Navigation there consists principally of tugs with and without barges in tow, commercial fishing vessels and pleasure craft. In order to prevent damage to vessels and installations at this location, the Engineers propose to establish a speed limit of five miles an hour under authority of the District Engineer pursuant to law, and official speed limit signs will be posted. Any protest against the proposed limit should be received by the District Engineer not later than July 24, 1957; otherwise, the Corps of Engineers says, it will be considered that there are no protests.

## MRS. HERRING NEW COUNTY CLERK AS JAMES CLARK HERRING RETIRES AND COUNTY COMMISSIONERS APPOINT HER

James C. Herring, veteran county district clerk of Aransas County, submitted his resignation to the commissioners court Friday morning.

The resignation was accepted and his wife, Mrs. Edith Marie Herring, was appointed to fill out the unexpired term of one and one-half years.

Herring, who recently celebrated his 80th birthday, was born in Rockport and spent his entire life here. The house in which he was born was converted into a private school, known as Steele's School, later becoming Steele's Military Academy. After attending these schools, Herring enrolled in Alamo City Business School.

Herring came from a long line of cattlemen. His father and grandfather were ranchers in the early days of Texas. He ranched on Blackjack Peninsula from 1898 to 1909 when he became associated with Cyrus O. Lucas on Matagorda Island.

Herring's father, John C., came

Grider, a successful Memphis, Tenn., attorney, was flying his own Cessna 195, and had with him his wife, two sons — Billie 16, and Wilson 11 — and his fifteen-year-old daughter Gail, and from here they were bound for Monterey, California, where Grider's brother, Captain John M. Grider, is still in the service. Another daughter, Sallie, was left behind at summer camp.

During World War II, Grider operated in the South China Sea from a base at Perth, on the coast of Western Australia, under Admiral Wright, commandant of submarines in the Southwest Pacific.

"I took over the Flasher from Reuben Whitaker," Captain Grider said, "and he had already hung up a score of some sixty thousand tons, so there wasn't too much left to do, and we did most of that on one patrol."

A patrol out of Perth generally lasted seven or eight weeks, he said, before the Flasher would return to base for re-fitting.

"Then we'd head out again," he continued, "maybe up through the Macassar Straits, running on the surface as much as possible to make speed, and keeping a sharp lookout for aircraft and surface ships. We weren't nearly as worried about the aircraft as we were about the ships, because the ships could stay longer, hunt for us harder, and could carry a lot more depth bombs than any plane."

"After we reached the China Sea we would stay submerged during the daytime and use the periscope for attack, but at night we would surface and attack from there."

"We got six ships on one patrol that way. There were four tankers and 2 destroyers—shidoris. The last patrol that we sunk any ships, we only got two. One of them was a little wooden ship the Japs were using to carry oil in drums, and the other was a small freighter of about 800 tons."

"Along towards the last of the war, the Japs just about ran out of ships. There were eight subs that formed a picket line across a great stretch of the sea in the last months of the war, and for three weeks we didn't see any kind of a ship. The skipper next to us challenged the Flasher to a ball game on the beach to while away the time. Of course we didn't play, but that'll give you some idea of how scarce sea-borne Japanese (Continued on page 5)

## AIRMEN BEGIN TO FILTER IN FOR BASE

## Senator Johnson Says Local Canal Fund Is Approved

Senator Lyndon Johnson, in a telegram to Emory M. Spencer, local attorney and oil man, stated that the Senate has approved over \$800 million in funds for river and harbor construction, included in which is \$890,000 to be expended on the Intracoastal Canal Cut-off between here and Aransas Pass, provided that the bill is ratified in its present form.

If approval is forthcoming from the House, which failed to provide any money for the project in its version of the bill, then residents of Rockport and Aransas Pass may see, within the next year or so, fruition of a dream that had its inception in a Corps of Engineers report on the Gulf Intracoastal Waterway in the vicinity of Aransas Pass, dated July 10, 1946.

