after the votes are counted, under a section of the law which says:

"The Board of Navigation and Canal Commissioners of any Navigation District may by resolution provide for six-year terms of office for Commissioners, provided that the terms of office be arranged so that one shall expire every two years. Commissioners shall hold office for terms of two, four and six years, respectively; and the respective terms of office shall be determined by the following method:

"Such commissioners shall draw by lot, and the commissioner drawing the number one shall serve for two years, number two shall serve for four years, and number three shall serve for six years."

Upon expiration of the term of any commissioner, after this procedure has been followed, his successor shall be elected for a six year term. Hence, as the resolution has already been passed by the present board, after commissioners have been elected on July 6, their terms of office will be allotted in this manner.

Presbyter's Convention will begin at 11:00 a. m. at the First Presbyterian Church, and Presbyterial Convention will begin at 1:00 p. m. at Woodlawn. Rev. A. Amott Ward is Chairman of the Nominating Committee for this proposed Presbyterial, and N. F. Jackson is Chairman of the Sub-Committee on finance for the council, while Mrs. N. F. Jackson is finance chairman for the Presbyterial.

CITY COUNCIL TABLES SUBDIVISION PLATS

The City Council, at its regular meeting Monday, tabled two subdivision plats presented to them by County Engineer James A. Jarboe. One of them was for Bayview Addition at Fulton, the other was a re-plat on the south 300 feet of Block 68, Mathis Division.

Commander D. K. Gibb, Commandant, ATU 307, Lt. Commander M. W. Greenstein, A. T. U. 501, Lt. Commander J. Henson, Staff, Chief of Naval Advanced Training, and Realty Officer Lee C. Clarke of the Corpus Christi Naval Air Station presented the ultimatum which came after a long series of skirmishes between NAS representatives and the embattled residents of Fulton over the past two or three years, climaxed by a mass turn out of local objectors at a meeting in April.

At that time approximately 140 people from Fulton, bearing a petition of 161 names, met with representatives of the Navy and with the Commissioners' Court, and pointed out that Fulton Elementary School, with its growing population of scholastics was on a direct line with the SE-NW runway of the airport, much used for practice landings, and that other residents of the area were increasing. In view of this, various members of the delegation said, danger to residents of the county was growing day by day, as training planes from NAS continued to use the runway.

Moreover, they said, noise from low-flying planes made it impossible to conduct classes at certain times, as well as disrupting normal living in the northern half of Live Oak Peninsula.

Opponents pointed out that Naval use of the airport adversely affected the area's economy in many ways. Civilian utilization had fallen off to an alarming extent, tourist court business at Fulton had been badly hurt; and the noise had also scared away fish in the bay. These things, they said, had affected the business of all other firms in the community.

At that time, the commissioners agreed to refuse renewal of the Navy's lease, only to find that the Navy intended to push the case.

County Judge John D. Wendell said naval spokesmen pointed out that the Navy could use the airport without a lease, and without payment to the county.

When asked what the Navy would do if the county refused to operate the airport under these conditions, the NAS representatives told the Commissioners' that it would be necessary to man the field with naval personnel.

Judge Wendell pointed out that improvements on the field that had been made by Aransas County, and asked whether the Navy would pay for these improvements, should it prove able to take over the field. This contingency, naval spokesmen said, had not been considered.

The Commissioners promised to answer the Navy's demands at a meeting arranged for June 14, but gave no indication as to what form the answer would take.

New Gulf Filling Station At Fulton

Seth H. Steele is building a new Gulf Filling Station at the corner of Beach and Palmetto Streets in Fulton which will be completed within the next sixty days.

It is of painted masonry of the kind the company calls type B-50.

When finished it will be turned over to Mrs. T. M. Caspary, local Gulf distributor.

RADAR ACCEPTANCE DELAYED BY CHANGES

According to Dick Ratliff, engineer-in-charge, final inspection and acceptance of the radar station here will be delayed at least until July 10, and no personnel from the 813th Squadron will arrive until after that date. The delay has been caused by \$135,000 worth of changes in the original plans.

CPL Announces Plans For Major Expansion

Central Power and Light Company today announced plans for a major expansion of its Lon C. Hill Power Station near Corpus Christi, which will more than double the generating capability of the plant.

CPL President J. L. Bates said the company will receive bids on the project in July and actual construction work is scheduled to begin in September. The plant addition will cost more than \$12,000,000.

The expansion calls for the addition of a 175,000-kilowatt generating unit, which alone will be enough to supply the electrical needs of a city of 300,000. The new turbo-generator will be capable of producing more than twice as much electric power as the largest unit in any other CPL power plant.

Generating equipment for the plant addition was ordered in 1956 and preliminary engineering work has been under way since that time. The new plant addition is scheduled to begin operation in early 1959.

