### **Coastal Towns Planning Ports**

Citizens in at least four Coastal Bend cities - Rockport, Aransas Pass, Ingleside and Victoria-are laying their plans for new or larger salt water ports. Recent developments on the Federal legislative front have practically assured Rockport, Aransas Pass and Ingleside of easier access to the Intracoastal Canal, and guaranteed Victoria the long-awaited canal for which it has been working these past fifty years.

A quarter of a million dollars was included in the 1957 Public Works Bill with which to plan and start construction on an extension of the deep-water channel now serving Carbide's polyethylene plant at Long Mott. Another \$890, 000 was allotted to the so-called Intracoastal Canal cut-off, which will shorten the route between Rockport and Ingleside, passing close to Aransas Pass.

Citizens of all four communities are making their plans to take advantage of this Federal largesse.

However, three years ago, when shrimp trawler at that time, with offshore drilling began to pick up, Begnaud converted her to a crew shrimping gear aboard. The long boat by removing her shrimping deck aft of the house was open gear, and adding an aft deckhouse and a flying bridge.

# In Safety Education

County Judge John D. Wendell said today that three state agencies have joined in urging the the findings of all those who have continuation of a state-wide program to acquaint the public with the Texas law requiring all vefindings are put into practice in hicles to stop when approaching a school bus loading or unloading children.

The Texas Education Agency, the Texas Highway Department, and the Texas Department of Public Safety are making a joint request that school superintendyouths in their homes, schools and television stations participate and communities, and cooperate in efforts to acquaint drivers with

The law says in effect, that upon meeting or overtaking a school bus which has stopped on the hghway for the purpose of receiving or discharging children, the driver of any vehicle shall stop immediately before passing. After coming to a stop the driver of the vehicle can proceed with due causion at a speed which is prudent and does not exceed ten miles per hour. The law does not apply within city limits.

Vehicles are not required to stop on highways with separate roadways when the bus is on a different roadway from that of a passing vehicle. Vehicles are not required to stop if the school bus is stopped in a loading zone mitted to cross the roadway

All public school buses are equipped with flasher lights. These flashing lights are used only when the bus is in the process of stopping or is stopped to