Local interests in Aransas Pass requested at that time that an alternate barge route be provided for Intracoastal traffic between Aransas and Corpus Christi Bays, as well as enlargement of the channel between Aransas Pass and Port Aransas be effected.

People of Aransas Pass proposed two routes at the time the request was made, and, later, citizens of Rockport asked that one of these be modified slightly, so that it would be located closer to Rockport.

The first route began at Mile 527.8 on the main channel of the Intracoastal, and extended southwestward to the shore of Redfish Bay, going through Trout Bayou and past the end of Talley Island to the mainland shore, which followed as far as the Ingleside Terminal before rejoining the old route of the canal.

Route B, as it came to be called, left the waterway in Aransas Bay at Mile 530.9 on the present main channel, extending (Continued on page 4)

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## Bids Are Opened On First National Bank Building

Directors of the First National Bank will open bids this afternoon (Thursday) on the construction of a new air conditioned building, James H. Sorenson, executive vice president, said.

The structure will be located across the street north of the present building. It will contain approximately 6,000 square feet.

The present building is one of the city's landmarks. It has served as headquarters for the bank since 1890, and its east wall was wrecked by the 1919 hurricane. It will be torn down and the site cleared next spring in an agreement on exchange of land to secure the site for the new building said F. W. Heldenfels, Sr. president of the bank.

Modern in every respect, the new bank will have one drive-up window on the east side with provisions for two additional windows at a later date. A paved parking lot for customers will be at the rear of the building. Victor Brock and Associates of Corpus Christi are the architects.

Six Corpus Christi contractors and 2 Rockport contractors have checked plans and specifications on the new building.

Officers of the bank are Heldenfels, Sorenson, A. C. Glass and Fred A. Bracht, vice presidents; Charles LaBounty, cashier, and Mrs. Mellinee K. Shults and Mrs. Edna M. Taylor, assistant cashiers.

## Rockport Firemen Win First And Third In Meet At Ingleside

Rockport volunteer firemen, competing with race teams that have been together for many years, won a first and a third place at the South Central District Volunteer Firemen's meeting at Ingleside on Sunday, according to Fire Chief Dick Fox.

Eighteen men attended, Fox said, and Rockport won first in the Paris rules race, with a time of 19.1 seconds, competing against eleven other teams. Team members for this race were Bubba McCabe, Mitchell Ammons, Leo Prophet and Winston Weber.

Another team tied for third place in the pumper race. This consisted of Gary Smith, Weber, Prophet, J. C. Gurley, McCabe, and Ammons.

In other fire department activity, Fox said, a class of eight is receiving instruction every Thursday night under supervision of a Red Cross director from Corpus Christi. Local teachers are Charlie Ankele, Vernon Gray, Elva Mullinax, Ceylon Ammons, Edric Deason and J. C. Keith, and the course in first aid is a hard and thorough one.

At the close of this six weeks' session another class will be started.

Carl Osborn, Elva Mullinax, and A. A. Pasche will represent the Rockport Volunteer Fire Department at the annual Fire Marshal's and Firemen's Training School to be held at Texas A & M College on July 21 - 26.

Civil defense and disaster relief operations will be among the subjects taught, and these will include, rescue training, radiological monitoring, and the use of gas masks. The usual training courses in fire fighting will also be given.

The school, now in its twenty-eighth year, will attract some 1300 students representing fire departments and safety divisions of cities, industries and armed services from Texas and 20 other states.

In addition to the regular facilities of the school, the plant and equipment of the Texas Rescue School will also be utilized.

The rescue school consists of a "disaster street" containing various types of houses and buildings in varying states of demolition, where students are given field instruction in rescuing.