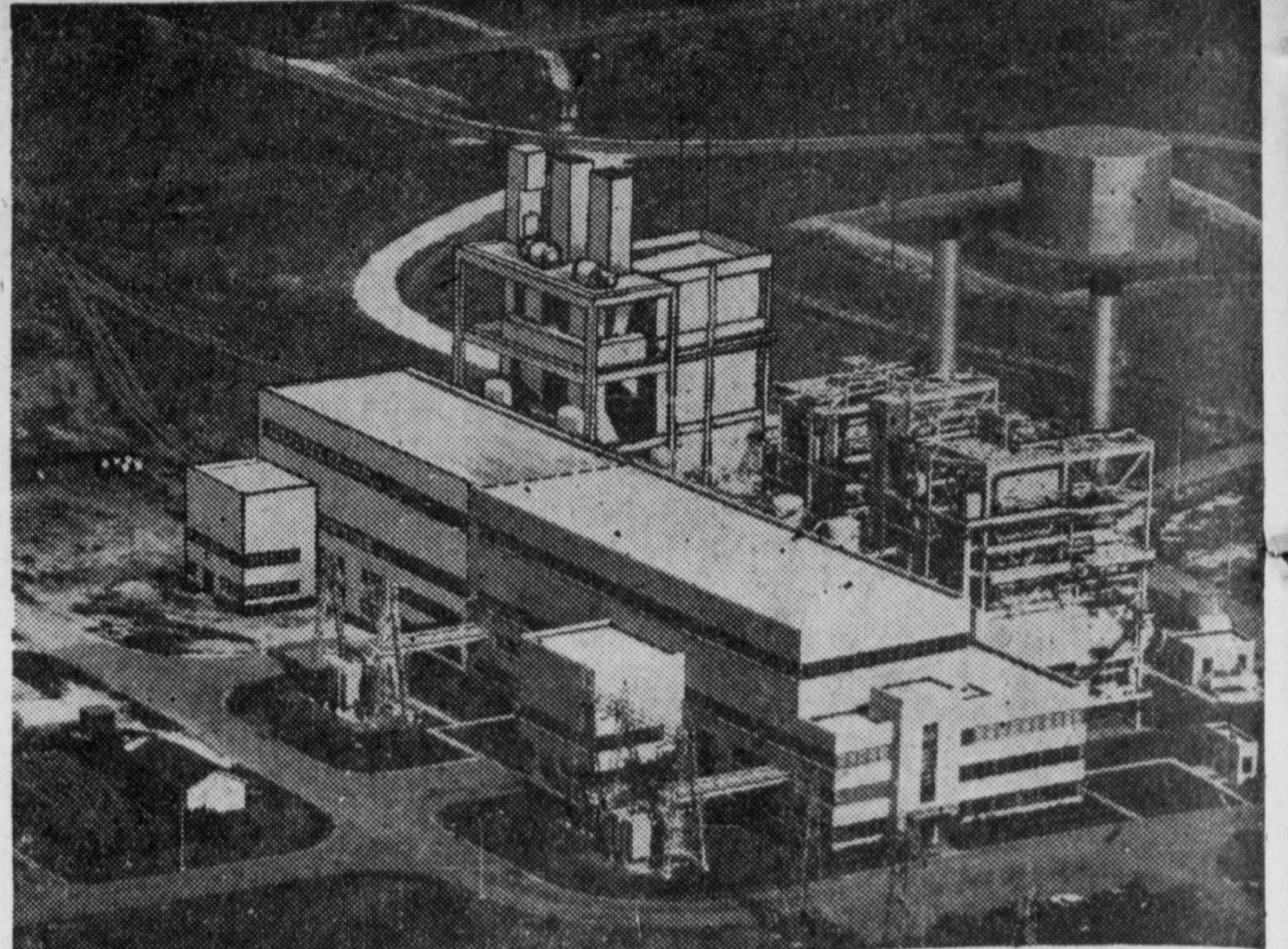
This will be the second time that the Lon C. Hill Station has been enlarged since it went into service in April, 1954, with an initial generating capability of 75,000 kilowatts. The first expansion was completed in 1956 when a second 75,000-kilowatt unit was placed into service.

M. H. Lovelady, CPL vice president and chief engineer, said the new generating unit would be highly efficient and would utilize the latest engineering developments.

He said the new generating unit will operate independently from the other two units, and that a new control room will be constructed. Both the present generating units at the plant are operated from a single control room.

The new turbo-generator will operate at a higher temperature and at a steam pressure more than double that of CPL's present plants. Both the higher temperature and higher steam pressure contribute to greater efficiency of the unit, Lovelady pointed out.

To handle the power output of the new generating unit, the switch yard at the power plant will also be expanded. Included

as part of this program will be the installation of a transformer more than twice as large as any CPL now has in service. The big transformer steps the power up to high voltage for transmission purposes.

When the current expansion is completed in early 1959, Lon C. Hill Power Station will be able to provide CPL customers with 325,000 kilowatts of electricity — more than all South Texas required at any one time in 1953.

The highest customer demand to date has been 468,800 kilowatts, but CPL engineers predict a continued steady increase in the use of electricity in coming years.

As the engineering work on this new plant addition goes forward, another CPL plant — J. L. Bates Power Station at Mission — is under construction. It will have an initial net generating capability of 75,000 kilowatts and will

go into service early next year. When the expansion at Lon C. Hill Station is completed a year later, CPL will be able to supply its customers with 825,000 kilowatts of electricity, almost eight times as much as at the end of World War II.

