Shrimpers May Get Paid For Seizures

On Wednesday morning, according to Congressman John Young, the House Merchant Marine and Fisheries Committee received from the sub-committee to which it Public Works Civil Functions apwas originally relegated, House Resolution 5526 which, in effect, authorizes the Treasurer of the United States to indemnify losses incurred in seizures of fishing boats by foreign powers such as those that occur from time to time off the Mexican coast.

Indemnification is pursuant, the Congressman said, during a telephone conversation, to verification by the Secretary of State, who shall make such verification to village. To obtain indemnities for loss above that sum, it is necessary to sue the United States through C. Saal was here from the the U. S. > The bill still faces the House and Senate before it goes to the president, but if it becomes law, the finding of the U.S. Court of Claims is final, with no appeal from its decision.

> The progress of this bill will be watched with a great deal of interest by fishermen and shrimpers of the Gulf coast, for in recent years a number of American boats have been seized along the Mexican coast without cause, according to the shrimpers, who say that they were operating outside the limits of Mexican waters on the high seas.

Only last year, during such a seizure, a Port Isabel Shrimp captain was shot during such an altercation, and many Texas shrimpers have lost gear, time, shrimp, and even their boats when hauled into Mexican courts, after being called thieves and fish pirates in the Mexican press.





HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, providing for the issuance and sale of bonds of the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial essistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State; providing for the payment of such bonds; creating an agency to administer said Fund and to perform other duties prescribed by law; limiting the period during which financial assistance may be granted; and providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proclamation therefor.

BE IT KESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF

TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to known as Section 49-c, as follows:

Section 49-c.