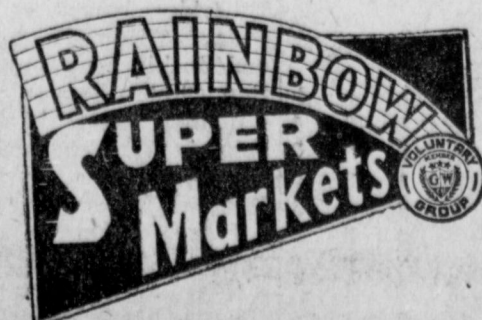

southwesterly through Corpus Christi Bayou and the Morris and Cummings Cut to an old causeway channel which it followed to the western shore of Redfish Bay. From here it followed the shore for about two miles, then swung southeast past Ransom Island to the Morris and Cummings Cut which it followed until it rejoined the present canal at Mile 543.4.

Route C, requested by Rockport citizens (and the one which will be dredged if the appropriation goes through) was a modification of the first route, leaving the Intracoastal at Mile 525.9. From here its route is southwest past the mouth of the Cove, where Aransas County Navigation District No. 1, expects to build its third harbor, cutting through a small neck of land, and eventually joining with the projected first route along the shores of Redfish Bay and running to the same Ingleside Terminal mentioned above.

A section of all three routes, about two miles long, passed close in front of Aransas Pass, at a location about 1400 feet in front of the existing city bulkhead. Route A required 15.1 miles of dredging; Route B called for 12 miles; and Route C calls for approximately 17.2 miles, but is much the more desirable, inasmuch as it opens new harbor and industrial site areas that none of the others would provide.

As late as 1956, and the fifty-first Intracoastal Canal Association meeting in Lake Charles, Col. W. P. McCrone, U. S. District Engineer at Galveston, said that the main channel of the Intracoastal Waterway was completed in this area, except for "the authorized re-alignment between Aransas Bay near Rockport via Aransas Pass, to a junction with the Corpus Christi Waterway. This re-alignment will require a new bridge to span the channel for vehicular traffic between Aransas Pass and Harbor Island. A total of \$31,000 is available this year (1956) for preliminary planning and design of the proposed bridge."

Postoffice Will Ban Miniature Stationery

Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield has announced that letters smaller than 2 3/4 by 4 inches will be banned after July 1, 1959.

This will mean that informal size letters and tiny birthday cards will not be accepted for mailing after that date.

Reason for the change in regulations is the fact that stamp cancelling machines operate best on uniform size envelopes. The post office will also change the size of their stamped envelopes to conform to those generally used commercially.

The announcement by the postmaster general was made in advance of the adoption of the new regulations in order that dealers and persons with small size stationery can use it up, without loss to themselves.

**Park of the Week  
Blanco State Park**

Blanco State Park at the crossing of the Blanco River by U. S. Highway 281 preserves the attractiveness of a typical hill country stream with just enough development to meet the needs of picnickers who find it an enjoyable day-time park.

Six masonry dams on park land along the river provide a series of waterfalls so skillfully built that some of them seem to be natural. Rock work in the park is attractive, including a narrow rock arch bridge, the rock building at the park entrance and a rock and timber pavilion. There is good rock work to be seen also in the private homes separated from the park by rock walls.

Low water crossings below some of the dams make both sides of the river accessible. Small groups can use tables and grills and larger groups can arrange long tables in the pavilion at the first dam with a low water crossing. Restrooms are located at this pavilion. The park is in rodeo country and a rodeo arena and livestock display is an important part of the park activity handled through a local organization.

Cottonwoods, pecan and live oak trees provide most the shade. There is a wading area below the place where Coke Creek flows into the Blanco River and fishing pools be-

low most of the dams. Recent floods have washed out the fish and until restocking it is not profitable to take along a rod and reel.

Travelers using U. S. 281 will find a pleasing and short detour by turning into the park and following the park road through the first low water crossing and continuing up-stream to the next low water crossing just below the Blanco City water supply dam. By continuing on, the park can be re-entered or some of the attractive parts of Blanco can be seen by following the County road back to the town square where it rejoins U. S. 281.

At the square there is a County hospital occupying what once was the County Court House. This became available for its new use when Johnson City became the new County seat.