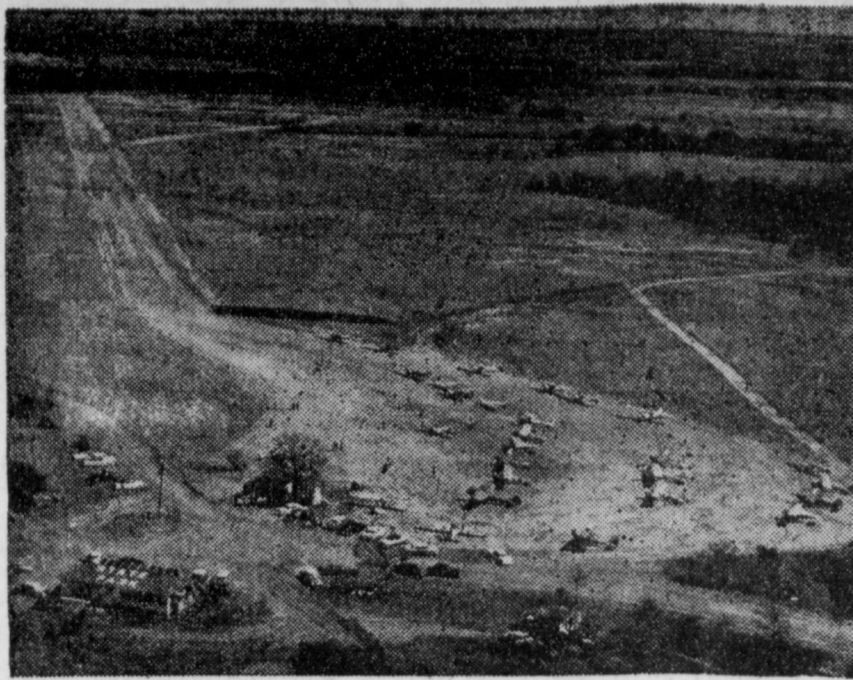

Park of the Week Lake Whitney State Park

Lake Whitney State Park receives its visitors by land, air and water. It is known popularly as the air-minded park. In cooperation with the Texas Aeronautics Commission, Park Concessioner C. E. Long has provided airstrips capable of handling airplanes of any size. One of the strips is 4,000 feet long; the other 3,000 feet. From either, pilots can taxi right up to Fishermen's Inn or to the edge of the 1,000 foot sand beach of the lake.

Road traffic into the park follows a marked route from the town of Whitney and enters the recreation area parallel to the longer of the two air-strips. Boats find a docking place on Frazier Creek. This is particularly convenient for fishermen because the best of the celebrated fishing flats of Lake Whitney lies right off the mouth of Frazier Creek.

Lake Whitney State Park is second largest of four recreational areas assigned to the Texas State Parks Board on reservoirs created by dams of the Corps of Engineers, U. S. Army, and the International Boundary Commission. Not yet fully developed they provide the room for meeting the expanding

park needs of Texas.

Overnight housing is not provided in Lake Whitney State Park, but the timbered land along the lake is provided with attractive camp sites fanned by cool breezes from off the lake. A fine network of gravelled roads reaches these campsites and picnic spots throughout the park.

A thousand-foot sandbeach is one of the popular attractions of Lake Whitney State Park. Access to the beach is made easy by road approaches at numerous places.

The park is probably most notable for its excellent black bass fishing. The large bass here have been found by anglers to offer sport which some declare superior to the joys of trout fishing in northern streams.

Lake Whitney State Park is within two and a half hours driving time for 1,500,000 Texans. More than a million of them, including residents of the Fort Worth-Dallas metropolitan area, can reach the park in two hours. Waco is but short distance away.

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GOOSE ISLAND SLATED FOR IMPROVEMENTS

With the second largest appropriation ever provided for state parks in a single year by the Texas legislature, important improvements can be provided for Goose Island State Park.

Sanitary facilities, camp shelters and fencing needed to keep cattle out of the picnic areas will be among badly needed improvements.

Park litterbugs are subject to penalty under the State Penal Code in an emergency act of the 55th Texas Legislature. The act was signed by Governor Price Daniel and made immediately effective.

Texas has had a law against disposal of waste in a harmful way, but it did not seem to get desired results. The new law defines "refuse" and also sets out specifically what property is protected by the enactment.

The new definition of "refuse" says it shall include garbage, rubbish and all other decayable or non-decayable waste.

Protection of the litterbug law is directed especially to public highways. It defines public highways, however, in a way to include public parks and says the area that is protected shall mean

the entire width between property lines of any road, street, way, thoroughfare, bridge, public beach or park not privately owned or controlled, when any part is opened to the public for vehicular traffic or which is used as a public recreation area, and over which the state has legislative jurisdiction under its police power.

The park entertained 3067 cars from Texas and 122 from out of state in May. There were 353 overnight campers that used its facilities and 16107 daytime visitors.

Only four state parks surpassed it in attendance during the month.