Numerous peaks are in the vicinity of the park. Persons wishing to climb them should first get permission from the landowners.

Not available this season, but appropriate for by the 1957 session of the State Legislature, are park improvements that will include nine overnight shelters.

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### IT'S THE LAW in Texas

Here's How State Divides Estates  
When There Is No Will

The death of an intestate person (one who has made no will) may give rise to many problems regarding distribution of his separate estate. In the preceding column we investigated the manner of dividing the community estate upon the death of a husband or

wife. Now we shall see that, where separate property is involved, a completely different set of rules applies in determining heirship and apportioning the estate among the rightful claimants.

It may be well to recall that the separate estate of a husband or wife includes property owned by either before marriage, and that which is acquired after marriage by gift or inheritance. Any other property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be community property until the contrary is clearly proved.

Now, here is a general idea as to how your separate property will be divided if you do not make a will with contrary provisions prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and if, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of previously deceased children, the children and their

descendants immediately obtain a full (fee) title in two-thirds of the real estate involved. The surviving spouse receives a life interest in the remaining one-third of the real property, which passes on to the children and their descendants upon the death of the spouse.

The rule for distributing personal property — cash, stocks, bonds, furniture, or any other items not constituting real estate — is different. Here the surviving spouse gets full ownership of one-third, and the children and their descendants inherit the balance.

Now suppose your husband or wife survives, but there are no surviving children or their descendants. In this case the surviving spouse inherits all of the personal property involved.

With regard to real estate, the survivor obtains full title to one-half, and the other half is divided between your mother and father, if both survive you. If only one of them survives, he or she receives only half of this portion, and the other half (or one fourth of the entire real estate) will be divided among your brothers and sisters (and their descendants) who survive. If there are no surviving brothers and sisters and their descendants, then the one surviving parent inherits the full one-half.

Where no parent survives, but there are brothers and sisters and descendants, the full one-half is

divided among these survivors. And, if there are no parents or brothers and sisters (and their descendants) surviving, then the surviving husband or wife inherits all of the real estate.

### Marine News

The Sun Oil Company has requested permission from the Corps of Engineers, U. S. Army, to operate in State tracts 66 and 166 in Aransas Bay; State tract No. 1 in Carlos Bay; and tract No. 3 in Dunham Bay, approximately 5 miles northeast of Rockport.

The company requests amendment of a Department of the Army blanket permit to authorize the erection and maintenance of structures and appurtenances thereto to be used in connection with the drilling of wells for the production of oil, gas or other minerals and for storing and transporting oil, gas or other minerals therefrom; to dredge and maintain channels, canals and slips; to lay and maintain gathering lines, pipe lines and other transportation facilities and to lay and maintain cables. No structures would be erected within 1,000 feet of the center line of the Gulf Intracoastal Waterway.

The requested amendment of the permit consists of the addition of: State Tract No. 166 in Aransas Bay; State Tract No. 1 in Carlos Bay; and State Tract No. 3 in Dunham Bay, and the deletion of: 12 State Tracts in Aransas Bay; 3 State Tracts in Puerto (Port) Bay; 21 State Tracts in St. Charles Bay; 8 State Tracts in Mesquite Bay and 21 State Tracts in Copano Bay or 65 of the original 67 State Tracts covered by the permit.

The Sun Oil Company has asked the Corps of Engineers, U. S. Army, for a permit to operate in Copano Bay, on State Tracts 41, 68, 69, 73, 74, 75, 104 and 119, about five and a half miles northeast of Rockport.

Sun requests an amendment of a Department of the Army blanket permit to authorize the erection and maintenance of structures to be used in connection with the drilling of wells for the production of oil, gas or other minerals, and for storing and transporting oil, gas or other minerals therefrom and the dredging and maintenance of channels, canals and slips and installation of pipe lines. The drilling structures would have a top elevation of 190 feet above the bed of the bay.

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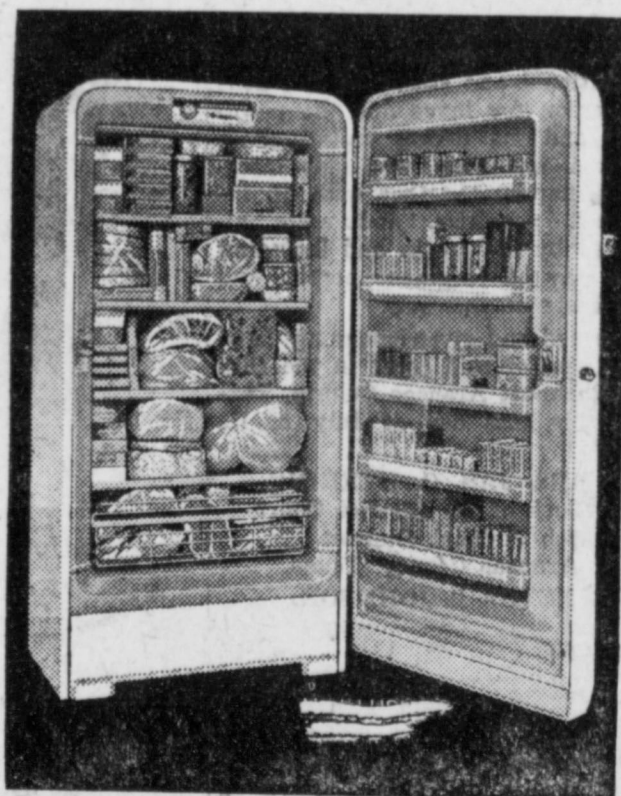
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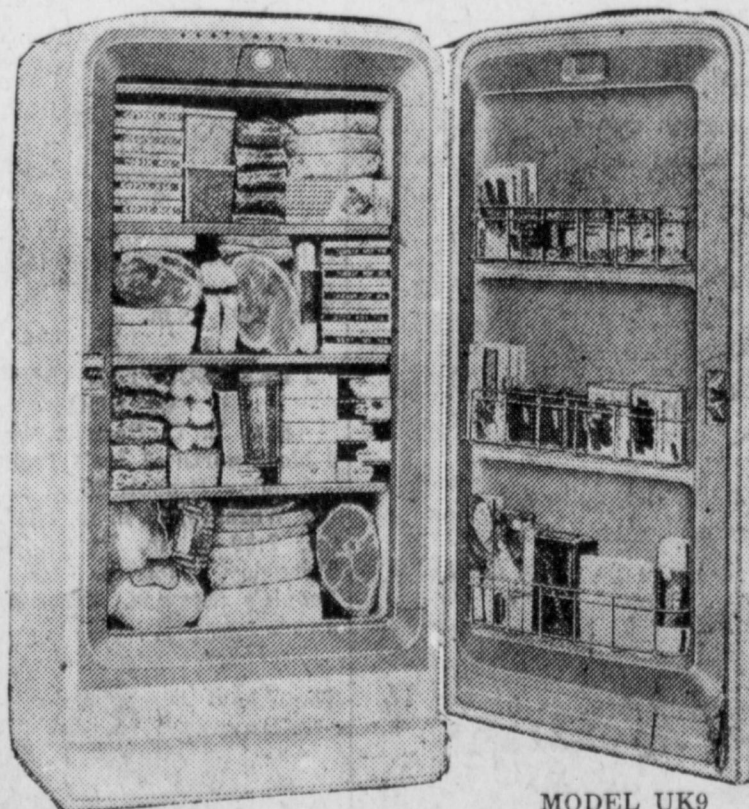
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Rockport Duplicate Bridge Club

traffic had become by that time."

Admiral Wright interjected here to point out that few people had any idea how important the submariners were in World War II, including the submariners themselves.

"Approximately fifty per cent of all tonnage sunk was credited to submariners," he said, "and when you stop to think that only about one per cent of the navy's personnel was in the submarine service you can see what a part they played."

"There's one thing about it," Captain Grider said, "I can't think of any more-pleasant way to fight a war."

Both men agreed that a lot of the public ideas about the submarine service were wrong, and that while any ship at sea during war time was dangerous, submariners were nice work if you could get them.

"It wasn't even particularly lonesome," Grider said. "The admiral sent us a news letter every day. It contained all sorts of things like news of the world; whose wife had had a baby; service gossip and so on, and it sure helped to pass the time away."

The submarine service is different from all other naval service in one particular, and both men agreed that this was extremely important. All ships can submerge, they said, but only submarines can come up!

Both men were loud in their praise of the atomic models now in service.

"For the first time," Grider said, "you have true mobility, and lots of speed under water. Always in our time, when you dove you lost mobility, and you were wide open to attack. Every time we took action against enemy ships we were hunted by their escorts, and some of us were just lucky. Sometimes the Jap destroyers gave up when they'd just kept on a little while longer we'd have had to give up and surface, where we'd have been sitting ducks. Atomics sure have it, for when they're attacked they can take evasive action and in a hurry."

"This has other advantages, for a surfaced sub is a sitting duck for almost anything including another submarine. When I was on the Wahoo, before I got transferred to the Flasher, we saw a big, fat Jap sliding along the surface, and I doubt whether that submersible ever knew what struck it. We let it have a fish in its belly and that was the end of it."

Admiral Wright pointed out here that Grider was better with torpedoes than he was with the kind of fish that live and have their being around Port Aransas. "I took him fishing for three hours," the Admiral said, "and he didn't get anything — anything at all!"

Captain Grider says that he and a Memphis newspaperman, Lydel Sims, are writing a book about his experiences during the war. To be titled "Warfish" it will be published by Little, Brown and Company.

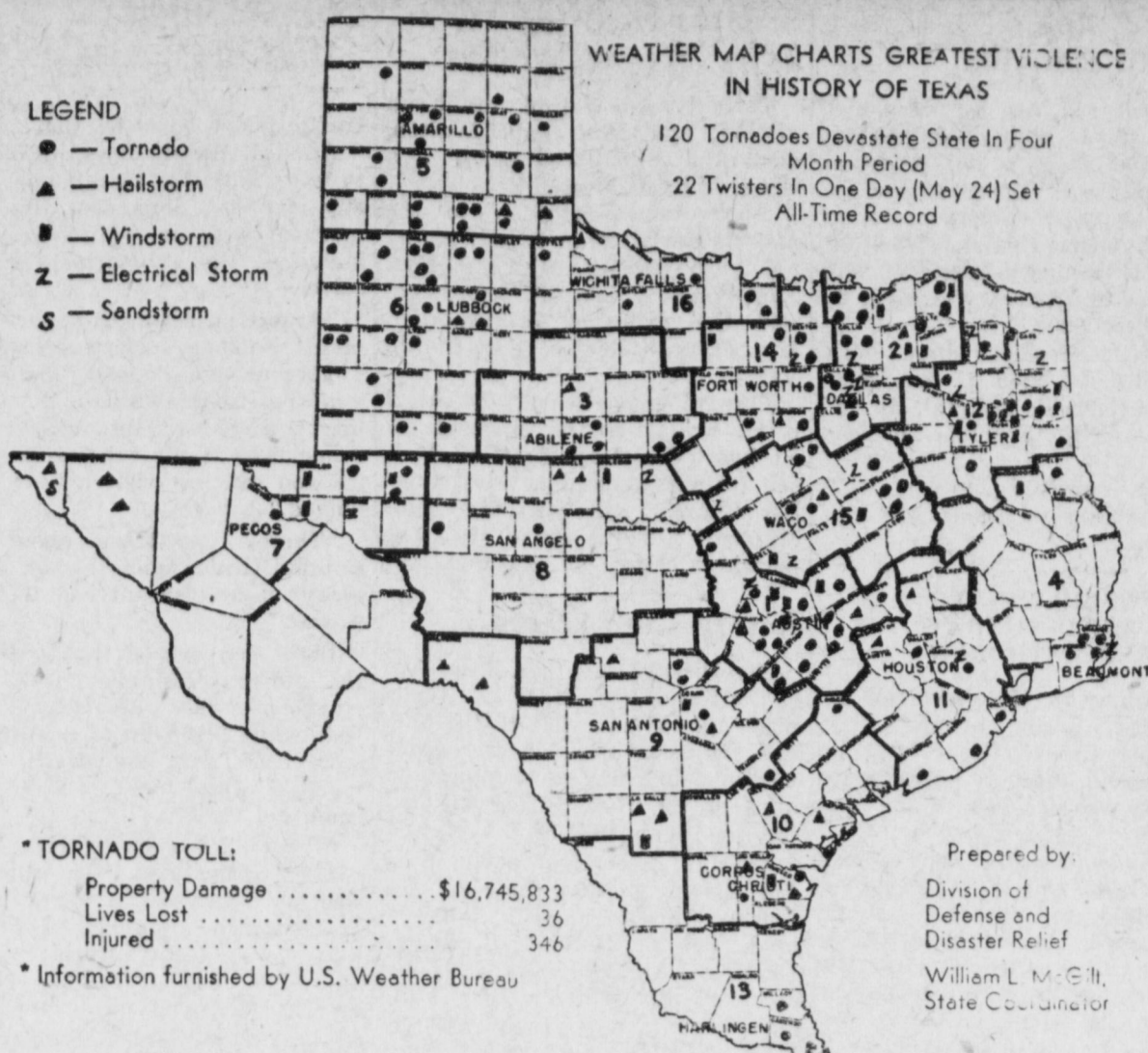

**Weather Costs People of Texas**

Austin — Unprecedented floods, tornadoes and severe weather during the first five months of 1957 have taken a property toll in Texas estimated at \$91,106,224. These are the figures submitted in a report to Governor Price Daniel by State Defense and Disaster Relief headquarters this week.

Preliminary estimates place the flood damage at \$69,700,000. A new survey of crop damage now being conducted may raise this estimate.

The Weather Bureau estimates damage by tornadoes, hailstorms, the March blizzard and other severe weather from February 16 through May 31 at \$16,745,833. This does not include floods and loss of livestock.

State agencies' contribution to disaster operations is now placed at \$3,360,391.

In addition, the cost of Red Cross assistance in meeting eligi-

ble needs of individuals and families is now estimated at \$1,300,000.

A tornado, which struck near Harlingen February 16, touched off a chain of weather violence unequalled in the history of Texas. This was followed by the worst spring blizzard (March 19) ever to hit the Texas Panhandle. With thousands stranded, the death toll was held to a surprising seven. Then came the disastrous Dallas tornado of April 2 that claimed nine lives. This was followed by the devastating Lampasas flood on May 12 that destroyed 90% of the business district, smashed 310 homes and killed five persons. Following close on the heels of this disaster, a roaring funnel descended out of black clouds just before midnight May 16 and destroyed Silverton, killing 19 people.

It was on May 24 that 22 tornadoes churned across a terrified Texas. Scores of other funnels were sighted but did not dip to the ground. Never before in the history of the Weather Bureau had there been such a day of

violence, setting a new record which Texans will not point to with pride.

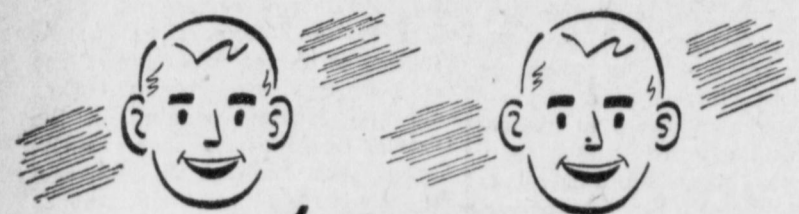
